I THOUGHT 7:30 p. m. would be early enough to start for the football game and arrive on the grounds in time to get a seat. Only had to go about one quarter of a mile at that. But, oh goy, when the Mr. and Mrs. of the Reporter arrived at the front gate of the Buffalo Stadium Friday night, folks were scrouging and pouring into the field and every seat on the east side was occupied and many standing. A walk around to the west side of the field we managed to get a seat, but not long all vacant seats were occupied, and some standing. Folks were out for a lark... they were hungry for outdoor entertainment... too... they were wondering what it would be like to witness for the first time in Stanton a football field, "all lit up" with electricity. They had no idea what their next door neighbor would look like sitting on the sidelines under an incandescent lighting system. They, themselves, had no idea how'd they act or feel, thus they were curious and they threw aside their daily cares and worries, and "they came, they saw, and were conquered."

Why, the whole appearance of people flocking in cars and afoot to reach the entrance gate, Deputy Sheriff Ogil Avery with flashlight directing cars to park in places, the football grounds ablaze with flood lights, the 50-girls strong pep squad whooping it up for the Buffaloes, reminded me I was being pushed by a surging crowd to the entrance gate of an A&M-Texas annual football clash.

Billy Clements, president, and Gordon Stone, a member of the Stanton Athletic Council, were raking in the money from selling tickets and tearing out tickets from the book of season tickets, like mad, made me wonder how they were going to do their job without getting some of the gate money mixed with their own... if they had any.

The only thing I could muster up to really register a kick, were the intervals my view of the players was obstructed by Geo. Lewis pacing up and down in front of me in white trousers, bareheaded, waving his hat, and letting out warwhoops. George Davis was just as bad hampering my optical vision with his 6-foot-one towering in the air. When those two Georges let loose their yells it reminded me of the warwhoops let loose by Sittin' Bull and his gang at Custer's last stand. There were a lot of Georges on the sidelines whooping it up, but the whoops got neither team a score.

Providence had a hand in providing ideal weather for the game. Friday morning about 10 o'clock, he closed the valves to his water wagon and brushed aside the rain clouds admitting Old Sol to come out in all his shining glory drying off a field that had been made wet by an inch of rain falling Thursday night and up to a late hour Friday morning. Then for the night he lit up the heaven with a myriad of stars to shine their soft light down on the field, with a cool atmosphere, to make wraps comfortable. The 600 fans witnessing the game let their enthusiasm be known with outbursts of vociferous yells, as Stanton and Loraine battled to a 0-0 tie.

My first time to witness a football game on Stanton field since war was declared, and not being too familiar with our

BUFFS-DOGS BATTLE TO 0-0 TIE

It was a breath-taking game, that clash staged Friday night between the Stanton Buffaloes and the Loraine Bulldogs, on the first lighted gridiron in the history of Stanton schools. It was pretty much of a see-saw affair the Buffaloes reaching within a few yards of the goal line and the Dogs holding them in their tracks, and the Buffs dishing out the same medicine when the Dogs were only a few feet from pushing over a counter. It was a hard-fought game for these two high school football squads, many of the players playing the first football, and all players on both sides, soft, physically, due to the lack of practice, occasioned by the first game of the season. The score 0-0 tie, is evidence of the thrilling game that was played.

A near capacity crowd of 700 people turned out to watch a thrilling 0-0 tie football game Friday night between the Stanton Buffaloes and the Loraine Bulldogs at the newly lighted Buffalo Stadium.

The weather was cool and clear and the gridiron in good shape in spite of earlier rains. It was the opening game of the season for both teams.

The game got off to a good start with Stanton kicking off and defending the north goal. The Loraine team received the kick and the "night cap" was underway. Both teams fought hard all through the first half, without either team gaining much ground.

Midway in the second period Stanton penetrated deep into Bulldog territory only to be met with brickwall resistance. At the end of the half the Buffaloes rolled up four first downs to two for the Dogs.

After the half, late in the third quarter, Loraine made their only threat of the goal line, only to be thrown back. Midway in the fourth quarter, starting left-end for the Buffs, a forward pass hurled by Jones, Buff half back, on his own 30-yard line and raced for a 40 yard gain to the Bulldogs' 30 yard stripe to start a Buffalo rally. As the final gun sounded Stanton was deep in Loraine

Mr. and Mrs. John Atchison, both 79 years old, celebrated their 60th Wedding Anniversary Monday with an open house at their home here.

Mr. Atchison is a retired farmer and business man. He farmed until he was about 50 years old, then owning a hardware and grocery at various times in Stanton in the later years. He served as county judge of Martin County from 1923 through 1926. He has served as elder of the local Church of Christ for 39 years.

Mr. Atchison was born May 7, 1867 near Decatur, Ill. Moved to Mexico, Missouri, when very small and on to Texas when he was about 3 years old. His parents moved back to Missouri and remained about four years,

when they returned to Texas. They journeyed to Texas in a 2-horse wagon settling in Bosque County, and finally settling in Comanche County, Texas.

Mrs. Atchison, who was Evelyn Cox before her marriage, was born March 23, 1867 in Dallas County, Texas. She moved with her parents to Hamilton County and on to Comanche in 1881. Her mother, who is Mrs. Hulda Cox of Wingate, Texas, is 99 years and 4 months old.

Monday morning at 10 o'clock at St. Joseph Catholic Church, Solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated for the repose of the soul of Mrs. Paul Konz. The celebrant of the Mass was Monsignor John A. Steinlage; The Deacon and Sub. Deacon of the Mass, Father Boeckman and Father Hartigan, respectively. Responses of the Requiem were chanted by Father Francis.

The sermon was given by Father Boeckman.

Mrs. Konz, who was Miss Florence Bone, was married in Stanton to Paul Konz in 1902. Mr. Konz was county clerk of Martin County. He was one of the organizers of the First National Bank, and became its manager, resigning the clerk's office in 1906, and retained the bank position until the time of his death.

Mrs. Konz and her two sons moved to Austin. She bought a home and put her two sons thru the State University, remaining there until her death Saturday, in an Austin hospital.

With property and money left by her husband as a nucleus, Mrs. Konz developed into a shrewd business woman, making investments in Austin and becoming a director in an Austin band. She had large real estate and farm holdings in Martin County at the time of her death.

Interment was made in the Catholic cemetery by the side of her husband with Edmond Tom, Glen Tom, George Byrne of Midland, I. G. Peters, and Jim Tom, acting as pall bearers.

Relatives and friends came from Midland, among them Mr. and Mrs. J. Alfred Tom, Mrs. Bertie Moore, a sister, and Mrs. George J. Byrne, an aunt.

YOUR YARD

1. The lawn may be green all winter. Cut the Bermuda grass close. Use one pound of Italian rye grass seed to each 10x100 square. Rye grass will come up and grow during the fall and winter. Mow as any other grass. It will die down in the spring. It should not be allowed to grow rank because this is about the only way it will harm the Bermuda grass.
2. Use decayed material from around haystacks, feed grinders or leaves from ditches and under trees to protect roots from extremely cold or dry weather. This will also enrich the soil for roses, shrubs, trees, etc.
3. Reset plants or shrubs that are in the way to more convenient places, such as screen or border.
4. Bulbs and roots may be planted or moved.
5. Plant hardy shrubs.
6. Arrange a receptacle for holding rubbish like discarded cans and broken glass, until enough has collected to carry away. Dispose of all rubbish around place, and improve sanitation in every way possible.
7. Remove unhealthy and dead shrubs or trees. Take up dead or unattractive flowers, weeds or grass from around shrubs or trees.
8. Prune overgrown plants or those that obstruct doorways or paths.
9. Plant screens for work or play areas.
10. Change gates and fences for more convenience and to save steps.

Careful study of labels is one of the first steps in wise buying.

The Pure Food and Drug Act requires that three kinds of information should be on a label. First, the name of the brand, name of the product, contents, name of packer and where it was packed.

The producer may desire to put various uses and recipes on the label, and last many labels inform buyer whether the product is U. S. Grade A, B, or C. Grade A products are "excell-

ent" in appearance and flavor and free from defects. U. S. Grade B means "good" in flavor and nutritious quality. Grade C, or "fair" should be used for thrift.

All U. S. graded foods must bear the shield on the wrapper with the words "Packed under the continuous inspection of the U. S. Department of Agriculture," which assures the buyer of sanitary conditions during packing.

Farmers Know What a Profit Is For

AS his own boss, the farmer has long since found out that a profit is not just an extra sum, above the bare cost of doing business, which can be used as you please. It is the main source of funds necessary to pay for a new silo, buy better machinery, and improve the house and the barn.

In spite of the great rise in income, farm profits are no more than necessary to keep the farm plant producing efficiently. It's the same with the iron and steel industry which makes the materials for the farmer's tools.

In 1945 steel companies had left, after meeting all expenses but before paying dividends, only a little more than one-tenth of one cent on each pound of steel sold. The profit on each dollar invested was less than five cents. Year by year since 1941, when the war started, earnings have been declining.

Although last year's output of steel was 19

per cent greater than in 1940, the last prewar year, pay rolls were nearly double but dividends were lower.

There are many misunderstandings and misrepresentations about profits. Some people forget that reasonable profits are a necessary incentive of the American system, which results in abundant low-cost farm products and abundant low-cost steel products.

It is up to those who know what profits are for, and what they can do, to see that they are not destroyed—and with them our high standard of living.

* * *

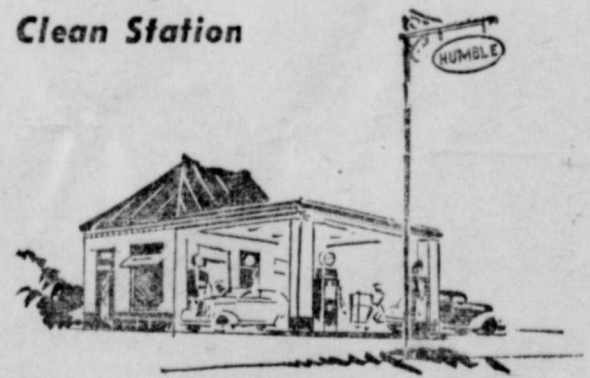
