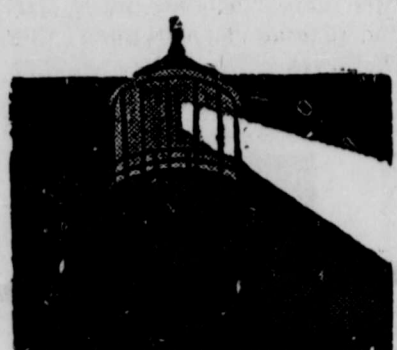

Equalization Board Named

At a called meeting of the Loraine School Board, the following men were appointed to serve on the School District's Board of Equalization: Woodrow Pratt, Roscoe Hudgins, Ralph Lankford, Ronald Bruce and Hubert Meadows.

The date of the Equalization Board's meeting to hear taxpayers was set for August 5th, in the school cafeteria between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m.

As a result in recent legislative programs that were put into law for this year, and increased cost in operation of the school, it was necessary for the Board to increase the values 20% throughout the district. This increase in valuations was put on real, personal and city property. The total tax rate will remain the same as last year, which is \$1.80 per one hundred dollar valuation.

It was necessary to raise the valuations because the school operates under Senate Bill 116, which states that as much of the money, or up to \$1.50 per one hundred dollar valuation may be put in the Local Maintenance Fund. The school was already on this for local maintenance.

No additional money was needed for retirement of bonds.

Vote For The Bonds!

The City Council is anxious for every eligible voter in Loraine to voice an opinion in the election. Of course the Council hopes that every voter will vote FOR the bonds because the Council believes it is for the best interest of Loraine that the improvements to the water system be made.

There are two very good reasons why the improvements should be made:

No. 1. It will give a large number of our citizens more water than they are now able to get through small mains. This increased use of water will give the water department an increase in revenue that will go a long way toward paying for the bonds.

No. 2. It will save money for buyers of fire insurance because, according to the base rate making agency of the state, the improvements made will lower the base rate for fire insurance in Loraine. A lower base rate means a lower premium for fire insurance on your home, your furniture, your store and its contents, etc., etc., etc. A saving that should be considerable year after year.

The Insurance Board at Austin, Texas, who set the key fire insurance for cities and towns in Texas, has notified city officials of Loraine that the improvements to the water system here should reduce the key rate in Loraine 11 cents. The present key rate is 45 cents, so the key rate should be reduced to 34 cents when the improvements are completed.

The date on which you will have an opportunity to vote on the proposition has been set for Saturday, August 23, 1969.

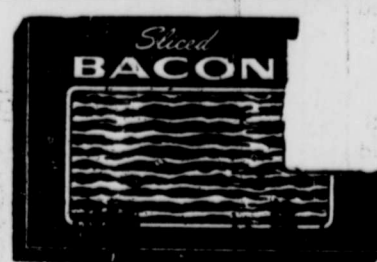
