Loraine Bulldogs Trample Sands To Tune Of 42-0 Fri.

The Loraine Bulldogs did it again. They carried off a 42-0 victory over the Sands team on the local field Friday night.

Coach Bryan said his club scored in every quarter, controlled the ball for the most part, and cemented their defense when necessary.

This was the Bulldog's second triumph, with one tie and no loss this season. They have scored 98 points while allowing opponents only 6 this season.

Wingback Terry Brewer and fullback Ronnie Finley played defense as well as offense. Brewer, a valuable blocker, struck for two touchdowns and traveled 70 yards in four tries for a 17.5 average.

Finley also scored double in the touchdown department and added a two-point conversion.

Along the way he ripped the Sands defense for 133 yards in 29 carries, averaging 4.2 yards per effort.

Finley and Brewer led the defensive also. Between them they accounted for all or in part for 31 tackles, Finley with four unassists and 13 assists. Brewer had 2 unassists and 12 assists.

These two boys had plenty of assistance in the game. Tailback Stanley Hackfeld scored a touchdown and averaged 6.4 yards in 22 carries for a total of 142 yards. He also contributed a two-point conversion.

Quarterback Tim Hamilton joined the scoring with a touchdown and two-point conversion. Brewer started the victory romp in the first quarter with a 44 yard touchdown run. Hackfeld added the two point conversion, and the Bulldogs were in control the rest of the night.

Hamilton's one-yard sneak was the first of two 2nd quarter touchdowns. He set up the score with a 40 yard punt return. Finley added two points for a 16-0 lead.

No. 2 in the second quarter was a 35-yard touchdown jaunt by Hackfeld around end.

Instead of tiring against the big, hefty Sands team, Loraine kept moving farther ahead in the second half. Brewer traveled 18 yards in the third quarter for a touchdown, followed by a pair of TD's by Finley in the fourth quarter.

Loraine had 21 first downs, 305 yards rushing, 28 yards passing, completed 4 of 7 tries and had no passes intercepted. They also had 8 penetrations.

Sands was able to muster only 5 first downs, 35 yards rushing, 24 yards passing, completing 5 of 15, and had one interception and one penetration.
