GIVE GUINEA CHICKS WELL-BALANCED FEED

Nothing Is Required for First
Thirty-Six Hours.

Fowls Are Natural Rangers and Will
Pick Up Seeds, Grasses, Insects
and Green Vegetation to
Supply Much of Living.

(Prepared by the United States Department
of Agriculture.)

Guineas are fed in much the same
way as chickens, but they require less
feed, as they are natural rangers and
can be trusted to find enough seeds of
weeds and grasses, buds, insects and
green vegetation in the fields to sup-
ply much of their living. For the first
36 hours after hatching no feed is
required, as the sustenance from the
egg is sufficient to nourish them for
this period. The first meal may con-
sist of a little hard-boiled egg mixed
with bread crumbs, or bread may be
soaked in milk, squeezed partly dry,
and fed in small bits. Clabbered milk
also is very good, poultry specialists
in the United States Department of
Agriculture say.

Three times a day is as often as
they need to be fed, one feed consist-

ing of clabbered milk or the bread and
egg or bread and milk mixture, and
the other two of chick feed. If the
coop is placed in a field or pasture
where green feed is available, the
guinea chicks can secure this for
themselves; otherwise, sprouted oats,
dandelion leaves, lettuce, or onion tops
cut fine should be furnished. Water,
grit, and fine oyster shell should be
before them always.

By the end of the first week the
young guineas will be finding enough
worms and insects to take the place
of the egg or milk feed, so this may
be eliminated and chick feed given
morning and night. If clabbered milk
is available, however, it can be con-
tinued with excellent success, since
guineas are very fond of variety in
their ration and it is conducive to
quick growth. As the birds grow
older whole wheat, oats, and cracked
corn can be substituted gradually for
the chick feed.

WAY TO PREVENT MILDEWING

Keep Leather in Well-Ventilated, Dry,
Well-Lighted Place, Exposed to
Sunlight.

Any leather article is almost cer-
tain to mildew if kept in a warm,
damp, and dark place, such as a
closet, cellar, or stable. This mildew-
ing probably will not reduce seriously
the serviceability of the article, un-
less it is allowed to remain on the
leather too long. It may, however,
change the color appreciably, thus in-
juring the appearance. The simplest
way to prevent mildewing, say special-
ists of the United States Department
of Agriculture, is to keep the leather
in a well-ventilated, dry, well-lighted
place, preferably one exposed to the
sunlight. Mildew can not make much
headway in the sunshine. When mil-
dew develops, it should be washed off
with soap and warm water, or simply
wiped off with a moist cloth, drying
the leather well afterwards. These
simple measures are preferable to
the application in the home of prepara-
tions designed to prevent the growth
of mildew.

POISON BAIT FOR CUTWORMS

White Arsenic, Arsenate of Lead or
Paris Green Mixed With
Bran Is Effective.

Cutworms appear in early spring
and cut off the stems of young plants
at the surface of the ground. They are
quickly destructive. The best remedy
is poisoned bait. For a small garden
mix two level tablespoons of white
arsenic, arsenate of lead, or Paris
green into five pounds of dry bran.
Add from four to six quarts of water.
In which half a pint of sorghum or
cheap molasses has been mixed. After
the mash has stood several hours
scatter it thinly over the garden or a
small quantity at the base of the plants.
Put the poison on late in the day, so
it will be moist during the night when
the cutworms feed.

HARRY H. PEPPER GOES TO ETERNAL HOME

The following article is taken from the Wheatland, Wyoming paper. The widow Mrs. Maude Nass-Pepper formerly lived in this county and is a niece of Mr. and Mrs. James Reed: Harry H. Pepper, whose critical illness was reported in last week's issue of this paper, passed away on Wednesday evening. A short service was conducted at his late home on Thursday evening, under the auspices of the I. O. O. F. lodge, Rev. C. M. Vales officiating, and the body was taken to Denver for interment. Mr. Pepper was born at Denver on July 23, 1893, where his parents still reside. He grew to young manhood in that city and graduated from the North Denver High School, after which he entered an undertaking establishment as a student and became very proficient in that profession. He came to Wheatland in the fall of 1916 and established himself in the undertaking business, meeting with marked success. In the spring of 1917 he offered his services to his country, enlisting in the Navy and because of his professional ability was placed in Naval Hospital service being stationed at Mare and Goat islands until the summer of 1919 when he received an honorable discharge, and returned to Wheatland. On Jan. 1, 1920, he was united in marriage with Miss Maud Noss of Wendover. To this union a daughter was born, Lillian Elaine, now four months of age. After coming to Wheatland Mr. Pepper at once became identified with community interests, playing the part of a loyal, active citizen. In the election of 1920 he was elected as county coroner with the largest ma-

HEALTH VALUE OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES.

Vegetarian schools have great faith in tomatoes as a medicine for biliousness and all forms of liver trouble; this is because of the vegetable calomel in large quantities which is found in that fruit.

Rhubarb or pie plant, when properly cooked, is a good laxative, while its agreeable acid is cooling and stimulating. The tender green leaves, combined with other greens, are especially good served as greens.

Lettuce is considered a sure remedy for nervousness and insomnia. Even Shakespeare has one of his characters remark: "Did I eat any lettuce to supper last night that I am 'so sleepy?'"

And of water cress, "a cheap but wholesome salad from the brook." Containing so much sulphur, this dainty little green tends to purify the blood. This sulphur, in vegetable form, is all ready to be assimilated, while the form we buy is not.

Dandelion greens carry a high percentage of iron, while the tender young leaves make a fine salad. Mixed with potato, it improves both kinds.

Spinach, which is called the broom of the blood, stands at the head of vegetables in percentage of iron. This vegetable has a most healthful action on both bowels and kidneys.

The onion, too often snubbed by those who would be ultra fine, holds a high place as a flavor vegetable, stimulating, laxating and generally purifying the whole system.

Beets are a nerve tonic, make new blood; the Greeks held the beet ideal for brain workers.

Cucumbers are rich in potassium and phosphorous; even in ancient times they were used for the complexion, internally as well as externally.

Carrots rank still higher in these days with the beauty specialist; when eaten raw, one a day, they are a sure cure for a muddy complexion.

Grapes are one of the favorite fruits and are usually taken by all with cleansing and tonic effect.

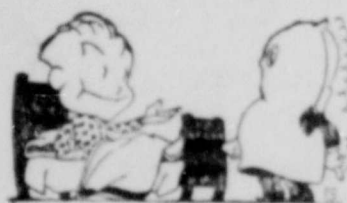

MAKE WHIPS AND CUSTARD DISHES

Eggs Form Basis of Many Delicious Desserts During Early Spring and Summer.

SOME SIMPLE RECIPES GIVEN

Thrifty Housewives Take Advantage of Plentiful Supply of Eggs to Convert Them Into Nutritious Concoctions.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

In early spring and summer, when eggs are plentiful and cheap, the thrifty among the housekeepers utilize plenty of them for desserts. When this is done the rest of the meal does not need to be quite so "hearty."

The following recipes are recommended by food specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture:

Soft Custard.

1 cup milk 2 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon vanilla 1-1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg

Heat the milk in a double boiler. Mix the eggs in a bowl with the sugar and salt. Add hot milk slowly, stirring, and return mixture to the double boiler. Cook until custard will coat a silver spoon. Strain and serve. If the custard curdles set the pan into cold water and beat the custard until smooth.

Steamed or Baked Custard.

1 pint milk 1/4 cup sugar
2 eggs 1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg or cinnamon

Mix eggs as for soft custard. Strain into custard cups and steam until firm over hot water, which is boiling gently. To bake, strain the custard into cups and place in a pan of warm water. Bake in a moderate oven until the custard is firm. To test a steamed or

baked custard, slip a knife blade to the bottom of the cup in the center of the custard and draw out without turning. If the knife is not coated the custard has cooked enough. Grate the nutmeg over the surface and cool before serving.

Floating Island.
1 quart milk 5 eggs (yolks)
1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup sugar

Prepare as a soft custard. The whites

should be beaten light and two tablespoons powdered sugar added for the meringue. When the custard is cool it may be poured into sauce dishes and the meringue dropped in large spoonfuls into it.

Custard Pudding.

1/2 cup pearl tapioca 1/4 cup sugar
or rice 2 cups milk
2 eggs (yolks) 2 eggs (whites)
1/4 teaspoon vanilla 1/4 teaspoon salt

Soak the tapioca in enough cold water to cover it until it absorbs the water. Add the milk and cook in a double boiler until the tapioca is soft and transparent. Combine the yolks of eggs with sugar and salt and add to the mixture in the double boiler. Cook until it thickens. Add stiffly beaten whites and flavoring, and when cool serve. Rice must be cooked in boiling water until soft.

Apple Whip.

2 cups apple sauce Cream for serving
5 eggs (whites)

Cook six or eight medium-sized tart apples until soft in just enough water to keep them from burning. Add sirup to sweeten sufficiently and one-eighth teaspoonful grated nutmeg. Cool. Press the apple sauce through a strainer and add to it the stiffly beaten whites of eggs. Beat until light and foamy. Pile onto saucers and serve with fresh cream or a custard sauce made of the egg yolks. This sauce may be prepared by the same method as for soft custard, omitting the whites of eggs. Canned fruit, such as peaches, figs, cherries or guava, may be substituted in the same proportion for the apples.

LEMONS CONDUCE TO HEALTH AND PLEASE

Have New Importance in Diet, Say Specialists.

Long List of Beverages and Desserts in Which Juice Can Be Used, as Well as in Number of Sauces for Fish and Meat.

In the olden times sailors who took long trips and ate no fresh vegetables and fruits for weeks or months were likely to fall victims to scurvy. Finally a cure or a partial cure for it was found in lemon juice.

Of late years scientists have been making a study of scurvy, its cause and its cure and of the conditions that make the body proof against this disease. They have discovered a substance called vitamin C, which seems to prevent and even to cure this disease. It is found in many foods, among them tomatoes and such citrus fruits as oranges, grapefruit and lemons.

Lemons, therefore, have a new importance in the diet, according to food specialists in the United States Department of Agriculture, office of home economics. They are no longer to be valued simply for their flavor, but also as a source of one of these necessary substances.

Lemons can be prepared in all sorts of ways in the preparation of meals. There is a long list of beverages and desserts in which lemon juice is used, as well as a number of delicious sauces that expert cooks have invented to serve on fish and meat. Many of these sauces the busy housekeeper has no time to make, but she can cut a lemon in two and put it on the table to serve with fish, oysters, or meat. Some people think that a little lemon juice adds just the zest needed to make eggs on toast a tasteful dish. Lemon juice is also good on spinach and other green vegetables, on many kinds of salads, and also as flavoring for pudding sauces and cakes.

The seal this year is a departure from the usual style, being diamond shaped and depicting Santa Claus holding two small children. Last year the sale of seals amounted to \$90,000.00 in Texas. This is the second year that the National Tuberculosis Association has had entire charge of the seal sale. Previous to that the sale was held in connection with the American Red Cross.

The Texas Public Health Association has at the present time twelve affiliated local societies which are carrying on an extensive campaign for better health. The work of these different organizations is financed entirely by the sale of Christmas seals.

The Texas Public Health Association in cooperation with the local societies is carrying on an extensive health program, specializing in the prevention of tuberculosis. An increased seal sale means increased activity in the fight for the better health.

CORN TEST BULLETINS FREE TO FARMERS

Variety tests with corn during a seven year period at the Angleton Experiment Station are described in Bulletin No. 276 of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, A. & M. College. The bulletin is just from the press and is for free distribution to those requesting it.

Eight varieties of more than fifty tested, made a showing deserving attention. Of these, Fentress Strawberry led with an average yield of 33.58 bushels per acre. Hastings Prolific, Yellow Dent, Thomas, Surcrotter, Chisholm, Virginia White Dent and Tuxpan followed closely in order named. Besides good yielders, Fentress Strawberry, Thomas and Tuxpan proved to be desirable types of corn for the Gulf Coastal plains of Texas. Some of the other good yielding varieties occasionally have a poor quality of grain due to short shuck or a tendency to rot.

Variety Date tests conducted for three years confirmed the variety tests and showed in every instance that the early planting about the 1st of March or as soon as weather conditions will permit, are better than plantings made either two or four weeks later. These tests are also described in Bulletin 276 and the rain fall records since 1914 are given.

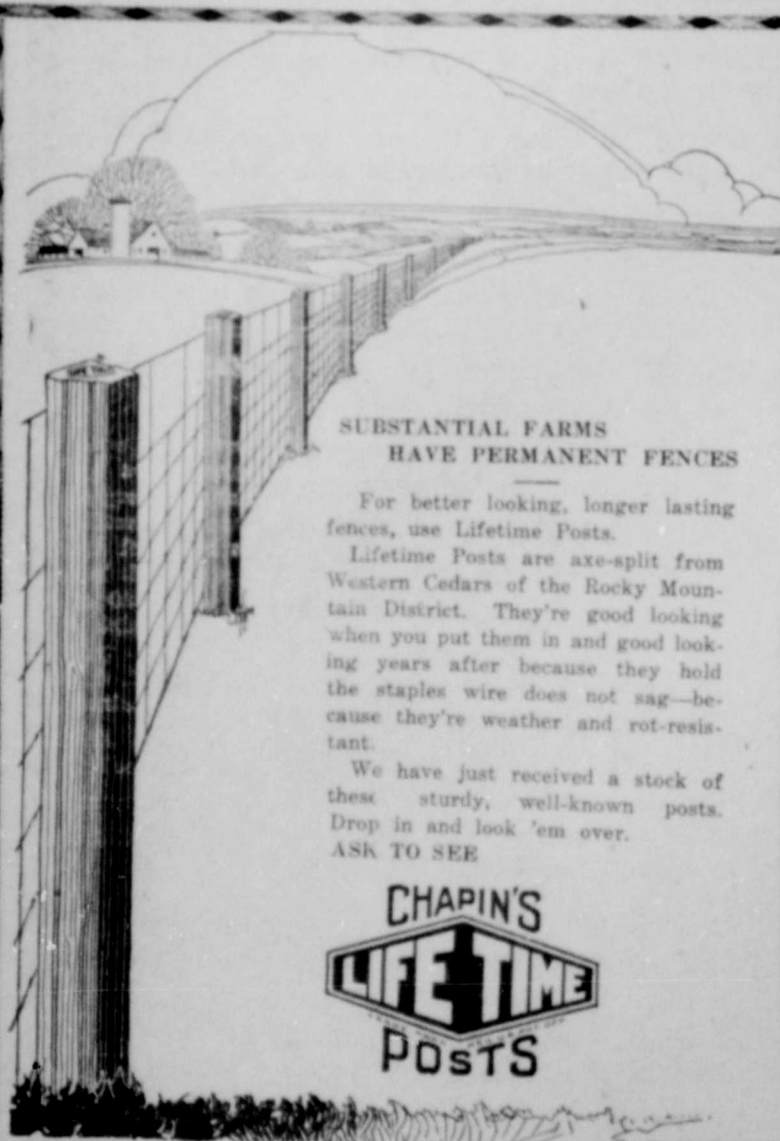

STAKE TOMATOES FOR BEST QUALITY FRUIT

Plants Are Thus Held Off Ground
and Kept Clean.

In Pruning Remove All Side Shoots
and Suckers, Leaving Only Main
Stem—Small Saplings Are
Good and Inexpensive.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

It generally pays to stake and prune the tomatoes grown in the small home garden because by this method the fruit is held off the ground and is clean, a larger number of tomato plants can be grown on a given space and the fruit generally ripens earlier than if the plants are allowed to grow in the natural way. In pruning the plants all side shoots and suckers are removed, leaving only the main stem with its leaves and clusters of fruit. It is easy to determine which are the side shoots and which are the young blossom clusters because the shoots appear directly in the little pocket where the leaf joins the stem, while the fruit clusters appear on the naked side of the stem where there is no

leaf. Pinch out the side shoots, but be careful not to injure the blossom or fruit clusters.

Tomato stakes should be from 4 to 6 feet long and 1 to 1½ inches through at the thickest part. They may be small saplings cut in the woods and sharpened at one end, or they may be split from a log that is free from knots. Sometimes strips of waste material from a sawmill or planing mill, known as edgings, are used. It makes little difference so long as the stakes are strong enough to support the plants and are inexpensive. The stakes should be driven firmly into the ground, one on the north side of each tomato plant, and the plants tied to them once a week during the active growing period with soft cord or narrow strips of muslin. Sometimes the tomato plants will reach the tops of the stakes and then hang over until the tip will touch the ground, clusters of fruits being formed all along the stems.

Twenty-five to 50 tomato plants trained to stakes will supply the average family with all the tomatoes needed for use while fresh, also for canning. It pays to go to some little trouble to have them early, also to stake and prune them so that the quality will be the best.

PLAN SEEDBED FOR ALFALFA

Plenty of Good Barnyard Manure
Should Be Applied If Soil Lacks
Humus and Fertility.

If you are planning a five or ten-acre field of alfalfa, and you ought to plan it if you do not already have alfalfa, see that the ground is made ready in good shape. Alfalfa needs a hospitable soil, but it isn't so hard to make a soil pretty fairly hospitable. Apply lime if the soil is acid, and plenty of good barnyard manure if it lacks fertility and humus. Then remember this: You cannot get the seedbed too fine for alfalfa; this crop needs a firm, fine seedbed and to get the very best results, you should see that it gets what it needs.

DISCARD ALL BOARDER HENS

In Small Flock Owner Can Determine
by Observation Which Fowls
Are Layers.

In any flock some hens will be found to be much better producers than others. Often there are a few hens that are such poor layers that it doesn't pay to keep them. Where the flock is small the owner can determine by observation which hens are merely boarders; and these are the ones to eat.

WAR ON INSECTS

Preventive measures are best against insect enemies. Rotate the crops, avoid introducing insects and diseases, practice frequent cultivation, and employ fertilizers to stimulate plant growth. A vigorously growing garden may produce a crop in spite of injurious insects, but in fighting insects be thorough.

FEDERAL GRADES HELP MARKETING

Organizers of Co-operative Associations Fail to Recognize
Value of Standard

HIGHER PRICES ARE SECURED

Florida Growers Pack Cucumbers
Through Central Packing House
Thus Insuring Uniformity
of Product.

Growers of fruits and vegetables are appreciating more and more the benefits possible through organization in marketing their products. It is estimated that there are 14,000 farmers' cooperative buying and selling associations in the United States of which about 2,000 represent fruit and vegetable interests.

Will Find Bureau Grades Helpful.

Where the association is organized for the purpose of selling, the organizers often lose sight of the fact that some standard must be adopted for marketing their products. Individuals or organizations will find the recommended or proposed grades formulated by the bureau of markets, United States Department of Agriculture, very helpful as a basis for their packs or brands.

One Florida truck growers' association adopted this past season the tentative United States grades for cucumbers as a basis for their "Fancy" and "Choice" packs, marketing them under their leading brand. An investigator of the bureau of markets inspected the association pack and the individual shipper's pack and advised with them when any doubtful points concerning grades were raised. This inspection service gave the bureau of markets an opportunity to determine in the field whether the grades as formulated would be practical, at least under Florida conditions.

The association packed all cucumbers through a central packing shed, each grower's product thus being graded by a disinterested person. This made for uniformity of the product. Every car loaded by the association was approximately 4 to 5 per cent within the grade requirements. Nearly every car inspected outside the central packing house was below grade, ranging 3 to 20 per cent in excess of the 10 per cent tolerance allowed for defective or cull stock.

It is interesting to study the prices received by association members for stock packed under Federal grades through their central packing house and prices received by farmers outside the association. Prices given in the accompanying table are f. o. b. car lots in bushel hampers.

No straight car of No. 3 were loaded on the street because it is customary to include a certain portion of such cucumbers in both the No. 1 and No. 2 grade.

Grades Fixed on Some Products.

The Bureau of Markets has officially recommended grades for potatoes, sweet potatoes, strawberries, northern-grown onions, Bermuda onions, and formulated tentative grades for barreled apples, cabbage, peaches, tomatoes, cucumbers, lettuce, celery, and asparagus. These grades are the result of investigations conducted in the leading fruit and vegetable sections, as well as in primary markets. The adoption of such definite grades by fruit and vegetable shippers, whether individuals or associations, would assist very materially in increasing returns and no doubt tend toward better understanding between shippers and receivers.

NEAT TRICKS IN GARDENING

One of Best is Laying Board Over
Row of Seeds to Start Them
and Hold Moisture.

There are a great many little tricks that should be learned and practiced by the gardener. It is not necessary to be a wizard to practice these tricks but just a good, common sense gardener. One of the best of these is the use of a board laid over the row of seeds for a few days after planting to hold the moisture and make the seeds start during dry weather. Another is to flood the furrow with water and allow it to soak into the soil before dropping the seeds, then cover with dry earth. Slightly packing or firming the dry soil over the seeds will help to bring the moisture to the surface and make the seeds grow. Garden tricks are easy to perform—try a few and see the results in the form of fresh vegetables for the table—it means better living.
