New Locations For Drilling

Sigmor Corp., of San Antonio has scheduled several wells in the Coleman County Regular Field east of Santa Anna.

The No. 5 W. D. Sheffield is to be drilled two and one half miles east of town on a 169.5 acre lease to be a proposed total depth of 2,400 feet. The well is located in the Mary Ann Fisk Survey.

The No. 6 Sheffield is in the same survey and for the same depth.

The No. 2 Joe C. Stevens et al is to be located in the John Gray Survey two and one half miles east of Santa Anna on a 50 acre tract.

A wildcat has been staked two miles east of Santa Anna as the G. DePrang Oil Co. of Coleman, No. 1 Garland DePrang. The well will be on a 260 acre lease in Section 55 HT&B Survey. It is planned for 2,990 feet.

Crown Petroleum Inc., of Dallas has staked four locations in the Santa Anna (Marble Falls) Field five miles southeast of Santa Anna. They are the No. 1, 2, 1-A and 2-A Pittard on the W. H. Pittard Estate lease. They will be drilled to 2,900 feet in the various locations in the Manuel Martinez Survey 751.

The No. 2 Santa Anna School District well located at the old Plainview School site four miles southwest of Santa Anna has been completed by Teal Petroleum Co. of Houston. Location is in the W. H. Bynum Survey 272 at a total dept of 2,051 feet. The absolute, open flow was gauged at 629,300 cubic feet of dry gas daily, treated with 500 gallons of acid.

Harris Nursing Section Is Named For Dr. Sealy

A cancer nursing section honoring Dr. W. Burgess Sealy has been established as part of the Learning Resources Center of TCU's Harris College of Nursing. The new section is designed to become a comprehensive learning center with its variety of multimedia materials and teaching equipment to be used in focusing on cancer and the specialized nursing treatment required in its professional care. It was inaugurated by an initial gift of \$7,500 from Mrs. Anne Burnett Tandy.

Its naming in honor of Dr. Sealy, well-known Fort Worth surgeon who is particularly interested in the field of cancer treatment, was announced recently during a brief ceremony held in the Learning Resources Center in TCU's Annie Richardson Bass Building.

Taking part in the informal event along with Mrs. Tandy were TCU Chancellor J. M. Moudy, Harris College dean Dr. Virginia Jarratt and Dr. William C. Conner, chairman of the University's Board of Trustees.

A bronze plaque at the entrance of the Learning Resources Center, unveiled by Dr. Moudy, reads: "Learning Resources Center, Cancer Nursing Section, given in honor of Dr. W. Burgess Sealy by Anne Burnett Tandy (Mrs. Charles D. Tandy), 1977."

Dr. Sealy, both a diplomat and fellow of the American Board of Surgeons, has served on the board of TCU's Harris College of Nursing for 17 years and has been its chairman since 1968. Also a

member of the University's board of trustees, the distinguished surgeon has been a fellow of the Mayo Clinic and is past-president of the Tarrant County chapter of the American Cancer Society.

He also is past-chairman of the education committee of the Texas Chapter of the American Cancer Society.

During TCU's May commencement activities, he will be awarded the honorary Doctor of Science degree.

A Santa Anna native, Dr. Sealy is a graduate of Santa Anna High School, the University of Texas and U.T. Medical School and the University of Minnesota Mayo Foundation. He is a distinguished surgeon and community leader.

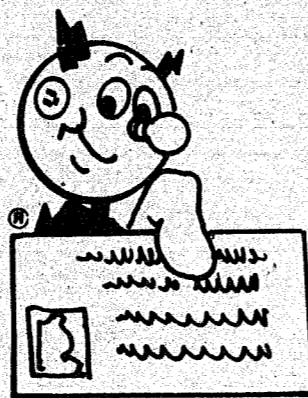

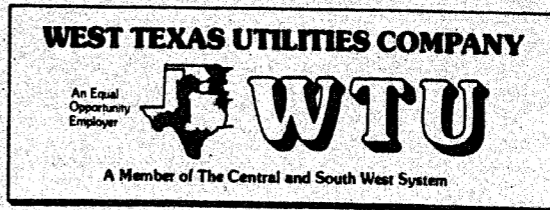

The fuel charge you have been paying is now shown as a separate item on your bill from WTU. The money from this charge is used for ONLY ONE PURPOSE— TO PAY THE INCREASED PRICE OF FUELS needed to produce your electricity. None of this money is used for profits or for any other expenses.

If you need more detailed information, please contact your local WTU office.

Your electric service bill will be similar to the one shown here with base rate and fuel cost charges included among the separately listed items. We've prepared a line-by-line guide to explain these items in your bill.



LINE ONE is the base rate portion of the monthly bill. It also shows amount of kilowatt hours used.

LINE TWO shows the fuel adjustment separately. The fuel adjustment has been part of the rate since 1959, but until now has been included as part of the base rate on your bill. The six-digit number shown (.017076) is the fuel adjustment factor. This factor reflects the difference between the price of fuel this month and the price in 1959.

This adjustment factor is then multiplied by the number of kilowatt hours used by you, the individual customer.
Example: .017076 x 562 = \$9.60

LINE THREE shows any charges for other electric services, which on this bill includes a Guard-Lite.

LINE FOUR shows the amount of SALES TAX remitted to the STATE.

LINE FIVE indicates your total bill for electric service.

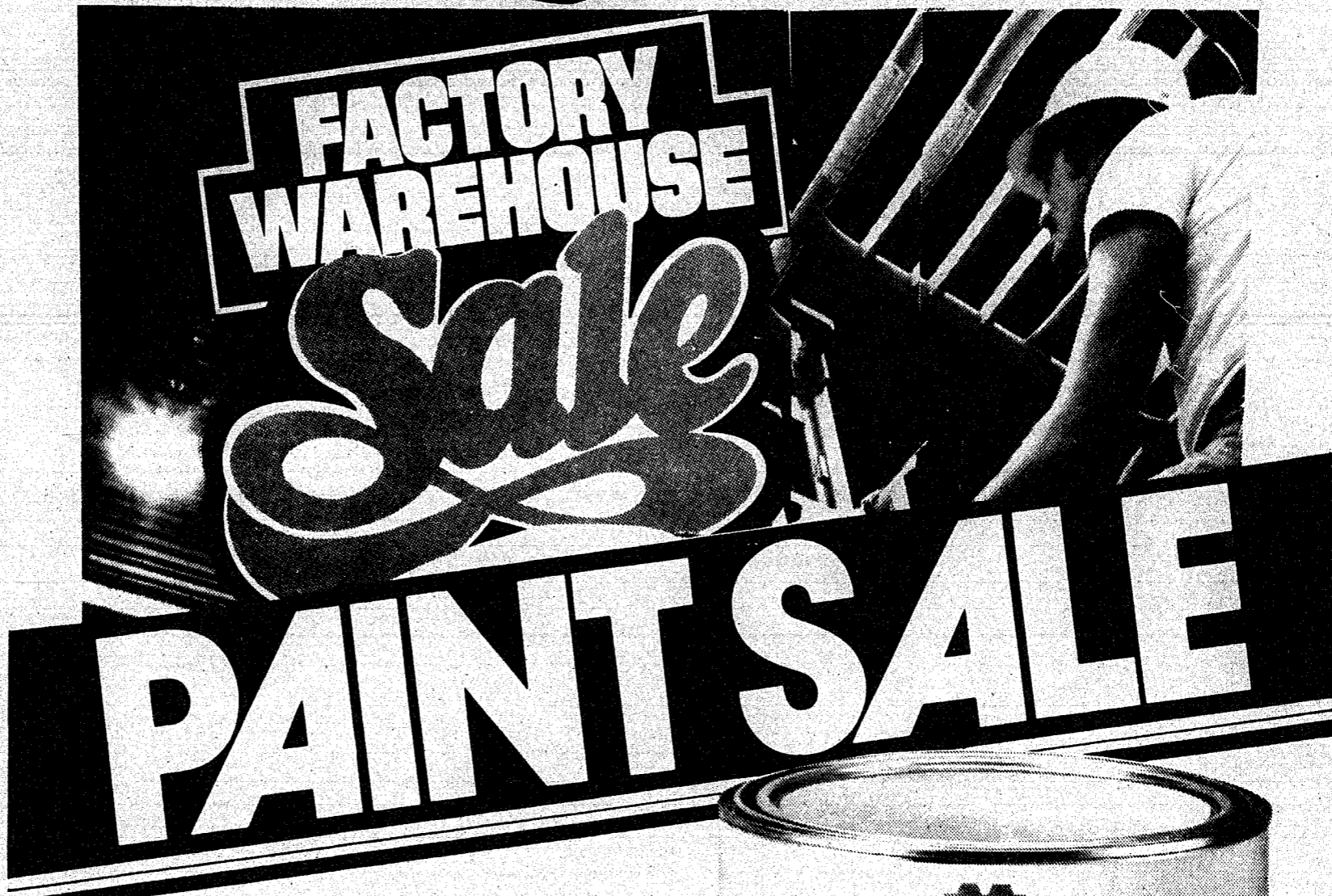

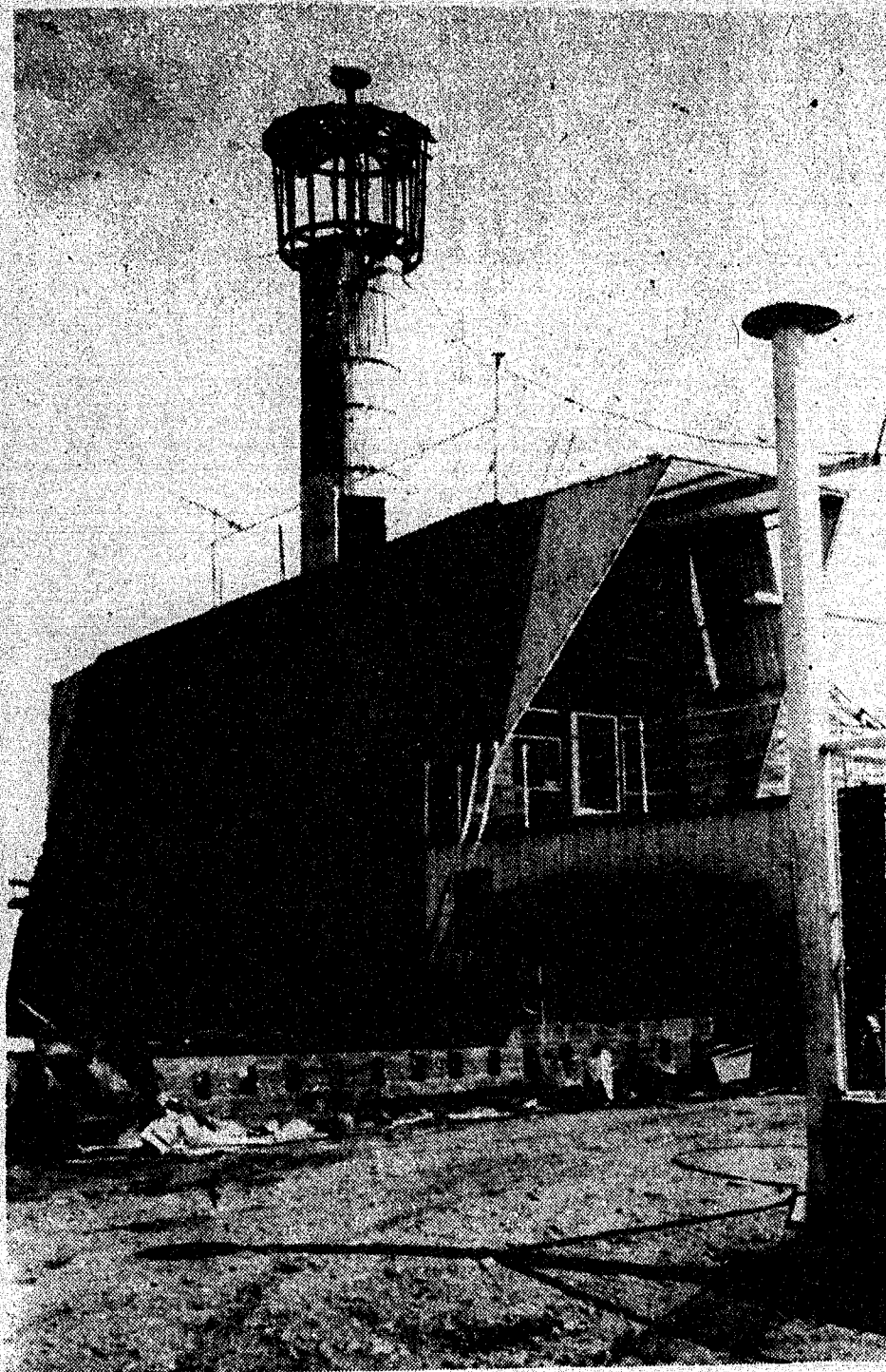

Elgean Shield Home An Unusual Structure

The pioneers who came west and brought their young families had a dream. Mr. and Mrs. Elgean Shield - though not so young - have a dream. The magnitude of it is unbelievable.

The dream began to take shape December 31, 1969 with a solar heated house. It isn't complete yet.

The dream house sits on a point of a hill, facing south. The whole house is 125 feet long and 50 feet wide. The living quarters are 50 feet by 25 feet, with a total of 12,500 square feet in the building. There are to be four stories when completed; first two are in use now, with an elevator going to the second floor.

We find the living quarters and bath on the first floor, with bedrooms and bath on the second floor, with concrete porches on east and west. The

building is 60 feet in height with the Observation Tower going much higher.

Mr. Shield tells us the house is made of steel with one-half mile of 4 1/2 inch oil field casing welded into the frame work. The walls and floor are made of old Santa Anna steel from a 55,000 barrel water tank. Walls have 14 inch insulation with 24

SDA Baptism Is Biblical

The baptism last month of President Carter's daughter has sparked questions on the ancient practice of "Total immersion" baptism, says Elder A. L. Swanson, pastor of the local Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Jesus Christ was baptized at the age of 30, in the Jordan River by John the Baptist. That act signified to the public His total dedication to His Father in Heaven.

"Jesus's parting words to His disciples, before ascending to heaven, were to teach the gospel, baptizing men and women in the name of the "Father, Son, and Holy Ghost," says Swanson. "In the book of Acts, we find Phillip baptizing the Ethiopian in a river AFTER he accepted Jesus Christ as his Saviour,...

Many Protestant churches follow the plan of "total immersion" - the Baptists and Adventists and some others - today feeling they are following more precisely the example of the Lord.

Many children are prepared for baptism at about twelve years of age. It is felt that at that age the child can understand the meaning of the ritual, and of his total commitment to the Lord, and is fully aware that he is pledging his whole life to God. This would be impossible at birth.

New converts to the faith are baptized at any age, unless through physical disability they choose to make a profession of faith, according to the pastor.
