Linda Higgs of Rule Is Winner in County "Spelling Bee" Here Tuesday

Linda Higgs, student in the seventh grade of Rule School, polished off her rival for the Haskell County Spelling Bee Championship by spelling only 30 words in a rapid unusual match here Tuesday morning.

Linda, 13, began the contest by correctly spelling "acorn," and five minutes later was declared champion after the other speller, Georgia Grey of Mattson, stumbled on "assure." Linda spelled "athletic" for the second word.

Georgia, another 13 year old seventh grader, had to compete in a preliminary match immediately before entering the county event. Because Mattson had not decided a school champion, four spellers—one boy and three girls—from that school were on hand to participate.

Judges elected to conduct the school match to provide a competitor for Linda. Only 10 words and three minutes had gone by when Georgia emerged as Mattson representative.

This would also be a good time to make repairs on the home which have been planned but put off for various reasons, perhaps to plant shrubs and flowers to improve the appearance of yards.

At any rate, the wholehearted cooperation of all citizens is solicited to make this year's Clean-Up Week and undisputed success.

Delegations Meet With Highway Engineer to Discuss F-M Roads

Delegations from Rochester, Rule and Sagerton met here Tuesday morning with Jake Roberts, Abilene, district Highway Engineer, to discuss highway projects, particularly Farm-to-Market roads in their respective areas.

Approximately 75 persons were present for the meeting, held in the district court room. Representatives from the three Haskell County towns had petitions bearing scores of names in support of the projects they were seeking.

County Judge Alfred Turnbow introduced District Engineer Roberts, who explained the method followed by the Highway Department in planning and building the state's system of secondary, or farm-to-market roads. He made it clear that the primary object of the department was to build roads as rapidly as possible, on the basis of traffic need and service to largest number of people.

Delegation from Rochester was particularly interested in two short-mileage F-M roads which are badly needed in that section. One of the projects would serve the area northwest of Rochester and give residents of that section a more direct route to Rochester. The other F-M project would serve a large territory southwest of Rochester and provide a shorter route between that city and Haskell.

Rule and Sagerton representatives are asking for a F-M road on the west side of the Orient Railway, connecting the two towns and serving a large farming and ranching area in the west part of the county.

R. W. Clanton, 83, Dies Tuesday After Brief Illness

R. W. Clanton, retired farmer and businessman who had been a resident of Haskell County since 1910, died at 3:30 a. m. Tuesday in the Haskell Hospital. He had been ill only a few days, and entered the hospital Monday evening. He was 83 years old.

Funeral services for Mr. Clanton were held at 3 p. m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church, where he had been a member for more than 35 years. Officiating were the Rev. M. D. Rexrode, pastor, and the Rev. H. H. Sego, Baptist minister of Haskell.

Burial was in Willow Cemetery under direction of Holden Funeral Home.

Mr. Clanton was born Oct. 16, 1872 at Mount Pleasant, Murry County, Tenn., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Clanton. He came to Texas in his youth. He married the former Miss Annie Bell Hummel Oct. 29, 1896, in Dallas, Texas. The couple made their home in Grayson County, Texas, before coming to Haskell in 1910 and had lived here since. Mrs. Clanton preceded her husband in death in February, 1924.

Mr. Clanton engaged in farming for a number of years, then extended his interests into the cattle business. Later he was engaged in the grocery business here for a number of years. More recently, he was associated with his son in the feed business here until his retirement a few years ago.

Mr. Clanton is survived by his son, H. W. Clanton, two daughters, Miss Velma Clanton and Mrs. Buster Shelton, all of Haskell.

HHS Indians Have Four Games Booked On '56 Grid Schedule

Four football games have been scheduled for the 1956 season by the Haskell High School Indians, Coach Jess Stiles reports this week.

Additional grid contests are in the making, and present prospects indicate that the 1956 squad will play a full schedule of non-conference games, Coach Stiles believes.

Haskell is under suspension by the Texas Interscholastic League, and can only schedule games during the 1956 season with unaffiliated schools.

Earliest game scheduled to date is with New Diana High School here Friday night, Oct. 12. Haskell and New Diana have scheduled two games, with the HHS Indians traveling to that city for a return game Friday, Oct. 26. The Upshur County school was suspended by TIL at the same time Haskell was ruled out.

The Indians have two games scheduled with Jesuit High School of Dallas, a Catholic school which does not affiliate with the League. The games will be on a home and home basis, with dates to be set.

Jesuit High School is one of the top-ranking schoolboy grid teams in the State, and annually includes 3A and 4A schools in its season schedule.

Haskell County History

30 Years Ago—March 26, 1936

Haskell's modern high school building, a \$60,000 structure, was destroyed by fire which was discovered around midnight Thursday. The three-story building and all furniture and school equipment was a total loss. At a special meeting of the School Board Friday, plans were made for rebuilding the school.

Anticipated cost of operating the City of Haskell for the fiscal year beginning April 1 has been set at \$35,736, this sum being set in the 1936 budget approved Monday by city officials.
