Applications For NROTC Available

Applications for the Navy's twenty-first annual regular NROTC qualification test are now available according to Mrs. Vivian Martin, Counselor at the Rivercrest High School. This nationwide examination will be given on Dec. 10, 1966, and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations and other factors, Mrs. Martin explained, over 1,700 young men will enter the regular NROTC Program as midshipmen at NROTC units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the nation. Male citizens of the United States will be at least 17 but not yet 21 on June 30, 1967, and who are now high school seniors or graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations next January and February.

A successful candidate receives financial aid for four years of college. This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50.00 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing baccalaureate degree requirements and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the U. S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Regular NROTC midshipment participate in three summer cruises with various naval units. These cruises help them learn more about the variety of interesting and challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps officers.

Registration for the test will close Nov. 18, 1966. 1967 NROTC Bulletins containing eligibility requirements and qualifying test applications are available from Mrs. Vivian Martin or the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station, Paris, Texas.

Amos Green Wins Fiddling Contest

Amos Green, Bogata jeweler won first place in an old fiddlers' contest at the Rains County Free Fair at Emory Friday night.

The Bogata fiddler took second prize at the Red River County Fair two years ago. He performs regularly with a country and western group, The Poke Salad Pickers. They have made appearances at various community and social functions and each Friday night attend a musicale held at the McCoy community near Clarksville.

Green's first fiddle was given him at the age of 14 by his father, John F. Green, who was also an old time fiddler. The father gave his own instrument to the boy, who made good use of it.

Green recalls one frustrating fiddling experience: at the Red River County Fair last year the group he was performing with was using an amplifier. Green played his heart out only to discover later that his fiddle had not been plugged in.

Tax Assessing In R. R. Co. Changed

Concerning the change authorized by the Commissioners' Court in the procedure for rendering State and County taxes, Assessor-Collector Marion Hines makes the following announcement:

"This year we are making a change in our assessing procedure which we feel will render a better service to our citizens.

"All assessing will henceforth be done at the Courthouse in Clarksville by a chief deputy assessor, and each taxpayer will be asked to render their valuations at the assessor's office.

"No deputy assessors will make personal calls on individual taxpayers.

"Property not rendered by March 31 will have a rendition placed on it by the assessor and no notice will be given to the owner. This is in accordance with the law.

"We ask your full cooperation in this procedure and hope that it meets with your approval. We will welcome your comments and questions."

A2c Billy Adams Gets Heroism Medal

A2c Billy M. Adams of the U. S. Air Force has been presented the Airman's Medal for an act of heroism involving voluntary risk of life at Kadena Air Base, Okinawa, on 2 April 1966. On that date, Airman Adams went to the rescue of a fellow airman who was involved in a motorcycle-truck head on collision which pinned the airman and his motorcycle beneath the truck. The motorcycle gasoline tank ruptured and exploded, engulfing the victim in flames. With complete disregard for his own safety, and despite the possibility that the truck's gasoline tank might explode at any moment, Airman Adams unhesitatingly guided the truck away, reached into the flames and removed the victim to a place of safety, sustaining first degree burns on his own hands in the process. By his courageous action and humanitarian regard for his fellow man, Airman Adams has reflected great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force."

Airman Adams, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Adams of Fulbright, is married to the former Miss Sandra Mathena of Bogata, and they have a nine month old son, Michael Jeffery. The serviceman's wife and son are making their home in Bogata while he is in Viet Nam.

Austin. — Far flung operations of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department have been placed under new administrative leadership.

Commissioners have named J. R. (Bob) Singleton as executive director. He replaced J. Weldon Watson who resigned last June.

Singleton had been serving as director of Region IV with headquarters in La Porte.

He picked Robert G. Mauermann, Region V director at Rockport, as his chief deputy.

In his first press conference, Singleton said he is considering recommending a change in the Commission's controversial policy on shell dredging.

He did not disclose exactly what he has in mind but said any such proposal would be "in the field of broad policy." His own close observation of dredging operations, he added, has convinced him that the Commission's 1963 and 1964 orders permitting shell dredging up to 300 feet of live reefs under close department supervision result in "extremely insignificant" oyster kill.

This issue has been heatedly debated between dredgers on one hand and fishermen and conservationists on the other since the old 1,500-foot - minimum - distance - from-reef policy was abolished.

A statewide tour of department facilities, particularly the parks, is planned by Singleton in order to familiarize himself first-hand with problems and needs.

Singleton declined to express his views on "closed door" meetings of the three-member P-W Commission. However, he did say "The commission sets policy. . . My duty is to implement and carry out that policy."

goner Carr, it must. He pointed to the law which prohibits the use of tax funds for any purpose other than for which it was levied.

Carr also held that, while a city may prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages at any time, it may not prescribe a lesser penalty for such an offense than is provided by state law.

A district court has exclusive jurisdiction over all suits on behalf of the state and county for the collection of penalties on delinquent personal property taxes, although the county court may have the power to share jurisdiction in a suit against property for the actual taxes, Carr ruled.

BIG BEND AIRPORT PLAN NED — Federal money will be available for building an airport adjacent to Big Bend National Park for commercial and general aviation, confirms Charles Murphy, Texas Aeronautics Commission director.

Daniel Beard, National Park Service Southwest regional director, said \$450,000 is expected to be provided by the U. S. government.

Money will go to land acquisition, planning and designing and actual construction. T. A. C. will supervise the work, including awarding of contracts, Murphy said. State will have to pay the cost of constructing terminal facilities and auto parking accommodations, as well as airport operation.

Texas funds are not now available and will require legislative appropriation or transfer from other source. Arizona's share of the Grand Canyon airport constructed under similar terms was about \$160,000.

STUDY RESULTS — Attorney General Carr reports that a two-month study of Texas Highway Department records reveals no indication or evidence of price fixing

among asphalt producers' sales to the state.

Carr's staff made the study at the request of DeWitt C. Greer, state highway engineer. Request followed the filing of lawsuits in other states alleging anti-trust violations by asphalt producers.

PROGRAM HAS BOOST—Texas' marketing program got a big boost when John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, received more than \$45,000 in donated equipment to be used as traveling showcases.

These contributions from farm commodity groups, individuals and industry signaled a "new era in Texas agriculture, marketing and education," White said.

Gifts included two large trucks, two power generators, two mobile trailers, exhibit material and operational funds.

SHORT SNORTS
State will earn about \$2,000,000 more in interest on its time deposits this year due to a one-half percent increase, State Treasurer Jesse James estimates. James said interest collections under the 4 1/2 percent rate should be \$10,000,000, compared to \$8,700,000 for the fiscal year which ended August 31.

Texas' oil production allowable was boosted for October to 33.5 percent of potential. Raise was first in five months. October percentage allows maximum oil production of 3,154,384 barrels a day, compared to September allowable of 3,125,028 under a 33 per cent factor.

State Board of Health has withheld action on 80 requests for federal hospital construction funds until Congress appropriates money for distribution. Since only about \$17,500,000 in federal funds will be available for Texas, State Board will have to sift through all the applications to find the most pressing ones.

Historical Sites Will Be Marked

Two sites in Red River County have been named as Recorded Texas Historical Landmarks and will receive the Texas Historical Building Medallion with an interpretive plate. Red River County Courthouse at Clarksville and the Roy L. Garland Home 1 1/2 miles south of Annona will be so honored. Dates for dedication of the markers will be announced later.

Official inscription states that the Red River County Courthouse records date from 1836. It was the fifth courthouse for the county—was built in 1885, with Italian Renaissance architecture design.

The Garland home was built in 1840 by Joseph Wagley, who came here with his brother from Germany. They were pioneer farmers and homesteaders, living in a one-room log cabin (which still exists in good condition) until they could clear land for the main house.

Joseph Garland bought the house just before the Civil War, and five generations of Garlands have lived there since then. Roy Latimer Garland owns the house today.

Finishing materials for the house were hauled in by ox wagon from Shreveport, La. Slave labor was used and the brick were hand-made from local clay. Massive hand-hewn timbers were used for walls; log walls have morticed and pegged corners. The place served as a stagecoach stop on Jefferson Road.

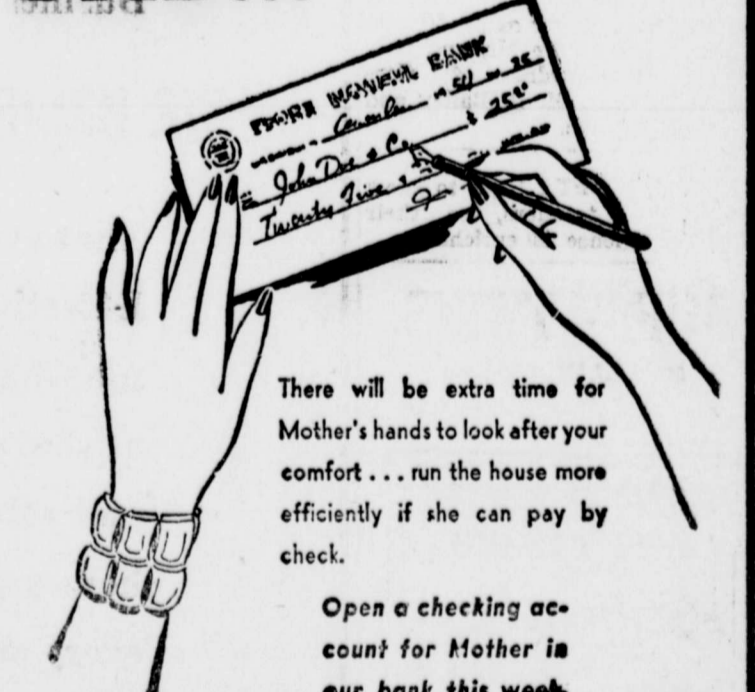
Location of both these historical sites will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers in tourist guides, and on maps.
