Dawson county and adjoining territory was visited by two good rains last Friday and Saturday night. It was one of those typical last minute South Plains rains when everyone was wondering if it would rain soon enough to do any good—and sure enough, it did! Thursday night's rain was slow and all soaked into a thirsty soil. The local weather gauge registered .61 inch and reports from most all over the county say that they had almost an inch. The following night another rain followed which registered .31 inch in Lamesa and was heavier in some portions of the county.

One of the best things about these rains were the fact that they were not hard driving rains and did not wash up any of the seed which had already been planted.

Almost every community in the county reports crops up and looking good and producers are in better spirits about the crop outlook than they have been in this spring.

Midland Planning Rest Rodeo Ever Held In These Parts

Candidates Will Draw For Places On Ballot Monday

The Dawson County Executive Committee met in the District Court room Monday and checked the names of the candidates who had filed for offices prior to Saturday, June 13, the last day designated for filing.

Beside the 12 names of candidates for district offices, a total of 41 have filed for offices in the county, including the precinct elective offices, which will make a total of 33 names to go on the county ballot.

The most sought after office in the election is that of County Judge, there being eight aspirants for that place.

Cost of placing the names on the ballot was determined and each candidate was notified. This fee must be paid into the committee before Saturday night.

There will be another meeting of the executive committee next Monday at which time those who have qualified to have their name placed on the ballot will draw for positions on the same.

Jack Aldridge Asks For Constable Office

The Courier has this week been authorized to announce the candidacy of H. D. (Jack) Aldridge for the office of constable of Precinct 1. This precinct takes in Lamesa and the southern part of the county.

Mr. Aldridge needs no introduction to the voters of Lamesa and Dawson county as he has been a resident of the county for the past twenty-four years. He has had some experience in enforcement, working with the local officers on special occasions.

Mr. Aldridge will see each voter in the precinct personally before election time, and until he has time to make a personal visit he asks that this message be considered as addressed to each one individually and that he be given a fair consideration in the campaign.

Educational Program At Local CCC Camp Highly Commended

The marker for Dawson County has the following inscription:

Organized February 13, 1905
Named in honor of

1808-1842

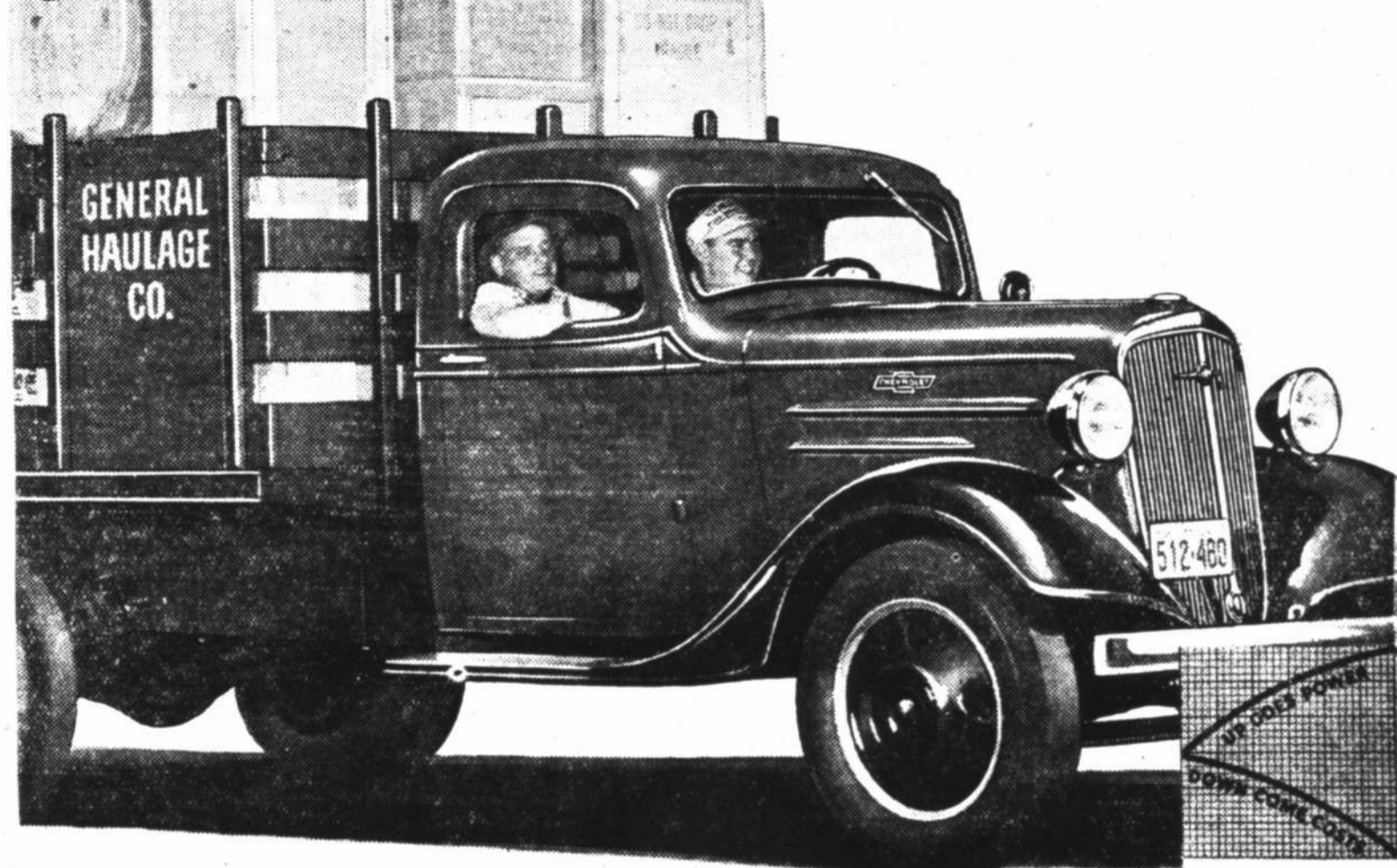

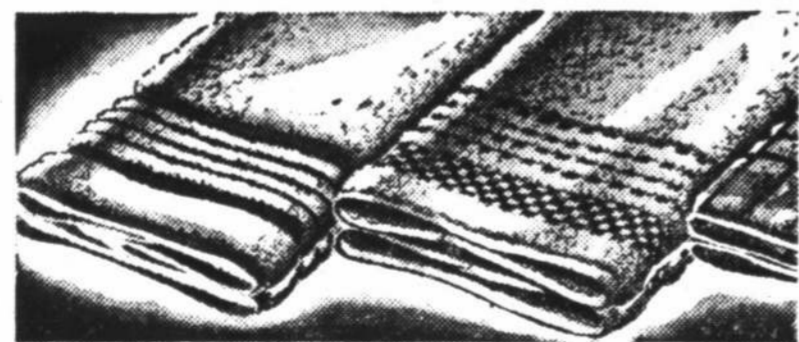

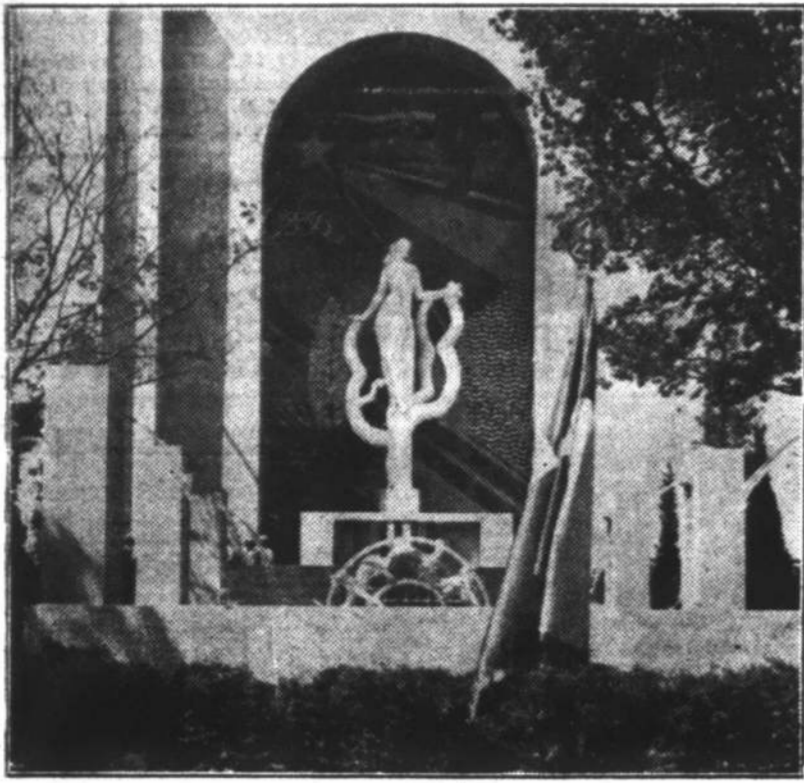

Mrs. Morris Returns From Washington Women's Conference

On Tuesday, June 9, Mrs. J. L. Morris returned from Washington, D. C., where she had been sent as a delegate from District Number Two, Texas Home Demonstration Association, and the Dawson County Council, to the Third Triennial Conference of the Associated Country Women of the World. This conference has met once in Vienna, Austria, and once in Copenhagen, Denmark. At each of these meetings, the attendance did not exceed three hundred but the last report in Washington showed that 7,300 registered at this convention. Each state of the Union was represented, and twenty foreign nations. Washington reports it as the largest convention of its kind ever held in the capital city, in fact the largest in the world, ever held by women.

It was also reported as the most refined and cultured group ever assembled there, with smoking and drinking conspicuously absent and consideration, thoughtfulness and appreciation the keynote.

Mrs. Morris states that the group were royally treated by President and Mrs. Roosevelt, being entertained with a garden party on the White House lawn, and when Mr. Roosevelt asked them to sing and called for his favorite song "Home on the Range" because it made him think of West Texas, they had to take time off for the 48 Texas delegates to express their enthusiasm with cheers. The five delegates from this district were cordially entertained by our Congressman, the Honorable Geo. Mahon and his wife. Lectures of interest were delivered by Carrie Chapman Catt, Cordell Hull and Secretary Wallace. The reports of the foreign delegates, made in the

most perfect English, were amazing. The things upon which the most stress seemed to be laid were making rural homes more attractive in order to hold the younger generation there, the training of city people who have rushed to the farms since the depression to adjust themselves to rural life, to exchange ideas in handicrafts, and last, but not least to generate a feeling of "Co-operation and love between the mothers of the nations in order that there may some day be world peace."

Mrs. Morris wishes to express her gratitude and appreciation to each and everyone who assisted in making this trip possible and wishes to assure them that she has done her very best to bring a profitable report back to the rural women of District No. 2.

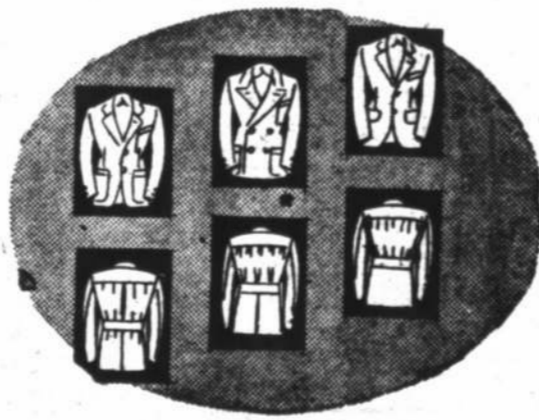
