BUILDING

There are many different meanings of building, rather there are many different ways to build. Most people think immediately of a structure of some kind with four walls or a number of stories, like a business house and hotel and office building or something of that kind, but there is a very important thing that towns must look to in their building program and that is the building of good will among the people of the community, and trade territory.

It used to be that neighboring towns were bitter rivals. They fought bitterly, and would try to pull down and tear to pieces every effort that the other town would make.

Don E. Mowry, secretary of the American Community Advertising Association in speaking of building for business says: "Some cities sit still and adopt a purely passive attitude toward the getting of new industries. Others bestir themselves and go out after them."

Parkersburg, W. Va., is one of the latter cities. Its experience is instructive. There is no denying the fact that commercial organizations do much what they do with the final analysis based on trade, but this is back to the matter of friendly rivalry, and that is altogether proper.

Lubbock wants the people to feel kindly toward her. Lubbock is willing to help others to help themselves, and while some few individuals resent her proffered assistance, it is because they misunderstand. Lubbock does not want to force herself upon communities. If her assistance when offered is not needed or wanted, she most certainly is not going to force it down their throats.

If there is anything wrong with this plan we cannot see what it is. None of these counties we dare say will be unwilling for this publicity to be sent out, as it will be arranged by some authorized representative of the county. This is just

an example of building that may be different to that usually as thought of when building is mentioned.

Character building, building of friendship are two very important classes of building, and these cannot be overlooked if a city or a community shall be built.

NEED FOR CHANGE IN LEGISLATURE PROGRAM IN TEXAS

That there is great need for a change in the system of the State Legislature goes without saying. The Vernon Record, in treating the subject says that a Texas newspaper recently printed an item which is rather illuminating as to why we sometimes complain at the supposed mistakes of the legislature. A prominent citizen down in North Texas, after serving in the Legislature through many sessions, was defeated last year for re-election. He then got a job as a lobbyist. His pay as a member of the Legislature was \$5 a day for the first sixty days of a regular session and the first thirty days of called session.

The sessions were prolonged he received compensation at the rate of \$2 a day for all time beyond the sixty days of regular sessions and thirty days of called sessions. The newspaper discovered, through evidence in litigation that the compensation of the ex-lawmaker as a lobbyist was \$250 a day and his expenses. While in the service of the people he received \$5 a day as a maximum and paid his own expenses. This is rather interesting information. We sometimes wonder why the lobbyists sometimes outwit the lawmakers and slip through legislation of special advantage to some interest or group. It isn't that lawmakers are not honest. The dishonest member of the Legislature who is crooked is so rare that when one is discovered it produces a sensation. Bribery plays a negligible part in the public business. No sane man, even though he is not honest, would stoop to bribery. That is one crime that is almost impossible to cover. Too many people are involved to make it safe. No sane lobbyist would bother with members who can be bribed. A lawmaker who will take a bribe from one interest would just as readily turn around and sell out to an opposing interest. The real reason that the lobbyist sometimes get through legislation of special value to some particular group or interest is not to be found in the usual explanation offered by the street corner moralist. In the first place there isn't much legislation of this type. Most of the lobbying activities are confined to efforts to prevent the passage of legislation regarded as militating against the interest of some group. Many of these efforts are successful, and it is well that we do defeat much of the legislation that would do for the correction of real or imaginary ills. If the problem is real, public opinion will soon force action. If it is not, we are all better off through the defeat of foolish legislation. But the explanation of the successes of the lobbyists is to be found in the fact that compensation for lobbyists attracts the best talent. Pay for legislators does not. We do have some very able men in the Legislature, but they are not there because of the pay, and we would have more such men if we paid them enough to, at least meet their living expenses while attending sessions. The people must compete with private enterprise if we are to be sure of getting the best available talent for the public service. It is worthy of mention in passing that the particular lobbyist referred to in the news item under discussion was not employed by some soulless corporation seeking special privilege. It was not a railroad company nor a public utility concern nor the life insurance trust. The man who was employed at a salary of \$250 a day and expenses was representing a farm organization! But there is nothing wrong in this, either for the lobbyist or his employers. These facts illustrate the absurdity of some of our notions about lobbying, big business and pay for public servants.

There is no question that the Constitution of Texas is much out of date and is really impracticable to a great extent. The old system of the legislature meeting only once in two years is one of the great faults just now. It does not give the representatives time to do any constructive work. Texas is filling up with people, and the legislature needs are much greater than they were when the Constitution was written. Of course you say that amendments can and have been made to the Constitution, but this is one part of the Constitution that has not been changed. The pay of the legislator is entirely too small, and it will not attract the very best talent, because men who make more money than that unless for merely loyalty's sake will put their time in on a job that will cause them great financial losses by being away from home. Five dollars per day is small enough, but under the Constitution after having been in session for sixty days the pay is reduced to \$2.00 per day, which means that the legislator stays there at a loss daily. We are of the opinion that the legislature should be in session at least four months each year, with a straight salary of not less than \$100 dollars per day with the railroad fare cut down to the actual amount that it costs. This would at least pay men a reasonable amount to stay down there and transact business without having to rush through a bunch of undesirable legislation because of the lack of time.

Some people call them cyclones and some people call them tornadoes, but the final result of either is very similar especially if one is blown away and killed. Among them is the fact that they are no worse, and another is that they do not bring us floods that wash our farms away and destroy our homes, and another is that they do not come from the same direction every day.

Mothers' Day was very generally observed throughout the United States Sunday, and it was generally observed in Lubbock. It was a rough day here, but many of the mothers attended services at the various churches and many people visited mothers in their homes where they could not get out. Quite a number of people drove several hundred miles to be with their mothers on that day, and all of us gave the question of the nation's motherhood more than usual consideration.

Lubbock has plenty of confidence in the future of this town, and believe it is to be the outstanding city of the southwest. Lubbock is not booming, but she is growing and growing rapidly. More than fifty new dwelling houses are now being built in the city and many of them are very substantial and expensive homes.

SO THINK WE

Music week in the United States was more generally observed this year than ever before. The United States is appreciating music possibly more than ever before, and Lubbock people are being favored with more high grade musical entertainment than ever before.

MORE CHICKEN MONEY As evidence that farmers of Briscoe county are doing their part toward diversification. One local producer, John Quiggles has paid out to the farmers since the first of January more than \$13,000, for produce. During the holidays this same firm bought from the farmers 15,000 pounds of turkeys, paying them an average of 30 cents per pound. From the first of January 1927, up until April 29, 1927, this produce house bought produce as follows: Butter, fat \$4,800, Hens \$7,900, Eggs \$1,500, Junk and hides \$500. It is estimated that counting the other houses and the grocery store, restaurants and hotels that buy butter, eggs and chickens—direct from the farmers, that about \$7,000 more has been paid to the farmers, since the first of January, making a grand total of about \$20,000. This is probably the best record of any town of its size in the Panhandle country, and is indicative of the fact that Briscoe county people are becoming greatly interested in growing more farm products at home, and not depending themselves to one crop program. With a productive country as Briscoe county and the many fields of fertile soil that enables the farmers to raise most anything that is planted, and with the fair prices that are being paid for farm products the farmers ought to be in good financial condition and they seem to be. Many hogs are being shipped from Briscoe county to the markets at Fort Worth and Dallas, which places much money in the country—Quiggles Post.

Just another testimony to add to the large number of early given of the creditability of poultry raising on the South Plains and in West Texas. This year has been the greatest example of what can be accomplished along this line that has ever been offered to the public. The farmers are making good. They have learned that they need not depend upon the cotton crop for their spending money. Poultry will do the stunt. There is a fine market for chickens all the time, and eggs can be made one of the most stable priced products on the market by getting their grades down to a point of uniformity, and a system of marketing. There is no necessity for farmers and poultry raisers taking less than thirty cents per dozen for their eggs if they will market them systematically. Offer them on the market in uniformity in size and color. This is one of the things

CITIES AND LAKES

By DON E. MOWRY American Pianist and Composer Did you ever stop to think that a lake is one of the best assets a city can have? Citizens of Decatur, Ill. did. But Decatur had no lake—nothing resembling one. So, with characteristic American enterprise, they decided to make one. A large dam was constructed across the Sangamon river, on the edge of town. Lowlands surrounding it were cleared of trees and brush; certain roads and bridges were abandoned; \$250,000 was spent on a new bridge. Now Decatur has in Lake Decatur, one of the prettiest and most attractive bodies of water in Illinois. It has been stocked with fish by federal and state governments. Incidentally, it serves as a reserve city water supply.

Land values along the lake have taken a decided jump. It is proving one of the best investments Decatur ever made, and a number of neighboring Illinois cities, noting the improvement, are preparing to follow suit. Salisbury, Md. also had a lake problem—with Severn English. Salisbury is on the Wicomico river; it has a good lake within the city limits, and is only 30 miles from the Atlantic ocean. Consequently, a large marshy lake near the downtown section was more of a drawback than an asset. So city funds were voted to drain it. The marsh was filled in, and now a new federal building and a broad pavement occupy the former site. Decatur and Salisbury solved the lake problem in opposite but effective ways.

Accompanying this great desire for music is a splendid instinctive discrimination between what is good and what is poor. Great sums of money have been spent to endow musical institutions. Great sums have been spent to build concert halls, and great

But today Richard Griffin, promoter, bids fair to realize his old dream of championship contention. He is a trainer of fighters who have beaten three world's champions in less than a year.

Since entering the business end of the fight game about a year ago Griffin has developed Tommy White of Houston, formerly of camp at the time. Clyde Hill (Lula), before they met "Dandy Dick," White and Hill were "in-and-outers," but since Griffin took them under his wing they have shown improvement.

White gave Finkey Mitchell, Milwaukee, a beating in June last July. Finkey was junior welter champion at the time. Clyde Hill beat Pete Letos, welterweight champion of the world, at Dallas in February this year and White beat Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion in a match at Dallas, March 25. He fought a draw with Willie Harmon in Madison Square Garden, New York on April 5.

All of the fights were no-decision affairs, as they were when Griffin was taking the number of champs, but the newspaper critics gave the verdicts to Griffin's protégés.
