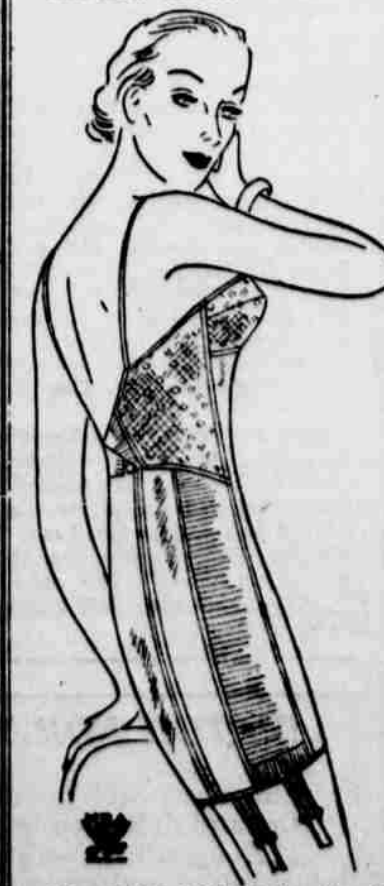

YOUR HEALTH

AUSTIN, Tex.—Whooping cough is a disease of the spring and summer months. It is a real problem in households where there are a number of very young children. Statistics show that cases terminating fatally are greater among females than among males. The younger the child when attacked by whooping cough, the greater the cause for alarm for its recovery. Babies, therefore, should be safeguarded and kept away from persons known to have been exposed to whooping cough. The dangerous malady is spread through contact with the secretions of the nose and mouth, which may come from sneezing, the use of contaminated handkerchiefs, toys, cups, and in fact from any agencies which allow close contact.

AUSTIN, Tex.—Whooping cough is a disease of the spring and summer months. It is a real problem in households where there are a number of very young children. Statistics show that cases terminating fatally are greater among females than among males. The younger the child when attacked by whooping cough, the greater the cause for alarm for its recovery. Babies, therefore, should be safeguarded and kept away from persons known to have been exposed to whooping cough. The dangerous malady is spread through contact with the secretions of the nose and mouth, which may come from sneezing, the use of contaminated handkerchiefs, toys, cups, and in fact from any agencies which allow close contact.

Operation of F.D.I. Pronounced Successful

WASHINGTON, D. C.—More than twelve thousand commercial banks in the United States are protected from the event of bank failure, it is reported by a report just released by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The report points out that in the largest insured banks with total deposits of over \$100,000,000, the average loss per depositor is less than one dollar. It also shows that the majority of insured banks have deposits amounting to more than \$100,000,000, and that the average loss per depositor is less than one dollar.

All but a small fraction of the deposits in the group of insured banks are fully insured, the report indicates. The figures also show that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation is insured by more than ninety-nine out of every hundred insured banks in this group, sending better than eighty percent of insured banks.

PRICES KEEP GOING UP

Whatever may be happening to the recovery program as a whole, the cost of living seems to be making an extremely successful comeback.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace himself predicts that meat prices will be up 32 per cent by 1936. Beef and pork will be up 22 per cent by July 1. Porterhouse steak and bacon are apt to be classed as "company dishes" before the year is over.

All of which lends some point to the complaint of the People's Lobby that the consumer is getting a pretty poor sort of protection in the campaign to put the farmer in better shape.

There may be exaggeration in the lobby's assertion that the recent "purge" in AAA means that "exploiting and profiteering interests have got control of that agency," but it is pretty obvious that the consumer is carrying more than his share of the load.

WHAT TO DO FOR HASKELL

When the average citizen of Haskell begins to think about its future he realizes that his own economic success depends, to a great measure, upon the prosperity of his neighbors, and the growth of his town.

To realize what he ought to do, in helping Haskell forward, he has only to ask himself what he expects of his fellow citizens. What is it? To trade with him to overlook the shortcomings in his business due to his location and through their cooperation to help him render them better service.

Then, to be a loyal booster of Haskell, all that is required of the average citizen is that he treat his neighbor, and his neighbor's business, in the same way that he wants his neighbor to treat him and his business.

THE ANSWER "NOTHING"

What is the effect of the gold clause decision of the United States Supreme Court upon the people of Haskell?

The answer is: "Practically Nothing."

What is its effect upon those who loaned the government money during the World War, taking for the cash the bonds of the government?

The answer is that the bond holders will be paid in dollars, each of which will buy twice as much as when the money was loaned the government.

LOOK TO YOUR CHILD'S EYES

Importance of continued efforts in home and school to determine whether children's sight is up to par is emphasized in a report just issued through the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

This report, prepared by a joint committee of the National Education Association and the American Medical Association, shows that fully 3,000,000 school children are handicapped by defective sight.

Most of these children will be able to surmount their defects if the trouble is promptly discovered and treated. But where the defect is not discovered, the effect on the child can be disastrous. He may be blamed for stupidity or inattention in school, when all that is wrong is that he can't see what is going on.

Regular examinations, treatment where treatment is needed, and establishment of special classes for children whose sight defects are more than ordinarily bad, will save many children from a very difficult situation.

WHEN YOU RECEIVE A BILL

To receive a bill is an honor. Instead of getting all riled up when the mail brings you a statement of your account, you should be genuinely pleased for the bill is an indication that someone has faith in your honesty. If you never receive a bill (unless you always pay cash) it might indicate that no one is willing to grant you credit, and that would not be so good. Credit is one of the most valuable things a person can have. Money can be had by various means, but credit comes only from years of honesty and prompt meeting of bills when due. When you pay a bill you are merely being honest.

Therefore, when you receive a bill, pay it if you possibly can, and if you cannot, then frankly tell your creditor why you can't and make some arrangement with him for meeting it later. You'll find him more than ready to meet you half way. Cherish your credit as you do your health, happiness and other priceless boons equally rare and elusive.

UNFAVORABLE TRADE BALANCE

(Dallas Morning News)

Peter Molyneux of Texas in London asserts again what he has stated before, namely, that any trade balance that is unbalanced is unfavorable. The favorable trade balance is the one in which exports approximately equal imports, after all exchanges of services and goods have been accounted for. Overlooking this principle of international trade has been a leading cause of our present difficulties, especially difficulties with which the South is faced.

The tide of affairs seems at present against the stand that Mr. Molyneux takes. The press release giving his London statement was accompanied by news of growing instability of the international monetary situation, bringing prospects of further development of the spirit of nationalism. But the theory of Mr. Molyneux must prevail in the end. The present trend toward economic independence for each great nation is one that is adapted to a period characterized by international fear and distrust. Economic self-sufficiency for each great world power would create an intolerable international political situation under any circumstances. It is the very opposite of the trend of international relationship that would be in harmony with growing specialization in industry and increasing speed of transportation and communication. Eventually the world must turn back toward the only rational permanent solution of its great economic and social problems.

HENRY-LESSON RADCLIFFE

PETER DELIVERED

International Sunday School Lesson for March 17, 1935.

GOLDEN TEXT: "Prayer was made earnestly of the church unto God for him." Acts 12:5. (Lesson Text: Acts 12:1-19)

The twelfth chapter of Acts is interesting. It contains the only account of the death of one of the twelve apostles. In addition, the great leader of the apostles, Peter, appears here for the last time in this book.

Herod Agrippa the First, was King of Palestine and ruled over the entire country as had Herod the Great. The latter died soon after the birth of Jesus, and his three sons divided his kingdom. The Herod of our lesson was the son of Aristobolus and the grandson of Herod the Great. He was ambitious, prevented Caligula, the Roman Emperor, from placing his statue in the temple. He courted the favor of the Jews by persecuting the new Christian faith. He was the father of the Herod before whom Paul made his great plea in the twenty-sixth chapter of Acts.

"The life of Herod Agrippa is a romance," says F. W. Farrar, "full of sudden and strange reverses of fortune. We see him pass at a bound from squalor to splendor, and back again from splendor to squalor. Now in the plethora of wealth, now driven to the verge of suicide by abject poverty." Josephus says of him: "He loved to live continually at Jerusalem, and was exactly careful in the observance of the laws of his country. He therefore, kept himself entirely pure, nor did any day pass over his head without its appointed sacrifice." "Here was Israel's last king," says G. Campbell Morgan, "the sycophant of a child of Roman voluptuousness, an Edomite, attempting, for political purposes, to retain Jewish power, supremely given over to all manner of Greek frivolity; and this man is the representative of the people whom God had created to realize and to manifest the will of God."

The first persecution of the disciples was launched by the Sadducees and the chief priests, inspired largely by the preaching of the Resurrection by Peter, for the Sadducees did not believe in immortality. Another wave of persecution came from the Pharisees, and it was in this movement that Saul took so prominent a part, and in which Stephen, one of the deacons, was stoned to death. A new phase in the persecution came when the government, in the person of King Herod, actively participated in the oppression of the new faith. James, the apostle, one of the prominent men of the early church in Jerusalem, was a victim of this outbreak. Hundreds of others were to follow in a time when belief in Jesus meant the danger of losing life itself. How many present day Christians would stand this test?

The Apostle Peter was also arrested and thrown into prison. Herod fully intended to have him killed as he had James, but out of less than the miraculous deliverance of Peter by angels. "Angiology and demonology were marked features of the religious beliefs of the New Testament age. The Jews were averse to the idea that God acted directly in human affairs, therefore he must needs have intermediaries to accomplish his ends," says Dr. S. Parkes Cadman.

"So the Epistle to the Hebrews says: 'Who maketh his angels winds and his ministers a flame of fire.' Angels were thus conceived as the agents for the fulfillment of his purposes, while demons were the instruments through whom their prince, Beelzebub, carried out his sinister projects. I have a suspicion that the angel who helped Peter to escape was a disguised member of the Jerusalem church. For this angel carried a light, spoke Greek or perhaps Aramaic, was strong enough to arouse the apostle out of a heavy slumber, and to unfasten the chains with which he was bound. Angels

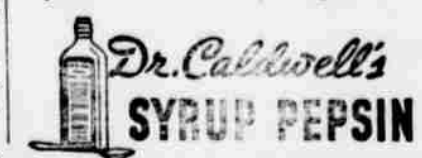

Ad Valorem Levy Will Be Slashed

AUSTIN, Texas, March 11.—Dreily needed relief from burdensome taxation had started on its way to Texas counties today.

A House committee has recommended by the big majority vote of 11 to 3 passage of a measure designed solely to sharply cut county ad valorem levies. The bill increases the gasoline tax one cent to provide revenue for carrying out the purposes of a companion proposal which authorizes the state to take over bonded indebtedness of counties on lateral roads.

Action was taken by the committee after hearing a delegation of county judges representing thousands of taxpayers in all sections of the state. Among them were Robert Ogden of Dallas, Frost Woodhull of San Antonio, Clyde Garrett of Eastland and Emmett Moore of Ft. Worth.

Passage of the bill would result in reduction of ad valorem tax rates in counties all over the state of 35 to 50 per cent, and at the same time safeguards money made available to the State Highway Department for operation, maintenance,

Representing the County Judges and Commissioners Association, Judge Ogden said that the revenue raising bill to retire road bonds was not a new measure. "It is not the undertaking of a new principle in the financial management of political affairs, because it simply seeks to amend, and in conjunction with a companion bill, to perpetuate and enlarge policies that have already been defined and practiced by the Legislature."

Judge Ogden explained that the Legislature several years ago realized the inequity of the basis of taxation in which counties voted various sums against the credit of the counties.

"The expenditure of those sums is in effect a granting to the state the credit of the county because the practical benefits of any road bond voted by any political subdivision such as a county, is of a state wide importance and has a state wide effect."

"The matter of building roads or improving roads, therefore, is not to be considered a local project, because every citizen has the benefit either directly or indirectly," Judge Ogden declared.

The main theme of arguments was that users of highways and roads ought to pay for their construction and upkeep, thus relieving farmers and owners of small homes of unjust taxation.

Judge Ogden pointed out that the proposed gasoline tax hike is not to be considered an increase in taxation, "and neither is it to be considered that there is to be a substitution of taxation because the benefits that will accrue to the people will be in effect an actual reduction of the tax levies against the people."

"Assume that a county has an assessed valuation of \$100,000 and assume that it would be necessary for that county, in order to finance its operations, to raise a million dol-

lars in money for that year. Instead of levying a tax of \$1, which would be the multiple of tax rate against the assessment, it would be necessary for the Commissioners' Court of that county to levy a tax of \$1.43 in a situation of that kind."

Judge Ogden declared enactment of the bill before the committee and its companion would have this result: The State, in the payment of all of the bonded debts of the counties, can get a 100 per cent collection on their levy, but with the ad valorem method of repayment of these bonds they must levy 40 per cent additional in order to collect the necessary revenue. So if this piece of legislation is consummated, it will not only mean a reduction in the ad valorem tax rates all over the state of some 35 to 40 per cent but it will also mean that you are taking off of the backs of the people of your community that payment that is being assessed for the levying of that tax in order to pay the bonded debts.

Despite the drouth last year enough English pea seed were saved by Mrs. Jesse B. Smith to plant eighty feet this year. The Smith family has made and put down 80 feet of tile at an approximate cost of eighty cents and now have English peas planted on the tile. Last year Mrs. Smith planted the Early Alaska variety, which produced enough to supply the family with fresh ones, to can several containers and to save seed for this year's planting.

Crop Insurance Is Provided In Bill by Sheppard

WASHINGTON.—Crop insurance through loans to growers participating in the Government's adjustment program was proposed in a bill introduced in the Senate by Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas.

It provides for withholding temporarily 5 per cent of all AAA benefit payments to be diverted to a special fund from which loans might be advanced under specific conditions. Repayment is provided for from future benefit payments.

That part of the insurance fund not needed for loans could be invested in stored agricultural products of the kind covered by the crop insured. That would be possible only following years of good harvest when demand for loans would be small. The holdings would be liquidated in years of more general crop failure when there would be greater demand for loans.

Senator Sheppard said his bill would guarantee the grower an income equal to half of his base-period yield at local market prices on his planted acreage, provided the failure to harvest at least half of the crop was due to no fault of the grower.

Sheppard Explains Bill
"Any added payments made to one farmer in the county," explained Senator Sheppard, "would be deducted pro rata from the payments to others in the same county, except where crop failure is severe and general over the county. In that case a loan would be made to the co-operating group in the afflicted county sufficient in amount to make the total AAA payments satisfy the crop insurance provisions. The source of such loans would be a crop insurance fund in the Treasury Department which would be established by withholding 5 per cent of all AAA payments, until the fund is deemed ample to serve its purpose. Loans would be repaid by withholding from future AAA payments everything above what might be necessary to satisfy the insurance provisions, until the loan is fully repaid."

Senator Sheppard explained the crop insurance provision would not affect the distribution of AAA payments in any county where no severe crop failures occurred except for the temporary contribution to the insurance fund.

Since all added payments to those suffering severe crop failures would come from AAA payments to farmers in the same county, Senator Sheppard thought local interest would prevent such payments being claimed or made when not properly due. He said the effect of the bill was to strengthen the crop insurance provisions of the agricultural adjustment act as now administered.

Senator Sheppard pointed out the AAA law made no distinction between a grower who suffers severe or total crop failure and another with the same past production record who may reap an abundant harvest.

The bill was referred to the agriculture committee.

Cost of Hook Rug To Club Member Is Small Sum of 45c

The total cost of a hooked rug size 20x34 inches will be 45c, according to Mrs. O. B. Vernon of the New Cook Home Demonstration Club. A combination of wool yarn and wool clothing is being used. The flowers and leaves are made from the yarn, which cost 35c, while the background is made from a rust colored wool coat. Mr. Vernon drew the design for the rug from a picture.

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Distribution of Centennial Half-Dollars Started

AUSTIN, Tex.—A state-wide campaign looking to the distribution of specially designed coined half dollars, commemorative in 1936 of the centennial of Texas independence, to raise a fund for the construction of the Texas Memorial Museum on the campus of The University of Texas, has been launched by the American Legion Centennial Committee, which is sponsoring the project, according to A. Garland Adair, chairman. The campaign for the sale of the coins was inaugurated on the second of March and will be conducted thru April 21.

"A feature of the campaign will be a travelling Museum exhibit, emphasizing the coin sale and the purpose for which the sale of the silver pieces at a premium will be utilized," Mr. Adair said. "This exhibit will be carried to all parts of Texas. The design is being provided by Robert Leon White, architect with offices in the University Y. M. C. A. who is himself a Legionnaire who has been active in the interest of the Texas Memorial Museum since the present fund raising movement was first inaugurated."
