Former Ciscoan's Work As Crime Investigator Cited By Magazine

A former Cisco man, now serving as special investigator for the district attorney in Riverside, California, was responsible late last year for saving a man who faced death in the California gas chamber for the murder of his wife.

According to a story in the April, 1953, Official Detective Story magazine, Donald Archer, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Archer of Cisco, chief investigator for District Attorney William O. Mackey, was convinced that the condemned man was not guilty despite an eye witness account and a virtual confession on the part of the man who was accused of the torch slaying of his wife.

After talking with the accused man Archer was convinced of his innocence, and spent hour upon hour working on his theory. In his investigation he found that the accused was drunk at the time of the deed and that the eye witness told the story because of jealousy.

The investigation proved that the man's wife died of burns received when her clothing became ignited from an exploding stove. The man was cleared of all guilt and was released after spending weeks in the death cell.

Donald Archer is a native of Cisco. He lived here until he enlisted for duty with the armed forces during World War II. After his discharge seven years ago he went to work in the office of the sheriff of the California county.

He stayed there until two years ago when he was selected by the district attorney as a special investigator, in charge of his investigating staff, because

of his ability and devotion to duty.

According to the story Archer summed up his work on the case by saying: "There's more satisfaction in getting an innocent man out of jail than there is in putting a guilty one in."

Archer is the brother of Lee Archer and Mrs. Elvis Nelms of Cisco.

When they arrived in the area they settled on a farm some three miles south-east of Cisco where they lived until 1912 when they moved to their home at 1202 Avenue L.

Mr. Shelton died several years ago.

New Coaches Will Direct Practice

Coach Jay Williams has notified his Cisco High school Lobos to be on hand Monday after school to begin spring training. He reported that Assistant Coach Al Langford would be on hand to assist with the spring training program.

Coaches Williams and Langford expect 11 lettermen to report for the initial drills. In addition there are 24 "B" team lettermen expected to report, as well as some recruits up from the junior high school Midgets.

Among the returning lettermen are 10 linemen and one back. Marcus Gallegos is the only returning backfield man on the team. The fleet halfback was expected to bear the brunt of the attack this year. Returning linemen are: ends — Bill Smith, Danny Louder, and Monte Ingram; tackles — Arzell Hale, Benny Edwards and Bill Miller; guards — Jim Reynolds and Sonny McCrea and centers — Bob Qualls and Fred Hayes.

Lettermen from the "B" team were expected to fill in the gaps caused by graduation. They are: ends — Levere Adams; tackles — Edward Bernie, Donald Meier, Kenneth Penn and Carroll Thames; guards — Joe Wayne Farrow, Frank Walton, Tommy Collier, Billy Duke and Buz Johnson; centers — Ronnie Qualls and Robert Fletcher, and backs — Tommy Reynolds, Howard Hamilton, Jim Sublett, Buck Whitehead, Tommy Pippin, Kent Davis, B. Webb, E. Moore, Paul Ford, Bobby Bennie, John Carlisle, Bob Miller and Bob Notgrass.

The main problem facing the coaches was finding a quarterback to handle the ball on the split-T formation. Best prospects for that post were Tommy Reynolds and Howard Hamilton.

There was a possibility that Fred Hayes might be tried at that post. The situation at the end position was also causing some worry. It was considered possible that Bill Miller would be used at end if he is eligible. Bill Smith was considered in at one post if he is able to play during the coming season. Louder, Ingram and Adams were expected to develop into good prospects.

The tackle and guard situation looked some better. Edwards, Hale, Bernie, Meier, Penn and Thames were expected to fight it out for the tackle positions.

Jim Reynolds, Joe Wayne Farrow, Sonny McCrea and Tommy Collier were considered the best prospects for the guard posts with Walton, Duke and Johnson giving them a run for their jobs.

A brother combination loomed at the center position with Bob and Ronny Qualls as the best prospects. Fred Hayes, last year's substitute center, may be moved to the backfield. Robert Fletcher was considered a good prospect.

In the backfield Kent Davis was expected to come through at the fullback position. Davis was one of the "B" team standouts last year. Gallegos, Pippin, and Whitehead were considered the best prospects at half. Others who might develop in spring drills are Carlisle, Hamilton and Miller. Other candidates were small but full of fight.

Best prospects up from the junior high school were Benji Lipsey, David Ewell, Jackie Reynolds, John Trigg and a host of other linemen and backs.

Plans call for stiff workouts to begin on the opening day. Track team members who win their district races will probably not report for drills for the first week.

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U of T SCIENTIST SAYS NATION'S GRASSLAND COULD YIELD MORE

AUSTIN, April 11. — The nation's grasslands can be made to produce significantly more than they now do, a University of Texas scientist declares.

In a new University publication, "Research and the Range," Dr. W. Gordon Whaley says the problem is to improve plant cover to an extent that soils will improve.

scientist must continue to search in a hit-or-miss manner to make a single improvement.

"If we had enough data concerning reproduction of grasses in which we are interested, we should be able to draw a chart that would tell us at least where we have some reasonable hope of success of hybridizing grasses and where, under ordinary circumstances, we should be wasting time in attempts to make crosses," Dr. Whaley explains.

"Without more parts of such a chart than we now have we must go about grass hybridization work on a 'hunt for a needle in a haystack' basis."

The results of such a basic studies program would be of immediate practical value for agricultural research dealing with grasses, Dr. Whaley comments. "To make such progress we shall

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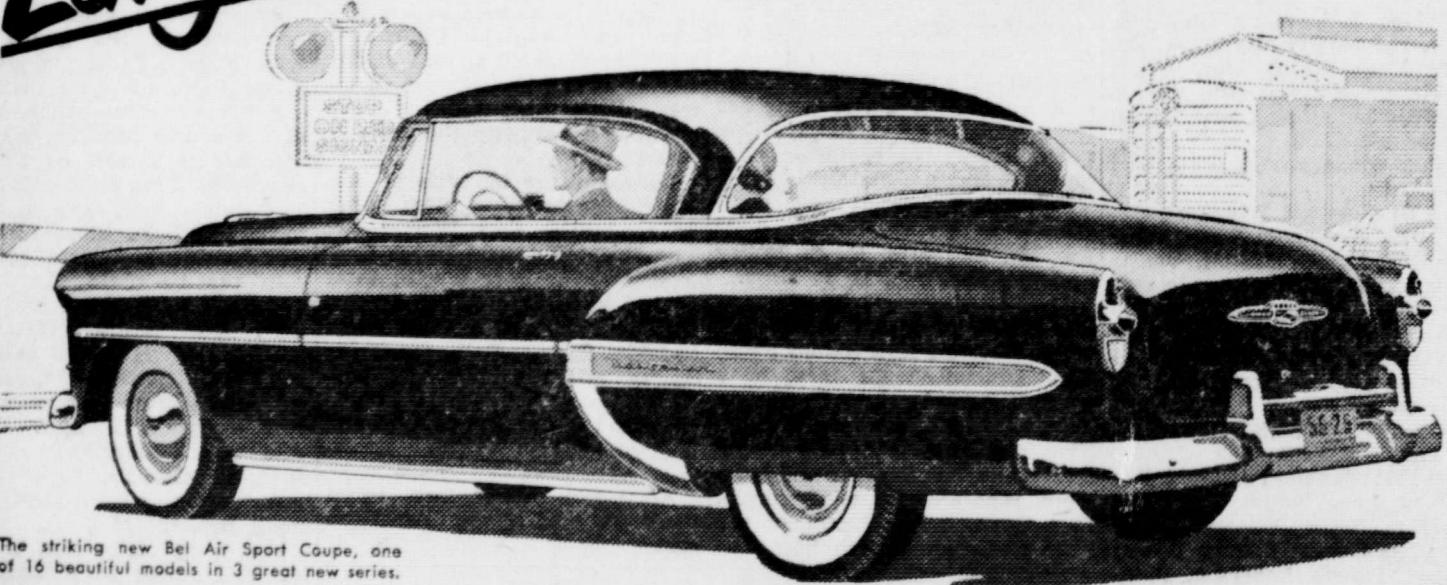

Public Urged To Keep Hands Off Game Animals

AUSTIN, April 11. — The Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission asked the populace to "keep their distance" during the Animal Kingdom's rearing season.

He said Texans can contribute mightily to the wildlife family by NOT trying to make pets of wild creatures or by trying to domesticate eggs of any kind.

"The sad part of the mistakes people make in molesting the birds and beasts," said the Executive Secretary, "is that they think they are helping out. Well, there are rare cases when they can. I repeat these cases are very rare.

"Any baby animal or bird deserves a chance to be restored to its natural protectors, if it actually does get lost or does seem to need help. People see stray creatures, such as a fawn. Maybe they are overwhelmed by an irresistible impulse to 'save' the fawn. Generally if left alone, the animal will be found by its mother. Of course there are extraordinary instances where the mother deer is killed by a car, or some such, where a fawn may be saved. But even then if they do survive and are raised as pets, they usually become a nuisance and sometimes harmful. Furthermore, it is unlawful to pick up fawns."

The Executive Secretary said taking or handling or even "looking at" wild bird eggs may be disastrous. Some birds, such as wild turkey, will NOT return to a nest which has even been approached by humans. He added that although eggs placed under a domestic bird do hatch, the incident merely circumvents nature since anything hatched under such circumstances invariably is lost to the cause of wildlife.

VA Report Made On Korean Vets

Veterans Administration has reported the number of post-Korea veterans, and their dependents or beneficiaries who are receiving certain Federal benefits under laws enacted by the Congress.

Nearly 44,000 post-Korea veterans are drawing compensation for disabilities incurred or aggravated by service since June 27, 1950.

In addition to the 43,953 veterans on the compensation rolls as of February 28, 1953, VA had awarded compensation to 33,310

widows, children or dependent parents on behalf of 17,551 veterans whose deaths were due to service since June 27, 1950.

VA is also making 10,502 monthly payments to beneficiaries of veterans whose death was due to service since June 27, 1950. These payments are being made under the Servicemen's Indemnity Act of 1951.

Of the nearly 44,000 post-Korea disabled veterans, with compensable disabilities, more than 3,000 are receiving vocational training in schools and colleges, on-the-job, and on-the-farm under Federal law.

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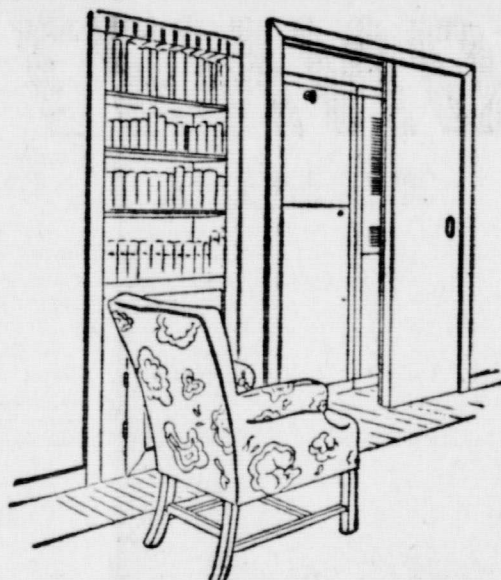

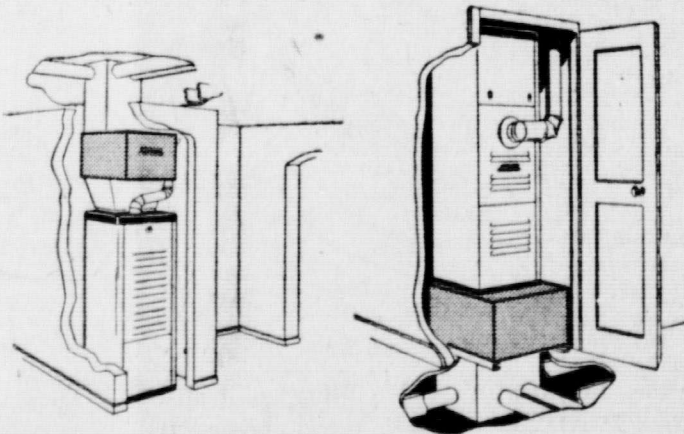

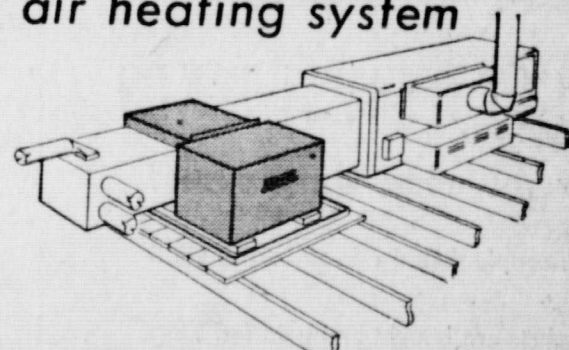
