The Convention.

FIFTY-FIFTH DAY.

CAPITOL, Austin, Texas,
Aug. 4, 1868.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain. Journal of yesterday read and adopted.

Mr. McCormick from committee on contingent expenses made a report in favor of paying the official reporter to date.

Mr. Armstrong of Jasper, introduced an ordinance authorizing the establishment of a ferry across Powder River Bayou.

Mr. Armstrong of Lamar, was added to committee on appointment.

Mr. Thomas offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That until the 15th day of the present month, both morning and evening sessions of this convention be devoted to the formation of a Constitution.

Mr. Evans of McLennan, in the chair.

Mr. Davis of Nueces, offered the following resolution:

1. Resolved, That this convention will take a recess from and after the 20th of August, to last till the 3d day of December next, subject in the mean time to be called together by the _____, if deemed necessary.

2. Resolved, That hereafter, this convention will set on no business other than the formation of a Constitution and the ordinance or declarations incident thereto, and the ordinances providing for the collection of the school fund due by the State.

Mr. Davis of Nueces, moved a suspension of the rules for the immediate consideration of the resolution, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

Yeas 44, nays 26.

So the convention refused to suspend the rules.

The President announced the hour had arrived to take up the regular business made the special order of the day, which was the motion to reconsider the vote, by which the substitute to the report of the committee on Internal Improvements was laid upon the table.

Mr. Hamilton of Travis, moved that consideration of the motion be postponed until Friday, August 10, 1868, at 10 o'clock. Carried.

From this time until the hour of adjournment, devoted to consideration of Executive Department of Constitution and the adoption of the preamble to Bill of Rights.

Evening session devoted to creating new counties.

THE CONVENTION.

FIFTY-SIXTH DAY.

CAPITOL, Austin, Texas,
August 5, 1868.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain; journal of yesterday read and adopted.

Mr. Mundine presented a protest from citizens of Harrison county, opposing the formation of a new county out of that county.

Mr. Monroe on engrossment, reported several resolutions as properly engrossed.

Mr. Finnigan from the committee on Internal Improvements offered the following report:

COMMITTEE ROOM,
August 5, 1868.

To the Hon. E. J. Davis, President of the Convention:

Your committee have had before them a declaration presented by the delegate from Calhoun, Mr. Johnson, asking relief for the San Antonio and Mexican Gulf Railroad Company, upon examination it is found that this company is not indebted to the school fund of the State of Texas, and that the entire price is a loanable one and has been repaid by the year. The premises all considered, the committee instruct me to report back the declaration with a recommendation that the relief be granted.

Respectfully, J. W. FLANIGAN.

The same committee reported a declaration in relation to the protection of all railroads in the State that might be prejudiced for the want of proper legislation as is contemplated by the regular session.

Mr. Goodin offered a declaration creating a new county.

Mr. Blodgett introduced a declaration for the relief of Administrators, Executors, Guardians and Trustees.

Mr. Wilson of Brazoria, offered a declaration relieving persons whose property have been sacrificed under Sheriff's sale.

Mr. Carter offered a resolution reducing the area of counties to six hundred square miles.

A declaration in relation to the Buffalo Bayou, Brazos and Colorado Railroad Company. Referred to committee on internal improvements.

Mr. Thomas introduced the following resolution:

Be it resolved, that the following be a rule of this Convention:

The per diem pay of members who are now absent, or who may hereafter absent themselves from the regular session of the Convention, unless on the business of this Convention, or by reason of sickness, shall cease during the term of their absence.

Amended by adding, "that nothing contained in the resolution shall stop the pay of any member who shall be excused to wait on a sick colleague." Passed.

Mr. Monroe offered a declaration in relation to administration of the estate of James H. Leaverton.

Mr. Evans of McLennan, introduced a section allowing criminal cases to be transferred from counties where juries cannot be obtained.

Mr. Kenchler introduced the following declaration and asked its reference to the committee on finance.

Be it declared by the people of Texas, in convention assembled, That the County Court of Gillespie county be authorized to levy a special tax for the purpose of paying the present indebtedness of the county.

1st. Said special tax shall not exceed ten cents per hundred dollars of the assessed

property—that of occupations shall be the same as the State levies.

2d. Said taxes can be paid in the county warrants, already issued by the County Court of Gillespie county, or in money.

3d. When the amount of \$100, or more, is in the treasury, it shall be the duty of the treasurer to give ten days' notice, according to law, to the warrant holders for presenting their claims, and under all circumstances the oldest shall be the first paid.

4th. The assessor and collector and county treasurer shall not be entitled to any fee whatever for assessing, collecting and disposing of the money.

5th. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to keep in a separate book a record of all acts done and moneys collected and disposed of under this declaration.

It was so referred.

The Report of the Committee on General Provisions was taken up.

The evening session was devoted to consideration of Bill of Rights. Not much head way.

The Russians in Central Asia.

The time is rapidly approaching when all the small chieftains who still maintain a nominal rule in Central Asia must give way to either Russia or England, and when the borders of these two nations will meet. Both are looking forward to that time with great anxiety, and are preparing for a conflict which appears to be unavoidable. In anticipation of such an event, both are now making extraordinary efforts to gain the affection of the natives. Russia, by her recent conquests in Central Asia, has received large additions to her Mohammedan population, and all the country which, still semi-independent, awaits absorption by either Russia or England, is inhabited by Mohammedans. According to Russian accounts, the Mohammedans of the new Russian Province of Turkistan are highly elated at their incorporation with the Russian Empire. Now, an English dispatch from Bombay announces that Ferose Khan, a Mussulman of great influence in Central Asia, has become the ally of Russia. The English evidently attribute importance to the fact, and suspect Russia of concocting dangerous plots with the Mohammedan leaders of Central Asia. Few trustworthy facts are known concerning this point; but the one fact which is fully established, the intimate relations which have recently sprang up between Russia and Persia, is well calculated to strengthen the suspicion. Russia, while stirring up the Christians in European Turkey against their Mohammedan sovereign, feels not the least scruple in establishing a close alliance with another Mohammedan Prince, and will feel no scruple, if she can, to stir up the Mohammedan fanaticism all through Central Asia, and use it for the extension of her own influence and her powers. Both England and China have a considerable and disaffected Mohammedan population, and Mohammedan rebellions in China and British India may become, at any time, formidable weapons in the hands of Russia. It is, therefore, plain that the alliance of Mohammedan leaders in Central Asia with Russia will awaken anything but pleasant feelings in the minds of Englishmen. On the arrival of our papers from British India and St. Petersburg we shall probably learn some interesting details about Ferose Khan and his alliance with the Russians.—N. Y. Tribune.

The Millican Riot.

The New Orleans Republican, of Sunday, says:

We draw from our bag some advance sheets of the report of the officer sent by General Buchanan to investigate the Millican riot.

The plain facts of the affair are, that in the little town of Millican the Texans, black and white, were accustomed to carry revolvers and knives. A bad custom certainly, but a general one throughout the country.

The civil white Texans waxed wroth in their cups at the reflection that they did not monopolize the "navies," and commenced firing at the negroes.

The firing became a fusillade, the negroes ran from the town, and sought behind some rising ground.

The whites following in crowds, shooting indiscriminately.

As a result seven negroes were killed and some twenty wounded.

Not a white man was injured!

The Sheriff, a Texan and a Democrat, says he is about to resign his office. He cannot discharge his duties in that ruffian community. He says he could have controlled the blacks without difficulty, if the mob had not furiously interfered.

Mr. Brownlow in his message to the Tennessee Legislature recommends that that body call into service a sufficient force of men to overthrow the secret bands of rebel soldiers formed in the State for the purpose of overthrowing its present Government. He declares that these bands should be outlawed and their members put to death wherever found.

THE PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN AND ITS RESULTS.

It is natural that every loyal man, particularly in the South, should feel the utmost anxiety in the result of the present Presidential election.

We feel confident that Gen. Grant will be elected. We do not believe an all-wise Providence would permit a nation, after the immense sacrifices which the United States have made to secure the integrity of the Union, and to establish freedom in the place of slavery; to loose all the fruits of this great victory which it would in a great measure do, if Mr. Seymour should be elected President.

We would say to our Union friends be of good cheer. You may hear the low mutterings of rebels of what they purpose to do in certain events; but recollect that in 1860 they talked loud, and threatened a revolution if the people of the North should elect a President that snited themselves, (by terror preventing Mr. Lincoln from receiving a vote in the South). They carried their threat into execution, and it is to be hoped they learnt something by the experiment.

But the situation is very much changed now, in fact reversed. They are as true to their instinct of rebellion and revolution as ever, but this time they propose the revolution in case their candidate is elected.

The Democratic party is the same party of State Rights secession and rebellion or revolution, that it was in 1860. The more honest and ablest men left it when it attempted to carry out its principles by the bullet. Such men as General Dix, Sickles, Butler, Logan and thousands of others. It has never been able to make a stand since, except in some local election, where its pure principles were not in the canvass.

It is composed of the same men, and will meet with the same fate in 1868, that it did in 1864, when it declared "the war a failure."

This election is a continuation of that, and is to decide whether the war was a failure or not.

Who does not believe that if Seymour is elected, the party, true to its principles, will cause more bloodshed in its spirit of revolution. While if Grant is elected, who does not know that the principles for which the nation fought and conquered, will be carried out peacefully. The principles of freedom fully established, and no "class legislation," be made, but all left equally subject to the law.

This is to be the result, and we feel thankful, although we may sympathize with those pets of society who feel that they can never live in a country which will not make laws especially to keep them above the colored man.

The San Antonio and Mexican Gulf Railroad.

By our Convention proceedings it will be seen that the above mentioned Railroad Company have been attempting to renew its life by an action of the Convention. The measure failed and is likely to sleep out its time until that body adjourns. We hope this corporation will at least be allowed to die a natural death. We feel sorry for the private interests involved, but public interests demand that this charter go by the board and new hands take charge of affairs.

We want a railroad to the Gulf, but we despair of ever getting it at the hands of the San Antonio and Mexican Gulf Railroad. The proposal made to the Convention looks like justice to the company, in view of the circumstances, but when we consider that nearly a quarter of a century has elapsed since this company, (it is true, not all the time in the same hands,) have been in existence, and no railroad yet, it looks like a gross outrage upon the people, that the corporation should be continued in order to give the corporators a chance to get even. If these parties have been injured by reason of the rebellion, and the claim is just for relief, let them go to the next Legislature. It is just on this kind of business the Constitutional Convention has been fooling away its time. We do hope the members will pitch in and finish their Constitution, take a recess and go home, and by the time they get back, their work will be properly digested. Let the rotten railroad alone.

INDIANS.—From all accounts the Indians are bent on mischief above here. We extract the following from a letter from Castroville of yesterday.

The Indians are troublesome, very, in fact there has been more of them lately, than for months before. Only a few days ago they stole a great many horses from the cow hunters, on the Nueces, and ten days ago, they stole nearly all the horses in Quini, and now to-day, we hear of a new band, and a large one, on their way down the Rio, destination unknown.

PEACE AND LAW PREVAILS.

A week or two since a regular band of rebel guerrillas captured a train of government stores at Sulphur Springs in the northern part of the State. The following is a true copy of the receipt given by the guerrilla chieftain:

To the Commander of the Post of Sulphur Springs Texas:

The undersigned reached here yesterday evening, and found five wagons loaded with military stores, and no one to receive them, and thinking the whole affair a humbug, I have thought it expedient and proper, and a duty I owe to my own reputation, and believing it a duty to an insulted and oppressed people, I have by force of arms taken charge of the contents of said wagons, and will in time report to your headquarters.

BACKBONE.—There seems to be a lamentable lack of "back-bone" in the reconstruction convention. A section granting equal rights to all persons in public conveniences and other public privileges which should be open to all citizens alike failed, because it was worded too plain, and a provision claimed to mean the same thing, was passed but which evaded calling things by their right names.

It seems that every radical measure has been met with a compromise; and now it seems impossible to get the members to the sticking point upon any subject. The question of adjournment meets opposition, and it is hardly possible to know what the convention does mean.

ENCOURAGING.—One of the brightest signs of the approaching Presidential campaign is that such men as Tombs, Forrest, Wade Hampton, and other advocates of the "lost cause" are advocating the election of Seymour, this of itself, is enough to make a "lost cause" of anything they advocate.

ALL RIGHT.—Our readers will see by the telegraph dispatches, that the bill providing for a militia in the State of Louisiana, has passed both Houses of the Legislature.

A TEST.—It will be seen by the telegraph that Thaddeus Stevens is dead. Loyal men will grieve and rebels rejoice.

Gen. Robert Toombs in a recent speech eulogized Pendleton, tersely saying "he was true in peace and true in war." So was Toombs. So was Wirz. The bitterest enemies of the Government are worthy of the greater credit in the Georgian's eyes.

Said Robert Toombs, in his Atlanta speech at the Seymour and Blair ratification meeting: "I will tell you another fact, which is enough for this time, that as the late war was produced by the defeated Democratic party in 1860." That sentence has the merit of frankness, if nothing more. And Toombs is pardoned!

The Charleston Mercury says: "The next Presidential election will, in all probability, settle the political destiny, not only of the southern, but of the next half century."

TELEGRAPHIC

[ASSOCIATED PRESS DESPATCHES.]

MONTGOMERY, Ala., August 11.—A. M. Garble brought into this city this morning a bale of cotton of the new crop. It is classed good middling, and weighs 600 pounds. It was sold at auction by H. P. Lee & Co., and was bought by the well-known firm of Weill, Moore & Co., for forty-two and one-half cents. The cotton is stored in the warehouse of Lehman, Durr & Co., and will go forward at once to Lehman Bros., New York.

A flutter was caused in the Legislature to-day. Governor Smith sent into the Senate, where it originated, a veto of the bill authorizing the Legislature to cast the Electoral vote of the State, &c. The Governor says: After most mature reflection I am forced to the conclusion that the bill is wrong in principle, and that it would be a dangerous precedent in a Republican Government. As my judgment does not approve the bill, it is my constitutional duty to return it to the Senate with my objections.

It cannot but be regarded as remarkable that the first Republican Legislature convened in Alabama shall, in the face of the principle of its organization, which every Republican professes to hold dear, deny not only to the colored but to the white man the right by his vote to indicate his choice for a President and Vice President of the United States, and take the matter in its own hands. What excuse can there be for it? Is it mere party expediency? If so, then it is an abandonment of principles, or an acknowledgment that the material out of which the Republican party is composed cannot be trusted—in other words, it is to say that colored men will not do to be trusted.

This action of the General Assembly will be regarded as still more remarkable when considered in connection with what seems to have been the almost unanimous opinion of the leading members of the Republican party of Alabama. It was believed by most of them and so represented at Washington, that a large majority of the population of the State were in favor of the new constitution. This was as much as to say that the Republican party was in a large majority in the State, for it is well known that but Republicans favored the constitution, and even some of these opposed it. If the party is as strong as it has been supposed to be, then the necessity of party expediency does not exist; but even if it did exist, should be justifiable in resigning, as much as it desires the election of Grant and Colfax. I am unwilling to become a party in behalf of that desirable result to a scheme which practically denies the very principles for which these standard-bearers are pledged before the country.

The message created a warm discussion and caused much bitterness. Sibey, Coon, and others, exclaiming Radicals, were violent in their expressions about the Governor.

Mr. Coon strongly urged the defeat of the veto, and said the object of the men who were sustaining the Governor in this matter was to get up a war. If the war must come, let it come; he was ready for it, and 90,000 freemen of Alabama would give the opposition a belly full of war before it was over with. He would stand by the Republican party in Alabama in the war, and victory would perch on its banners.

Mr. Jones replied to Coon, and told him that his remarks were revolutionary; but that if he wanted war he could have war, and the war would last until none of his sort desecrated the soil of Alabama. He said that he was a Republican, but when war is talked about and Alabamians are to be slaughtered, he would be found on the side of his own people—those in this bright and sunny but oppressed land to share the country and to whom the government of it justly belongs. He said he could raise a squadron of town boys and whip out anything the gentleman from Iowa could bring against him; he could marshal 20,000 colored men to follow his banner in defense of Alabama and Alabamians. The colored men of intelligence knew that carpet-baggers were not their friends, and that a squatter would desert them in the hour of trial and need.

The debate was conducted altogether by the Republicans—there being but one Democrat in the Senate.

Without action the Senate adjourned to 5 P. M.

It is not likely that the bill can become a law over the Governor's veto.

The Legislature will probably adjourn to-morrow.

Who gave aid and succor to the Rebels? The Democratic party.

Letter from "Occasional."

[Correspondence of the Philadelphia Press.]

WASHINGTON, July 30, 1868.

Every white man who emigrates South, seeking for a home, is instantly ostracized if he does not join in the Democratic party. No matter how high his character, he is at once catalogued as a "carpet-bagger," or a "scalawag," and he must possess rare nerve and self-reliance to resist the sneers and insults of the chivalry. The proscription is exceptionless, extending with greater bitterness to the intelligent, because they are supposed to wield more influence, but not sparing the humble laborer or mechanic, especially if he dares to stay South after having fought in the Union army. Of course, emigration is delayed and defeated, and the self-inflicted sufferings of the Southern people greatly increased.

Like all their other follies, this attack of the rebel politicians upon loyal men and women must react with terrible effect. It will be a far more disastrous investment than their cruelties to anti-slavery men before the war. The barriers between the sections have since been destroyed; and history shows that no obstacle, no mountain, however high, no ocean, however tempestuous, no perils of climate, no fears of savage enemies, have deterred the progressive American. Nay, the very impediments set in the path of freedom, and the very penalties affixed to free opinion, will rather attract the adventurous pioneer to the fertile fields of the South. And when Republican emigration rolls in and over that section, it will have nothing ebb.

As great a folly is the neglect by these Bourbon of the teachings of their own history. They do not recollect that it is a little over ten years since they attempted to take possession of Kansas, in the name of slavery, not only with an army of carpet-luggers, but with a horde of armed bullies, who were simply to vote down freedom and the majority, and then to move back to their homes. The Northern men who move South are good citizens, resolved to remain; but these border ruffians entered Kansas to stay only long enough to fix the hated claws upon her constitution, and then to run away. The Northern men and emigrants who balled them are there to this day enjoying the fruits of their courage and perseverance; and such will be the fortune of the Union men of the South, if they are equally determined and persistent.

As to a war of races, we have no fears for the result. The colored people are too peaceful a body to commence any such war. If such a war comes, it will be hastened and precipitated by the whites, without cause and without provocation; and when such a conflict is inaugurated it will not be a war of races. It will not be the blacks against the whites nor the whites against the blacks, but it will be the friends of liberty and just government on one side against the promoters of anarchy, despotism and misrule on the other.

The National Republican makes the following sensible remarks:

Some of the unreconstructed rebels in the South seem to be spoiling for another civil war. The papers from that region come to us loaded with the most violent distillates against the Government and against the authorities which have been placed in power in the States by the votes of the people in accordance with the laws of Congress. If they are anxious to try their hand at a second rebellion we suppose that they will do so, but we pity them when once again they bring down upon their doomed heads the loyal masses of the North. We indulge in no threats, but the "Union must and shall be preserved."
