Tornado Kills Twenty; Three States Damaged

Finds Way to Restore Life After Death

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, April 5.—A new method of resuscitation by injection of fluid from adrenal glands directly into the heart is explained in reports read by Dr. Dennis Crile, of Chicago, and Dr. G. W. Crile, of Cleveland, before a medical meeting here today. Dr. Crile, of Cleveland, is reported to have originated the method and has made a thorough test. He is credited with having revived persons who had been pronounced dead by other physicians, some of whom had been dead as long as thirty minutes.

MURDER TRIAL SET FOR JUNE 18

CHICKEN THIEVES RAID HEN HOUSE

The officers were busy Thursday morning trying to get a clue on a wholesale chicken raid which was made in South Ballinger Wednesday night. Up to noon nothing definite had been given out as to the probable arrest of the guilty parties, altho a trail of the fowls had been found.

According to the sheriff's department at least twenty-five poultry yards in South Ballinger were raided Wednesday night and between fifty and seventy-five chickens stolen. It is the second raid made in the same neighborhood, persons visiting the homes which were visited by thieves several months ago, and stealing chickens. Winners in "Tech" Theme Contest are Announced

Ivan Searbrough won first prize of \$10, and Herbert Sledge won second prize for the best theme on "Why the Texas Technological College Should be Located at Ballinger." Vember Taylor was awarded third place, and while no prize was provided for the third best theme, Secretary Williams of the Y. M. B. L. stated that all the themes were good and a third prize would be given. Eight themes were submitted, and after a committee had carefully read them, and compiled the new thoughts brought out as to why Ballinger is the most logical location for the college, the manuscripts were turned over to The Ledger, and we will publish some of them, carrying one from time to time. Following is the theme which won first prize:

"Why the Texas Technological College Should be Located at Ballinger."

The question of where the Texas Technological College shall be located, or at least as to whether it shall be located at Ballinger, is one of the most personal and momentous questions that has arisen in Ballinger in recent years.

Perhaps one of the best reasons Ballinger can produce as a reason why it should be chosen for the location, is the favorable situation of the city. Situated as it is in the fork of the Colorado River and Elm Creek, it has immense possibilities for irrigation and for a magnificent water supply. Elm Creek alone in ordinary times, and with the water system now in force, is capable of supplying the city, while the river if properly dammed can be made to furnish water for several cities the size of Ballinger, as well as for any number of colleges. In fact the big irrigation dam, which is to be constructed a few miles Northwest of Ballinger, could supply with water a hundred cities of the size of Ballinger, or of all the colleges that are ever likely to be located in this section. The dam is to be one hundred and twenty-five feet in height and two thousand feet in length. The lake which will be formed will be about twenty-five miles in length and will cover thousands of acres of ground. Should all else fail there are wells in the South part of Ballinger capable of supplying enough water for a college of almost any size. Thus, one of the main requisites of the location, that is an efficient water supply, is amply provided for.

Another point in the location of Ballinger is its healthful climate. Ballinger is situated at an altitude of 1,650 feet, making a thin,

dry atmosphere and consequently a healthful climate. Although the climate is dry, it is not so dry as in many sections of the West, and although dry enough for good health, the rainfall averages about twenty-three inches, a plentiful amount for the raising of a heavy crop almost every year. It is only once in a great while that Runnels county makes a crop failure, and with the installation of the projected irrigation dam these failures will be a thing of the past. Runnels county is the best agricultural county in the West, ranking fifteenth in the production of cotton and ranking well in the production of other crops. The soil of Runnels county, especially on the gray land, compares favorably with the black waxy soil of central and North central Texas.

The best argument for the fitness of Ballinger's location, however, is the fact that it lies nearer to the geographical center of the district in which the college is to be located than any other city or town capable of supporting it. This would make the college more easily accessible than if it were located at some other point in the district. Ballinger can offer as efficient, modern facilities as any town or city in the West, having a modern water and lighting system, modern sewerage system, and the most efficient telephone system of any city its size in Texas. The railway facilities are excellent, Ballinger being served by the Santa Fe and by the Abilene & Southern railways, with five passenger trains entering the city from three directions in each twenty-four hours. As to other transportation facilities there are bus lines operating from Ballinger to all the most important cities nearby. The roads too, are good.

Besides these facilities, Runnels county, as has been mentioned before, will have in the near future one of the greatest irrigation systems in the United States, and it is only fitting that a college pertaining to the agricultural and industrial arts should be located near an institution which will do so much for their advancement. The experimental farms of the college must be irrigated and their proximity to this irrigation plant would save the added expense of constructing a plant for the college.

There is no section of the state which so badly needs a college as that in which Ballinger is located. Runnels and the surrounding counties have a large population, Runnels county especially so, and

McKinnon is charged with embezzlement of \$27,000 and Furney with embezzlement of \$8,000 funds belonging to the Klan. The men were released on \$1,000 bond each. Both the officials arrested have been working under the supervision of Wizard Evans.

STREET CLASH DUE TO THREATS

AUSTIN, Apr. 5.—Declarations that a feud existed between those involved in the sensational street clash at Sealy last September, and that threats had been made previous to the clash, were made today by defense witnesses in the trial of Foster Bell, on trial here charged with assault and intent to murder upon Ernest Schaffner. Statements were made that Luther Bell, one of the four men who lost their lives in the clash, killed two of the other three before he himself was shot down. The testimony was given by G. B. Fontaine, W. H. Blakey and D. J. Ballard.

HIGH SUGAR DUE TO REFINERIES

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Closer organization of the sugar producing industry was advocated today by the Farmers' Union. The union recommended the close affiliations in a statement attributing the present sugar prices to "criminal manipulation" of the market. The statement said that it was possible for the producers to refine their own sugar, and market the finished product, instead of turning the raw material over to the refineries which are controlling the market.

Present prices of sugar was laid wholly at the door of the refiners by acting Chairman Smead of the Senate finance committee.

COAL SHORTAGE DUE TO UNIONS

WASHINGTON, April 5.—A committee speaking for the bituminous coal operators informed the coal commission today in a brief that it was their opinion that the policies followed by the United Mine Workers of America, constituted the chief deterrent of the unsatisfactory condition which exists in the coal industry at this time. The committee said in its report that the recent shortage of coal and the high prices could be traced to the miners union and the railway unions which are associated with the United Mine Workers of America.

ALEXANDRIA, La., April 5.—The death toll as the result of a tornado which struck Alexandria and Pinesville, yesterday, is today placed at twenty, with sixty injured. The dead include fourteen whites and six negroes. Property damage is estimated at \$500,000.

TEXARKANA, April 5.—Estimates today of property damage as the result of a tornado in Cass county, Texas, yesterday, places the loss at approximately \$35,000. Fifteen dwellings were damaged and ten barns wrecked.

WENDELL, N. C., April 5.—A wind storm here last night injured approximately twenty-five persons and destroyed thousands of dollars worth of property. Fifty buildings were destroyed and others wrecked and badly damaged.

BANKER KILLED AT SANTA ANNA

J. V. STOCKARD, age 64, was killed by a freight train at Santa Anna about seven o'clock Wednesday afternoon, according to news received at Ballinger Thursday morning.

Mr. Stockard was caught by the train which was making a flying switch, according to information received here, and his body badly mangled, the arms and legs being twisted off.

Deceased was one of the pioneers at Santa Anna. He was at one time agent for the Santa Fe at that place and was president of the First National Bank of Santa Anna. He was a widower.

WHAT THE EGYPTIANS THINK OF IRRIGATION

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, April 4.—Important new irrigation work is about to be undertaken by the Egyptian government on the Blue Nile. The construction of a reservoir at Djebel Aouilia will aid Egypt in cultivating almost any quantity of rice; will abolish the rotations concerning cotton; will supply the water necessary for irrigation by ditches and will improve the uncultivated areas.

Experts in the Egyptian irrigation service believe that the reservoir will prevent the inundation of a large area of land in Southern Sudan, and save to the Egyptian government large sums which it has been paying as compensation for damage done in these areas.

The cost of the new undertaking will be about \$15,000,000.

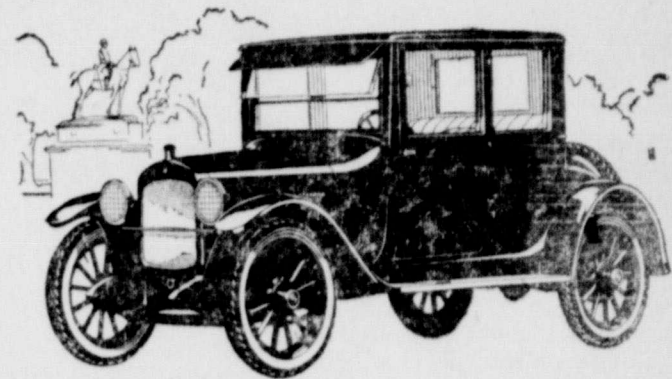
MRS. WYLIE GIVES LIBRARY \$100,000

there is no college, not even a Junior College, within sixty-five miles of Ballinger.

In regard to the fitness of Ballinger for the responsibility of maintaining the moral standard of the college, there is not a city of Texas that sets a higher moral standard than Ballinger, both in lack of crime and in church organization. There are nine well-attended churches (with emphasis on the well-attended) in Ballinger. A good church organization is the backbone of the moral standard of a city, and this is well looked after by a Pastors' Association, B. Y. P. U., Epworth League, Christian Endeavor, several ladies' clubs and the like. It is not only civil officers and the churches, however, that look after the morals of Ballinger, as there are strong chapters of the Masonic, W. O. W., Odd Fellows, and other orders, while a strong chapter of the Order of DeMolay is doing much toward training the boys of the city in the ways of good citizenship.

In a small city such as Ballinger there are not such temptations as lie in wait for students in larger cities. RURAL SCHOOLS TO CONSOLIDATE

An election in which both Runnels and Coleman county school patrons will participate has been petitioned for by the patrons making up the Kirby school district and the Herring school district. The Herring district is a county line district, being located on the Coleman and Runnels county line with patrons residing in both counties.

A mass meeting was held at the Herring school house Wednesday afternoon and a petition signed asking for an election to determine whether the Herring district and the Kirby district should consolidate. It was stated that a large majority of patrons in both districts were in favor of the consolidation.

In the event that the consolidation is made it will place two one teacher schools together, creating a district composed of twenty-

seven square miles. A new school building will be constructed which will be in Runnels county, and two teachers will be employed to begin with. The advantages offered in the consolidated school has created a demand for the consolidation, according to the school authorities.
