DUTCH RUM SHIP SEIZED; MUCH BOOZE IS LANDED

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The Dutch schooner Zeehond, was seized off Fire Island today by the coast guard cutter Lexington and her captain and crew are being held for violation of the prohibition laws. 2,500 cases of champagne and other liquors valued at more than \$200,000 was confiscated by the prohibition authorities.

ATLANTIC CITY, Dec. 8.—Coast guards today reported that rum runners from Atlantic City and vicinity completed one of the most successful landings from a rum fleet ever made in the South Highlands, hitherto the center of rum smuggling operations. A steamer and four sailing vessels, believed to be part of a fleet of fifteen craft, reported earlier in the week off the Highlands, are now anchored off the Atlantic City coast.

HEADLESS BODY MISSING WOMAN FOUND IN BAY

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 8.—The headless body of Mrs. Bell Tompkins, the wife of Ray Tompkins, was found today in the vicinity of Whitefish Bay, a suburb of Milwaukee. Mrs. Tompkins had been missing since Thursday and her body was found by a searching party which was organized soon after she disappeared.

OIL MEN WILL MEET DEC. 11TH IN ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 7.—Various phases of the oil industry; European conditions, and the marine and home use of fuel oil will be discussed at the fourth annual convention of the American Petroleum Institute here, December 11-13.

Group meetings will be held for the consideration of pipe line, ship and tank car transportation of oil; standardization, simplification and improvement of oil drilling methods, and the automotive fuel problem.

GEN. CALLES LEADS FEDERALS AGAINST REBELS

(By Associated Press)
VERA CRUZ, Dec. 8.—General Calles' renunciation of his presidential candidacy and support of the Obregon government against the rebellion, will not halt the rebellion against the federal authority, it was stated at the headquarters of the rebels today. The news of Calles' withdrawal from the presidential campaign, however, caused much rejoicing. When the announcement of his withdrawal was received, chimes on church towers were sounded and the battleships in the harbor blew their whistles.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 8.—Gen. Calles has renounced his candidacy for the presidency of Mexico and has offered his services to President Obregon against the insurgent forces in Vera Cruz and Jalisco. President Obregon immediately accepted the offer and named Calles as head of the federal troops which are lined up to put down the de la Huerta-Sanchez rebellion. Federal troops to the number of 28,000, it is said, are converging upon the Vera Cruz revolutionary zone and President Obregon has issued a manifesto calling on the citizens for their support against the military tactics of the rebels. Obregon, in his manifesto brands the rebellious movement as a conspiracy against the common people on the part of the reactionary conservatives.

BALDWIN WILL RESIGN MONDAY

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The London Evening Standard today says that Premier Baldwin will resign Monday. He is likely to recommend as his successor Ramsay MacDonald, who as head of the parliamentary party is leader of his majesty's opposition in the House of Commons. There is no indication however for any authority for the newspaper statement.

YEGGS KILL WATCHMAN; FAIL TO CRACK VAULT

GIN REPORTS PUTS SKID UNDER COTTON PRICE

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—Cotton broke four dollars per bale in the local market today upon the publication of the government's ginning report. January fell to 33.78; March, 34.15; which brings the market down to a new low level for the present reactionary movement, and represents a decline of from \$15 to \$16 per bale from the season's high point of ten days ago.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Cotton ginned prior to December 1st amounted to 9,243,917 running bales, including 228,967 round bales which are counted as half bales. Up to the same date last year the total ginnings amounted to 9,319,601 running bales, including 157,768 round bales. The Census Bureau made public the government ginner's report this morning. The total ginnings in Texas amounted to 3,919,458 bales.

The back door to the bank was forced open and the vault badly damaged by blows from hammers, but the vault remained intact and the robbers failed to get away with any valuables.

"The thrill in person may be free in soul,
And I shall see the jousts,"
—Idylls of the King.

When Gareth wished to go to Arthur's court his mother forbade his going unless he would there serve as scullery lad, without telling his name or rank to any one, for a year and a day. She thought the young prince much too proud to accept such terms and hoped to keep him home with her for another year or two; but he accepted her terms, because by so doing he could see the jousts.

Those with a like spirit get anything they want from life. Whether the desire is to see the jousts, to gain wealth, to gain power, or what not, if a man desires that one thing so much that he is willing to do anything whatever to gain his desire, he will gain it. Most people go through life wishing for a dozen things instead of one. As a result they often get nothing at all. If Gareth had insisted upon retaining his princely rank and his servitors, he could not have seen the jousts. He got the one thing he wanted by giving up everything else for it.

Wealth and power and learning and beauty and health and the many other things for which men long may all be had if one is willing to pay the price. Often the price is much more than the thing is worth, but if one is willing to pay it, the thing becomes his. The price for wealth may be unending toil; denial of comfort and all self-independence, and a sacrificing of friends, relatives and principles. The price for power may be murder, as it was in the case of Macbeth, and as it has been in the case of many another ruler. The price for learning is much study and self-deprivation. The price for beauty and the price for health are much the same—eternal vigilance, proper exercise, temperate diet, hygienic habits and a calm mind.

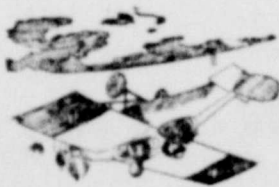
Gareth was able to reconcile himself to mental servitude by the reflection that the thrill in person may be free in soul. That his reflection was correct is abundantly attested by history. Two names stand out prominently from the many names of those who have been free in mind, although bound in body—Aesop and Epictetus. Both were slaves—the latter of a master who once tortured him by breaking his leg, but no one could have been freer in soul. The first by his tales, and the latter by his discourses, have done more to mold the thought and manner of mankind than any of the freemen who were their contemporaries.

DALLAS LEADS SOUTH IN
TELEPHONE SUBSCRIBERS

DALLAS, Dec. 8. — Dallas made a net gain of 791 telephone stations in October, the largest gain of any one month in the city's history, according to the Texas Public Service Information Bureau. There are now 47,877 telephones in this city, the largest in any Southern city, it is said. The total gain in telephone stations during 1923 reached nearly 5,000, exceeding all records, the bureau stated.

About the only criticism the inspector made of the schools was for a lack of equipment and high school facilities. The schools are meeting the requirements for affiliation, but the high school needs better equipment.

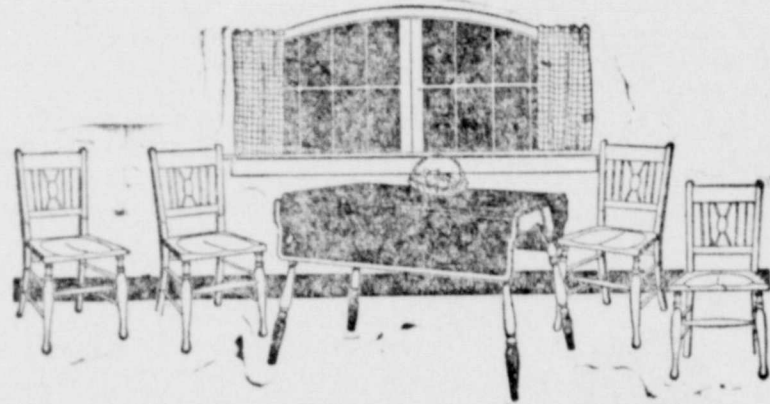

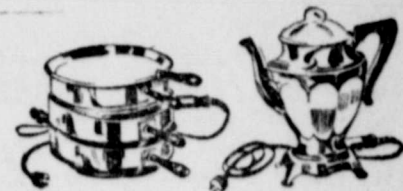

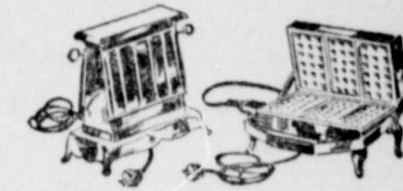

NEW OIL TEST FOR TOM GREEN

Special to The Ledger: SAN ANGELO, Dec. 8.—Fred J. Quinn, Wyoming operator, has signed a contract to drill a test for oil to 1,000 feet on the E. P. Green ranch in Tom Green county, about 16 miles Southeast of San Angelo, it was announced here Friday by Cal Huffman, who made the deal.

A lease on Mr. Green's ranch of fifteen sections is included in the transaction, which provides that spudding in must take place within ninety days from Tuesday, December 4. The ranch lies East of and borders the road leading to Fort McKavett and is known as the old McKinley ranch. It is on Lipan Flat.

Monroe W. Hooper of Coleman, made the geological survey of the property, which is highly favorable to the striking of oil in paying quantities at a comparative shallow depth. Mr. Huffman stated. The drilling contract is only the forerunner of a number of the kind that are in prospect for early in 1924, it is understood. Mr. Quinn is already here and will at once begin assembling his equipment for drilling.

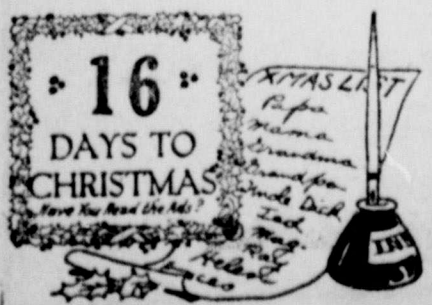

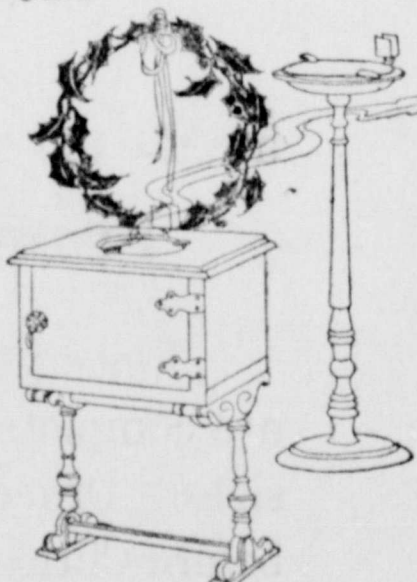
