The pool will be open Monday-Saturday from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. MDT. throughout the summer.

After many long months of planning, determination, and volunteer help the swimming pool in Texico will be opened to the public Monday from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. MDT. Thereafter throughout the summer, pool hours from Mondays through Saturdays will be the same. The pool will not be open on Sundays according to the present schedule.

Kathy Culshaw of Texico is the pool manager and life guard. Marie Floersheim, also of Texico, will operate the

concession stand.

Admission fees will be 75 cents for children 12 and under and \$1.25 for adults. Summer passes for children will cost \$30; adults, \$50; and family passes are \$90. All fees are to be paid at the pool office.

Miss Culshaw said that swimming lessons will be offered at a later date.

Prior to the opening of the pool, many volunteers have been busy this week making final preparations for the

opening day. The masonry class of the vocational school in Clovis laid the cement and other volunteers finished the painting and final cleaning efforts.

Texico Woman's Club spearheaded the drive to renovate the swimming pool. The organization was ably assisted by donations and volunteer service from the Chamber of Commerce, volunteer fire department, El Llano Grande Kiwanis Club and City Council.

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Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church - -

Worship And Song Services Highlight 50th Anniversary

Sunday was a joyous day for members, former members, pastors and guests at Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church as they gathered together to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the church.

Regular Sunday School classes kicked off the day long festivities, followed by worship services. Throughout the services two former members, James Symcox of San Marcos and Zella Donaldson Ellison of Dimmitt, sang several gospel and religious selections. Messages were also heard from Rev. Moody Smith, pastor, and former pastor Rev. Ray Wood of Frederick, Okla.

A noon meal was served in the fellowship hall of the church. On the walls were several bulletin boards displaying pictures which depicted various church members

throughout the years.

Following the meal everyone gathered in the auditorium for the conclusion of the program. Rev. Smith introduced several former pastors who reminisced briefly about the experiences they had while pastoring the church. They included Rev. Charles Vick, Canyon; Rev. Jesse Terry, Bovina, retired; Rev. Bob Roberts, Portales; and Rev. Irving Looney, Lubbock.

Also on the program were two former interim pastors, Dr. Fred Howard and Dr. Cecil Golden, who are both associated with Wayland Baptist College in Plainview.

Symcox and Mrs. Ellison sang several songs. The program concluded with members of the congregation requesting hymns.

Oklahoma Lane Baptist

Church is rich in history and memories. The Sherman Wood family from Oklahoma is credited with planting the seeds which later grew into the present day congregation of the church. As the Woods were devout Baptists -- and there was no church here at that time -- they conducted Sunday Bible studies in their home. These sessions were open to everyone, regardless of their religious affiliation.

After a few years the Wood family returned to Oklahoma, but the seeds of Christianity which they had planted continued to grow. In 1923 an effort was made to organize a Baptist Church, but no pastor was ever obtained and no records presently exist of that period.

Another attempt was made

to organize the church in later years by Brother Garret, pastor of the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church. But again the efforts failed. The time was not yet ripe.

According to 1927 church records a pact was made "to live and teach God's word." Mr. and Mrs. G.W. Roberts and Addie Rundell were elected representatives and within a few weeks they voted to join the Tierra Blanco Association of the Southern Baptist Convention.

A few weeks later a pastor, Ben D. Johnson, was called. During the first few months of his ministry, Brother Johnson survived on free will offerings. Sometimes bad weather and impassable roads prevented church services and one time

Farmers Must Report Crop Acres To ASCS

It is extremely important that 1977 crop acreages be reported to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, says Prentice Mills, county ASCS executive director. Wheat and Barley acreage should be reported by June 20, and must be reported before harvest.

Cotton, corn and grain sorghum must be reported by August 1. Under proposed legislation, 1977 acreages will have a direct bearing on 1978 farm program participation.

If there is a set-aside program in 1978, the farm's program benefits will likely be tied to the 1977 acreage planted for harvest. Of course, about one-half the wheat and barley acreages in Parmer County have already been reported. If there has been no change in acreage, no further report is needed on these farms - except for cotton, corn and grain sorghum. If they have not reported any acreages as yet, farmers may report all crops at the same time if they are planted.

Farmers should make sure that their acreage measurements are accurate. Errors in acreage reports can be costly.

If a farmer wants ASCS to measure his acreage, the fee is \$11 for the first 160 acres on a farm, plus \$9 for each additional 160 acres. If ASCS measures the acreage, the farmer will have no problem in timely and accurately filing his acreage report. Farmers wanting ASCS measurement service must apply by no later than July 8.

Bennie Stancell Has First 1977 Wheat

The first load of 1977 wheat reported harvested in the area was cut Monday, June 6, by Bennie Stancell who farms south of Lariat.

The wheat was Centur variety and was harvested from a semi-irrigated plot. Stancell took the grain to Shirley-Anderson Elevator at Lariat where the manager, Asa Smith, reported that it had a test weight of 55 pounds and 12 per cent moisture content. Stancell received a premium for having the first load of wheat.

Joe McWilliams, who also farms near Lariat, brought in two loads of barley to the elevator on June 6.

Smith says that the June 6 date of delivery for wheat was somewhat earlier than normal, adding that the first is usually harvested in the area "about June 15."

From the looks of the area's golden fields the High Plains are teetering on the brink of a massive wheat harvest. It's too bad our farmers can't get enough for their wheat to pay the cost of production.

Read an article that said with this year's anticipated wheat harvest the United States would have enough wheat on hand to take care of our domestic and foreign commitments for the next two years even if we did not harvest a grain of wheat in 1978.

We don't know how accurate this assessment of our stocks of the golden grain will turn out to be, but it should make planting this fall a risky venture.

In the June 3rd issue of Water Inc., newsletter it says, "Not just a burgeoning world population, but also a wealthier one is a significant factor portending a world food crisis, according to a U.S. Department of Agriculture economist."

At the present time we seem to have all the wheat we need and apparently these "wealthy" nations are not paying enough for wheat to give our farmers a return on their investment.

It sounds to us like something is messed up in the farm marketing and export business.

Of course, the Federal Government is coming up with a proposed new agency to cope with the energy situation. It will be the proposed Department of Energy with an anticipated budget of \$10.6 billion.

A statistician from the Chevron Company came up with the following facts that will be of interest.

What Baby DOE Will Cost

A Chevron statistician has been sizing up the \$10.6 billion budget of the proposed new Department of Energy. For example, it is about double the value of all the oil the U.S. imported from Saudi Arabia last year. It exceeds capital and exploration expenditures by the petroleum industry to find and produce oil, gas and gas liquids in the U.S. in 1975. It exceeds by \$800 million the 1974 profits of the seven largest international oil companies. Chevron can't resist adding that those profits were described by a U.S. Senator as "obscene." It is equivalent to about \$3 a barrel of domestic crude oil production, which means, if our own arithmetic is correct, that you could decontrol all domestic crude oil prices and still end up paying less for oil than the federal energy bureaucracy costs. And one should keep in mind that the \$10.6 billion is only the cost of the newly born baby DOE. Think what it will cost when it grows up!

It's sort of an endless circle this time of year. We are referring to the weekly chores of watering the grass and then mowing the grass. We have tried stretching the watering process out to at least a week between soakings. This has worked well in inhibiting the growth, but it has almost killed out several large spots in the old lawn.

Pat Rose, one of our community horticulturists, said that she was going to give us an almanac cycle that if followed for a mowing schedule would reduce the growth. According to Pat, you need to cut the grass during the right sign. Heretofore the grass cutting sign around our house was the mean gleam in the wife's eye. Maybe we can convince her that the right sign does not fall on Saturday afternoons.

Members decided to build a church of their own in 1931. In three months the building was completed and the total cost was \$2000. The old building is still in use. It has been modernized and currently houses the kitchen, fellowship hall

and children's Sunday School classes. Dedication services for the new building were held February 13, 1938.

The first parsonage was built in 1949 and Rev. Jesse Terry and his family were its first occupants. The new auditorium was built in 1952 and formally dedicated in 1958 after the retirement of the debt against it.

Other additions included building a Spanish mission in 1961 and constructing a new parsonage in 1975.

GOD'S ETERNAL PURPOSE

Have you ever considered carefully the opening words of the Bible? "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." Why doesn't it simply say that God created the universe? Why the heaven and the earth?

As we go on reading we find the answer to this question, for the Bible clearly teaches that God has a two-fold purpose; one having to do with the earth and the other with heaven. The former is the subject of prophecy, while the latter is the subject of the "Mystery," or secret, revealed to and through St. Paul. (See Acts 3:21; and cf. Romans 16:25). The former concerns Israel and the nations; the latter "the Body of Christ," the Church of the heavenly calling.

Some people are surprised to learn that there is not one promise in the whole Old Testament about going to heaven. There the whole outlook is earthly, with Messiah reigning as King (Jeremiah 23:5, et al). When our Lord appeared in the flesh the angels cried: "Peace on earth" (Luke 2:14). He Himself said that "the meek" should "inherit the earth" (Matthew 5:5). He taught His disciples to pray: "Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven" (Matthew 6:10). Even at Pentecost

Peter declared that after "the restitution of all things" God would send Jesus back to earth and the times of refreshing would "come from the presence of the Lord" (Acts 3:19-21).

Not until the raising up of Paul do we learn that now all believers in Christ are "baptized into one body" (I Corinthians 12:13), and Colossians 1:5, and many other Pauline passages, speak of "the hope which is laid up for you in heaven." Indeed, before God, believers are already given a position "in heavenly places" and are "blessed with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ" (Ephesians 1:3; 2:4-7).

The prophecies regarding the kingdom, however, will still be fulfilled and Christ will reign on earth and bring the promised "times of refreshing." Thank God, this world will not forever be a place of war and bloodshed, sickness and death, misery and woe. Indeed, at that time, heaven and earth will be opened to each other, and thus will be fulfilled God's two-fold purpose: "That in the dispensation of the fullness of times He might gather together in one all things in Christ, both which are in heaven, and which are on earth, even in Him" (Ephesians 1:10).

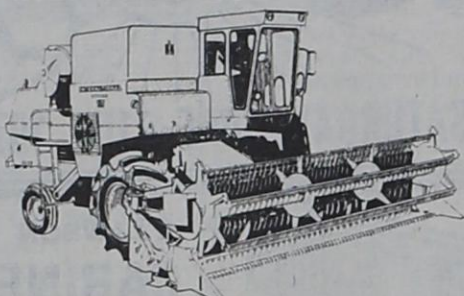
At Farwell, Sharon was named to the all-district team for three years and was voted "most athletic girl" at Farwell High. She also participated in track.

Sharon was an honor student during high school and was a member of the National Honor Society. She is serving as a counselor at Arrowhead camp this summer.



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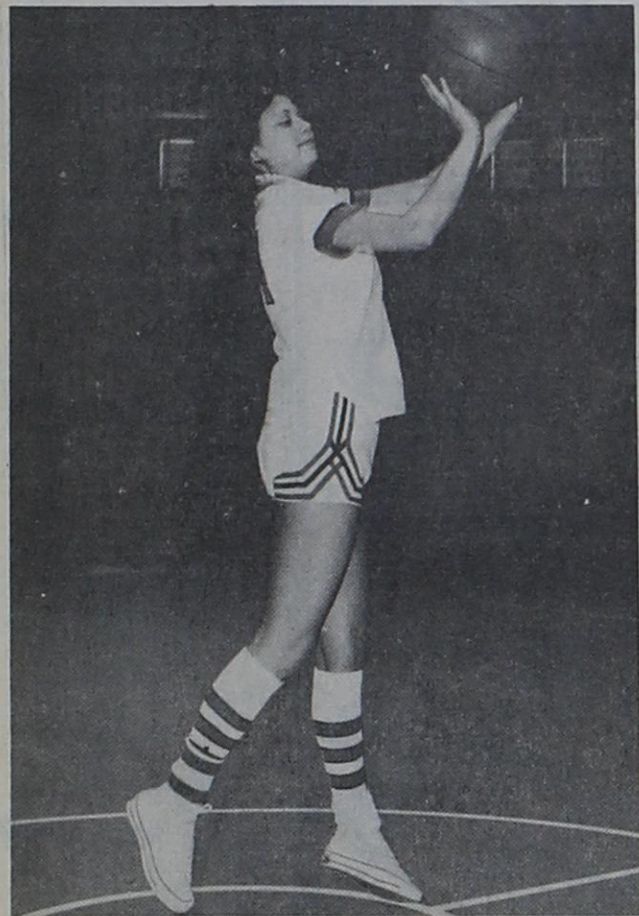
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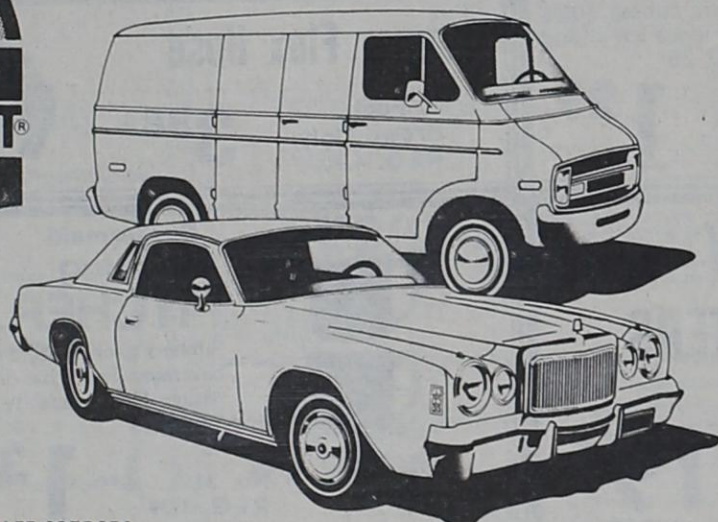
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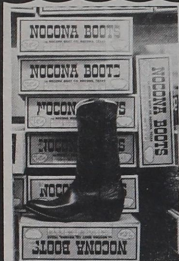
