Charles F. O'Neill Drops Dead Of Heart Failure

Dawson County Farmer Shot To Death; Son Is Jailed

Aged Man Fatally Wounded At Farm Near To O'Donnell

A. J. Durham Meets Instant Death As Four Shotgun Charges Enter Side And Legs Tuesday Afternoon

No Charges Filed

Suspect Held In Slaying Said Insane By Members Of Family; First Shots Fired Through Window

(Special To The Avalanche) O'DONNELL, Dec. 31.—Robert Durham, 82, is being held in the Dawson county jail at Lamesa, following the fatal shooting of his father near here this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

A. J. Durham, 90, the father, who lived four miles south of this city died almost instantly after four shots from a 16-gauge double-barreled shotgun had entered his side and legs.

Durham, who is said by members of his family to be insane, was captured by neighbors a short time after the shooting and brought to O'Donnell where he was turned over to Officer Tom Parker, Mrs. Joe L. Ray, sheriff, and deputies E. P. Anderson and Granville White, together with County Attorney A. W. Gibson, all of Lamesa, arrived late in the afternoon to conduct an investigation.

First Through Window. The father was said by members of his family to have just returned from O'Donnell and was lying on his bed when the first shot was fired through an open window. He ran from the room and into the road.

The meeting was opened with a brief talk by Mr. Ragland, giving a history of the local association and its work and asked that immediate action be taken for improvement. "The cemetery might be a credit to a town of 25,000 people, but to one of 25,000, it certainly is not," said Mr. Ragland.

Confessed Slayer Caught Following Escape From Jail

Manhunt Ends In Capture Of Herman Riley, Charged With Killing Plants And Wounding Brother

WAXAHACHIE, Dec. 31.—A manhunt lasting half the afternoon, Herman Riley, 19, confessed slayer of his parents, was captured today following his escape from the Ellis county jail here. Riley and J. W. Eatep, 23, charged with theft, dug a hole through the jail wall, permitting escape from the runaround, about 3 p. m. Riley had not been apprehended by tonight.

Riley's trail was picked up by the Gettendanner Memorial partner, Waxahachie and he was pursued by authorities. Several shots were fired at him but none took effect. The chase led to the Lott community, about three miles here. There the youth was shot under a vacant house. He was turned to the jail here.

Young Riley is charged with killing his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Riley, and wounding his brother, Walter, 17, at their farm home, Italy. He first claimed he found parents dead, but later made a detailed statement of how the slayers were committed after he confronted with his own bloodstained clothing.

Mack Stanton, owner, Stanton purchased the Clovis Journal and Clovis News, two weekly papers, last April and converted them into a daily. Associated Press leased wire service. Purchase of the Clovis News Journal gives the Nunn-Warren chain three newspapers in New Mexico, the Roswell Morning Herald, the Carlsbad Current and the Clovis News Journal. J. L. Nunn of Amarillo is president of the company.

Seventy-Two Boys And Girls Killed In Theatre Panic

Four Score Others Injured Following Cry Of "Fire" In Scottish Mill Town; Gay Laughter Stilled

Trampled To Death

Youngsters In Observance Of Traditional Holiday At Time Of Catastrophe; Resembles Chicago Fire

(By Associated Press) FAIRFAX, Scotland, Dec. 31.—Seventy-two boys and girls of this Scottish mill town were killed and four score others were injured in a panic which followed a cry of "fire" in the Glenn movie picture theatre here this afternoon, when a fire started in the projection room.

The children came from working class families. They crowded into the 750-seat theatre singing and dancing and excited over the prospect of thus spending their "holidays" in the traditional Scottish New Year's treat which outlasts Christmas north of Tweed.

Pandemonium Breaks Out. But in a few minutes their gay laughter had given way to shrieks of terror and agony. A wave of smoke had come out of the projection box of the theatre. Some one cried "Fire" and in an instant the hundreds of youngsters were scratching and scrambling over each other in an effort to get out.

The catastrophe quickly became a combined reproduction of the 1903 Iroquois theatre fire in Chicago.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—A suit charging violation of the Sherman anti-trust law was started against the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America, Will H. Hays and several large motion picture producers and film boards of trades today in Federal court by Ivan Abramson and the Graphic Film Corporation.

Action also will be brought against the Paramount-Famous-Lasky corporation; Loew, Inc.; Metro-Gwyn-Mayer Distributing Corporation; Fox Film Corporation; First National Pictures, Inc.; Universal Film Exchanges, Inc.; United Artists Corporation; Pathé Exchange; P. B. O. Pictures Corporation; Vitaphone, Inc., and film boards of trade of all the large cities of the country.

Asks \$1,300,000. Abramson asks \$1,300,000 for damages alleged to have been sustained by him through the activities of the defendants.

Construction Of Nazarene Church Will Begin Today

New Building Expected To Be Completed Within 60 Days; Work Starts Two Years After Dirt Broken

Actual construction on the first Nazarene church, at corner of Avenue Q and 14th street, will be started this morning, just two years after ground was broken for the project, according to an announcement yesterday by Rev. S. H. Erwin, pastor.

At the time ground was broken due to financial difficulties and work has been held up until this time when contract for completion was let to the firm of Pray and Thompson. The basement which extends five feet under ground and six feet above, is equipped with a modern kitchen, rest room, nursery and nine classrooms. The new modern auditorium will have a seating capacity of 457 opera chairs, a large choir loft, a library and pastor's study at each wing. The architectural drawings call for Old English and Gothic structure and one of the features of the building will be an old-fashioned beehive with a bell. Materials will be frame and brick veneer and when completed will cost about \$20,000.

The church is being built largely through public donations, and is expected to be finished within the next 60 days.

Local Realtor Remembered By String Of Activities In Civic Affairs; Served In Various Capacities

CHARLES F. O'NEILL, 54, prominent civic leader and real estate dealer of Lubbock, died suddenly last night at 8:10 o'clock at his home, 1623 Broadway, following an acute heart attack.

Dr. Chas. J. Wagner and Dr. Allen T. Stewart, who had been attending Mr. O'Neill for several days after he had complained of indigestion, arrived at his bedside a few minutes after his death.

At Office Tuesday. Mr. O'Neill was said to have been at his office all day Tuesday and seemed to be in excellent health, going to his home about 6 o'clock in the evening. Business associates stated that he apparently had recovered from his illness caused by indigestion, while members of his family said he looked well shortly after dinner.

Heard in Dallas. Mr. O'Neill moved to California and was mayor of San Diego for a period of years, 1913 to 1915, during which time he took an active part in the great exposition held in that city.

Since moving to Lubbock five years ago he has been an outstanding

Cincinnati Publisher And Philanthropist Succumbs After Lifetime Spent In Uplifting Of City

(By Associated Press) CINCINNATI, O., Dec. 31.—Charles P. Taft, 66, Cincinnati publisher and philanthropist, died at his home here tonight.

Mr. Taft was internationally known for his philanthropies and contributions to art, education and the development of modern journalism.

His sickness was known only to intimate friends, and the Cincinnati public, which revered him, knew nothing of the anxious moments of the past three days when he hovered between life and death.

City Builder. Born here in 1843, Mr. Taft gave a lifetime to the uplifting of the city.

Business Outlook Of 1930 Pictured Good By Speaker

L. C. Ellis Says Section Not
Affected By Slump In
Stock Market. In Talk Be-
fore Lions Club

L. C. Ellis, vice-president of the Lubbock National bank, was principal speaker at the Tuesday noon luncheon of the Lubbock Lions club and took as his subject, "The Outlook of 1930," reviewing the year now closing and declaring that this section was not materially affected by the New York stock market slump.

"The slump on Wall Street," he said, "will make business conditions throughout the country on a sounder basis for the coming year. The future looks bright. The building and loan companies who have practically ceased operations here for the past few months, because of some of them making loans deemed not conservative enough, will be back in the field next year, doing business on a conservative basis."

Big Things Promised
Mr. Ellis intimated that there are several "big things" under cover for Lubbock during the coming year which will be announced in the near future.

Wisconsin Real Estate Board In Answer To Texas

Secretary Makes Statement
To Public In Reply To
Resolutions Sent By San
Antonio Manufacturers

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 31. (AP)—John L. Newman, secretary of the Wisconsin Real Estate brokers board, has made public a statement replying to Texas organizations "seeking to sway" that board's consideration of the merits of Texas land development companies by any "propaganda or communications."

His statement was especially addressed to the San Antonio Manufacturers' association, which sent the board a copy of resolutions adopted following refusal of the board to license certain Texas companies as brokers in Wisconsin.

Acted As Court.
"The board," said Newman's statement, "is quasi-judicial in nature. In considering applications of Texas land companies it has acted as a trial court, making findings and on its findings making orders either granting or denying applications."

"With these facts in mind, you may readily see the impropriety of any propaganda or communications addressed to this board while applications are under advisement—especially such communications as contain a veiled threat of an industrial boycott of Wisconsin man-

ufacturers in the event the board be unfavorable to the Texas applicant."

Newman reiterated Wisconsin had no unfriendly feeling toward Texas and each applicant was judged on merits.

The San Antonio manufacturers resolution stated the board was making an "unwarranted attack upon the good name and reputation of the state of Texas."

Scientists Show 3-Day Week Plan

Use Of Present Unavailable
Energy In Artificial Light
Suggested At Meet Of
American Association

DES MOINES, Ia., Dec. 31. (AP)—A three-day week for machine workers through use of at present unavailable energy in artificial light is suggested to the American Association for the Advancement of Science as an industrial development of the future.

It is a by-product of a new field of scientific exploration explained to a general session of the associa-

tion last night by Dr. W. T. Boye, formerly of Harvard Medical school. It is based on observations which Dr. Boye said promised the possibility of producing an artificial light, a wide range of healthful and stimulating rays neutralized at present because not disentangled from useless or harmful rays of the same light.

The idea of shorter working hours was suggested to him by a manufacturer and by his own observations that some workers would prefer night work if they might have as healthful conditions as in the day. With the equivalent of sunshine available artificially it might be possible, he explained, to operate machinery 24 hours a day, saving the interest on capital now lost with idle time and developing resources to give workers the shorter week.

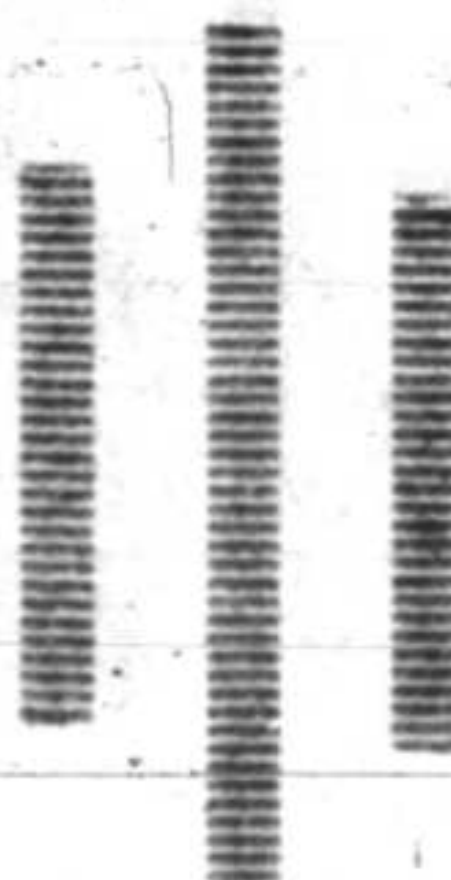

"Flapper Mode" Passes From Fashion World Horizon

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—One of the changes in the new modes that I consider a happy one is the differentiation there is between costumes for youth and those for the sophisticated woman.

It always seemed a pity to me that women with the dignity of a few more years should not capitalize their experience and dress up to it rather than wear the standardized flapper type of costume.

Now, with dignity, elegance and sophisticated grace among the chief characteristics of the new mode, women have been clever enough to realize their advantage, and any gathering of smart women will reveal how successful has been the result.

On the other hand, it is quite as pleasant a diversion to turn to the parties for debutantes and see them favoring frocks that become their youth and beauty and play up their lack of years instead of trying to make them into sophisticated women before they are out of their teens.

Youth and Charm in Debutante Mode
Since this is the debutante season, I should like to stress the importance of costume in her in the new manner which capitalizes her youth and sweet charm.

The fabrics that are used are tremendously important. In this, the feeling of femininity, for instance, is in some ways youth itself—crisp, fresh, gay. I have made many coming-out gowns of this fabric, especially the fallie taffet which has a soft sheen. Chiffon is light and lacy and some satins achieve a very youthful effect. But the rich brocades, the heavy laces and velvets should be left until the debutante grows older.

The cut of gowns for coming-out parties is of real importance. When a young girl has that exquisitely molded slender line that tapers into a small waist, it is important to cut her gowns to emphasize it. She may not have it later. Often a bouffant type of gown, made longer now than formerly, will bring out her exquisite slenderness admirably. I use this line quite often. Other figures are tremendously smart in very high waisted and long-lined lines, and if the gown is ankle length all-around, it often is quite demure looking on a debutante.

Again, the princess silhouette, with some young touch such as puff sleeves, bellies or bolero effect, is lovely.

Two Frocks That Capitalize on Youth
A hydrangea blue moire frock is very young and charming in its cut and general effect of unconscious grace and beauty. It has a fitted bodice and its double-tiered skirt flares from a high hipline. Across the back a third tier extends clear to ankle length and a narrow, tight belt at waistline emphasizes the skirt's flaring fullness. A single flower adorns the frock at the right side of the back, instead of the front.

Quite different in its effect, but equally youthful, is a flowered tulle in rose tones, with sprigs of roses in soft blue, green and pink. It is a modified princess line, with its wrap-around skirt cut to fall diagonally across the front. The bodice features a diagonal line for its décolletage, both front and back, and all the edges are outlined in fine lines of the three colors, rose, beige and green.

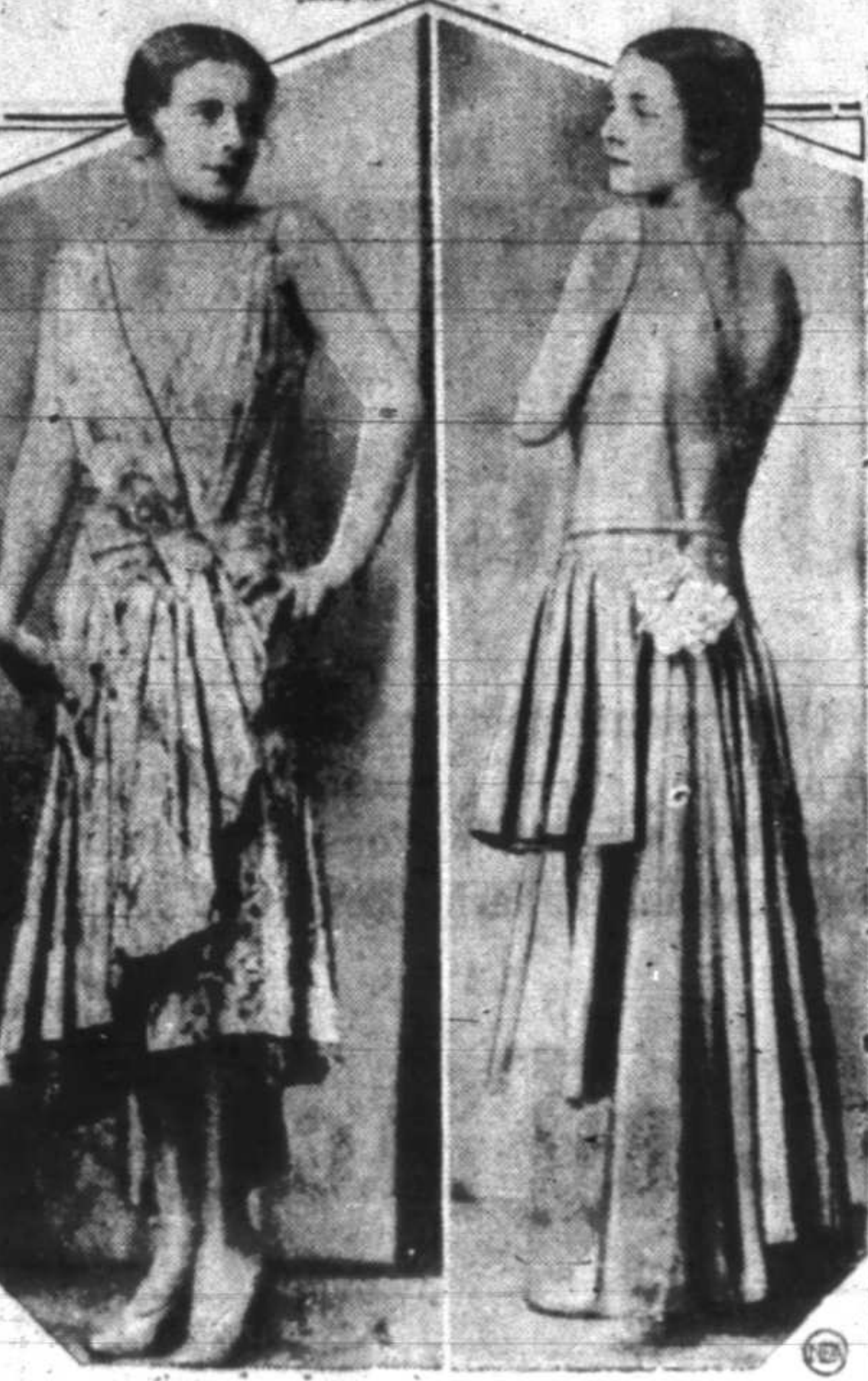

And yet, over in London, when Francis Francis, the wealthy young guardian, wants to marry Sunny Jarman, who is a musical comedy actress, he has to resign from the Royal Horse Guards.

There is an old custom, it seems which has become an unwritten law, that no officer in His Majesty's brigade of guards may so far forget his superior station in life as to marry an actress.

Frequently before the same situation has faced the choice between love and duty to the king.

Naturally, it does not become news unless the man chooses love, when it is always romantic and glamorous, as it is in this case. For it does mean something to give up so desirable and showy a position as that of royal guard-man.

The custom, of course, originates in the days when theatrical folk had no social standing, and could not possibly be considered eligible matrimonially.

But there is a certain romance about giving up a career for love. There is triumph in being more important to a man than his position. There is a cavalier gesture that is rare enough in these prosaic days.

And after all, though Francis may give up his uniform, all is not lost. He gains the right to use that priceless phrase: "Remember what I gave up for you."

WASHINGTON statement means business, liquor smugglers and—analogs today in prohibition.

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Claim Soft Words Cannot Stop Rum Running Activity

State That The Coast Guard Means Business Issued As Latest Angle On Pro Enforcement Controversy

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. (AP)—A statement that the coast guard means business and cannot stop liquor smuggling with "soft" words and "ambiguities" was added today to the controversy on prohibition enforcement, which had enlivened the holidays for official Washington.

This assertion was made by Rear Admiral Frederick C. Billard, coast guard commander, upon being informed that the men had met death at the hands of his service while attempting to run liquor into Narragansett bay.

It came at a time when the contention over prohibition was running high, with prominent "dry" members of the senate and government agencies issuing vehement statements criticizing and defending the enforcement of the liquor laws.

"The coast guard," Billard said, "has the job of stopping liquor smuggling at sea. It is not a job that can be handled with soft words and ambiguous gestures. The coast guard is used to carrying out any duty given to it to do, with vigor and determination."

"It means business about this matter and acts strictly within the law. If a liquor smuggler elects to defy the command of a coast guard craft to stop, he runs a serious risk of getting hurt through a course of action that the law has specifically authorized for a hundred years."

In some quarters, Billard's statement was interpreted as an answer to the demands of the last week for more rigid enforcement, in line with the justice department's renewal of an order that no prohibition cases are to be made public without the department's consent.

Reverberations were expected from the announcement as well as from a statement of Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, a scathing arraignment of "enforcement personnel," which charged that "gangs were running wide open in the jurisdiction of district attorney after district attorney."

WINTER STAGGERS AWAY
WINNIPEG, Dec. 31. (AP)—Winter was staggering away from the western prairie today as summer temperatures skyrocketed to unseasonable heights, and continued mildness was forecast for the region that have heretofore carried the name of being the coldest districts on the American continent. Lethbridge, Alberta, with 52 degrees, was the warmest spot in the prairie provinces.

FULFILLED REQUIREMENTS
PROVINCIAL, Dec. 31. (AP)—Commander W. C. Beach, commanding the New London coast guard cutter, told government officials here this afternoon that the coast guard patrol boat 290, which fired upon the rum runner Black Duck off Newport yesterday, had fulfilled all legal requirements before starting fire with the vessel's machine gun.

TEXARKANA, Ark., Dec. 27. (AP)—Jails, observed Judge Frank A. Youmans today, are good enough for women law violators; but they ought, at least, be good jails.

So, after a personal investigation, he ordered Mrs. Maggie Parsons of Fulton and Mrs. Marie Youngblood of Texarkana committed to the Union county jail at Eldorado as the "best jail in the district." The women pleaded guilty to selling liquor.

The judge's philosophy on committing women was summed up as he passed sentence.

"It is a very difficult matter," he said, "for a judge to impose jail sentences on women. The jails in this district are not suitable for women. I have made a personal investigation of the Eldorado jail and find conditions there are better than anywhere else in this district."

"Women who persist in violation of the law must expect some punishment."

The judge's quandary resulted from an order to commit no more women to the Federal reformatory at Alderson, West Virginia.

CHINA NOT AFFECTED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. (AP)—State department officials today reiterated their belief that the privileges of Americans in China would not be affected by the order issued by the Nanking government for the abolition of extra-territoriality privileges for foreigners after receiving a copy of the Nanking mandate from the American legation in Peking.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. (AP)—Chairman Legge of the federal farm board, and Carl Williams, member representing cotton, will leave tonight on a conference tour to Little Rock, Ark., Oklahoma City, Okla., and Austin, Texas.

Sanction Given

Five-Year Dispute Comes to End Over Estate

CHICAGO, Dec. 31. (AP)—Sanction of Judge Philip L. Sullivan of the circuit court was given today to an agreement among the heirs sharing the \$1,500,000 estate of William Nelson McClintock, and an end was written to the five year dispute that began with the death of the "millionaire orphan" Dec. 4, 1924.

Mrs. Veeder receives \$350,000 and \$35,000 each will be distributed among ten cousins of McClintock.

Junior Championships Are Abolished By Body And Resolutions For Curing Major Boxing Evils

NEW YORK, Dec. 31. (AP)—The New York State Athletic Commission bade farewell today to an old member and faced the fistic problems of 1930 with a drastic set of informal New Year's resolutions hitting at major evils in the boxing industry.

After passing a resolution of appreciation for the efforts of George E. Brown, a member of the commission for the past six years who resigned today to become district attorney of Kings county, Commissioner James A. Fawcett and William Muldoon cleared the record for 1929 and took their first shots at the problems of the coming year.

The action abolished junior championships with the main blow aimed at the junior lightweight class. The purses of Benny Bass, Philadelphia seeder, and Tod Morgan, the last champion of the "great" division, still are withheld as the commission because of the doubts in Madison Square Garden, December 20, wherein Bass knocked out the titleholder in two rounds, while gamblers in the lobby pleaded for wagers with odds 6 to 1 on the challenger.

The commissioners, morally certain that the battle was not fought on its merits have been unable to discover definite proof of alleged fraud. Abolishing the 130-pound division, created seven years ago by the late Tex Rickard's request for Johnny Dundee, strikes principally at Bass. Complicated financial arrangements disclosed before the match would, if true, cost Benny \$20,000 to win a title now worthless.

Though nearly as tall as Primo Carnera, the boxing behemoth, Stretch is not of the same excitable temperament. Murphy was a marked man in every one of Purdue's games last year, and took plenty of punishment in running up his grand total of points—but he went about his business as calmly as a man making a New Year resolution.

Besides Murphy, Purdue has two other veterans back from last year—Glen Harmsen, the football player, and Herman Boots.

Jones Says Rule Is Proven Unjust

Far From General Agreement On Football Regulations; Stagg And Warner Favor No Changes

NEW YORK, Dec. 31. (AP)—Although the college football coaches have gone on record, as an association, against further tinkering with the gridiron rules, there is far from general agreement among them, especially with regard to the new fumble rule.

The Associated Press today received contributions to the debate from four of the country's most famous coaches now all in the far west. In them, Alvin Karpis of Chicago and Glenn S. (Pop) Warner of Stanford were disclosed as favoring the present rules without change. Capt. Lawrence (Biff) Jones of Army and Howard Jones of Southern California expressed desire to do away with the new rule which prevents the defensive side from running with a recovered fumble.

In the opinion of Howard Jones, "the new fumble rule which prohibits the defensive team from running with a recovered fumble has proved unjust."

Crowd Of 70,000 Expected For Clash In Rose Bowl Today; East-West Grid Supremacy At Stake

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 31. (AP)—Pittsburgh's Panthers and Southern California's Trojans will match football strength tomorrow in Rose Bowl in an intersectional classic that brings together the outstanding team of the East with one of the best in the West.

Undeclared and with nine victories written into its regular season's record, Pittsburgh comes to the far west with one of the greatest grid machines in its history. In its line-up are four players who clinaxed a brilliant year by winning all-American recognition. Joe Donohue, left end, and Tony Unanue, left half back, were named for the 1929 Associated Press first team. Ray Montgomery, right guard, and "Pug" Parkinson, full back, took places on the second squad.

The Trojans lacking the impressive record of their rivals in that they lost two games, nevertheless won nine contests and exhibited considerably more power in a point scoring way. In nine games, Pittsburgh rolled up 277 points and allowed 43. Southern California's eleven contests netted 445 points to 61 for the opposition. If comparative scores indicate anything, Pittsburgh defeated Carnegie Tech. 34 to 13, while Southern California crushed the same team, 45 to 13.

Approximately 70,000 spectators forming the first capacity crowd since the bowl was enlarged a few years ago, will watch the contest.

Those who back their opinions with money have installed the Trojans a slight favorite.

Many capable critics, including Coach Warner of Stanford, however, incline toward the Panthers.

Stanley Ussis, who won five of these intersectional encounters, teams from the East, South and Midwest returned home with four victories, while three games were tied.

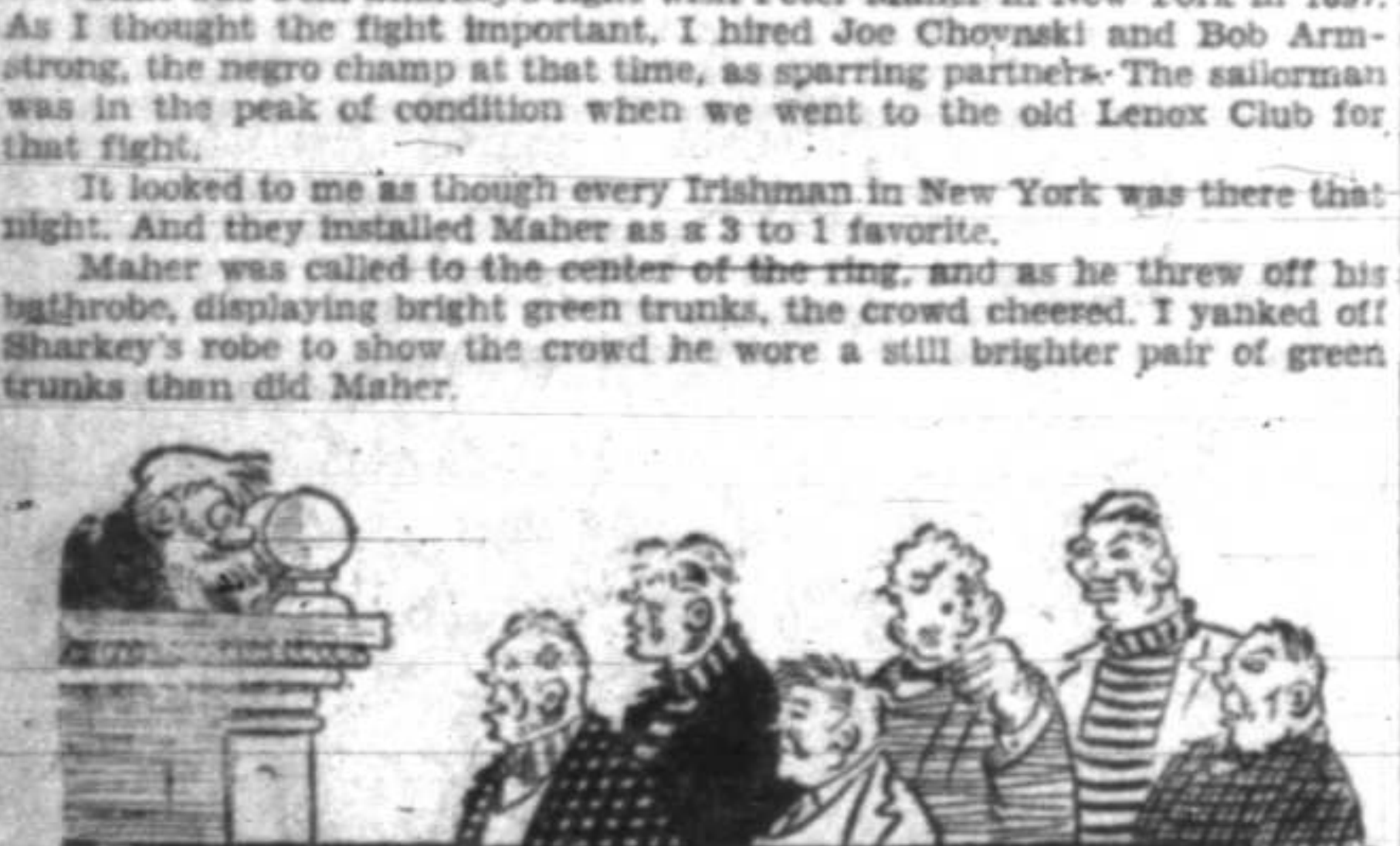
TIM RECALLS IRISH CHAMPIONSHIP BATTLE BETWEEN MAHER AND TOM SHARKEY

NEVER will I forget the "Irish championship" battle, between two Irish fighters, with two Irish handlers, before an Irish crowd, and which wound up in arrest by Irish police and appearance before an Irish magistrate.

That was Tom Sharkey's fight with Peter Maher in New York in 1897. As I thought the fight important, I hired Joe Chovinsky and Bob Armstrong, the negro champ at that time, as sparring partners. The salesman was in the peak of condition when we went to the old Lenox Club for that fight.

It looked to me as though every Irishman in New York was there that night. And they installed Maher as a 3 to 1 favorite.

Maher was called to the center of the ring, and as he threw off his highkicks, displaying bright green trunks, the crowd cheered. I yanked off Sharkey's robe to show the crowd he was a still brighter pair of green trunks than did Maher.



The crowd settled back to root for both of them.

With the championship of Ireland at stake, Maher and Sharkey flew at each other. The fighting was terrific.

Just before the end of the first round Maher managed to floor Sharkey with a terrific right to the jaw. In the fifth, Sharkey flattened Maher and the tide of battle turned. And Tom began forging ahead.

In the seventh round the "see boys," who had put up the long odds, jumped into the ring, claiming Sharkey and his petter after the going sounded. Jimmy Caldwell, the referee, refused to allow the claim of foul.

There was a general mixup. We climbed into the ring from Sharkey's corner. Maher's seconds and fower slingers climbed in, and soon we were a mauling pile in the ring, pulling at each other, while the crowd was in an uproar.

When Referee Caldwell could make himself heard, he threw up both arms and called the fight a draw. This, if anything, made matters worse. Police Inspector McLaughlin and his riot squad appeared, and everybody in the ring wound up in the old Harlem police station, Big Tim Sullivan heard of it, and bailed everybody out.

We appeared before an Irish police judge the next day. I wish I could recall his name.

The first man he called was Peter Maher. He asked Pete where he was born. "Ireland, your honor, county Galway," Pete replied.

"And you, Buck McCormick?" to one of Pete's handlers.

"Ireland, county Kerry."

"Ireland"—a Kerryman, too.

"Peter Burns?"

"County Wicklow, Ireland."

"And you, Tom Sharkey?"

"Ireland."

"And you, Tim McGrath?"

"County Limerick, Ireland."

"That's enough," said the judge. "I can't see any case here. You are all dismissed."

Guard Letter Of Borah To Hoover Over Prohibition

The Latest Contribution Of Senator To Washington's Liquor Controversy Is Kept Secret

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. (AP)—Contents of a letter on prohibition sent to President Hoover by Senator Borah today were a closely guarded secret while official Washington turned to speculation on the nature of the senator's latest contribution to the present liquor controversy.

The communication was regarded as a surprising Borah's participation in the current discussion, in the course of which he had issued two denunciations, scathing attacks on the federal prohibition law, and a statement in which he declared that the prohibition law was a "scandal" and that it was "time to get it out of the way."

In his previous statements, the senator, one of Mr. Hoover's most prominent opponents, asserted the faults of prohibition enforcement lay with those charged with making the law effective and that with the present personnel "from top to bottom" nothing could be done.

"Saloons Wide Open"

Later he declared saloons were running wide open in the jurisdiction of "district attorney after district attorney" and charged a "scandal" exists in the administration of the alcohol permit system. Meanwhile, Senator Borah reviewed the situation with President Hoover at a lengthy luncheon conference, but what was said was not revealed, although the senator made it clear his position had not been changed.

One view of the letter to the president was that it contained evidence of liquor law violations which had come to Borah's attention. In this connection, it was recalled that when Senator Howell, republican, Nebraska, made charges of non-enforcement of the prohibition statutes in the District of Columbia and asserted the responsibility lay with Mr. Hoover, he was requested by the White House to submit evidence supporting his charges with the promise it would be thoroughly investigated.

Expect Statement

A statement is expected later this week from Senator Jones, republican, Washington, author of the law providing heavy maximum penalties for prohibition violations. He called yesterday at the offices of the Hoover law enforcement commission and after a two-hour conference said he would make a statement within a few days.

Meanwhile, members of the House pitched into the fray, providing comment from that branch of congress heretofore noticeably lacking.

Representing Cochran, democrat, Missouri, issued a statement advocating "a dignified effort" by "wet" members of congress to bring about a modification of the liquor laws that would permit the manufacture of light wines and beer "not intoxicating in fact."

Representative Schaefer, republican, Wisconsin, said the "recent shames and walls of the dry leadership are comparable to rats leaving a sinking ship."

This drew a reply from representative Kelly, republican, Pennsylvania, who expressed the opinion that ten years of prohibition had demonstrated "the determination of the people as a whole to retain the eighteenth amendment and secure its enforcement." He appealed for support for President Hoover with the assertion "the task now confronting us is to follow the leadership of a president who recognizes his responsibilities and who has challenged all Americans to assist him."

Hulen's election to the vice-presidency of the Fort Worth and Denver City railroad was taken by many observers of the situation here to indicate an extension of the Burlington system's influence over the Trinity and Brazos Valley. It was seen as another step toward bringing the Burlington system into Houston via the T. and B. V."

"General Hulen's election will not affect his position as receiver for the T. and B. V., which is owned jointly by the Fort Worth and Denver and the Rock Island. The Fort Worth and Denver is part of the Burlington system. His election, however, will operate to abolish at least for the present the office of traffic manager of the Fort Worth and Denver, which position he has held for the last several years. He will retain his residence and office in Houston."

"The stock held by General Hulen in the T. and B. V. is generally regarded as the pivot upon which will turn the eventual allocation of the short line to one of the great systems, as proposed by the Interstate Commerce Commission's recent suggested groupings."

Mr. Carr died at his daughter's residence yesterday morning at 2:30 o'clock following a brief illness.

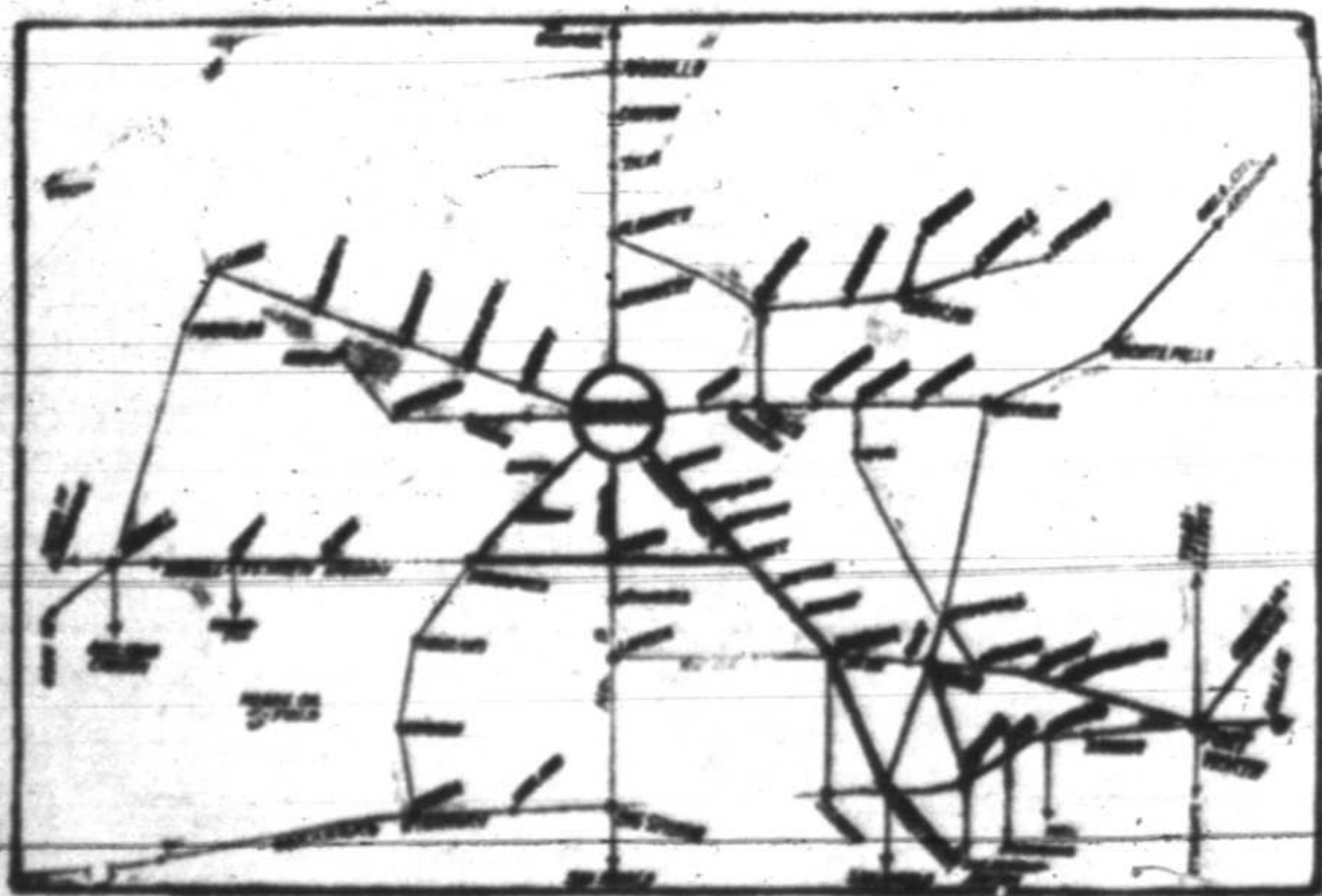
Survivors are the widow, three sons, Sam Carr, Will Carr and Monroe, all of Alpine, and the daughter, Mrs. Roberts.

Incorporation Of Farm Association Comes January 15

Final Draft Of New Cotton Group By-Laws Are To Be Presented To Directors, Carl Williams Says.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. (AP)—Prediction that the \$20,000,000 cotton association would be incorporated by January 15 was made today by Carl Williams, farm board member.

Council for both the board and the growers sub-committee on charter and by-laws completed the legal phase of the final draft today, he said, and expect to present it to the board tonight for approval.

The new marketing corporation, Williams said, will be incorporated as a stabilization corporation if, and when, an emergency is declared to exist. Such a declaration would have to be made by the National Cotton Advisory Committee, subject to approval of the Farm Board. The committee has not been named.

Through Organization. Under the act proposed, Williams said, farmers cannot get production loans from the board, but must go through their state, or regional, cooperative organization, production credit being a matter of state control.

He said the corporation probably would be organized under the laws of the state of Delaware and articles of incorporation sent to the board of directors of state and regional cooperatives making up the corporation for their approval and stock subscriptions.

New Orleans, Dallas, Houston and other southern cities are bidding for the headquarters of the new corporation.

By NEA Service. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28.—There are too many broadcasting stations and too much advertising in their programs, is the opinion of fans on the Pacific coast, according to a survey taken by the "Commonwealth club of America here. 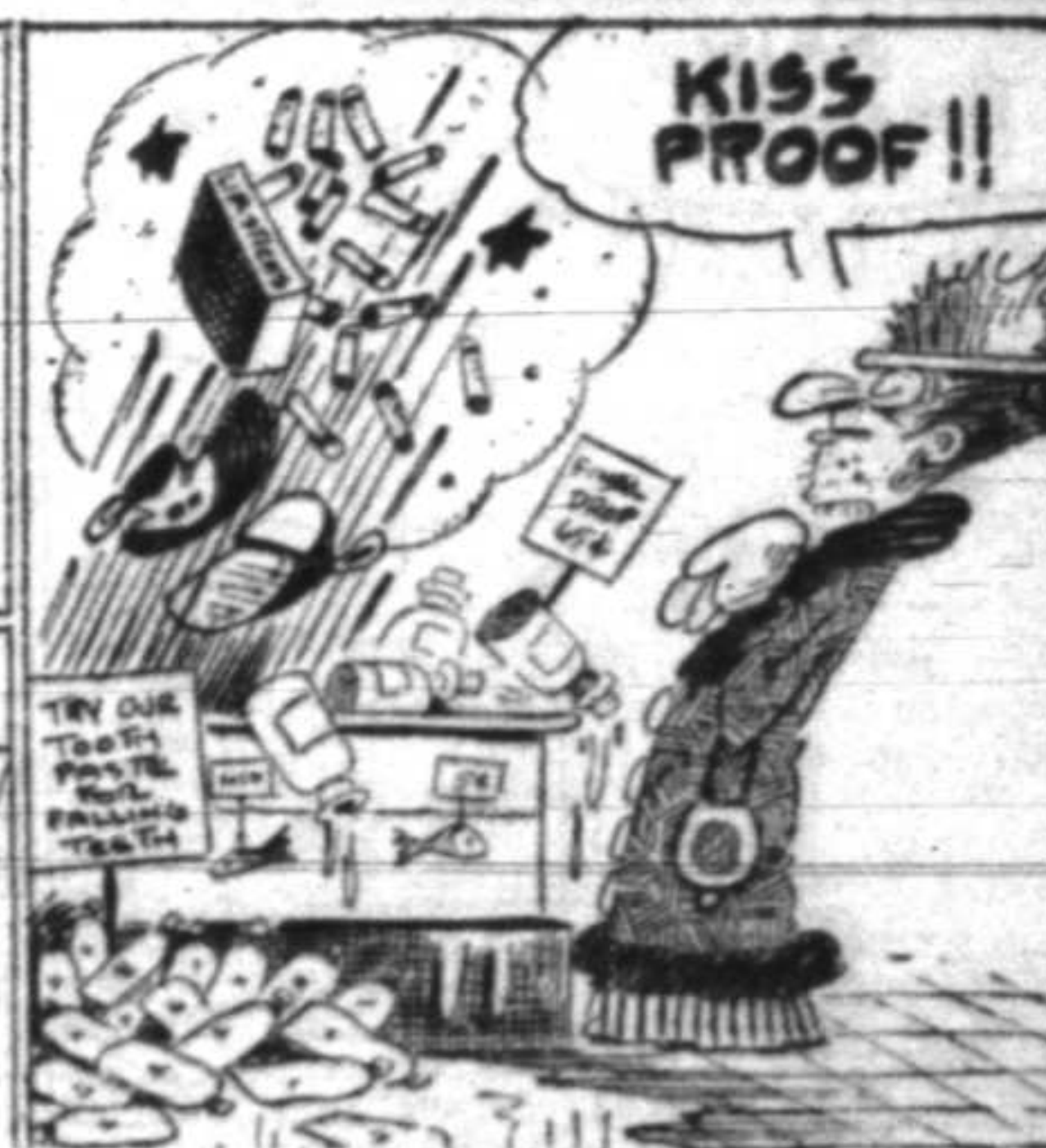

Fifteen Senators Forced To Retire Or Run Again

Political Prophecies Run Amuck; Several Talked As Candidates For Higher Offices In State

AUSTIN, Dec. 31. (P)—Terms of 15 members of the Texas senate expire in January 1931, meaning that these will be obliged to seek nomination next July and re-election next November if they care to continue in the roles of lawmakers. There will be sixteen holdovers whose terms do not expire until 1933. The entire House of Representatives—membership is elected every two years.

The 15 senators whose terms expire in 1931 are influential members of the legislature and few, if any, means to quit politics. In fact some of them like the game so well that they are ambitious to climb even higher.

Those Who Retire
Those whose terms expire with the 41st legislature are: Miss Margie E. Neal of Carthage, W. R. Cousins of Beaumont, Julian Greer of Poyner, Ed Westbrook of Sherman, Joe M. Moore of Greenville, Thomas E. Love of Dallas, Gus Rusek of Schulenburg, Walter Woodul of Houston, T. J. Holbrook of Galveston, A. J. Wirtz of Seguin, Eugene Miller of Weatherford, W. D. McFarlane of Graham, Walter C. Woodward of Coleman, Archie Parr of Benavides and Julian C. Hyer of Fort Worth.

Miss Neal was the first woman to be sent to the Texas Senate and no member stands in higher esteem with her colleagues than she. She is influential and her services to her district have been of a high order. She has been mentioned as a probable candidate for State Superintendent of Public Instruction but she has never divulged her plans.

To Run Again
Senator Cousins has been a member of the senate since only last January, having been elected to fill the unexpired term of the late Dr. H. F. Triplett. He probably will stand for re-election, according to his friends.

Senator Greer, a school teacher, is completing his second term and is likely to ask his constituents to send him back.

Senator Westbrook is rounding out three and one-half terms, having been originally elected to fill a vacancy. There is some doubt about his candidacy for re-election.

Senator Moore has under consideration a race for lieutenant governor. Also he has been urged to run for Congress. If he does not run for some other office he is likely to ask to be returned to the Senate for a third term.

Love Seeks Governorship

Senator Love is actively after the governorship. While he has been in the senate only one term this time, he is no novice there, having been an "old timer" in the upper house.

Senator Rusek would not be happy outside the Texas lawmaking halls and can be expected to run for re-election and his friends say his district is so "solid" on him that he will not have opposition. He has served one and one-half terms.

Senator Woodul was drafted by his district to serve out the unexpired term of Senator J. W. Hall of Houston, who resigned to become Harris County tax collector.

Senator Holbrook is rounding out his second term and will probably seek re-election, although he has his eyes on a seat in congress. He tried for it in 1928.

Wirtz Undecided
Senator Wirtz is undecided. He has given eight years to his district in the Senate and is one of the most active members. He has a steadily-increasing law practice and may decide to devote his entire attention to it. Also, he has been urged to seek the lieutenant governorship and there has been some talk of his becoming a candidate for congress from the 13th district, where his former Republican law partner, Harry M. Wurzbach, lost out in 1928 to Augustus McCloskey of San Antonio.

Senator Miller, completing one and one-half terms, is undecided. He has confided in friends. He came to the senate from the house, where he served while a student in the University of Texas, and was for a period the youngest member of the Upper House.

Senator McFarlane is serving his first term and may become a candidate for congress. He succeeded Senator J. D. Parnell of Wichita Falls, who is a candidate for lieutenant governor again after an unsuccessful try last year.

Woodward Talked
Senator Woodward has been talked of as a probable candidate for governor or congress. He is completing one and one-half terms and is recognized as one of the strongest senators.

Senator Parr will likely return for his fifth term. He is the dean of the senate.

Senator Hyer is filling out the unexpired term of former Senator Robert A. Stuart of Fort Worth who resigned last January after he had been elected district attorney of Tarrant county.

Martin, Hubbard; Edgar E. Waco, Charles; S. Galster, Bryan; J. W. Stevenson, Victoria; John W. Hornsby, Austin; Carl G. Hardin, Stephenville; Oliver Cunningham, Abilene; W. A. Williams, Abilene; Pink L. Parrell, Lubbock; and C. C. Small, Wellington.

Curtailed of American Automobile Business in France Sought by Duties

PARIS, Dec. 31. (P)—The American embassy is expected to make representations to the foreign-offices shortly against proposed increased duties on automobiles and parts which probably will curtail all American automobile business in France.

The embassy is preparing data in an effort to show that this would have an adverse effect by throwing out of work many of the 8,000 French employed by American firms and by adding expense to many French imports of parts.

Ford To Suffer
The Ford company, it is believed, would be the principal sufferer under the new duties, as it makes the bulk of American cars sold here.

Ford is now the fourth largest producer in France, averaging 1,500 cars a month.

The organized effort against foreign automobiles was given its force by Louis Renault, one of the largest car builders of France.

Snobbery Named
Snobbery he said, caused Frenchmen to buy foreign cars, although he asserted French automobiles were better. He said they were more durable, held the road better and had more effective brakes.

If foreign cars dominated the French market, Renault asserted, it would not have been worth while to have lost a million and a half men in the war to escape German tutelage only to fall under that of America.

Life One Break After Another

UVALDE, Dec. 31. (P)—Life is just one bad break after another for Herman Bowles, 31, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Bowles of Uvalde. While playing Friday he broke his right arm. It was the fifth time that arm had been fractured, and brought his grand total of breaks up to 15.

Other breaks include three of the right leg, two of the left leg, three of the right collar bone, one of the left collar bone and one of the left foot.

LINDBERGH'S STUCK
COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 31. (P)—Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, arrived at Port Columbus today from Detroit after a flight of an hour and 45 minutes on the first stop of an inspection trip over the Transcontinental Air Transport lines. They stuck in a snowdrift in attempting to reach the runway on foot and needed assistance of Harry Kaiser, A. T. A. T. employee, to get out.

CHARGES FILED
DUNCAN, Okla., Dec. 31. (P)—A murder charge was filed today against Jim Brown, deputy sheriff, who last Friday shot and killed Claude Cheves, gangster. He was admitted to \$15,000 bail.

\$400,000 Damages In "Talkies" Suit

LAREDO, Dec. 31. (P)—A suit for \$400,000 damages growing out of an alleged conspiracy to defraud of property and slander in connection with the Allen Stowers patent on what was claimed to be the first perfected motion picture machine was on trial today in district court here. The styled John L. Dannelley et al vs. A. F. Bard et al.

Allen Stowers of Laredo was the inventor of a talking picture machine, demonstrated here several years ago. It was being manufactured by the Veeclum Corporation of America, of which John L. Dannelley, Laredo and San Antonio attorney, was president.

The suit alleged that New York persons, headed by A. F. Bard, conspired to defraud Stowers, Dannelley and others of rights granted them under the patent.

CIVIL WAR YET DIES
BEAUMONT, Dec. 31. (P)—J. H. Crainer, 91, one of Dick Dowling's "Immortal Forty" at the battle of Sabine Pass, in which the Federal forces were severely defeated in one of the most brilliant small engagements of the Civil war, died here today.

BURNS TO DEATH
BEAUMONT, Dec. 31. (P)—Katherine Alingworth, five, was burned to death and her mother, Mrs. J. M. Alingworth, was severely burned in attempting to rescue the child when their home was destroyed by fire near Sourlake today. Two other children escaped with minor injuries.
