RED TEACHINGS IN U.S. EXPOSED

RUM-CRAZED ITALIAN SPREADS REIGN OF TERROR

ONE OFFICER SLAIN, ANOTHER IS WOUNDED AS FRUIT BUYER HOLDS OFF ARRESTING PARTY

HAYWARD, Calif., Sept. 17.—Apparently crazed by drink, Joe Cataldi, 70, fruit buyer, shot and killed one policeman, wounded another and held a score of others at bay for two hours last night until he was captured after being routed from his barricaded residence by tear bombs.

George Vierra was the officer killed. Al La Cunha, a constable, was wounded.

Neighbors said Cataldi came home intoxicated and started shooting at his wife with a rifle. She fled, and police were called.

Vierra and La Cunha answered the call and, when they started for the front door Cataldi opened fire. Vierra fell, mortally wounded, and La Cunha was shot down as he reached for his gun.

Cataldi barricaded himself in the house, and held reserve officers at bay with a stream of bullets.

Tear bombs were tossed through the windows, and after two hours Cataldi emerged from a back door. He was slightly wounded.

FORMER TEXTILE STRIKER, ON STAND IN MOB TRIAL, TELLS OF THREATS ON GOVERNMENT

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Sept. 17.—Carl Holloway, former striker, and one of 14 men accused of having been concerned in the kidnapping of three men during disturbances on the night of September 9, denied today he was in the mob or had any connection with it.

He testified in his own defense at the hearing being conducted before Judge Thomas J. Shaw.

Holloway quit work April 2 when the National Textile Workers union called a strike at the Lora cotton mill in Gastonia. He was for a time picket captain for the union but later returned to the mill.

Asked by Solicitor John G. Carpenter why he had quit the union, Holloway said it was "because of free love, association with negroes, and religion."

"What did they teach you," Holloway was asked, by Plummer Stewart, defense counsel.

"There is no God," "They taught us there was no God, to do away with marriage laws and overthrow the government," he replied.

"What did they say about the government?" "Some said throw it out, and some said sweep it out."

Moody Not Decided On Pollard's Place

AUSTIN, Sept. 17.—Governor Moody said today he did not know when he would announce his choice of a successor to Attorney General Claude Pollard who resigned effective today.

"I'll say this, you newspapermen have guessed wrong; none of those you have mentioned will get the place," he said.

JURY LISTENS TO PLAINTIFF

GEORGE SIMPSON GOES ON STAND IN BOND SUIT IN CITY

George L. Simpson, of Dallas, is on the witness stand this afternoon testifying as to the contract he had entered into with the city, as the second day of the hearing in 99th District court of his suit against the city of Lubbock for recovery of \$1,745, premium alleged to have been paid for \$349,000 worth of warrants unloads pages of an agreement made in 1927.

Mr. Simpson's testimony followed that of W. H. Rodgers, city secretary, who identified on the witness stand various papers of proceedings and related that the city had not advertised sale of the bonds 30 days prior to date of contract with Mr. Simpson. The latter was testimony introduced in support of the city's contention that the transaction was illegal because sale of bonds was not advertised.

Lindy To Fly Over New Air Mail Route

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh will leave tomorrow for Miami, Fla., to open another Latin-American air mail route.

As technical adviser to Pan-American Airways, he will make the first flight with mail over the company's new line extending its service from Porto Rico to the Virgin Islands, Antigua, St. Lucia, Trinidad, British Guiana and Dutch Guiana.

He will be accompanied by Mrs. Lindbergh and a crew consisting of Charles Lorber, as co-pilot, and W. W. Ehmer, radio operator. If the mail load permits, several passengers will be taken also.

BANK EMPLOYEES IN TWO CITIES ARE HELD ON CHARGES OF LOOTING SAFES

LEWISTON, Maine, Sept. 17.—Wilbur H. Davis, treasurer of the Peoples Savings bank, who last night told police he had been trussed by two armed robbers who had taken \$5,000 in currency and securities from the bank, was arrested today charged with robbing the institution of ten thousand dollars. Police declared a preliminary examination indicated the bank might have lost between \$50,000 and \$100,000 through defalcations.

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FOSHEE TRIAL IS TOMORROW

FIRST MURDER TRIAL IN HOCKLEY COUNTY IS SET WEDNESDAY

The trial tomorrow in Levelland of B. A. Foshee, charged with murder in connection with fatal shooting September 7 of Elmer Wright, 23, will be just another trial to go on Texas court records, but it will have a different significance to Levelland, for it will usher in the first murder trial to be held in 72nd district court of Hockley county.

Surrendering in Levelland to Sheriff L. P. Williams, shortly after the shooting, Foshee explained, "I had to do it; he was breaking up my home."

Has Not Made Bond

Bond for Foshee was set at \$5,000 by a grand jury last week and he has been held in the Hockley county jail since his surrender.

Preliminary discussion in court circles indicates that Foshee will plead the "unwritten law" and will attempt to justify the killing on the ground that Wright had broken up his home. Young Wright was a single man and lived on a farm at the home of his sister, Mrs. W. A. Kitchen, eight miles northwest of Levelland, and about one mile from the Foshee farm.

Weldon F. Johnson of Levelland, and C. C. Crenshaw and George Dupree of Lubbock will defend Foshee, while the state will be represented by District Attorney Durwood Bradley. Judge Homer L. Pharr will preside.

Federal Action Will Be Asked To Break Alleged Trust

TEXARKANA, Sept. 17.—While Assistant Attorney General Jack Blalock prepared to open an investigation of alleged price fixing by cotton companies buying cotton seed in this section, Congressman Wright Patman of this district announced he would go to Washington to lay his charges before the department of justice. Patman charges the companies are keeping the price about \$10 below what it should be.

Blalock revealed the attorney general had been investigating the cotton seed situation in other parts of Texas before Congressman Patman's charges gained publicity for the matter. The congressman has been interested in the matter for a year and will turn his data over to Blalock. The assistant attorney general said yesterday his inquiries already have convinced him an investigation is justified and a hearing will be held in this congressional district with the next ten days.

Rangers Keep Up Hunt For Slayer

STATE OFFICERS REFUSE TO DIVULGE NEWLY FOUND FACTS IN SLAYING OF PROSECUTOR

BORGER, Sept. 17.—With their customary reticence Texas Rangers announced today there were no new developments and went ahead with their relentless search for the gunman who Friday night shot and killed District Attorney John A. Holmes of Borger.

Holmes was buried at Panhandle yesterday in an impressive ceremony in which more than 2,000 people took part. The Baptist church there was too small for the crowd, and several hundred were unable to attend the ceremony.

Calls For Action

Clifford Bralley, district attorney at Pampa who is taking over the duties of Holmes' office until the position is filled, touched the high spot of the ceremony when, in an impassioned address at the grave, he called upon all law-abiding citizens to take up the fight which Holmes was waging against lawlessness and to carry it to a successful end.

Although Mrs. Holmes, who first asked that no Hutchinson county officials attend the funeral, related and invited the officials, only one of them attended. County Judge H. M. Hood, lifelong friend of the slain prosecutor, acted as one of the pall bearers.

SHORTAGE OF FUNDS BLOCKS PAY-DAY FOR EMPLOYEES OF COUNTY AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—It was semi-monthly pay day for 4,000 Cook county employees yesterday, but they didn't get paid. County Controller William J. Graham said he doubted if they would be paid for two or three months.

"Our pay roll of approximately \$400,000 fell due yesterday, but instead of paying checks we locked the rolls up in the vault," Graham said. "Of course, the employees will have to be paid some time, but when, nobody knows."

The county board Thursday will consider the plan of pay-

ing employees in scrip. In such a case employees would have to take their scrip to the bank and discount it for what the banks would offer.

The shortage in the corporate fund was explained by the controller as being due to the 1928 reassessment which not only has delayed tax collection but has resulted in valuations considerably lower than those anticipated by the budget makers.

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BIG ENROLLMENT SEEN FOR TECH

Presaging a record-breaking enrollment for the 1929-30 session, 889 persons have sent in records asking for admission, 300 of whom will be transferred from other colleges, according to an announcement made Monday afternoon at the first faculty meeting of the institution.

Practically all of the 128 faculty members were present at the meeting.

HOMES ARE IN PATH OF FIRE

BROKEN POWER LINE AND WIND SPREAD DISASTER

VENTURA, Calif., Sept. 17 (AP)—A fire that started from a broken electric power line and whipped itself into a 7,000 acre inferno when fed by boiling oil from a tank exploded from the resulting heat threatened the homes of Santa Paula canyon near here today. A force of 200 men battled to save the homes after police had ordered them vacated as a safety measure.

Damage estimated at about \$2,000,000 had been done by the blaze, an oil still was burning with terrific force, although it had been partially controlled. Fire wardens said many homes still were in danger, but they hoped to entirely subdue the blaze before it had destroyed much more property.

Started On Monday

The fire started yesterday five miles north of Santa Paula and swept toward the canyon, soon cutting a path two miles wide and about five miles long. Ranch houses, oil derricks and other property went up in flames.

ONE DAY STRIKE FOR PROTEST CALLED IN CAROLINA

(By Associated Press)
CHARLOTTE, N. C., Sept. 17.—A one-day strike of all workers in textile mills of this section, as a "mass protest against the murder terror" of mill owners and their government, was called for today by Communist and National Textile Workers Union leaders.

The funeral of Mrs. Ella May Wiggins, union member slain during Saturday's mob activities against Communists, was the occasion for the strike call. It was issued last night after a day of hearings on strike disorders, which saw the freeing of eight unionists charged with conspiracy to overthrow the government of North Carolina, the postponement until today of a case against a labor leader charged with carrying concealed weapons, and continuation of testimony in the hearing of 14 men accused of being members of a mob which kidnapped three unionists early last week and flogged one of them.

Mrs. Wiggins was shot as an automobile occupied by members of a mob collided with a truck load of union members from Gastonia Saturday and the mob opened fire on the truck. The mob had turned the strikers back as they tried to attend a Communist meeting at South Gastonia. The inquest into Mrs. Wiggins' death was postponed Sunday until next Saturday after seven men had been arrested on charges of manslaughter.

Fight On Dope Will Be League's Effort

GENEVA, Sept. 17 (AP)—The British delegation at the League of Nations assembly today presented a proposal regarded here as marking great advance in the fight to limit manufacture and to check illegal traffic in dangerous drugs.

The proposals designed to bring about an international agreement for control and limitation of production of heroin, morphine and cocaine were regarded as representing a complete reversal by the Labor government of the late Baldwin government's attitude on the question of limitation and manufacture.

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AMERICAN-BRITISH NAVY AGREEMENT LOOKS LIKE SUCCESS

NAVAL ACCORD GIVEN PRAISE

BRITISH PRESS STAMPS O. K. ON PLANS OF MACDONALD

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Sept. 17.—Great Britain through its press today hailed with approval the prospective Anglo-American naval agreement which Minister Ramsay MacDonald caused to be outlined in detail to British journalists for the first time at the foreign office yesterday.

Editorial declared in effect that with such a narrow margin as three cruisers between the United and Great Britain on the question of naval strength it was scarcely imaginable that complete agreement could not be reached.

In Given Briefly
The British and American naval position is brief as follows:
Great Britain desires 50 cruisers, divided into two categories, namely eight inch gun and six inch gun carriers. Thirteen eight inch and 37 six inch gun cruisers would make a total tonnage of 338,000.

The United States wants 36 cruisers, 21 eight inch gun carriers and 15 six inch gun carriers, these vessels having a larger tonnage than corresponding British units, thus giving America 318,000 in tonnage.
Margin Is Small
Thus the disputed margin between the two countries is three inch gun carriers and tonnage of 15,000. Great Britain has suggested that total American cruiser tonnage be placed at 300,000.

On all other naval categories complete agreement has been reached. Battleships were dealt with at the Washington arms conference. Destroyers involve a wider settlement than Anglo-American agreement. The two countries are agreed that submarines can be eliminated from their navies.

Japan Is Interested
TOKYO, Sept. 17 (AP).—Publication in London of an authoritative outline of the present status of the Anglo-American cruiser negotiations has focused Japanese attention on the difference in the maximums for Great Britain and the

BRITAIN USES YANK FIGURES

ESTIMATE MADE BY U. S. BOARD BASIS OF ACCORD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP).—Insisting that the American navy's fleet of 8-inch gun cruisers of ten thousand tons be limited to eighteen, the British government is taking the figures which once were arrived at by the American navy general board as representing requirements of this nation.

These figures were put forward only a little more than two years ago in the midst of the controversy between the United States and Great Britain on the cruiser question at the tri-partite naval limitation conference at Geneva. Britain opposed any 8-inch gun cruisers, and it was upon that proposition in the main that the parity broke down.

U. S. Makes Offer
England proposed as its minimum requirement in cruisers a total of about 450,000 tons. The United States objected to such a large tonnage and finally offered to limit its cruiser strength to 355,000 tons to be made up of eighteen 10,000 ton 8-inch ships to be built, and the ten 7,500 ton 6-inch ships then in commission.

Thus far in the present negotiations, the administration is supporting the general board in favor of the 8-inch gun ship as against the 6-inch gun craft. It is no secret the American government would be willing to forego construction of the 30,000 tons now in controversy. However, the British requirement of 338,000 tons is conceded, and this additional tonnage is necessary to produce parity between the fleets.

MOODY'S PLAN FINALLY WINS TO GET ORGANIZATION FOR FARMERS; FEDERAL RELIEF FUNDS MAY BE GIVEN TEXAS

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, Sept. 17.—Participation of Texas farmers in the \$5,000,000 agricultural relief fund of the present administration was nearer realization here today after a definite plan was set in motion by Governor Dan Moody's statewide committee of bankers Monday.

After opposition to Governor Moody's plan developed during a three hour meeting Monday, it appeared for a time that the financiers would have no part in fostering an organization to avail farmers of the state of benefits of the recently enacted federal agricultural marketing act.

Moody Wins Out
In the end Governor Moody's plea for co-operation prevailed and the group of about forty heads of banking institutions adopted resolutions to sponsor the program submitted by a legislative committee of four and approved by the governor.

The seven committees named were L. R. Gabbard, chief of the farm and ranch division of the Texas agricultural experiment station; John E. Owens, vice president of the Republic National Bank and Trust company, Dallas; W. M. Mc-

Gregor, president of the First National bank, Wichita Falls; P. B. Doty, president of the First National bank, Beaumont; W. B. Lee, vice president Spur National bank, Spur; Representative Lawrence Westbrook of Waco, and John Q. McAdams, president Winters State bank, Winters.

Amendatory provisions of the main resolution bespoke the co-operation of the Texas bankers and pledged individual aid of those present.

Horn Fights Plan
Among bankers who strenuously opposed the plan during the session was A. A. Horn of Galveston, president of the Texas Bankers association.

Horn declared he would oppose the sponsorship of the program "with all the power I have."

Horn, after refusing Governor Moody's request to preside at the session, termed the plan "socialistic and paternalistic" and declared it was certain to fail in its purpose.

By authority of a resolution, Governor Moody appointed seven members of the committee to designate temporary chairman for the seven soil districts, which themselves yet are to be defined. From these appointments it was planned to work out the smaller details of the organization.

The seven committees named were L. R. Gabbard, chief of the farm and ranch division of the Texas agricultural experiment station; John E. Owens, vice president of the Republic National Bank and Trust company, Dallas; W. M. Mc-

KIDNAPED LAD IS FREED BY POLICE

Inspector Henry J. Garvin said he learned Holdreth's father paid \$5,000 to his son's abductors Saturday. The youth's release was prevented by the inadvertent capture by police of two of the kidnapers as they left the rendezvous where the elder Holdreth was said to have turned over the money.

Edward Wilds and Frank Hohfer, named by Garvin as two of the kidnapers, were taken by police after a running gun fight with a police scout car seeking a stolen taxicab. Police at that time did not know of the kidnapping.

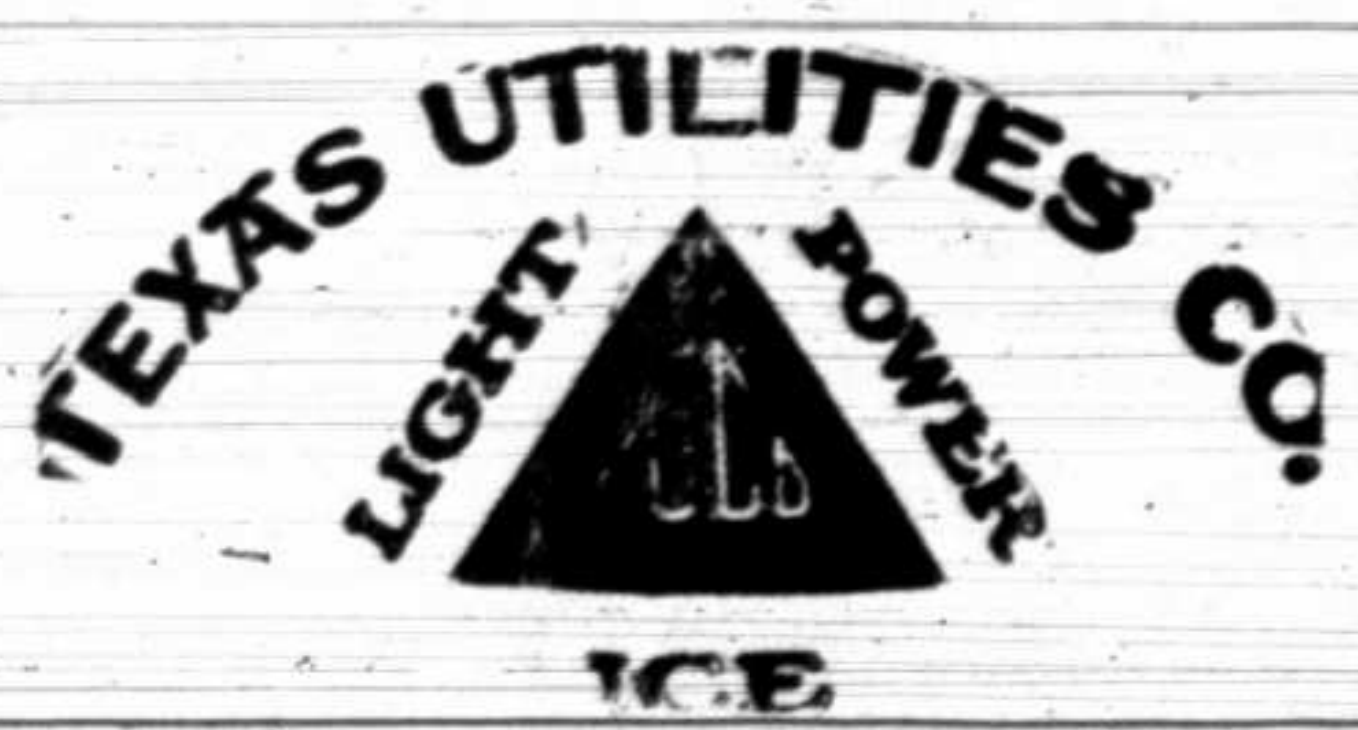

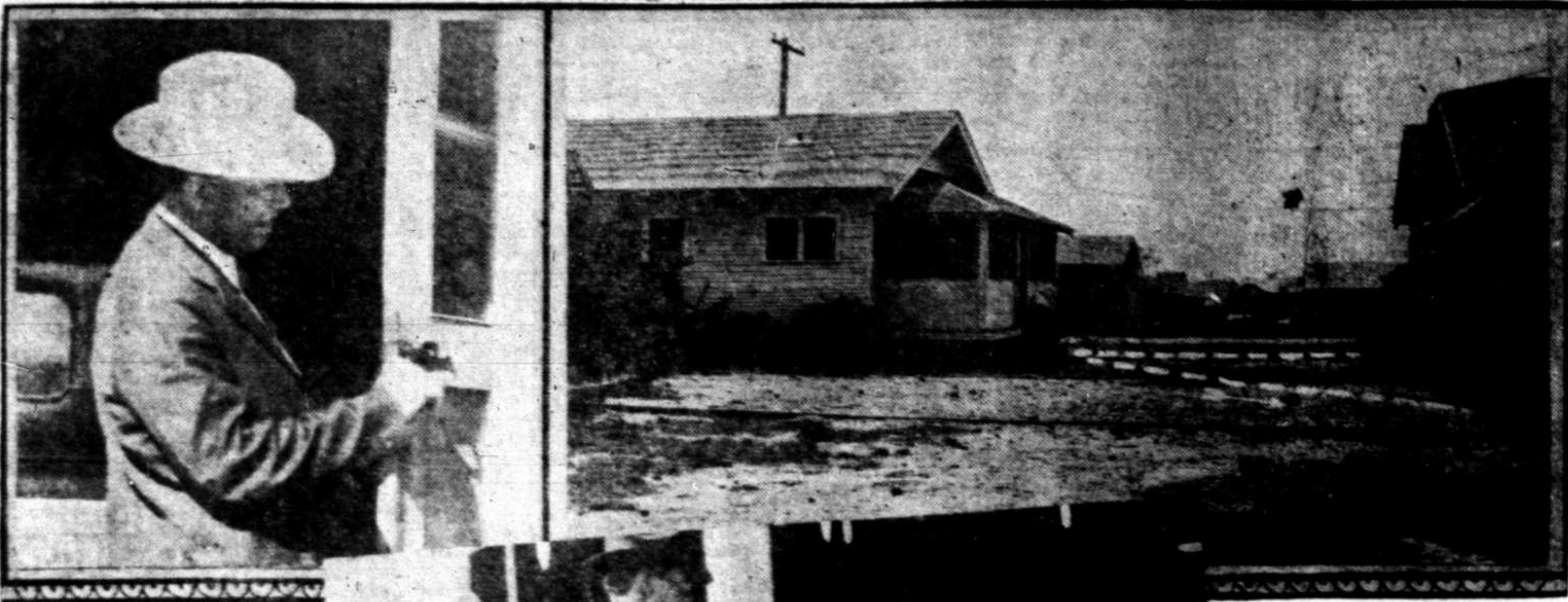

HIDALGO CASE GETS SETTING

FIGHT FOR JUDGESHIP WILL BE HEARD ON OCTOBER 9TH

AUSTIN, Sept. 17. (AP)—The case of J. E. Leslie against Gordon Griffin, involving the judgeship of the 33rd Judicial District in Hidalgo county, was set Monday by the third court of civil appeals for argument October 9.

Judge Leslie, now District Judge, has appealed from a decision of the Travis county district court which ordered the Hidalgo county commissioners court to canvass the votes in the Weslaco precinct, after the court had refused to include them in the count.

Griffin, who is an independent candidate for judge, claimed that the Weslaco box had been included in the canvass he would have been elected.

Griffin brought a suit for injunction against Mrs. Jane Y. McCallum, secretary of state, to restrain her from opening and canvassing the returns as sent by the commissioners court.

It was alleged that the envelope bearing the Weslaco returns had not been sealed and that there were irregularities around that box on election day, these things influencing the court to disregard the votes cast there.
