AUTO KILLS MAN ASLEEP ON ROAD

SIX DIE, 200 HURT IN TRAIN WRECK

TWO LIMITEDS ARE DERAILED BY SMALL BAR

SEVERAL OF INJURED FEARED CRITICALLY HURT IN CRASH

(By Associated Press)
MOUNDS, Ill., Aug. 6.—Six passengers were known to have been killed and approximately 200 injured when two fast Illinois Central passenger trains were derailed one mile north of here early today.

Fifty injured, including 19 white persons and 31 negroes, were taken to hospitals at Cairo, nine miles south of here. Some of these were critically hurt.

A list of dead issued at railroad offices in Chicago included L. A. Brennan, 40, Mattoon, Ill., transfer agent; Mrs. Edna Sander, and Joe Edmick, both of West Orange, N. J., and five negroes, whose names were not given.

Other bodies were believed to be in the wreckage.

Ten cars of a southbound liner were derailed and 47 cars of a northbound train were thrown from the track by the impact. The obstruction responsible for the crash was thought to have been a bar or wire dropped from a freight car.

"Train No. 16, the Chickasaw, the northbound between Memphis and St. Louis, in charge of Conductor Whalin and Engineer Abel struck a cast iron pipe nine inches in diameter by 20 feet in length, the statement of the superintendent said.

"The pipe struck the south track and threw it out just as the No. 3 Chicago to New Orleans Limited, in charge of Conductor Snyder and Engineer Bates, passed.

"The engine and two cars of No. 3 were derailed. The derailed cars struck the Chickasaw while it was standing still, resulting in derailment of seven cars.

"Nine passengers on No. 3 were killed. Twelve passengers on both trains were seriously injured.

"Relief trains were dispatched to haul the dead bodies from Carbondale and Cairo, Ill."

POLISH PLANE BACK IN SPAIN

FLIERS TURN BACK 21 HOURS OUT; PLUNGE IN SEA, RESCUED

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Portugal, Aug. 6.—Major Kazimir Kubala said today a broken pipe line forced him and his companion, Major Louis Idzikowski, to turn back after they had flown 11 of the 48 hours they estimated it would take them to fly from Paris to New York.

The airmen were rescued when they were swimming in the sea near the wreckage of their plane, the Marek Pilsudski, at the German frontier. Saturday, they were brought to Lissabon, near Oporto, on board the ship Kubala slipped and fell cutting his right forearm in broken glass.

Kubala, interviewed in the Oporto military hospital said after they flew 21 hours the tube feeding he ate stopped working. The airmen thought it would be impossible to continue their flight.

Wings Both Collapsed
When they were 70 miles off Cape Finisterre, a westernmost point of Spain, they noticed additional damage. This caused the wings to collapse and the heavy acroplane plunged into the sea near the shore. The wings broke and the plane was damaged in other respects.

"We threw ourselves into the sea," Kubala said. "We swam towards the wreckage and were rescued by a boat which took the plane in tow. We were afloat 38 hours in the sea."

The airmen plan to leave for their home with their plane on Wednesday.

WOMAN FOUND MURDERED AND ONE MAN HELD

BODY, BATTERED AND NUDE FOUND IN LOS ANGELES HOME

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—Solution of another violent murder case confronted police today in the slaying of Mrs. Myrtle L. Melus, 41, wealthy and socially prominent.

Her nude and battered body was found yesterday in a bed room of the Melus house, located in a fashionable residence district. Leo (Pat) Kelly, 36, a suspect, was found groveling in a clothes closet on the first floor. He denied killing the woman although he said he gave her a "terrible beating."

Discovery of the crime was reported by her husband, Frank Melus, club man, and vice president of a wholesale concern, who returned home late from a day's fishing trip. The house was locked and he forced a door to gain entrance. Discovery of the suspect was made by police who overpowered Kelly when he attempted to escape.

The body appeared to have been in the house for some time.

PARTY PLEDGE STATUS IS NOT YET GIVEN OUT

NO DEFINITE ACTION YET TAKEN IN THIS COUNTY, REPORT

The status of the political situation in Lubbock county in regards to the question of bolting the Democratic ticket remained unchanged today at noon as efforts to get in touch with Frank E. Wheelock, Democratic county chairman, proved fruitless.

Just what action was taken on the resolution presented in the convention Saturday asking that all candidates in the county for the second primary pledge to support the nominee of the democratic party November, was not learned as Mr. Wheelock could not be reached at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Prior to the convening of the democratic county executive committee this morning, Mr. Wheelock stated that he would consult the advice of the best attorneys of the city in making his decision on the resolution which he said is governed solely by the statutes. He stated, however, that the resolutions had not been formally presented to him but that he expected them in the meeting this morning.

Votes Are Recounted

In the re-check of the votes this morning, only one important change was noted in the results of the official count from those announced following the election. W. L. Brabaker, commissioner for precinct three, received a majority over his other opponents, the count showed. No run-off will be necessary in this race, it was said.

Changes of some few votes were revealed in the other races, it was said. Mr. Wheelock could not be reached for the official count of the votes this afternoon.

BUCKNER SAYS HIS VOTE WILL GO FOR SMITH

MAN NAMED DELEGATE BY BOTH FACTIONS RAPS "BOLTERS"

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Aug. 6.—Murrell L. Buckner, chairman of the Dallas county democratic executive committee, who at the county convention here Saturday was named as a delegate both by the Smith and anti-Smith factions, indicated today he would serve at the state convention with the former group.

"I didn't intend to support the democratic ticket from top to bottom. I would resign as chairman of the executive committee," he said. "I have never scratched a democratic nominee and never will."

Robert S. Quillen, secretary of the county executive committee, also was named a delegate by both factions. Buckner, speaking for Quillen, said their attitude was identical.

Both the Smith and anti-Smith groups named a complete list of delegates Saturday after those favoring Governor Alfred E. Smith as the democratic candidate for president bolted the convention and held a separate session. The two factions are expected to stage a hot fight at the state convention here September 11.

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Accused Man Shot In Officers' Chase

TEXARKANA, Aug. 6 (AP)—Will Mays, charged with shooting with intent to kill a federal prohibition officer and with federal and state liquor law violations, was in jail here today suffering from a slight wound after a pistol fight with Texarkana police last night.

John W. Griggs, prohibition agent, was wounded by Mays on June 11 when he and other officers raided a still alleged to have been operated by Mays who escaped amid a hail of bullets.

Mays was arrested last night after a traffic policeman had recognized him. He speeded through the residential section with officers in pursuit, but after colliding with another automobile abandoned his machine and hid in some high weeds. He refused to surrender until he had been wounded in the arm.

LORD MAKES ESTIMATE FOR SUBMISSION TO COOLIDGE TODAY

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 6 (AP)—Brig. Gen. H. M. Lord, director of the budget, arrived here today to submit to President Coolidge preliminary budget estimates for the fiscal year 1930 totaling slightly less than \$3,700,000,000.

The budget director said that although granting substantial increases to a number of government departments, he had managed to keep the total within the figures set by President Coolidge in his speech on June 11 to the business organizations of the government for the fiscal year beginning next July.

The increase over the total of previous years, Gen. Lord explained, was accounted for not only by increased proposed appropriations for government agencies but by the fact that all probable expenditures were provided for in the 1929 estimates, whereas previously many items such as tax refunds, were not taken into account.

An increase of nearly \$400,000,000 for defense over the previous year was included in the preliminary estimates presented to Senator Lodge, whereas for the current fiscal year budget provided \$200,000,000 for this purpose. One long plan to develop \$500,000,000 in 1930.

BOMORTONMAN VICTIM OF HIT RUN ACCIDENT

COMPANION TELLS OF QUEER ACCIDENT NEAR LOCKNEY

(Special To The Journal)

LOCKNEY, Floyd County Aug. 6.—Struck by a hit-run motorist as he slept on the Lee highway at a point nine miles northwest of here, Richard Gray, of Bomorton, Baylor county, received injuries which resulted in his death, shortly after 3 o'clock this morning. Gray was enroute to Plainview, where his wife and child reside, when the accident occurred.

According to the story told by Gray's companion, whose identity is being withheld by local officers, the two men left Floydada Sunday night with L. D. McReynolds, of Aiken, a small community 13 miles east of here. McReynolds took the men in his car as far as Aiken and the two set out on foot from there, enroute to Lockney and Plainview.

Awakened By Groans

After travelling about three miles the men became tired. Gray's companion relates, and together the men lay down in the road and fell asleep. The companion reports that he was awakened about 3 o'clock by the groans of his friend and found that Gray had been mortally injured, evidently by being struck by a motor car. A rapidly travelling car was just fading out of view, he says.

Aid was summoned from a nearby farm house but by the time help arrived Gray was dead. The body was brought to Lockney and is being held here until an investigation of the case is completed.

Said To Own Property

Gray had been in Gore, Knox county, and Bomorton, Baylor county, inspecting some farming properties which he is said to own in that section, and was intending to visit his wife and child in their Plainview home.

No trace of the motorist, who is said to have driven over Gray's sleeping form, had been found early this afternoon. Authorities here in charge of the body report that the man's head is badly bruised, his neck broken and that there are other minor injuries about the abdomen.

Another novelty men appreciated was a roll-top suitcase like a roll-top desk, with drawers underneath for men to keep their things neatly in."

"Women are easier to dress than men. But it is more interesting to find something new for men because they really are anxious for new things that they can accept. There are a lot of crazy fads that the gentleman cannot wear. But even the most conservative man was an ear cocked for new things that are, at the same time, correct."

Women's Mannerisms In Each Era Determine Lines, Patou Says



Erect, perfectly poised is this smart modern woman in her tiered tulle frock; a characteristic attitude of a smart woman of pre-war days, with the graceful silhouette it produced; today a woman can make wear a beautiful gown and look tremendously distinguished.

PARIS, France, Aug. 6.—In any discussion of fashions the word silhouette is constantly recurring. One generally considers that the silhouette is changed by the mere fact that the style of dressing has changed. There is some reason for this assumption. A gown is indisputably has a very great influence on a woman's outline.

Very few persons stop to think, however, that a dress style evolves with women themselves. It changes as their carriage and gestures change. To be specific, I mean their methods of carrying themselves. If you will concentrate on any smart woman you see in a drawing room you will find that there is no analogy whatever between the way she stands today and the way she stood a generation ago. Only fifteen years ago women stood in such a way that the body rested on one leg while the other was placed at an angle, the modern woman stands in harmony with the way she stands. And yet fifteen years ago, because women stood differently, they had other distinct gestures. Both the new and the old school may express charm, but they are different.

Each Era Has Its Charm
The modern woman, in contrast, stands like a man. Of course this does not imply that she thus loses all the prerogatives of her femininity in so doing. This is perhaps a minor anatomical observation, but it is tremendously important as far as the work of a fashion creator is concerned. Most of the gestures of the modern woman are in harmony with the way she stands. And yet fifteen years ago, because women stood differently, they had other distinct gestures. Both the new and the old school may express charm, but they are different.

A fashion designer must take all these facts into consideration. He either studies them thoroughly or he feels them instinctively and they unconsciously inspire his creative efforts. A fashion designer must watch women as they live.

Years ago, when women rested their weights in repose on one leg, the straight up and down silhouette was indicative of the military matter-of-factness in the mannerisms of women of that era. Now, with women relaxing from the hurried, business-like days just mentioned, their poses show a spirit of leisure and repose that is reflected in the new silhouette.

Fashions Reflect The Times
For after all, it is the woman who makes the silhouette, rather than the silhouette that makes the woman! Contrary to general opinion, fashions are not the arbitrary dictation of certain artists. They are an expression of the feeling of the times that make them. They reflect the era that produced them.

There is one habit of modern women which I do not like at all. This is the silhouette of a woman seated whose dress is too short. When I see a woman sitting like that, although I am quite a partisan of modernism, I find myself regretting the good old days when women wore dresses that covered their legs.

Another gesture of the modern woman is her habit of walking with her hands and arms clinging to her body. This was a gesture which you never saw before the era of buttonless coats. Yet this new gesture may be very charming with a woman.

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NO LEAF WORMS ARE FOUND HERE BY COTTON MEN

With reports of the appearance of leaf worms in nearby counties, County Agent D. F. Eaton and officials of the Lubbock County Farm bureau, were out in the cotton fields this morning in search of traces of the pest, a menace to the cotton at this time of the season.

No evidences of any worms were found, it was said today at noon.

The search is being made due to reports from Howard, Scurry and Dickens counties that leaf worms were on the cotton there. A call also came from Muleshoe this morning asking for some of the calcium arsenate poison to kill the worms.

R. E. Overstreet, director of the Lubbock County Farm bureau, answered the call and supplied the farmers in that section with the poison. He has about 20,000 pounds of the poison on hand, left over from two years ago when a rather serious infestation threatened the crop here.

Early disposition of the first worms will prevent any possible outbreak of the pests, Mr. Eaton said today.

Jesse James Spends Night In City Jail

Jesse James, emulator of that famous character in the early history of the South west, was found resting in the city jail this morning.

Last year farmers of the Amherst territory shipped 301 cars of corn and milo maize; 3,790 loads of cotton; 18 carloads of watermelons; 48 cars of hops; 33 cars of cattle. With poultry and eggs playing their part in the upbuilding of the territory, 10,000 pounds of cream is being marketed every week.

Hops and Cattle Popular
Farmers here find hops and dairy cattle their safest way of keeping even with the grocer, as they can plant 10 acres of sudan grass in the spring and raise 100 head of beef and 10 head of cattle until September without any feed at all. Eighty to 85 per cent of the ranch is now in cultivation and the larger majority of the farmers own their own homes.

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NON-COMS IN AIR CORPS SHOW BIG JUMPING RECORD

(By Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 6.—Although commissioned officers enjoy greater standing in the army than their non-commissioned, a subordinate officer, especially in the air corps, have records of accomplishment that outshine the records of many of their superiors.

Master Sergeant E. H. Nichols, instructor in parachutes at Brooks field, for instance, has "jumped" 944 men since he took up this work and a broken leg is the most serious casualty any of them have suffered.

Many of the master sergeants fly hundreds of hours or more each year than a majority of the flying officers themselves. Master Sergeant B. F. Nendel at Kelley field in fact, has taught a great many of the present officers of the air corps what they know about flying.

Master Sergeant Nichols has learned a lot about parachute jumping. One thing that worried him at first was that some of his students would forget to pull the rip cord and open their chute. He has found, however, that they all grasp it as naturally as a drowning man grasps at everything in sight.

Sergeant Nichols also scoffs at the old theory that it was safer to jump from a plane than to be pulled out of it. He has found that the safest practice is to pull the rip cord as soon as the jumper's feet leave the plane.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 6.—Condition of Senator-elect William S. Vale of Pennsylvania was much improved today, a bulletin issued by his physician said. His temperature had returned to normal and held there for several hours.

RUNNERS FAIL TO MEASURE UP TO STANDARDS

FINLAND AND BRITISH HOLD MOST HONORS IN RACE EVENTS

By ALAN J. GOULD

Associated Press Sports Editor
AMSTERDAM, Aug. 6.—The United States has captured the Olympic track and field championship for the ninth successive time in 32 years but only at the expense of the biggest blow to American foot racing prestige ever sustained. This was almost unanimous opinion as the blue ribbon features of the ninth Olympiad closed with France's Algerian, El Ouali, wearing the marathon laurel wreath instead of Joe Ray and the bulk of the remaining running honors divided by Finland and the British empire.

Only the spectacular running of Ray Barbuti in the 400 meter flat race, in which the Yankee scored their only individual victory, and the triumph of two American teams in record breaking or record equalling relays yesterday saved the United States from complete rout on the cinder path. The point margin by which America won over the team which had won the term title, 173 to Finland's 162, was established chiefly on the brilliance of the field performers who won five events.

Several Stars Fail
Failure of many Americans, such as Lloyd Hahn, Frank Wyoff and Joe Ray to regain their form, and existence of some discord in the official family over various arrangements helped to explain the way the Americans fared. The opposition this time came not alone from Finland but stronger than ever from the British empire and such higher imposing American league lead of Miller Huggins' high priced Yankees.

Finland retained distance running supremacy outside of the marathon but two defeats for Paavo Nurmi and one for Willie Ritola at a time when this pair still was believed to be invincible ranks as one of the game's biggest sensations.

U. S. Girl Wins 400 Meter Swim Event

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 6.—Martha Norelius of New York brought the United States its first swimming championship of the Olympic games by winning the 400 meter free style swim for women today.

Behind Miss Norelius in second place came Miss Braun of Holland and Miss Smith of Australia. Josephine McKinn of Homestead, Pa., was third.

Miss Norelius' time was not immediately announced as officials went into a huddle but it was said to break both the world's and the Olympic records.

Miss Norelius' time was announced as five minutes, 22.4-5 seconds, a new world's record.

300 Meter Breast Stroke
The Olympic record for the 300 meters breast stroke event, held in the United States at 2 minutes and 56 seconds, was shattered today in the course of the elimination heats.

Eric Rademacher of Germany, swimming the distance in 2 minutes and 32 seconds in the third heat, was Olympic record holder for a few minutes as Tsuruta of Japan turned in 2 minutes, 30 seconds flat in the fourth heat. The world's record is 2 minutes 46 seconds flat and is held by Rademacher.

Thomas Blankenbush of Oakland, Calif., was the only American competing and finished second to Rademacher.

HOOVER GIVES ATTENTION TO BIG QUESTIONS

CONFERENCES ARE SET TO FOLLOW AFTER NOTIFICATION

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Aug. 6.—Herbert Hoover gave attention today to larger questions of campaign policy which will come up for discussion and decision at conference he is to hold here with party leaders immediately and after notification ceremonies at Stanford University next Saturday.

There is in the confidence of the republican presidential candidate an authority for the prediction that so far as Hoover himself is concerned his speeches will be devoted to an exposition of his own policies and the relationship of government to the many economic and commercial problems at present or soon to

Plans for carrying on such a fight in the time intervening before the general election on November 6 already have been the subject of conferences the nominee has had with his advisers. Hoover, chief of the republican national committee, and others who are controlling the internal parts of the vast organization are working on the battle ahead.

Work Due Next Friday
Mr. Hoover is to arrive here next Friday and remain over until August 13. Senator George H. Moses of the Hampshire, chairman of the notification committee, will arrive Thursday, but the vanguard of national committeemen and committee women will reach Palo Alto even before that time.

Hoover has in mind now to make to extend his journey over the country during the campaign, and if he has his way he will leave Washington only three or four times for short trips to the east and some of the border states. He will make a visit to the turbulent corn belt on his way back to the national capital on August 21, speaking at his birthplace at West Branch, Iowa.

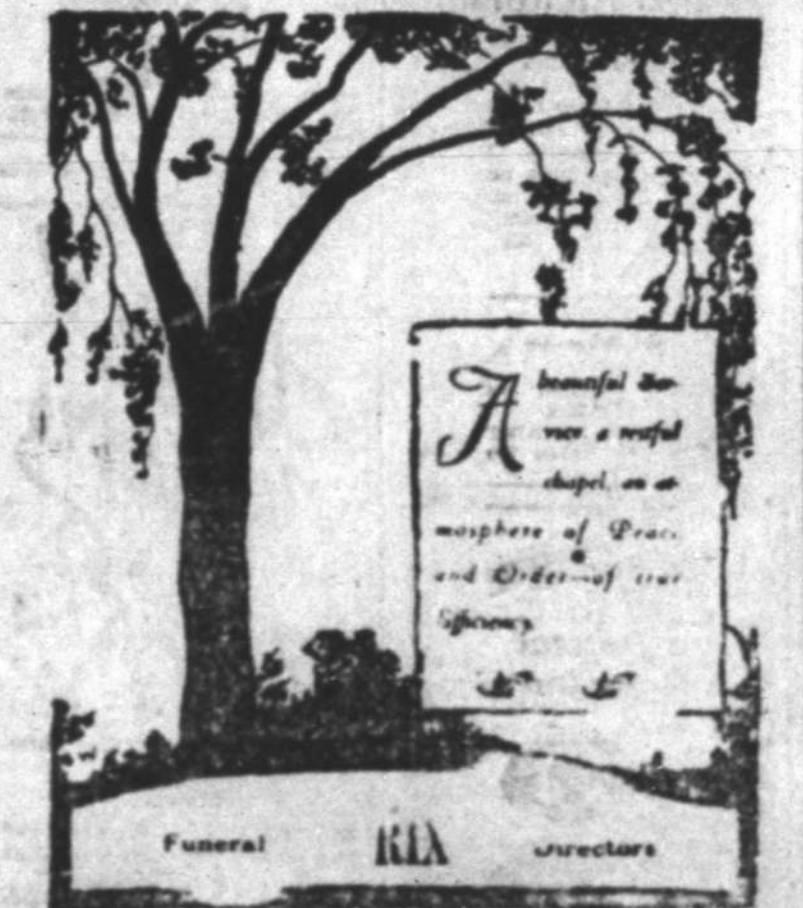

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP)—The cotton market opened steady at a decline of 1 to 9 points under selling which appeared to be due to a private report placing the condition at 7.4 and indicated yield at 15-500,000 bales, or considerably above average of recent reports.

There was extensive selling of October at 15.55, but offerings of later months were small and selling on larger private crop figures mentioned, was probably restricted by another report placing condition at only 67.1 and indicated yield at 14,207,000 bales.

Offerings tapered off after the call and prices steadied up a few points, covering the market showing rather nervous and irregular fluctuations during the first hour.

The market eased off, selling growing more active toward mid-day. A favorable view of the weather was, probably a factor, while some southern selling was reported as well as restocking by recent buyers.

December contracts worked off to 15.33, with the general market showing net declines of about 21 to 25 points at mid-day. According to a canvass today, 72 members of the New York cotton exchange are expecting a crop estimate of 14,742,000 bales on the average. The highest individual estimate by members was 15,500,000 and the lowest 13,900,000.

NEW ORLEANS TRADING

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 6 (AP)—Cotton market opened irregular to day, first trades 3 points up to 17 down. October deliveries, which showed initial strength, soon eased off in sympathy with later positions and traded to 15.00, 13 points under Saturday's close.

Towards the end of the first hour the market rallied 5 to 13 points from the low, but prices lacked a definite trend. Posting of the first hurricane warning of the season today had no effect on values.

The market turned easier later under liquidation and selling induced by large private crop estimates. Stop loss orders were uncovered adding to the weakness. Before offerings were absorbed October traded off to 15.17 and December 15.80 or 35 to 36 points under Saturday's close.

General Motors, a laggard for some time, was rushed up 3 points. A number of other industrials also ruled from 3 to 6 points higher. The renewed rate on call loans was reduced from 7 to 6 per cent.

The closing was strong. Prospective earnings and dividend expectations were the main factors in the late rise in which a number of new leaders came forward. Allied Chemical, National Biscuit, American Bank Note, Dupont and General Cable A improved 4 to 5 1/2 points. Late profit taking in some favorites like Radio, General Motors and Montgomery Ward failed to dampen bullish enthusiasm to any extent. Total sales approximated 2,100,000 shares.

Grain Market

MANY MATTERS FACE SMITH IN GRIND AT HOME

NOMINEE BACK FROM 10 DAY VACATION TRIP IN MOUNTAINS

(By Associated Press)
ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 6.—With his acceptance speech as well as other important matters on his mind, Governor Smith was back today in Albany from a ten day vacation.

He returned in the dead of night, terminating a 100 mile automobile trip through stormy darkness along the west bank of the Hudson. The governor and members of his family motored here from Camp Smith near Peekskill.

Plenty of Business
As he got back today to the grind of being a presidential nominee, Smith found a mass of accumulated business requiring his immediate attention. He also was faced with the necessity of whipping into shape his acceptance speech which he will deliver two weeks from Wednesday evening.

One of his trusted advisers, Mrs. Henry Moskowitz, who has charge of publicity at main campaign headquarters in New York and is a member of the democratic campaign executive committee, came to Albany with the governor's party, having joined it at Peekskill. She plans to remain several days.

Within the next two or three weeks Smith also intends to consult a number of party leaders among them Senator Walsh of Montana, and also recognized authorities on the farm question.

Meets Campaign Heads
While on the vacation which began after he had conferred ten days ago in New York with Governor Ritchie of Maryland, Smith after a few days at the shore, returned to New York and there saw various managers of his campaign, and George W. Peek, Illinois farm leader, who has swung to his support.

Yesterday the governor traveled up the Hudson on a yacht to Camp Smith, within view of Peekskill, where the fourteenth and sixteenth infantry passed before him in review, their bands blaring "The
