The modern fisherman is bombarded by the gadgetry of fishing—boats, one-man tubes, two-man bass boats, high-powered bass boats with trolling motors, depth finders, live fish tanks, temperature recorder, oxygen meter. Once the fisherman has made these choices, he must still depend on other equipment, says Don Steinbach, fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. First is it going to be cane pole, casting rod and reel or spinning reel? Fiberglass or graphite? Worm rod, doodle socking rod, ultralite? These are all the fun things of getting ready for fishing.

Then comes the confusing part for many anglers. What kind of lures? The choices are numerous, including top water lures, floating bottom or deep water lures and sinking mid-water or in-between diving lures.

The choice of lures should be guided by understanding the bass—where he lives—why he lives there—and what he is eating while he is there.

The location of bass will determine what general kind of lure to use—examples are 1) when fish are on the shoreline or in shallow water you would use top-water or shallow-running baits, 2) deep water bass must be caught where they are with deep-diving or weighted lures than can get to the fish in bottom 3) the suspended fish

must be fished with mid-water lures.

The fisherman must understand the habitat requirements of bass, food habits and the other water requirements such as temperature and oxygen, Steinbach points out.

Why do fish stay in certain places? They are cold blooded so temperature of the water will determine where they are comfortable. Winter weather cools shallow water rapidly. Though cold, the deeper water remains more constant and slightly warmer than shallow water. Oxygen is usually high in cold water and fish do not require much food during cold temperatures. They will not move very far or fast for food. Therefore, the winter fisherman should

fish deep lures—worms, spoons that are jigged—or jigs. These lures must be presented slowly to the fish.

As water begins to warm in the spring, bass move close to shore—shallow water—and start to feed more mid-water. Fisherman should use swimming baits that duplicate shad, bluegill or other bass foods.

Knowledge of the spawning habits of largemouth bass can really aid in knowing when and where to fish. Bass spawning begins in shallow water when the water temperature is 55-60 degrees F. The lure to use during this time is crank baits, spinners and top-water baits in shallow water.

Many other variables

such as color, size and sound must be considered. Color is usually related to food except for worms and then the book is thrown out the window with purples, black, blue and greens.

Size of lure can be a factor on finicky fish

and the ultralite artist can claim success when many other fishermen don't catch.

The bass fisherman must study the fish and how he lives, then make some educated guesses as to which tackle choice will be presented to Mr. Bigmouth.

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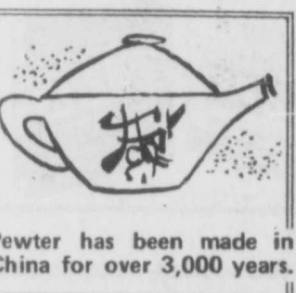

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Dr. Ronald Rathbun To Perform At Fine Arts Guild

The Sweetwater Fine Arts Guild will present its second program of the 1982 series on Thursday, April 15, at 8 p.m., at the First United Methodist Church in Sweetwater. Dr. Ronald Rathbun of Abilene will perform a piano recital with selections from the works of Bach, Debussy, Daniels and Schumann. The selections have been chosen for their beauty and popularity. Even people who are not classical music fans can enjoy them.

After opening the recital with "Italian Concerto" by Bach, Dr. Rathbun will then perform a delightful selection entitled "Children's Corner" composed in 1908 by Debussy for this five-

year-old daughter. The composition of four of these pieces was prompted by the child's toys. One of these pieces, the well-known "Golliwogs Cake-Walk" is a fun piece with jazzy accents. Another piece, "The Snow is Dancing," describes a child's imagination while watching snowflakes fall.

A composition that was written especially for Dr. Rathbun in 1981 by Daniels consists of

five variations of a simple theme. Both the melodic intervals and the rhythmic theme receive variation treatment.

The concert will be concluded with one of the masterworks of the 19th century piano repertoire. Composed by Schumann, "Fantasie" reflects the composer's despair over a love affair.

Dr. Rathbun has taught at Abilene Christian University for 10 years

where he is a Professor of Piano, Chairman of the Piano Division, Orchestra Director and Director of the Fine Arts Series at ACU. He has received degrees in piano from Southwest Missouri State University, Indiana University and the University of Iowa.

He taught at Angelo State University and the University of Iowa. He taught at Angelo State University during the '60's, Concord College in West Virginia, the University of Iowa and in the public schools of Missouri.

An authority on the

piano sonatas of Robert Schumann, Dr. Rathbun has presented solo and chamber music recitals, piano workshops and master classes.

Below is a draft of the final report for the ongoing 208 Water Quality Management Planning Study for the Upper Colorado City Basin:

The purpose of Task 140U.115 is to assemble data reflecting new facility planning needs as identified in the interim Wastewater Facility Needs Report, initial 208 Plan-Facility Planning Needs in need of revision, and updated facility planning needs for 201 projects.

The only facility planning area which requires any updating in the Upper Colorado Basin Study Area is the West Odessa Area. This area was addressed in the interim report for FY-1980. During the review process following completion of the report, it was discovered that a substantial growth in population in the West Odessa Area had occurred and a reexamina-

tion of the area was warranted.

The 1980 population of the West Odessa Area is estimated at 10,529 persons. This is projected to increase to approximately 22,070 by the Year 2005.

The projected population density will justify a collection system and centralized treatment facility. An approximate service area location map is included in the report.

Management Agency possibilities for the West Odessa Area include the Ector County Municipal Utility District, incorporation of the facility planning area or the formation of a Special District.

Q. What are the signs of a bad water pump? How is the pump replaced?
A. There are several indications a water pump may be going. For example, a dry roller bearing in the pump might scream when the car is started. The pump might also make knocking sounds or the fan may seem to wobble. Replacement isn't a difficult job. But, since you didn't specify the make or model of your car, we can only pass along general guidelines. First, remove the fan belt and take off any accessory which may prevent you from getting to the fan. Follow the instructions in your shop manual as to removal and replacement. Keep in mind that a rebuilt water pump will do an admirable job. Replacement with a rebuilt or new pump is a better repair than disassembly of the pump to try to fix the old one. Since you are in the vicinity, this is a good time to check the condition of fanbelts, fan and radiator core.

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Smith Writes "Journal Of The American Medical Association"

The "Journal of the American Medical Association" published an article by West Texas

internist Dr. V. Taylor Smith in its Feb. 26 issue. Dr. Smith is associated with Big Spring's Malone-Hogan Clinic.

"Anaphylactic Shock, Acute Renal Failure, and Disseminated Intravascular Coagulation following Zomepirac" reports the severe reaction a West Texas patient experienced to the new drug zomepirac (Zomax).

Zomepirac is a non-

steroidal, anti-inflammatory agent which was developed as an analgesic. It is used for headache, muscular pain and other discomforts requiring a painkiller stronger than aspirin. Available since November, 1980, the drug has been described by its manufacturer as safe and well tolerated.

Medical literature has reported only one previous occurrence of a similar reaction to zomepirac.

Dr. Smith indicates this fact suggests that severe allergic reaction, kidney failure and associated symptoms are probably uncommon complications of the drug.

However, Dr. Smith alerts physicians reading the "Journal of the American Medical Association" that the degree of the reaction he describes may demonstrate the potential severity of complications

from the drug if patients become sensitized to zomepirac.

Dr. Smith points out that similar reactions are possible from other drugs to which a patient has developed an allergy.

"Texas Medicine's" February issue also carried an article by Dr. Smith. It is entitled "A Case of Insulinoma and Approach to Diagnosis." The "Annals of Internal Medicine" has

published other work by Dr. Smith.

The Malone-Hogan Clinic internist graduated from the University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio in 1972, then completed an internship and residency in internal medicine at Scott and White Hospital in Temple before joining Big Spring's 22-physician multi-specialty group in 1975. Dr. Smith is a fellow of the American College of Physicians.

University Given \$149,119 In Funds

The Texas Commission on Alcoholism has awarded a \$149,119 contract to Texas Christian University to conduct a major study of the incidence and prevalence of alcoholism in the state, Ross Newby, TCA executive director, announced.

The contract, the largest ever awarded by the agency, will be funded through federal block grant funds.

The Fort Worth university's Center for Organizational Research and Evaluation Studies will conduct the study under supervision of Barry Tuchfeld, Ph.D., center director, and Patrick Miller, associate director. Tuchfeld is

also associate professor of sociology at TCU.

Results of the study will allow TCA to develop better programs and improve the cost-efficiency of its resource allocation, Tuchfeld said.

Miller noted that the study would provide county prevalence estimates for specific age, sex and ethnic origin populations.

He said it represents a state-of-the-art technology transfer, using methodological techniques which have been used in drug abuse studies, human services needs assessments, marketing research and political election forecasting.

Egypt Is Forecasted To Be Oil Producer

It looks as though Egypt may become a big oil producer by 1984. The Egyptian Minister of Petroleum says production is now about 675,000 barrels a day and should reach one million barrels a day by mid-'84...about the same as Libya, Kuwait and Abu Dhabi.

Saudi Arabia is beginning to have trouble selling all of its 8.5 million barrels of oil it produces every day. The four American companies that buy up to six million barrels a day of Saudi oil are seeing the demand for their oil slow down.

These companies don't want to do anything that would harm their relations with the Saudis so they probably will continue to buy the same amount each day. Saudi Arabia is expected to make either a price or production decision at the next OPEC meeting May 20th. And, Britain and Iran have just announced a price

cut on their oil.

In other news, several Rocky Mountain states...Utah, Colorado, Idaho, South Dakota, and Nebraska among others have been or will be dealing with increasing their severance taxes. If President Reagan's New Federalism Program is only partially successful, many observers say that most states will look to the energy industry to find more income instead of reducing or eliminating the former federal programs.

TREMENDOUS TRIFLES

PSYCHOLOGY
DETERMINED CHOICE OF
UNKNOWN SOLDIER

One of those seeming trifles, those inexplicable eccentricities of the human mind, determined the choice of the casket that rests in the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. This national shrine in Arlington Cemetery will again receive homage as this Veterans Day.

After World War I, four flag-draped caskets, all unnamed, were assembled at Chalons-sur-Marne, France. Each contained the remains of an unidentified American soldier. From the four, one was to be selected to rest in Arlington Cemetery. One soldier had fallen on the battlefields of the Meuse-Argonne, one at Aisne-Marne, one at the Somme, and one at St. Mihiel. Suitably, the choice was delegated to an American enlisted man, Sergeant Edward F. Younger of Chicago. The caskets, arrayed by side, were exactly the same in appearance. All possible identifying marks had been removed. Apparently there was nothing to indicate that one, more than another, would be chosen.

The nation would in the future honor one of these four caskets as symbolic of the thousands of men who had given their lives for their country but remained nameless. Which would it be? The choice, psychologists say, was pretty well determined in advance.

Scientists have found that given a series of numbers from which one is to be chosen most people will, oddly enough, pick an odd number. From the numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, the number selected will more than likely be a 1 or 3. Three is more likely to be chosen than 1, since it will be felt that selecting 1 would be too easy, or obvious. Consequently, psychologists say, when Sergeant Younger was delegated to choose one of the four caskets, it was quite likely that he would choose the third. That, in fact, was his selection.

Perhaps if the psychologists would also explain to us why man's intelligence is sufficient to unleash the great forces of nature, but insufficient to know what to do with them, the unknown soldiers of the world may not have died in vain.

Reefs Have Valuable Findings

The size and shape of small organisms found in coral reefs in the Pacific and Caribbean may hold valuable information for development of oil and gas in the Permian Basin.

Dr. Pamela Muller, assistant professor of earth sciences at The University of Texas of the Permian Basin, currently is directing a study of foraminifera, small organisms which

produce carbonate shells. When these organisms die, they become part of the sand and sediment. Muller noted that in Hawaii, the sand is about one fourth foraminifera shells. She said these organisms have lived in coral reef environments since the Pennsylvanian Period—the age of sediments containing oil and gas deposits of today.

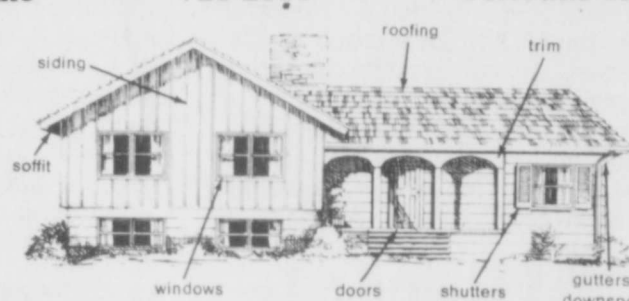
