## Wise Declines Appointment

# Candidate Sought For Pct. 1 J.P.'s Office

Mitchell County Commissioners are now seeking applicants for the position of Justice of the Peace of Precinct 1 after M. O. (Odie) Wise turned down an appointment to the position. Commissioners met in special session Thursday to appoint Wise to that position but

that same morning Wise received notice from the Veterans Administration that he had been placed on the 100% disabled list stemming from World War II wounds. Wise told the commissioners that he could not receive the tax free pension if he was to

accept the JP's job. Wise challenged the incumbent Leonard Henderson in the May 4 Democratic primary for the job and received 270 votes to 344 for Henderson. Henderson informed commissioners May 14 that he was going to resign his post, effective June 1.

Commissioners are seeking someone to fill Henderson's unexpired term of office. Probably within the next month, the Precinct 1 Democratic committee will name someone to place on the ballot for the November general election to take office Jan. 1.

County Judge Bill Carter said four persons have expressed interest in having the job which pays \$562 a month plus \$25 a month expenses.

Duties of the office include holding small claims court, levying fines on traffic violations and setting bond on persons charged with felonies and misdemeanors.

The only qualifications required is that the applicant must have been a resident of Precinct 1 for a period of not less than six months and attend 20 hours of schooling within the next year.

Justices of the Peace are on call 24-hours a day. Wise expressed his appreciation to everyone for their help and support during his campaign and on his behalf to have

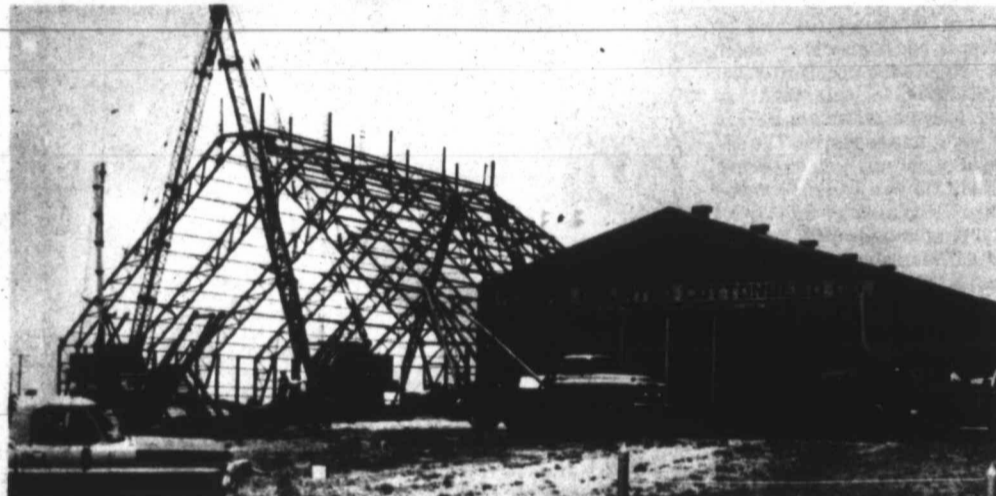
A regular weekend's traffic at the park is about five or six hundred cars, Robinette said, and they are expecting about twice that many for the holiday.

# Last I-27 Meeting

A final informal meeting on extension of Interstate 27 is set for 7 p.m. at Waltrip Senior High School in Houston.

Meetings were held in March in West Texas cities, Lubbock, Lamesa, Snyder, Big Spring, Abilene and San Angelo.

The I-27 extension is one of ten routes for which Congress directed feasibility and necessity studies as part of the 1973 Federal Aid Highway Act.

The Texas Highway Department says that the I-27 meetings have provided citizens the opportunity to suggest routes and to air their views on the proposed highway.

Routes proposed range from one that would extend southward from Lubbock, across I-20 to I-10 near Ozona, to a route extending across central Texas, linking up with I-10 near Houston. Several intermediate points were suggested as the I-10 connection.

Proposals also include that proposed by Colorado City as a compromise route, extending through Slaton, Post, Snyder, Robert Lee and connecting with I-10 near Sonora or Junction. Features of the Colorado City proposal include the lower cost of rangeland for the right of way, providing a needed route for West Texas traffic and the important consideration that it is the shortest southward ex-

ension to San Angelo, one of Texas's largest cities not served by an interstate highway.

## Handy Hints

Recreation offers three phases of enjoyment--the hopeful or planning stage, actual pleasure or enjoyment from the activity, and the recall or "sweet memories" of the experience, says Nelson Barksdale, recreation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

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The less water added when cooking vegetables, the more nutrients are retained. To prevent scorching, use moderate heat, suggests Mrs. Mickey Sweeten, foods and nutrition specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

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Clean rugs and carpets with a vacuum cleaner. Shaking or beating them breaks threads, damages the backing and tears the binding. Hanging them over a line strains fibers, causing them to break, warns Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

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Only linen and silk textile wastes are used as the basic ingredient of currency paper, says Marilyn Brown, consumer education-clothing and textiles specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

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The quickest way to get a child interested in doing something with you is to start doing something you really want to do by yourself, says Dr. Jennie Kitching, family life education specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

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Many interesting beverages, sandwiches and dips can be made from cranberries. Since cranberry sauce has fewer calories than many jams and jellies, it makes an excellent snack food, says Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

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Evaporated milk can be used in place of milk or cream on cereals and puddings--and in cooking, says Frances Reasonover, foods and nutrition specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

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Don't be misled by so-called crushed velvet, which may be no more than a coating of flocked fiber on a woven background, advises Marilyn Brown, consumer education-clothing and textiles specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

## Public Helps With Endangered Species

"The interested public will walk the second mile for wildlife if they only know which way to walk," according to non-game biologist John Smith of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Speaking before a recent meeting of the Southeastern Association of Game and Fish Commissioners in Hot Springs, Ark., Smith outlined his success in enlisting public aid for his census of peregrine falcons, ospreys and bald eagles.

In most states, game and fish departments lack the finances and manpower to learn the status of endangered non-game species.

Smith found a solution to this problem: "I began to notice that at least one of every two citizens interested in non-game species was offering his services to my project if I would only tell him how he could help."

He cited several reasons for such heartening response from the public.

"The field of endangered species is a romantic one. Many people have created interest in these species because they are new and exciting...and the unknown, especially when rare, is intriguing."

There is also a segment of hunters and fishermen which has come to the conclusion that all wildlife is important and they want to have an active part in the non-game research. The endangered and non-game species enthusiasts are truly a composite of ideas and drives."

Smith started in 1972 to utilize public assistance on two projects: a bald eagle-osprey survey and a peregrine falcon census.

Smith said that of the 4,500 questionnaires sent out on the eagle-osprey survey, some 2,100 were returned.

"Response was so good that literally hundreds went overboard in telling me how honored they were in being asked

to help, often at the expense of telling me where they saw the bird.

"There was no doubt that the public had allowed me to conduct a relatively inexpensive but effective survey of endangered species.

The public also came to Smith's rescue in October, 1973, when the second annual peregrine falcon survey was conducted along the Texas coast.

During the 1972 survey, 50 teams of from two to three people each combed Matagorda, Galveston and South Padre Islands in search of migrating peregrine falcons. A second survey with some 75 participants was conducted October 1973.

"On the whole," said Smith, "the non-professional wildlifeers were quite 'professional'."

**Boating Course Available**

If you were out boating and you came upon a red-and-black horizontally banded buoy, would you know what it meant? Do you know the proper way to give a distress signal over a boat's radio?

If not, you probably need a copy of the "Texas Skippers Course" which is available from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The course is a 104-page home study program to be offered free of charge by the department.

It is designed so that the reader can digest a small amount of material and then test himself on what he has learned with review and summary questions before he continues.

An end-of-course, open book examination will be graded by the department, and those who successfully complete the program will receive a safe boater registration card. A permanent record of their achievement will be maintained by the department in Austin.

Boating safety officials say situation problems are utilized throughout the course so the reader can apply what he has just read in solving problems created in the situations.

According to Joel Block, water safety education coordinator for the department, the "Texas Skipper's Course" will allow the boater to pace himself, spending as much time as he requires in grasping a problem.

Information explaining how to obtain a copy of the course will be available with boat registration renewal forms and through Parks and Wildlife Department offices statewide.

**Kleingrass New In This Area**

Kleingrass is a relatively new grass to this area. "It is a high producer of quality forage, when managed properly," states Guy McLhaney of the Soil Conservation Service in Colorado City.

Kleingrass should be planted in a pure stand either in rows or broadcast. It should be planted from April through June.

Several plantings of Kleingrass have been made in the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District. Two of these are on Rex McKenney and Myra Robinson's "Wildhorse Ranch." Both landowners are very pleased with the results they have obtained with Kleingrass.

Kleingrass will respond to fertilizer and production can be increased a great deal with its use.

Weeds should be controlled for maximum grass production, especially while getting established.

Landowners interested in knowing more about this grass should contact the Soil Conservation Service personnel in Colorado City. The Colorado City field office serves the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District.

## Conserve And Protect Land From Wind And Water Erosion

The expected large increase in agricultural production in the United States presents major responsibilities and fresh opportunities for the Soil Conservation Service and conservation districts.

The responsibility is to encourage land users to get additional cropland under conservation plans promptly and to select for intensive farming those acreages that can be protected adequately from soil erosion. Closely related is the job of helping land owners find ways to increase farm and ranch income and production.

Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz said in a statement last month, "While there is plenty of additional land in the United States that can be used for crop production without endangering our basic soil and water resources, there are also millions of acres of farm and ranch land with soils so prone to blowing or water erosion that they should never be used for crops."

## McDonald Rites Held Sunday

H. T. McDonald, 69, of Mineral Wells, died Friday, May 17. Funeral services were held Sunday May 19 in the First Baptist Church in Mineral Wells.

He was the son of Minnie McDonald and the brother of Mrs. Brice Webb of Colorado City.

He was born in Eastland County and moved to Winters when he was young. He taught school there for several years.

He was assistant postmaster in Mineral Wells and was postmaster when he retired.

McDonald was a member of the First Baptist Church in Mineral Wells and a member of the Pythian Lodge.

Survivors include his wife, two sons John of Mineral Wells and Raymond of Fort Worth, his mother, Minnie McDonald of Colorado City, a sister Mrs. Brice Webb of Colorado City and two other sisters and one brother.

Also last month, the National Association of Conservation Districts called for a nationwide campaign to make sure farmers and ranchers use conservation practices to prevent accelerated wind and water erosion--to avoid another "Dust Bowl."

We must work with farmers and ranchers to remind them that soil erosion control, or the lack of it, directly influences crop yields and farm income. One recent study, reported by the Agricultural Engineering Department of the University of Missouri, showed that soil erosion in some areas seriously reduced the production of corn and soybeans and resulted in a net income drop of \$18.32 an acre on moderately eroded fields and \$33.20 an acre on severely eroded fields. Production costs for these farmers rose 20 percent on moderately eroded fields and 56 percent on severely eroded fields, due primarily to the increased time and cost required to prepare the seedbed.

Conservation can increase net income...increase yields and crop quality...reduce production costs. This is nothing new to long-time farmers, but it may be to some of the other people we serve. The time for examples and testimonials is now. The time for letting people

know what assistance we can offer them is now.

The strong demand for food products offers the American farmer and rancher an excellent opportunity to bring about real efficiency in his operations and to install good conservation systems.

For example, a bottomland farmer may now find it profitable to install tile drainage or to make other improvements in his water management system. He will gain in crop yields, be able to work his fields better, and reduce wet spots. An upland farmer may be able to put in a new terrace system and thus add new acres of tillable land. An irrigation farmer may be able to afford ditch lining and save on his water use. Another farmer or rancher may have added incentive to bring his pasture and rangeland into first-class condition.

At a time when American farmers are producing more than ever, they should be enabled to install the necessary protective measures. The Soil Conservation Service must continue to help farmers and ranchers with efforts to retain the quality and productive capacity of their land for both the next year and the next generation.

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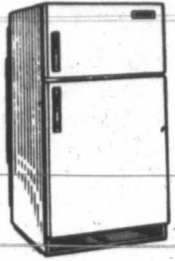

3 to 2 or 5 and 0?

A casual glance at the footwear in the above scene, taken during a graduation ceremony recently, might reveal that the cowboys, or "kickers" were running a close race with the "city slickers"--3 to 2. But such is not the case, for the two "city slickers" are really cowboys in disguise, dressed up for a special occasion.

#### Black Drum Food Fish

Black drum--rough fish or food fish? By Texas law and by many sports fishermen the big croaker is a rough fish but it is also an important commercial food fish. Like trout and redbell, black drum populations have declined tremendously in the past decade especially along the lower coast. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department gill net studies in 1952-53 yielded 80 drum per 1,200 feet of net. In 1973 studies only 26 of the fish were caught in the same amount of net. Even though the 1973 study has yet to include samples during the peak winter months, the decline is evident and department biologists cannot readily point to the cause. During the 1950s, black drum were heavily fished but the populations flourished. In fact, there were so many drum 20 years ago that huge schools of the fish destroyed trout and redbell habitat during their bottom foraging for crustaceans and worms. Since the drum feeds off bottom-dwelling organisms, it should be adversely affected by persistent pesticides such as DDT. However, the Baffin Bay-Alazan Bay Area along the South Texas coast contained large numbers of black drum during the winter of 1972-73. The species could be on the upswing from the reduced usage of DDT by agriculture in the area. Like the more popular redbell, large drum have pronounced spawning runs usually to the Gulf of Mexico. They spawn in the Gulf, passes and bays. Young drift into bays and frequently move into small tidal creeks.

Texas Crops Doing Well... Livestock Export Pens Go Modern... Ear Ticks a Menace... Shortages Yet.

GRAIN SORGHUM is reported heading out from South Central Texas southward, and cotton is blooming in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, as most of Texas enjoyed good growing weather within the past week of 10 days. Planting of both grain sorghum and cotton is gaining momentum on the Low and High Plains. There was some hail damage in the Valley recently as there was on peaches in the Limestone and Freestone Counties areas. The rains slowed harvest of potatoes and cabbage in the San Antonio-Winter Garden area. Watermelons and cantaloups were beginning to come off in the Valley. Rice planting is almost complete in the State, compared with about 75 percent at this time last year. Wheat and oat harvest is well underway.

THE TEXAS Department of Agriculture is now operating five new livestock export facilities at El Paso, Brownsville, Del Rio, Houston and Eagle Pass, and the sixth and final installation authorized by the legislature will be built at Laredo. Texans who have not visited one of the facilities would be interested to see what has been happening in the livestock exporting business which adds millions to the economy each year. Everything has been done at the facilities to make it easier and safer to handle animals and to prevent the export-or import-of diseased animals. The loading and unloading chutes may be raised or lowered hydraulically, and vats for dipping cattle also are movable. The strong-built pens, all under a roof, have concrete floors and curbs that make cleaning easier. Office space and laboratories also are at each location. The El Paso and Brownsville facilities are the most recent to go into operation of the five now in use. Commissioner John C. White reported that 33,000 head of livestock went through the Houston, Del Rio and Eagle Pass facilities between April and December, 1973.

A REMINDER: Watch out for ear ticks which are making a strong comeback, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Entomologists say that the ticks are being found in greater numbers because of favorable weather and neglect of control measures. Ear ticks can cause an increase in screwworm infestations. In 1973, 80 percent of screwworm cases in 14 South Texas counties were attributed to ear ticks. The ticks, sometimes called Gulf Coast tick, flourish within 100 miles of the Coast.

FUEL SITUATIONS are reported very tight in Donley, Archer, Lamb, and Comanche Counties, but no Texas counties reported critical situations. Hay baling is getting underway in some Texas counties, and 88 counties have reported short supplies of baling wire, and 66 counties reported short supplies of twine. Other shortages that may affect Texas farmers have been reported in both wood and steel fence posts, barbed wire, herbicides, machinery parts, and tractor and machinery tires.
