NEWS BRIEFS

DETAILS RECEIVED ON NEW U. S. MAIL PLAN

Acting Postmaster Edwin Hardesty has received information from the postoffice department pertaining to the new plan for speeding mail delivery to larger cities of the nation.

Cities like Houston, Dallas, Ft. Worth, and others throughout the nation have been given zone numbers. A letter addressed to someone in Los Angeles, for instance, must carry the number 37 after the city and state, else the address is incomplete.

Residents in the areas affected by the ruling have been advised and the number must also be placed on the return address card of all mail sent from whatever number area is made applicable for the area.

Local residents writing personal letters to relatives or friends, as well as business letters, to larger centers, will speed up their delivery greatly by observing this ruling. Loss of experienced postal help, whose places are being filled by new employees, is one of the reasons the new number system has been put in use, to speed up dispatching. Increase in the volume of mail is another reason.

HALE'S WAR BOND QUOTA FOR JUNE SET AT \$77,500

Hale county's war bond quota for the month of June is \$77,500. H. S. Hilburn, county chairman, has been advised. This is \$2,900 above the quota assigned last month.

Lt. Moore, Instructor at Air Field, Is Creator of Comic Strip Character

BOB REID NAMED TRUSTEE

Abernathy school board meeting Monday night named R. S. (Bob) Reid trustee to succeed P. H. Renfro who resigned after moving to Clovis, N. M. Reid, who is a partner in Reid Chevrolet Co., received third highest votes in the election last April when Renfro and Ted Watts were re-elected trustees.

Renfro, who had been employed at Tuco since about 1930, was transferred to the Clovis plant of Southwestern Public Service Co. as chief engineer. He was assistant engineer at Tuco. In addition to his services on the school board, Renfro was active in civic affairs here and was an official in the Masonic lodge.

Renfro's family moved to Lubbock Tuesday from house No. 2 at Tuco. They are to join him in Clovis later when a house is available. The Jess McLain family moved from an apartment in the home of Mrs. W. A. McKenzie to the house vacated by the Renfroes.

Nunley Is New Assistant

R. T. Price, chief engineer at Tuco, Tuesday announced the appointment of L. L. Nunley as successor of Renfro as assistant chief engineer of the plant here. Nunley and Roy McLaughlin are to divide the duties previously performed at Tuco by Renfro and Philip Sterrett. Sterrett has been transferred to the Plainview office of the company.

Nunley, who has been employed by the company for 12 years, came here with his family from Amarillo. They are temporarily residing at Delmar hotel and later will move to house No. 1 at Tuco. Mr. and Mrs. Nunley have a son, Chas. Lynn, six years old.

SECOND QUARTERLY INCOME TAX PAYMENT DUE JUNE 15

The Internal Revenue department is mailing out notices to millions of taxpayers, notifying them that the second quarterly payment is due not later than June 15. This remittance is necessary irrespective of the final adoption or failure of the compromise tax plan.

Tax authorities urge taxpayers to examine the notices carefully, because experience has shown that many remittances for a quarter of the balance due rather than of the total tax are made each June 15. The same amount must be paid as on March 15.

The payroll deduction or withholding levy will not be effective before July 1, and even its effectiveness will not relieve the taxpayer of the obligations for making the June 5 payment. Thereafter the taxpayer will have other problems but for the present his worry is the second quarterly payment due under the old tax system which is still in effect.

The quarterly notices this year are different in one respect from those of previous years. Each bear a stub which must be detached and returned with the quarterly payment.

The Abernathy "gremlin" has made its bow and as a result, the creator of one of the comic pages' best known characters, "The Phantom," has been introduced to the South Plains.

Lieut. Ray S. Moore of St. Louis, who is responsible for the hooded character which daily thrills thousands of newspaper readers over the nation, during a few moments rest at Abernathy, drew a "gremlin" for his students training at the South Plains Army Air field auxiliary field near Abernathy.

As a result, his connection with "The Phantom" became known. Lt. Moore is stationed at SPAAF, but works at Abernathy, helping train men in Uncle Sam's glider program.

His "Phantom" was one of the first such comic characters to romp thru comic strips and books over the nation. When Lt. Moore first started talking about his popular comic strip he referred to the hero as a man in glamorized long handled underwear. But the remark was only testimony to his keen sense of humor. Talking about how he got started, Lt. Moore told a few of the "inside secrets" of his trade.

"Only, there isn't anything to tell. I just got the idea I wanted to draw. So, after giving up a study of law in college, and after taking a crack at baseball and football, I gave it all up to draw," he explains.

For seven years "The Phantom" has been famous as a King Features, Inc., comic strip in newspapers and comic books. He explained that the description of the "Phantom's" clothing was the best description he could think of, only it isn't long-handled.

Naturally there are many humorous situations which daily arise in connection with being the creator of such a widely read comic strip. For instance, Lt. Moore tells about the man who annually sent him a letter with a clipping of one of his cartoons.

"This fellow always was taking me or 'The Phantom' to task for looking. I got to the point where I looked forward to getting those annual letters. However, he has failed to write the past two years. Must have died of colic, or something..."

Working with a writer friend who handles the script, Lt. Moore sends "The Phantom" through thrilling episodes all over the world, but mostly with a jungle background. Most of the letters Lt. Moore receives are from children asking him to arrange a wedding between the "Phantom" and "Puddin' Puss," the feminine interest of the comic strip.

"The characters were just 'dreamed up,'" the cartoonist says. "Names also are fictitious, or are supposed to be. However, once we hit 'on' that one in a million chance and used the name for the villain which happened to be the same as that of some young lady in New York. She wrote demanding apologies."

"Then, of course, kiddies all over the nation, and grown-ups, too, also are constantly writing me in hopes that 'The Phantom' and Diana will finally marry, with a sort of jungle setting, and all that," Lt. Moore reports. "It's a life and death matter with them," he adds, "and it's important to me, also." He continues with a laugh.

Lt. Moore at present has a friend handling the fortunes of "The Phantom" but hopes to continue his trade after the war.

Before he entered the service, he had had considerable flying experience in his own plane, in which he always took his drawing board. He is a service pilot at SPAAF.

FORMER TEACHER JOINS WAVES

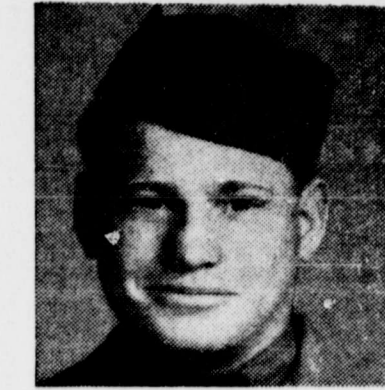

Replanting of most row crops will be required in the territory suffering heavy hail damage.

Reports from farmers said rainfall in the territory ranged from two to five inches, with the larger amount falling northwest of town.

Rationing Calendar

Gasoline — A book coupons No. 6 good for 4 gals. each, became valid May 22.

Tire Inspection — "A" book holders should have tires inspected by Sept. 30, "B" bookholders second inspection by June 30; "C" bookholders second tire inspection by Aug. 31. "T" bookholders should have tire inspection every 60 days, or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

Sugar — Coupon No. 13 became valid June 1, good for 5 lbs. through Aug. 15. Coupons 15 & 16 good for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local boards for additional rations if necessary.

Coffee — Stamp 24 (1 lb.) became valid May 31 and is good thru June. **Shoes** — No. 17 in Ration Book 1 good for one pair through June 15. Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) will become valid June 16.

Meats, Etc. — Red stamps J, K, L good thru June 30.

Processed Foods — Blue stamps K, L & M continue good through July 7.

(Below we reprint a copy of a sale bill which has been printed in almost every paper in the nation at least a half dozen times, but we keep getting requests for reprints of it, so here it is again. It's the original copy of a farm sale 90 years ago.)

pair ox and yoke; 2 baby yoke; popular weatherboards; plow with wood mole boards; 800 to 1,000 3-ft. clapboards; 1,500 10-ft. fence rails; 1 60 gal. soap kettle; 85 sugar troughs, made of white ash timber; 10 gals. maple syrup; 2 spinning wheels; 30 lbs. mutton tallow; 1 large loom; 300 poles; 100 split hoops; 100 empty barrels; 1 32-gal barrel of whiskey, 7 yrs. old; 20 gals. apple brandy; 1 4-gal. copper still of oak tanned leather; 1 doz. real books; 2 handle hooks; 3 scythes & cradles; 1 doz. wooden pitchforks; one half interest in tan yard; 1 .32 cal. rifle; bullet mold and powder horn; rifle made by Ben Miller; 50 gals. soft soap; hams, bacon and lard; 40 gals. sorghum molasses; 6 fox hounds all soft-mouthed except one.

ORANGE HONEY BREAD

3 tablespoons shortening 2 1/2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
1 cup honey 2 teaspoons baking powder
1 egg 1/2 teaspoon soda
1/4 cup milk 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 orange peel 1/2 cup chopped nuts, if desired.

Sift flour. Measure. Sift again with baking powder, salt and soda. Put orange peel through food chopper. Cream shortening, add honey gradually. Add beaten egg and orange rind, and nuts if used. Add flour mixture and milk alternately. Turn into a greased bread pan. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Bake for one hour and ten to fifteen minutes, or until done.
