"COUNTING THE COST"

"For which of you, intending to build a tower, sitteth not down first and counteth the cost, whether he have sufficient to finish it?" Comparatively few people are given the pleasant opportunity to plan and build a material house or tower, but are we not all builders, and are there not a great many matters in which it might well pay one to 'sit down and count the cost' to determine whether after all it really pays to do the thing he is doing. For instance, it is apparent on every side that a very large and unusual amount of business is leaving this trade territory to various mail-order houses. We wonder if either the mail-order customer or the local merchant has really 'counted the cost' of such business to this territory. Of course, each thinks (or does he really think) that he is doing the proper thing. The buyer sees what on first thought seems to be a few cents saving in an article and sends his order for it. Very probably if he would count the actual purchase price, plus postage, money order fees, etc., he would find that he was not making any savings at all from a monetary standpoint for goods of equal quality and price to be found in his own town. But is that all to be considered? Does the buyer stop to ask: how many churches has the mail order house helped to build in my community? How many schools, good roads, pianos, community song books, and the many other community needs has it contributed to? How much does it contribute to the support of the minister who preaches in my community from time to time? How much has the work of the mail-order house added to the value of my real estate? How many times has it come to my aid in the case of an emergency, such as when a fire, tornado, hail or other calamity came my way? Does what it has done compare favorably with what my home has done in this respect? Can you go all the way with your mail-order house?

How many circulars have the mail-order firms had printed by your home town printers, or how many page advertisements they run in the home papers which you so anxiously look for each week? How many postage stamps have they bought of your local post office? Should not all of this enter in when one sits down to 'count the cost'? On the other hand, has not the local merchant resigned himself to an attitude that conditions are just naturally bad and that there is not much business to be had at the best and that what there is will not justify his advertising to let the buyers know what he has and what his prices are? Has he observed that the harder business conditions get the harder the mail-order houses get after business? Has he observed that the mail-order house never fails to have its catalogues out right on the dot, regardless of what the prospects may be? Already their special holiday catalogues are in the homes of every buyer whose address can be obtained. Is he just waiting, hoping that the NRA or something else will eventually bring better conditions and that he will come out safe in the end? Does he realize that the NRA, the Lord, and everybody else helps them most who help themselves? Would not a small per cent of the business he is losing to the mail order houses justify a considerable increase in effort and advertising on his part? Should not both the buyer and the merchant really sit down and count the cost? Is it not true in the end that what helps one helps the other, and what hurts one hurts the other? Do we not need more cooperation, more of the spirit expressed in the poem, "If I knew you and you knew me"? In a nut shell and in the words of the Great Statesman, is it not a case of "We must all hang together or we may hang separately"?—Contributed.

E. B. Warren Explains School Tax Situation

In conversation with a reporter for the Courier, E. B. Warren, representing the Lamesa Independent School District in delinquent tax matters, said: "The Board of Education wishes it clearly understood that it is earnestly desired that all delinquent tax items be adjusted amicably but at the same time the Board wishes to impress it upon delinquent tax payers that these delinquent taxes must be paid."

Mr. Warren further said, "Every one must know that school cannot continue to keep open and going unless taxes be paid. Schools have no other source of revenue and too if these taxes remain unpaid and the District defaults in its bonded indebtedness, then we are face to face with the baggage of a court receiver whose duty it will be to handle the fiscal affairs of the school district, and such receiver will proceed to bail us into court to show cause why the lien on our homes and property should not be foreclosed and our real and personal property sold at Sheriff's sale."

Delayed Frost Aid To Feed Crops

With winter apparently postponing his coming until another week, scores of farmers in our territory are jubilantly anticipating bumper feed crops for their home use.

In many instances, fields laid bare during the cotton reduction campaign last summer were planted to corn, maize, heigan, and other small grain and bundle stuff. Government regulations forbade sale of this feed, but Lynn, Dawson and Borden county farmers are planning the feeding out of calves and hogs in addition to storing their winter supply of farm stock feed.

This delayed frost has meant thousands of dollars to farmers in this section. Practically all of the feed planted even as late as August has matured safely, even the bundle stuff being prime for forage when our light cold wave struck week before last. It is estimated that the Panhandle-Plains territory has the largest crop of feed in its history.

This will be convenient not only for the farmers themselves, but also for cattlemen who will be able to buy feed close at home. We understand that a number of truckers and shippers from various eastern points are here buying maize.

Four Cents On Cotton Options

\$48,000,000 To Be Distributed to Producers Immediately

Washington, Nov. 20.—Immediate distribution of \$48,000,000 constituting a 4 cent a pound advance to cotton producers who are to receive options on 2,400,000 bales of government held cotton, was announced today by Oscar Johnson, director of finance for the farm administration.

The advance will be made to approximately 600,000 producers as quickly as necessary forms can be signed.

The Reconstruction Finance corporation notified Johnson today a commitment on the cotton covered by option had been made to the Commodity Credit corporation which will make the funds available to a cotton pool to be established by Secretary Wallace.

The producers who asked options on government cotton at 6 cents a pound as part of their consideration for acreage reduction will be required to participate in the 1934 program.

After signing the agreement and transferring his option to the pool, the producer will receive \$20 for each bale upon which he is entitled to an option.

The pool will issue participation certificates to option holders who will retail their beneficial interest and upon sale of the cotton will receive their ratable share of any price above 10 cents a pound after deduction of expenses.

STUDY COURSE AT SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

Primary teachers of this county may get a Course of Study of Elementary Grades by calling at the office of the county superintendent W. T. Webb.

The local chamber of commerce is in receipt of a letter from the Compensation Claim Board, stating that it is the desire of such Board that all cotton growers who have claims against the state on account of the fumigation of cotton or the sterilization of cotton seed during the years 1929 to 1932 inclusive at once to forward their names and addresses to Fred W. Davis, care of the Department of Agriculture, Austin, Texas. It is suggested by the office of our chamber of commerce that each interested farmer do this at once.

Each person who has a claim should forward it to the address given above and within the next few days they will receive back a letter of instruction showing them how to prepare and file their claim. After the claims have been prepared and filed, the Pink Boll worm Claim Board will hold a meeting in Dawson county and each claimant will receive notice of the time and place of such meeting.

At present, the action taken by each cotton grower is to send in his name and address and the amount of his claim, and then wait patiently until he receives instructions from the Board. It is not necessary that this be in any particular form. Just so the name and address is clearly and legibly written so that there will be no mistake as to the name when it is received at Austin.

Grand Jury Returns Two Indictments Against Johnson

The grand jury Wednesday returned two indictments against John Johnson, deputy sheriff of O'Donnell.

The first indictment was for the murder of B. O. Best on May 24 and the second was for assault with intent to murder of Grady Best on the same day.

Mr. Johnson is out on bonds amounting to \$10,000. Two thousand five hundred dollars on the second indictment and \$7,500 on the first.

The trial is expected to come up in the time of court, but the date has not yet been set.

A. M. Hill Killed When Hit By An Automobile Sunday

A. M. Hill, prominent farmer who lives just south of O'Donnell but in Dawson County, was killed early Sunday night when hit by an automobile on the highway between O'Donnell and Tahoka.

Tobe Bishop of Lakeview in Lynn County, was the driver of the car that struck Mr. Hill as he was repairing a tire, took the unconscious man to Tahoka for emergency treatment, and then took him on to Lubbock to a hospital where he died at 10:15 p. m. just 45 minutes after being admitted. Mr. Hill was accompanied by A. W. Parrish who lives west of O'Donnell.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday afternoon in Lubbock with Rev. J. W. Watson officiating. Burial was made in the Lubbock cemetery.

Mr. Hill is survived by three sons, R. L. and A. L. of Littlefield, Texas who lived with his father, and a daughter, Mrs. S. D. Parker of Littlefield, by two brothers and a sister.

AIR MAIL SCHEDULES

A two-page schedule of air-mail connections has been prepared and mimeographed by the local post office and distributed to all business houses in the city this week. A large map of all air mail lines in the United States is also posted in the lobby of the post office. Postmaster J. D. Dyer states that by use of the list and the map together, patrons can readily ascertain points that may be reached by airmail and time of arrival of a letter sent from Lamesa by air-mail. Information will be furnished at the office in regard to any city not shown on the list distributed. Air-mail from Lamesa takes the air at Fort Worth or Amarillo. The rate of air-mail postage is 8c for the first ounce and 13c for each additional ounce.

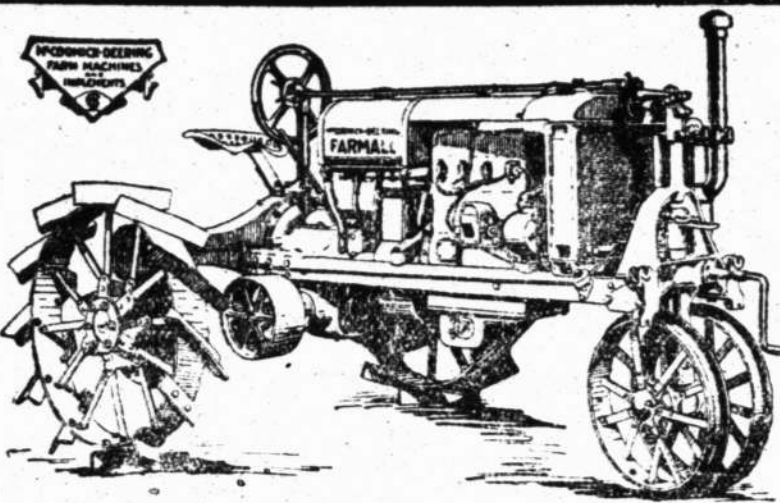

\$500,000 To Buy Texas Beef For Texas Needy

A "bought in Texas, used in Texas" plan for supplying needy Texans with beef this winter has been worked out by U. Z. Crane of the Federal Emergency Relief Corporation, Lawrence Westbrook of the Texas Relief Commission, and the Extension Service of Texas A. & M. College. As explained to county farm and home demonstration agents in their annual meeting at College Station last week it is planned to buy six million or more pounds of beef from Texas farmers for slaughter and canning at 15 to 20 central points located in the heart of areas where relief is most needed. Texas is the first and only state to try out this plan of supplying its own needy from its own resources with money supplied from Federal funds. Mr. Crane said. If it succeeds the plan may be used in purchases of butter and eggs and possibly other food stuffs.

Federal relief authorities have allocated about \$500,000 to Texas for the purchase of beef this winter above regular requisitions, and this money, less a small administrative expense, will be paid Texas farmers and ranchers for 20,000 or more fat culler cows. Regular market prices will be paid but the saving in freight and commission due to the fact that the slaughtering will be done in the areas where the cattle are bought will be given the producers. Purchases are to be distributed as widely as possible over the state and between farmers. Purchases are to be allocated to counties and experienced buyers are to be employed to do the buying. All slaughtering is to be done by commercial killers at points where there are slaughter and refrigeration facilities, and where there are R. F. C. canneries. At some places canneries will probably be established to save costly transportation.

The unemployed are to be given jobs in these canneries which are to be supervised by persons selected by the Extension Service and directed by home demonstration agents. County agents are to help in securing the supply of cattle. The cutting of the carcasses is to be done the "A and M Way" to facilitate canning, as shown in thousands of demonstrations by county agents. Meat will be canned into roasts, stew, hamburgers and chili and hash.

New Cotton Plan To Pay \$120,000,000

The new cotton plan to be offered growers who sign the Government contracts for 1934-35 provides for total payments of \$120,000,000 of which 90 million are to be paid in the form of land rentals and 30 million in "parity" payments, according to C. A. Cobb, chief of the Cotton Section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. In explaining details of the new plan to county farm and home demonstration agents at their annual meeting at A and M College last week Mr. Cobb emphasized that the plan is not yet in its final form and may be modified later. As tentatively set up in the plan, land rentals will be paid on retired cotton acres at the rate of 3 cents per pound for the average five-year production. Land producing an average of 125 pounds of lint per acre for the years 1928-32 for instance, would be entitled to a rental of \$3.75 per acre. The minimum payment would be \$2.25 per acre for production of 75 pounds of lint per acre, and the highest would be \$14 per acre.

Land rental payments are expected to land owners, with land-lords making satisfactory arrangements with tenants. In the case of large properties where fewer tenants may be needed next year the Government will probably urge landowners to allow the dismissed tenants to remain in their houses and to work food and feed crops for their living out of the retired acres. For other necessities tenants may be able to work as day laborers for the landlord. The "parity" payment promised is

one cent per pound for 40 per cent of the average five-year production. It may be more. There is expected to be 30 millions of dollars available for these parity payments on 6 million bales of cotton, or \$5 per bale. This money is to be divided among the contract signers. The parity payment is expected to be divided between landlord and tenant according to their existing share agreements. A third and fourth tenant, for example, would get three-fourths of this payment or about \$3.75 per allotted bale. Mr. Cobb expressed the belief that full details of the new plan will be available in the counties late in November and asked county agents to complete the sign-up campaign by January 15th.

School Fund Report Made Last Week

Of vital interest to practically every independent school district in Texas was the report made last Friday by State Auditor George B. Simpson. In this report, the first made since he took office, Simpson recommended several changes in the administration of the permanent school fund.

The Auditor suggested to the State Board of Education:
1. The discontinuance of the purchasing of refunding bonds for cash until authorized to acquire such bonds at their market value, instead of at par value and accrued interest.
2. The creation of an investment bureau.
3. The immediate survey of the status of the funds of political subdivisions, the obligations of which are held by the permanent school fund.

The school fund balance includes \$40,938,306.09 invested in bonds.

ON TEXAS FARMS

Bexar county wheat farmers are going many others one better in their loyalty to their government in time of stress. They have voted to stay out of the wheat plan but to reduce their acres of wheat 15 per cent anyway.

We have records of garden sub-irrigation water coming from tanks, windmills and from the weekly wash. Now a Hutchinson county woman is agent to be catching the water that reported by the home demonstration runs off the roofs of house and barn for diversion into a concrete tile sub-irrigation system.

Pork was successfully cured in the heat of late September by J. C. Walker of Victoria County in a local cold storage plant. Using the 'A & M Way' he changed three hogs for which he was offered \$25 on foot into 600 lbs. of pork worth \$50 to his family he states.

Parkways in Canadian are verdant with turnip greens this year in the effort of the city fathers to provide for their people. Farm women are among those who have gathered the green there for canning.

Somervell county farmers received from \$2 to \$4 more per acre for their plow-up cotton on terraced land than on unterraced.

An average of 236 containers of home raised garden stuff was canned by 7 girls of the Kings Highway 4-H Club in Brazos county this year. They had 24 varieties and averaged 2386 pounds of vegetables per garden.

Three creep feeders have been placed on the Elsinora Ranch in Pecos county to prevent retarding the growth of calves when grass is short. If found profitable the county agent says the ranch will provide these feeders for their entire 329 sections.

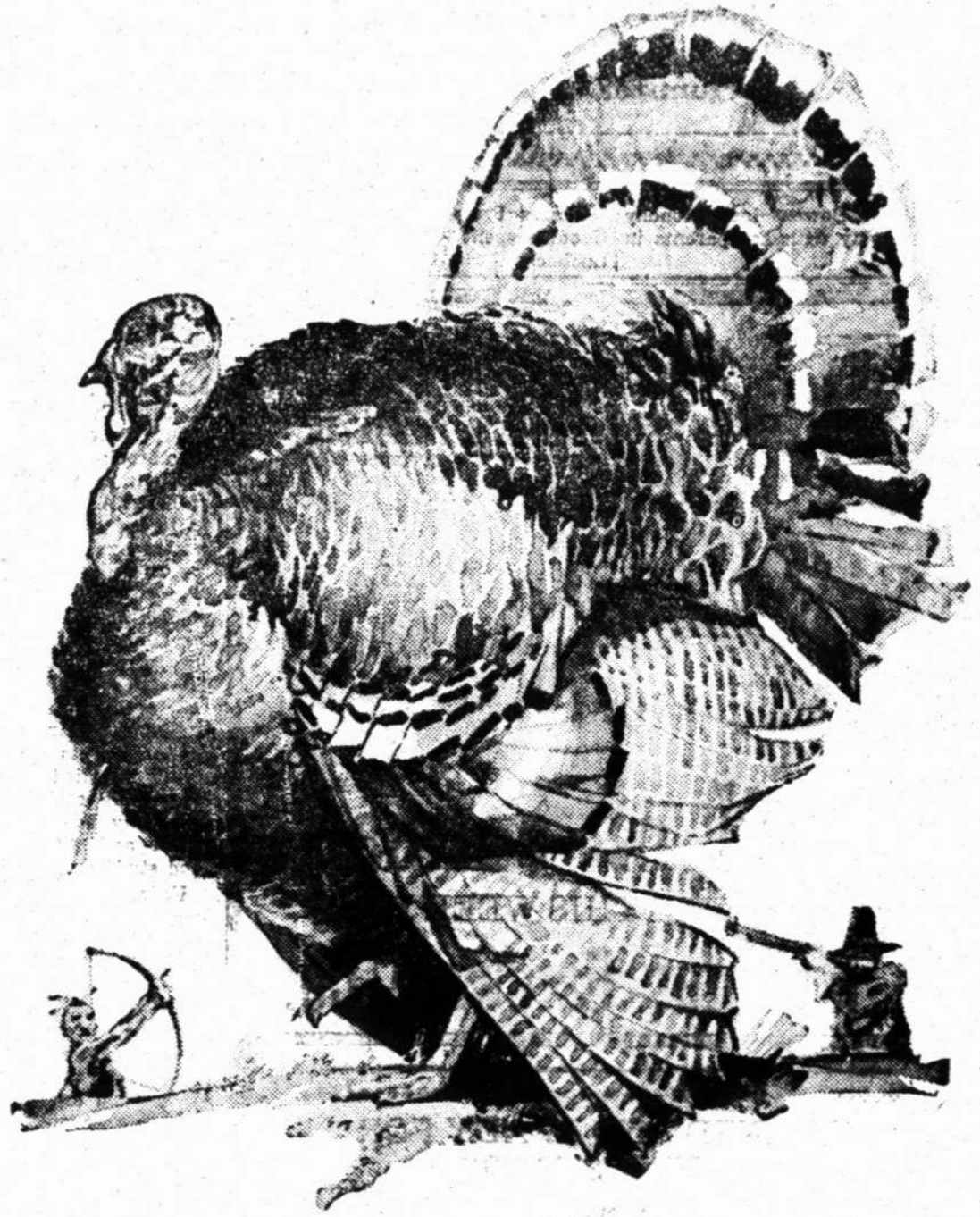

Highway Work To Provide Winter Jobs For Unemployed

Utilization of the far-flung maintenance organization of the 48 State highway departments is planned by the administration as part of the program to provide employment through the winter for the many unemployed now on relief rolls it was announced today.

In a recent telegram to all State highway departments, Thos. H. MacDonald, Chief of the Bureau of Public Roads, U. S. Department of Agriculture, outlined a tentative setup by which relief labor will be furnished and paid by the Federal Relief Administration up to 65 percent of the total expenditure. The remaining 35 percent will be from Federal funds supplied to the State highway departments, and this money will be used to pay for supervision, supplies, material and equipment.

Maintenance supervisors of the various State highway departments, under the plan outlined by MacDonald, will prepare, with the aid of county officials, a list of six, or eight highway maintenance projects in each county or district where serious unemployment exists. Each of these projects will provide for a \$5,000 expenditure. Additional projects are contemplated in populous or needy counties.

Twelve classes of work are listed for immediate undertaking: grading and draining roads and streets largely by hand labor; widening shoulders; widening inside curves and flattening slopes; laying tile underdrains; cobble gutters; fencing right of ways; dry masonry guard walls; surfacing and resurfacing with local materials or with materials supplied from other than relief funds; footpaths of local materials on outlying streets and suburban roads; clean-up of streets and trimming trees; production of road maintenance material.

State maintenance supervisors in each county will assign experienced men as foremen on individual projects. The work is not to be confined to State highway systems.

"The resourcefulness of the State highway departments should enable employment progressively to be given to hundreds of thousands of men before the end of the month," the telegraphic appeal states. Action on the program and financing will follow immediately upon submission of State highway department lists of projects so that actual work may be started without delay.

"This is a big order," the telegram says, "but on the other hand the State highway departments are the outstanding agencies of Government controlling closely-knit and disciplined organizations sufficiently dispersed to insure reasonable success to this emergency effort."

"It is an opportunity for constructive effort that must be carried through to successful completion."

Responses received by telegraph from all 48 state highway departments show that projects will be submitted and begun immediately.

TEXAS TENANT FARMERS' ASSOCIATION

PURPOSE:

Section 1. This association is willing to co-operate with the President of the United States and the Department of Agriculture of the United States in the reduction of cotton acreage, 1934-1935 and to co-operate to raise the price of any other farm crop of which there may be a surplus.

Section 2. The purpose of this association is to secure justice between tenant farmers and landlords, as follows: (a) Fair rental contracts; (b) comfortable houses; (c) and more especially to secure justice in the division of moneys received from the leasing of lands taken out of cotton production by the Department of Agriculture.

Section 3. (A) The Texas Tenant Farmers' Association, by collectively petitioning the President and the Department of Agriculture of the United States for what we deem as fair to both tenants and landlords, a fifty-fifty division of all moneys derived from the leasing of cotton acreage or from acreage taken out of production of any other agricultural crop of which there may be sufficient surplus to depress the price of same.

(B) Or, by collectively petitioning the President and Department of Agriculture of the U. S. for the tenant to receive all the feed grown on said land so leased to the Government, as specified by the President and Department of Agriculture.

(C) Or, collectively petitioning that said land be completely left uncultivated, so as not to come in competition with any agricultural crop.

(D) Texas Tenant Farmers' Association recommends that a tax of one-half of the present processing tax on cotton or other farm crops, be collected by the Department of Agriculture of the U. S. from any producer who fails to co-operate in the leasing of such lands as the Department of Agriculture may see fit to lease. Such tax to be collected at time of sale of such products, thereby lowering the processing tax on the consumer.
