Max Boyer Submits His Past Record And Asks Voters' Support, August 24

Max Boyer, the leading candidate for State Senator, who received 42% of the total votes cast in the first Primary, enters the final days of the run-off campaign with the assurance of his friends from the rural section that he will have the opportunity to serve the average citizen for four years, when the final count is made August 24.

In accounting to the public for the service he has rendered the average citizen during the past four years, Max Boyer stated, "I believe the statement made by Governor O'Daniel in the daily newspapers following his election July 28, is the best recommendation I can give the people at this time."

Governor O'Daniel said, the record of the 46th Legislature reflects the fact that you had 94 House members who did everything they could to aid in solving the Social Security problem. I urge that you take the record and from the record decide which candidate will most likely make the most efficient public servant.

"A second recommendation to the voters who are not familiar with my type of service can be found in the voters of the ten counties I have served during the past four years. Many Farmers Attend Meet

Approximately sixty farmers attended the Wheat Improvement meeting held in the court house last Friday. The wheat situation in this territory as far as varieties are concerned was explained by Frederic T. Dines of Amarillo and E. A. Miller, agronomist for A. & M. Extension Service at College Station.

In the discussion it was brought out that the wheat has deteriorated to some extent due to introduction of varieties which are not as desirable as the old Turkey Red and Turkey strains. The situation is not critical in this territory as yet, however, it was pointed out that heavy planting of Chieftain or Beardless Blackhull could easily cause the mills to discriminate against the wheat produced in the county by paying lower prices. This condition has already been reported as existing in some counties of Oklahoma and Kansas.

The varieties were listed in order of desirability in so far as milling and baking value. They were judged as to good, intermediate or poor.

The Turkey strains included Turkey Red, Tenmarq, Kanred and Cheyenne in the good group; intermediate and Chieftain and Standard Blackhull was classed as Superhard Blackhull as poor.

The early Blackhull has fair baking qualities, but has a low milling turnout and is so rated between intermediate and poor.

An effort is made to list the desirable varieties of wheat seed available for sale and distribute such lists in this and neighboring counties.

Rangers Of 1940 Will Make Trek to Raton, N. M., For Ten Day Training Camp August 30

Boyd Payne of Corsicana, who will serve his first year as athletic coach in the Perryton schools, stated that a call meeting would be held of all football boys at the school Monday night at eight o'clock to discuss plans for the annual encampment at Raton, New Mexico. More than 45 boys will make the ten day training period this year under the coaching of Mr. Payne. George Philbrick and Otis Burk. The group will leave Perryton on August 30. Superintendent C. Wedgworth plans to accompany the party, but will not remain during the entire training period.

For the past ten years candidates for the Perryton Rangers have made the annual trek to New Mexico for an extensive training period before the season starts, and Coach Payne is enthusiastic about the prospects of the 1940 team. Despite the loss of many valuable players who made up last year's Regional Champions, a good selection of material is turning out this year.

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Deskins Wells to Speak at Political Rally in Perryton on August 22

With their backs to the wall, the forces opposing Max Boyer know that they are whipped and there is no regard for decency or truth in their muck-raking campaign to beat Max Boyer.

There is not one word of truth that the Phillips Petroleum Co. had a single thing to do with the booster trip Monday from Perryton through the eastern Panhandle. Every cent of the expense of this

trip was paid by Perryton business men and Ochiltree county farmers who made the trip. The trip was organized and promoted by Max Boyer's home town friends.

High Schools Offer Course In Driving

Driver training courses for instruction of Texas high school students in traffic safety will be offered next September with one-half credit allowed toward graduation, it has been announced by the Texas Safety Association. Perryton will be among the 1,214 high schools offering this course, according to C. Wedgeworth, superintendent of Perryton schools.

Incorporation of safety education in the school curriculum recently was approved by the State Education Committee on Accreditation and successfully climaxed the efforts of the Texas Safety Association, the public safety department, and the state education department to secure its adoption.

The course will be an elective one designed for students approximating the legal driving age of sixteen who will receive driver's licenses upon passing it. Unique among driver training courses of other states is the home project feature of the Texas course which will permit behind-the-wheel instruction in driver operation under the supervision of the pupil's parents.

"The need for training youngsters in the principles of safe and sane driving has long been recognized," said George Clarke, executive secretary of the association. "Not only are these youngsters the drivers of tomorrow, they are to a most important extent the drivers of today."

"Statistics of the public safety department reveal that youthful drivers constitute 30 per cent of all drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents and 26 per cent of the total number of drivers involved in non-fatal accidents."

"The driver training course will not only teach the mechanics of operating a motor vehicle safely but of equal importance will indoctrinate the student with the safety concept that his driving rights are secondary to his driving responsibilities."

Although graduation credit will be allowed for the course in 1,214 accredited high schools, it will be necessary for the boards of those schools to approve inauguration of the course in each school. The Texas Safety Association through

affiliated safety councils and cooperating organizations such as the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers will seek early approval of the school boards.

The safety committee of the Texas State Teachers Association and the school education committee of the Texas Safety Association are assisting the state departments of education and public safety in preparing the text of the course.

Eggs Excellent Source of Income

COLLEGE STATION — Twenty Floyd County farm families will realize an average of \$100 a year extra income through the organization of an egg marketing association.

The association, according to the Floyd County agricultural and home demonstration agents, D. F. Bredthauer and Edith Lois Wilson, is the outgrowth of work by the local land use planning committee. A subcommittee authorized to develop local markets reported, among other things, that farm eggs were being penalized because of their low grade.

The 20 families agreed to form a demonstration association. A committee visited the farm of each member, inspected the flock and equipment and made recommendations for increasing the production

and marketing infertile eggs.

A sales committee contacted a local buyer and agreed to deliver 1,000 dozen infertile, high quality eggs each week at a price 4 cents a dozen above the local market.

After a 30 day period of improvement, the members began delivery of the eggs. Extra income to date has averaged \$40 per week.

More tractors were sold in the United States in 1937 alone, than were in use on all farms in 1920.

Another increase in import duties on tobacco products by the United Kingdom makes the tax on a package of cigarettes there about 20 cents as compared to 6.5 cents in the United States. The increase is the fourth since April, 1939.

A 22-foot section tractor harrow now on the market is so built that it will go through a farm gate 11 feet wide. The two outside sections may be folded in on top of the two center sections.

Take Precautions Against Burglary

Whether you are planning to 'lock up the house' and leave on your annual vacation or merely plan to be away for the evening, it isn't a good idea to advertise the fact.

A recent study made by the Elina Life Companies involving burglaries reported in 47 principal American cities reveals that "family away for the evening" is the leading factor in making residence burglaries possible. Other factors which give the burglar his best opportunities are "family away overnight," and "family away on vacation."

The survey further shows that more burglaries, on the average, are committed between 8 p. m. and Midnight than at any other time of day. During this period, more burglaries were reported as occurring around 9 p. m. than at any other specific hour, although nearly as many occurred at 8 p. m., and at 10 p. m., and a lesser number were reported from 11 p. m. until midnight.

Burglaries in cities and towns in the west seem to occur on the average at a slightly earlier hour, however. San Francisco, for example, reports more burglaries between 2 and 5 p. m., while Honolulu, Los Angeles, and other western centers report the majority as occurring between 6 and 8 p. m.

One fact borne out by reports received from the various cities, according to the Elina, is that regardless of the time of the robbery, burglars make it their business to learn beforehand when their intended victim is likely to be away from home and the property left unguarded.

The Elina lists the following as the best samples of "Burglar Wanted" advertising:

1. House having the general appearance of abandonment, lawn uncut, etc. The burglar reads the signs and concludes that the family is away for the summer, or on vacation.

2. Mailbox stuffed with mail, a collection of newspapers on the veranda, or several bottles of milk on the doorstep fairly screech their message that the family has departed for several days. It is important to have all such deliveries stopped, even if the family plans to be gone less than a week.

3. Leaving the house dark and the shades up when the family is out for the evening is an invitation for the burglar to tarry and plunder. Whether you plan to go to the movies, to the Joneses for bridge, or merely out for a short ride, it is wise "extravagance" to leave at least one light burning. Burglars do not like to take a chance on entering a home where there is light showing.

Precautions should always be taken to see that every window and door is locked, including basement windows, and coal-chute or dumb-waiter doors. While locks do not ordinarily discourage the burglar who knows his business, at least they delay him in his work, and prove a good bulwark against the efforts of "amateur" vandals.

Last but not least, always notify the Police Department when you plan an absence that will leave your property unguarded.

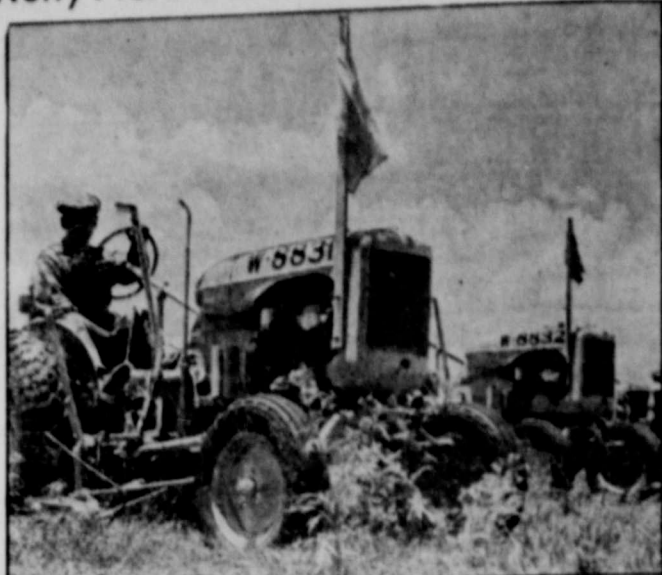

Intensified Drive For Army Reserves

LUBBOCK, Texas—Former members of the United States Army under 36 years of age who served as much as one year and received an honorable discharge are eligible to receive as much as \$5.00 per month merely for becoming members of the Regular Army Reserve under the Army's plan to keep in touch with ex-service men.

All members of the Regular Army Reserve receive \$2.00 in cash per month for each month their names are on the Reserve rolls. If they ever are called into active service, which will be only in the event of a national emergency when they would be subject to call whether members of the Reserve or not, they will receive an additional sum at the rate of \$3.00 per month for each month they have been a member of the Reserve, not to exceed a total of \$150 in cash.

Members of the Army Reserve have no formations, camps or other required meetings. In fact, their only connection with the Army is the check they receive every four months unless they are called to duty in case of a national emergency.

Since only trained ex-soldiers are eligible for membership in the Regular Army Reserve, no further training is considered necessary for them.

All ex-service men under 36 years of age with as much as one year's service in the United States Army and an honorable discharge should report to the nearest Army Recruiting Office for full particulars and a physical examination.

Many choice vacancies still are available in the Regular Army for young men between 18 and 35 years of age without dependents and able to pass a fair mental test and physical examination. Interested young men should apply at the nearest Army Recruiting Office.

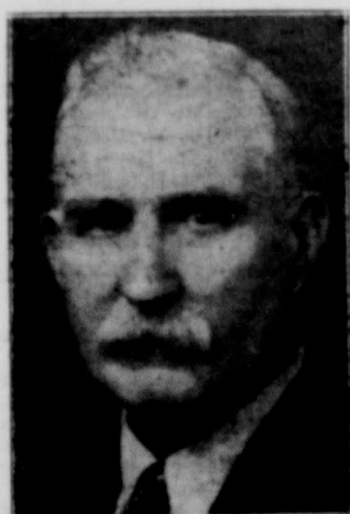

Let's Teach Democracy

Since public schools closed down late last spring, important changes have taken place in the world. Adolf Hitler's legions have blitzkrieged their ruthless way through the Low Countries and France, and the Nazi philosophy now dominates most of continental Europe. A new preparedness program has been launched in the United States.

To American children returning to their books, these changes in Europe and at home may seem remote. True, their parents may feel the weight of increased defense taxes and their older brothers may be affected by conscription, but to the children revolutionary world changes may make little difference.

Here, then, is a vital new problem for our schools. Officials in general have been militantly alert for trends toward radicalism in our instruction; now they must be just as militant in their efforts to teach their charges that democracy remains the only right way of life.

It is improbable that there will be curriculum changes, at least for the present; Secretary of State Cordell Hull has urged that more schools offer instruction in Spanish as a means of tightening bonds with Latin America, but in general courses of study will remain about the same as they have been in past years.

But those courses must be given new meaning. Studies such as civics and problems of democracy are ideally suited for highlighting the contrast between totalitarianism and the American way. Current events, too often a stepchild in our educational systems, should be given new stress.

In success or failure of our schools' efforts to instill the democratic credo in the minds and hearts of American children lies the outcome of the fight for freedom.

Losses Too

"We hear much about the profit motive. Some people speak of it as something sinister.

"Profit is the aim of capitalistic system. Everybody understands that. But few understand, or acknowledge, that the capitalistic system also takes losses . . .

"Under the capitalistic system the rewards or losses go to those who voluntarily assume the risk of a venture; but when the government puts its money into an undertaking, the profits or losses are distributed among all the citizens.

"An unprofitable private undertaking usually comes to a quick ending, but an unprofitable government venture may continue endlessly because, for political reasons, there may be no one to call a halt.

"For this reason, private capitalism is the only system that has ever worked well in the long run. It isn't the perfect system, but it is the only one we know of that works."

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Confession and Forgiveness

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Aug. 23
Text: II Samuel 12:13-14; Psalms 51:1-3, 9-13; 32:5.

MEN of generous spirit, noble thoughts and virtuous deeds may succumb to gross temptations and, once caught in the coils of sin, may be guilty of shabby and criminal deeds.

The story of David, the shepherd boy who became king of Israel, illustrates all this. Nowhere is it more vividly brought out than in the tragic story back of this lesson.

David, contrary to his usual character, was staying at home while Job was leading the army in the field against a menacing enemy. If he had been out where he ought to have been, leading his troops, the tragedy might never have occurred. The allurements of a beautiful woman, whom he had seen from the roof where he had gone for the siesta, proved sufficient to entice David into adultery. Then, to cover up his sin, he suggested to Uriah, should be put in the thick of the battle and then deserted so as to make sure of his death.

WITH the husband out of the way, David married Bathsheba, for whom and for whose child he evidently had a very sincere love, but the foul deed he had committed was by no means wiped out. The child died, and a year afterward Nathan, the prophet, dared to rebuke David in a plain and exceedingly courageous way.

Nathan's rebuke was ingenious as well. He told the story of a rich man who had everything, but who had nevertheless stolen the ewe lamb of a poor neighbor. What, he asked David, should be done with the man who would do such a contemptible thing?

David denounced him and declared him worthy of death, and it was then that Nathan, pointing his finger at the king, declared, "Thou art the man." Here again, however, that finest quality in David came to light. He might have destroyed Nathan, but he acknowledged the greatness of his guilt and confessed his sin.

WHETHER or not he wrote the 51st Psalm, in which the writer calls for God's mercy and pleads to be cleansed from his sin, we do not know. But much in this Psalm would have applied to David's case, particularly where he says, "I know my transgressions and my sin is ever before me." The Psalm is a clean and noble prayer for salvation from sin and from past wrong. "Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me."

If the Bible is a book of sin and tragedy—in this case, of adultery and foul murder—the Bible is a book that is magnificent in its revelation of forgiveness and in its teaching that even those who have fallen to the greatest depths can find restoration and salvation if they seek God in the humility of sincere and true repentance.

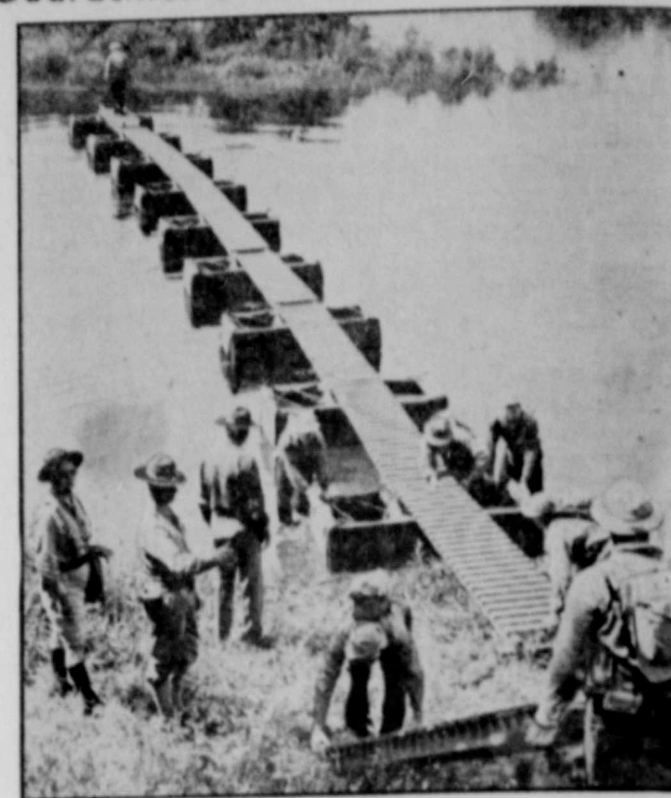

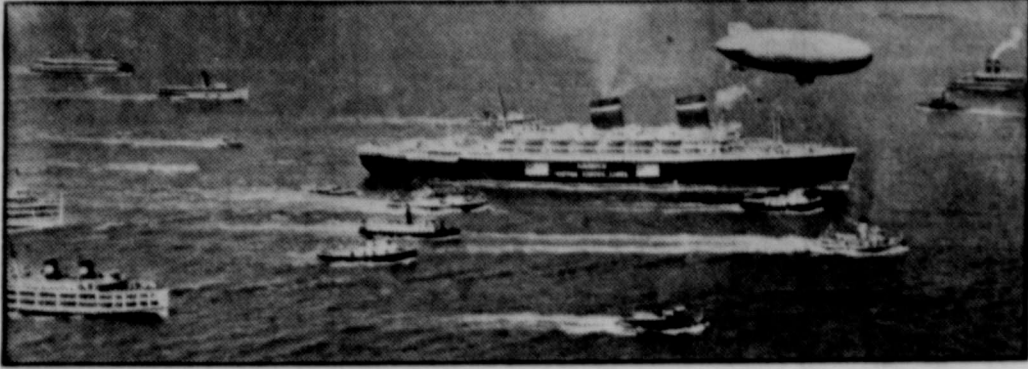

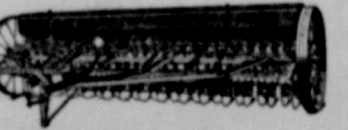

that this vital social security problem could not be solved until the state officials who co-operated were re-elected and those who blocked this legislation were replaced by efficient officers who would co-operate with Governor O'Daniel. This fact was recognized by many of the legislators during the last term of the 45th Legislature. These legislators voted to adjourn the state legislature in order to save tax-payers more than five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) per day when it became well established that there was no hope of solving this social security problem so long as the minority group was determined to block this worthwhile legislation. It is interesting to note that the action of these legislators not only showed they were co-operating with the governor, but were co-operating with the tax-payers and that this was the proper action, since no legislation was passed to solve this problem during the 41 days that the legislature remained in session after May 10. It is also interesting to note that Governor O'Daniel recognized this hopeless situation and refused to call a special session of the legislature to spend needlessly the tax-payers' money.
