

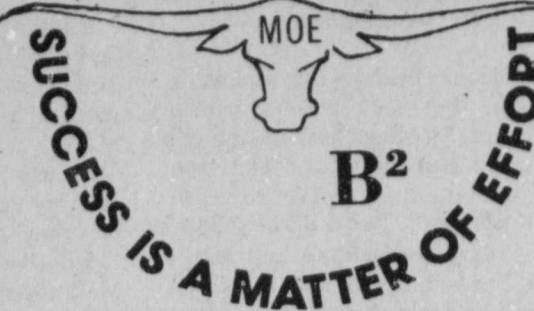

Drug education underway Nov. 1

In the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney School Board of Directors, board members approved a drug education and control contract with Carl Rickert Jr., to be enacted November 1. Rickert also has contracts with Lubbock and Plainview for the same program. For more completed details on the new drug control and education program consult the separate article in this edition of the Beacon.

Superintendent W.H. Hallmark commented, "I am very excited about this program and bringing it to the Lockney school system. I am not that excited about the dog aspect of the program but by the fact that we will be having several drug education programs in the schools." This program will be enacted in all three school buildings. The drug education programs will be held as assemblies and meetings with the students.

In other action the board contracted with Texas Exterminating to treat the elementary school building for termites. The building has been inspected by the board and by experts who have found

that termites have caused minimal damage to the building. Treating the building will prevent further damage.

The board also inspected the new music and physical education building at the elementary school. The building is nearing completion and is being used by the P.E. classes at the present time. Mrs. Amy Thornton will begin having her music classes in the building this week.

The board has also approved moving the board meetings to the second Thursday in each month. The meeting time was also changed to 7:00 p.m., due to the daylight saving time.

The board also approved the minutes of the last meeting, payment of current bills and the making of investments at the meeting.

Annual Harvest Festival slated for October 26

Mrs. Eddie Teeter again is chairman of the food committee for the Lockney United Methodist Church's Annual Harvest Festival which is to be held this year on Saturday, October 26.

In preparation for the approximate number of 700 turkey and dressing meals expected to be served, Mrs. Teeter has ordered 22 large turkeys, 30 gallons of sweet potatoes, 30 gallons of green beans, six gallons of cranberry sauce, 44 pans of dressing and 40 pumpkin cakes which will be baked by the church ladies. Some 840 rolls have been ordered from the school lunch-room ladies.

Tickets for the meal are \$3.50 for adults and \$2.50 for elementary school children and under. The price for the meal has not changed since the Harvest Festival was begun in 1979. This year,

however, 50 cents will be added to the price of tickets bought at the door. Tickets may be purchased now from church members, or at Barker Insurance or First National Bank. Brett and Judy Gill are in charge of ticket distribution.

Takeout plates will again be available, with Molly and Charles Huffman in charge. They expect up to 300 plates to be served through their department. Delivery to the elderly or to shut-ins may be arranged by calling the church office at 652-2193 on weekday mornings or on the morning of the Harvest Festival.

The Harvest Festival also includes a 10 a.m. country store (craft items and baked goods,) and an auction which will follow the meal.

City council reviews insurance

In the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney city council, October 10, the council met with Art Barker and Jerry Paul Cooper to discuss the city's various insurance policies. It was the general consensus of both men that the cost of the city insurance policies would be increased when the policies come up for renewal this year.

The council was updated on the new regulations on insurance for municipalities and the companies that hold the city insurance policies were also discussed.

The city authorized a resolution to purchase a new police vehicle from the State of Texas. By getting the vehicle from the State it will cost the city less money than trying to go through a dealer. The city, however, will not be able to specify what make of vehicle is purchased. The car received by the city will depend on who has the lowest bids

to the state. The car will be a fully equipped police vehicle.

A resolution giving the cities support of the new water plan to be voted on in the November 5 election was tabled for this month and no action was taken.

In other business the council approved leaving the assessment and collection of city taxes with the Floyd County Appraisal District, and approved moving the certificates of deposit from the general improvement fund to the general fund on the advice of the auditor.

The city council discussed retroactive overtime pay for the city employees. The city is required to pay this overtime pay back to April 14, 1985 in order to meet new regulations. Overtime pay will be paid to Laverne Carthel, Dickie McCarty, Archie Jones and Steve Wright. Personal use of vehicles was also discussed at this time but no action

was taken.

Jim McAlister, manager of Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority met with the council to discuss the budget for the 1985-86 year and also to discuss the city's monetary obligation to the authority this upcoming year. The city will be paying \$13,852.00 to the authority this year for water. This figure is down \$9.00 per month from the 1984-85 year. Last year Lockney had contracted to use 147 million gallons of water from Mackenzie and the city used over 80% of that budgeted amount.

In other action the council approved payment of the current bills and the minutes of the last meeting. Present for the meeting were Mayor J.D. Copeland, Aldermen Jerry Johnson, Dub Dipprey, Paul Reecer, Pat Frizzell, Kenneth Wofford and city secretary Erma Lee Duckworth.

New drug control program to be implemented Nov. 1

In the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney school board the board voted to contract the services of Carl Rickert for the purpose of drug education and control.

Rickert is from Gainesville and his services are presently being used by both the Lubbock and Plainview school systems locally. He will be using drug education techniques to alert the students and parents of the dangers of drug use and he will also use trained dogs to search and detect drug use on the campuses in Lockney.

Both superintendent W.H. Hallmark and high school principal James Poole commented that, "education of the students as to the dangers of drug use are the biggest benefit of this new program. By educating the parents as to what to watch for and more thoroughly educating the students maybe we can cut down on the drug problem in Lockney."

Poole also said, "We do have a problem in Lockney and this program will be educational to the parents and show them what to look for. By doing this we can bring even more awareness to the problem and the parents can help us in handling the students who have problems with drugs. Even one student who uses drugs can be a problem because it can spread to other kids."

This new program will begin on November 1 in Lockney and the

administration is planning assemblies with both parents and students to show how the dog will work in the system. Poole said that should drugs be found on a student or if use is suspected the parents will be notified and will have the opportunity to meet with the administration.

The drug surveillance dog and Carl Rickert will be in the Lockney system a minimum of four times each month and they will be spending a minimum of five hours in Lockney with each visit. The program will cost \$665.00 per month for Lockney and both Hallmark and Poole commented it will be money well spent.

The dogs used in Lockney are specially trained to sniff out drugs and will also be able to detect the students who are using drugs from the smells on clothing and cars. These dogs are so well trained that one of them was able to detect five marijuana seeds on the floor board of a closed and locked car.

This new program is being brought to Lockney for the protection of the students and parents and will be administered for that reason. The school administration feels that there is enough of a problem in Lockney to warrant the use of such a program.

The parents will be notified by the local news media and through the schools when the demonstrations of the dog and the assemblies on the program itself will be held.

PSAT exams slated Oct. 22

This fall the nearly 1.5 million students across the United States who take the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) will have a special opportunity to familiarize themselves with the testing format also used on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT).

ON the PSAT/NMSQT, the 30-40 students taking the test at Lockney High on October 22 at 9:00 a.m. can "preview" the exam process for the SAT—the prerequisite for many college-bound students, said Kay Williams of the school guidance staff.

Since 1959, about 30 million high school students have taken the test, which measures verbal and mathematical abilities.

This year, the PSAT/NMSQT will be offered Saturday, October 19 or Tuesday, October 22 at almost 20,000 high schools nationwide.

Through the PSAT/NMSQT students are selected for the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Program, which enables talented students to compete for scholarships, and Hispanic students are considered for the National Hispanic Scholar Awards Program, funded through a \$2.1 million grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation.

In addition, students can use the test as a guide to see how they ranked nationally among other students.

As preparation for the 100-minute, two-part test, students receive a *Student Bulletin* containing a complete sample test with an answer key and scoring instructions.

After taking the actual test, students will receive a booklet, *About Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores*, a descriptive explanation of test results. Students will

also be able to compare their individual answers with the correct answers by consulting the *Report of Students Answers*, another valuable guide. Actual test booklets will also be made available to allow students to spot mistakes and work out answers correctly.

In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

With the magnitude of the latest espionage case escalating almost daily, wariness about how far to go in sharing intelligence with Bonn is deepening in Washington and other allied capitals. In the words of a North Atlantic Treaty Organization diplomat: This affair will shatter confidence in West German security for some time to come and mean most partners will regard Bonn as being as leaky as a sieve.

The scandal was triggered by the defection to East Germany of Bonn's counter-espionage chief, Hans Joachim Tiedge. It involved at least five West Germans by the end of August, including a secretary in the office of the President. It also led to the ouster of the boss of the country's foreign intelligence services, Heribert Hellenbroach.

Repercussions from the scandal were felt outside Germany with the arrest in Britain and Switzerland of two East German couples who had been under surveillance as spies. The affair took an ironic turn with the defection in Argentina of a senior East German diplomat, Martin Winkler, who requested asylum in the United States. One report, denied by Bonn officials, claimed that he was a double agent who worked for West German intelligence and feared that he would be exposed by Tiedge. Another report, published in the mass circulation West German newspaper Bild, described Winkler as

an East German spy master with responsibility for most East German agents in Latin America.

Further underscoring West Germany's vulnerability to penetration by East German spies is the fact that Bonn has been racked periodically by espionage sensations. The most spectacular led to the resignation of former Willy Brandt in 1974 after it was disclosed that a confidential aide was an East German agent.

As the shock waves from Bonn's latest spy scandal spread, the challenge for Washington is how to control the flow of vital secrets to West Germany without endangering cooperation with a key ally.

Horns open district play with win

The Lockney Longhorns opened district play last Friday night with a win over the Petersburg Buffaloes. The final score of the game was 28 to 7. The Horns that took the field Friday night were much like those that lead the Lockney team to the district title last year.

The Horns took the opening kickoff with Javier Bernal receiving. The Horns began the first drive of the game on their own 24 yard line. Quarterback Steven Cates handed off to Bernal and he carried the ball down the Lockney sideline to the Buffalo's 20. However after four plays the Horns, unable to make the first down tried for a field goal that went wide.

After the Buffalo's had the ball for six plays it was returned to the Horns on the 40 yard line, who this time capitalized and scored. Four plays and a penalty later, the Horns had only gained one yard. On the third and nine play quarterback Cates reared back and

connected with Rusty Teeter for a twelve yard gain that put the Horns just inside the Petersburg territory. Tony Banda took the first handoff and moved the Horns seven yards closer to the goal line.

The next play put the Horns on the Buffalos 39 yard line but on the first down play they were moved back two yards. On the second down play Cates kept the ball and put the Horns in a third and five position. Dickie Hernandez took the next handoff and moved the Horns to the Petersburg 25 yard line and a first down. The ball only moved two yards on the first play but on the second down play Tony Banda took the handoff and charged ahead 23 yards for the first score of the game. Ben Schuster made the extra point and the score was 7 to 0 with 2:32 left in the first quarter.

The Horns had possession once more in the first quarter but lost the ball on a fumble.

In the second quarter the Horns had possession three more times but failed to turn the possessions into scoring drives. Petersburg did however score in the second quarter.

With 2:35 left in the half Petersburg took the fumbled ball on the Lockney 43 yard line. An unsportsmanlike penalty on Lockney moved the ball to the Lockney 25 yard line and the Buffalos were in good shape for scoring. However two Petersburg penalties and a big loss on a reverse play, involving Dickie Hernandez who sacked the quarterback, left the Buffalos in a third and 29 position, with only 37 seconds until the half. However three plays and two passes later the Buffalos scored and at the half the game was tied at seven all.

Petersburg took the kickoff after the half but Lockney got the ball back two plays later on a fumble recovery at the buffalos 15 yard line. It took just three plays for the Horns to score their second touchdown of the game. On the third and nine play quarterback Cates threw Johnny Torrez a 15 yard pass that was complete in the end zone. A penalty on Lockney backed up the PAT attempt by Ben Schuster which fell wide, but the Horns lead 13 to 7.

Lockney and Petersburg each had the ball three more times in the quarter but no scoring was achieved by either team.

In the fourth quarter Lockney recovered a fumble that left the Horns on the 50 yard line. On the first down play the ball was handed off to Dickie Hernandez who carried the ball 17 yards and put the Horns in a first down situation on the Buffalos 33 yard line. Tony Banda carried nine yards on the first down play and also on the second down play. That second carry left the Horns again with a first down on the Buffalos 11 yard line.

The first play left the Horns at the starting position but on the second down play Dickie Hernandez took the hand off and carried the ball to the three yard line. Tony Banda took the handoff on the next play and the Horns again scored. Jimmy Ballejo was brought in to quarterback the two point conversion attempt. He kept the ball, ran wide to the Buffalo's side of the field and stepped across the goal line to put the Horns up 21 to 7, with 7:03 left in the game.

The Horns final scoring drive came after Petersburg had possession of the ball. The Buffalo's were forced to punt back to the Horns after four plays. With 5:05 remaining in the game the Horns took the ball on the visitors 37 yard line. Steven Cates kept the ball on the first play and gained 18 yards to give the Horns another first down on the opponents 19 yard line.

On the second and five play Tony

Banda again took the handoff and rushed into the endzone for the fourth touchdown for the Horns. Ben Schuster made the extra point and the Horns emerged victorious with a 21 point advantage over the Petersburg Buffalos.

This win brings Lockney's record for the year to 2-3-1 but most importantly in district play they are one win up. The Horns will face Paducah, in Paducah, this Friday night. The game will start at 7:30 p.m.

The Lockney defense could only be described as hot in the game against Petersburg Friday night. The defense posted four quarterback sacks with Rusty Teeter having three of those. They also kept the opponents ground game to just 12 total yards. The defense also capitalized on four Petersburg mistakes, two fumbles and two interceptions.

When asked why the Longhorns played so much better than they have in the first five games of the season, coach Bob Purser said, "I think, to the boys this is the first week they have really had something (the district title) to play for. They really came on strong. After the half they decided to go out and really play football and they put a lot of effort forth."

Players of the week for the Petersburg game include: offensive lineman Randy Race, offensive back Tony Banda, defensive forcing unit Rusty Teeter, with four quarterback sacks, special teams player Monty Means, and the Big Hit of the week went to Ben Schuster. The Horn of the Week was Rusty Teeter.

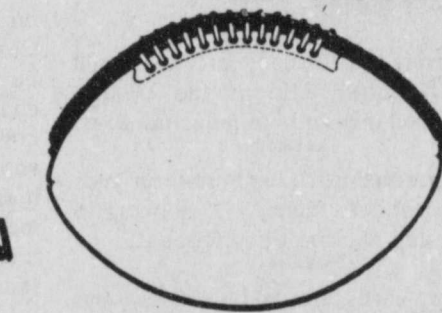
