Austin. — Next year's legislative session may see state employees battling as hard for a pay raise as school teachers.

Furthermore, help is assured. Gov. Connally says that "substantial pay raises for state employees" will be among his "strongest recommendations" to lawmakers.

Indications are that the pay boosts could run as high as \$17,500,000 a year.

According to Connally, state government is slipping farther and farther behind in its efforts to keep qualified workers—not only in the lowest pay levels but in the higher brackets of professional personnel.

Connally says that:

More than 7,800 of the 45,000 state employees (not including those at colleges and universities) make less than \$3,000 a year, the federal "poverty line."

Turnover is running 30 per cent per year.

Lower-bracket hospital aides get as little as \$193 a month.

There are 313 vacancies in the hospital system, 77 in parks and wildlife operations, 100 in the prison system, 135 in the highway patrol and 148 in the Texas Education Agency.

"If we do not reverse the trend," warns Connally, "not only will the stability and efficiency of our operations be threatened, but we will also weaken our entire system of local self government and responsibility."

Salary issue promptly was injected into the governor's race.

Stanley Woods, Connally's opponent for the Democratic nomination, chided the governor for not having spoken out on the subject before election time.

Woods' ticketmate, State Rep. Bill Hollowell, running for lieutenant governor, said Connally should submit the raises to an immediate special session of the Legislature rather than waiting eight months until the regular session opens.

GINNERS FIRST ON CONTROL LIST? — Texas' new nine-member State Air Control Board now has held its second meeting since Governor Connally named the group, whose purpose it is to protect the public from air pollution. Indications are that Texas' more than 1,300 cotton gins will be the first area subject to air control rules and regulations.

Conclusions after a year-long study of pollutants caused by cotton gins is that smoke emitted

from burr burning contains significant quantities of arsenic and tars. These poisons, along with gin dust, have contributed to the 20 to 30 per cent increase in complaints about respiratory diseases suffered by downwind residents during ginning season. Also, there have been adverse effects on trees and vegetation downwind from arsenic and other evidences of pollutants.

Report states that much of the increased pollutants from the gins are caused from an increase in trash—leaves, limbs, immature bolls, and dust—picked up by mechanical harvesters. Recommendations for curing these problems will be in the report of the Board's staff.

WATER QUALITY COSTS GOING UP — Taxpayers, as well as the men who run the sewage treatment plants in growing cities, must get used to the fact that in the future they are going to have to maintain high standards of operation of their plants. Higher quality water means higher cost of treatment.

This came out in the Texas Water Pollution Control Board's meeting when the City of Dallas objected to a doubling of the Board's usual chlorination requirement, arguing it would cost more than it would be worth.

Dave Smallhorst, the Board's executive secretary, said: "The cities, including Dallas, have to recognize the fact that an increase in water quality requirements is going to mean an increase in cost." Smallhorst said chlorination is necessary to protect public health and the Board's first concern is the health of the public.

HEARING SET—Railroad Commission has set a hearing for May 2 to investigate purchasing and transportation practices of the Gulf Oil Corporation and Gulf Refining Company in the Pittsburg Field in Camp County.

T. D. Humphrey Jr. and Southern Union Production Company requested the hearing. In separate action, Sinclair Refining Company asked the Commission a second time for a rule change to permit operators in the East Texas Field to transfer their allowable to another producing well when the casing of a well springs a leak. Independent oil operator Bryan Payne of Tyler opposed the change. Such a proposal was rejected by the Commission last year.

Over 20 Inches Rain In April

Sunshine Tuesday and Wednesday was welcomed after 10 days of heavy rains. The downpours brought total precipitation to record highs for April. Numerous roads and highways were closed when creeks and drivers overflowed their banks.

Highway 37 between Bogata and Mt. Vernon was closed several days and Highway 271 from Bogata to Talco was closed from Saturday afternoon until Monday morning about 9:30 when Sulphur River overflowed.

Schools at Rivercrest, Talco and Bogata were closed because of the high water Monday. Classes were resumed at the usual time Tuesday, according to Supt. Travis Hale.

Recorded at Deport the past week was 7.23 inches to bring the monthly total to 20.55 inches, with 19.96 of the amount being measured the past 10 days. About 26 inches has been recorded for the year.

Wednesday night of last week the rain was accompanied by an electrical disturbance. Lightning struck at home of Mrs. Bill Young in Deport setting fire to the living room and doing considerable damage.

Rain measured Thursday totaled 1.76 inches. Friday's rain totaled 1.85, which sent Mustang Creek overflowing into Main Street. Recorded on Saturday was 1.37 inches and early Sunday 2.25 inches. Saturday's rain again caused overflowing of Mustang Creek into Deport's Main Street, and washed farm land badly. Some farmers, who had planted cotton and had it up to a good stand, will have to replant.

At Bogata, 5.2 inches fell during thunderstorms Thursday night to Sunday night. Rain during the previous week amounted to 13 inches, making a total of 18.2 during a ten day period.

Squirrel Season Opened On May 1

Squirrel season opened May 1 in a number of Northeast Texas counties. This year the season varies with some counties having 30 days while others have a longer period.

Season in Titus and Red River counties will be May 1 to May 31, inclusive, with a bag limit of 10 per day, with 20 in possession.

In Lamar County the season is from May 1 thru June 30. Eight per day and 16 in possession.

In Franklin, Hopkins and Delta counties the season will be open in May, June and July with eight per day as bag limit and eight in possession. The season is closed in Morris and Camp counties.

Award Contr For Loop 286

McKnight Construction, Commerce has been awarded a contract by the Texas High partment for construction remaining section of L southeast of Paris.

The grading, paving, be and surfacing will extend Farm Road 905 near its intersection with Jefferson Road to State Highway 24 south of Paris.

The contract for \$433,561 was included in a record tabulation of \$40,776,531 at the end of two days of contract letting by the Highway Department in the state.

When this southwest segment is completed the only link remaining to completely encircle Paris with Loop 286 will be along Farm Road 905 from Jefferson Road to U. S. Highway 271.

Paving is almost completed on the southwest segment of the Loop from west Highway 82 around to Highway 24, and shoulders must be built up, but that section will be open before long. Bad weather has halted construction.

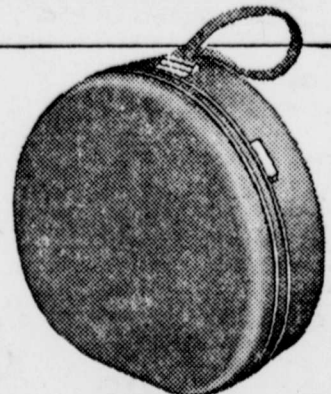

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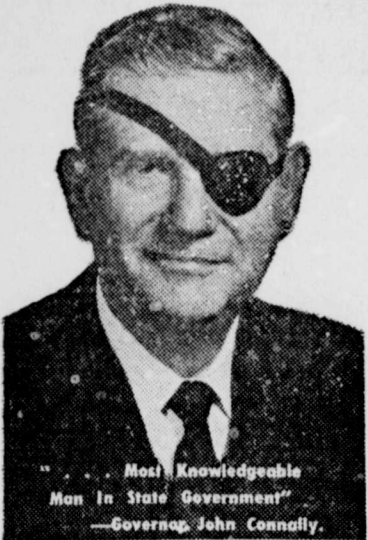

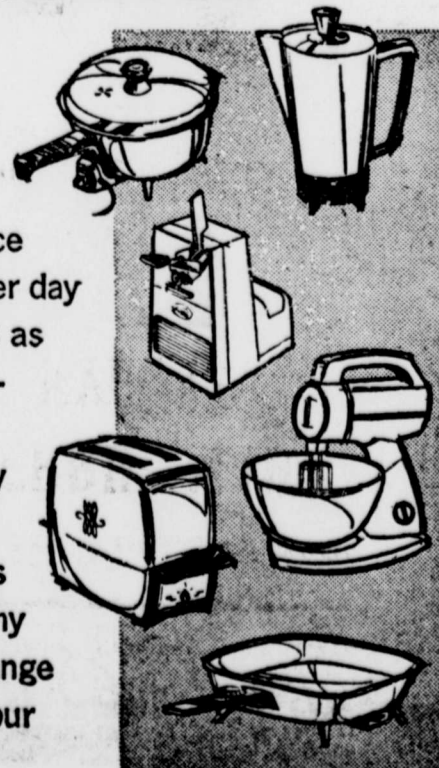
