of a new wildcat two miles southeast of the Harper and about three miles southwest of the Addis pool in Ector county. Fuhrman Petroleum Corporation and Colton Brothers, of Okmulgee, Okla., No. 1 Elliott F. Cowden. It will be drilled 330 feet out of the northwest corner of section 41, block 43, township 2 south, T. & P. survey. Contract depth is 4,500 feet, production of water, and it will be started on or before August 1. The test is on an 1,840-acre block purchased from Mr. Cowden.

In Ector's Glodsmith pool, Ben Nysewander Jr. No. 2 Scharbauer rated daily potential of 1,422 barrels after 1,500 gallons of acid at 4,228. It topped pay at 4,155.

Humble No. 5 W. F. Cowden flowed 53 barrels an hour, with 8,000,000 cubic feet of gas following 1,000 gallons at 4,280 and was then given the second stage of 3,000 gallons. It was swabbed in and is now cleaning out into pits.

Northern Basin

In the northern counties of the Basin, little of interest had developed today. Bond & Harrison et al No. 1 Cameron, eastern Cochran wildcat, had drilled unchanged to 4,620 feet in lime.

In southeastern Bailey, Illinois and Marraolbo No. 1 Yellowhouse, a wildcat, had reached 4,975 feet in lime.

Corrigan No. 1 Lewright, wildcat in southeast Terry, is bridging back with rock to 5,000 feet preparatory to setting a string of 5 1/2 inch o. d. pipe to shut off upper water.
