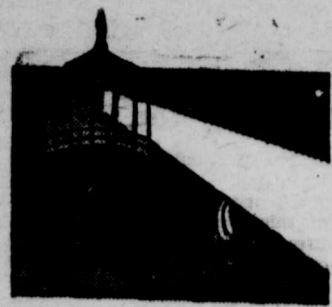




On The BEAM

Fred B. Ison Dry Goods Store Is Sold to Oklahoma Man & Moved

The Fred B. Ison stock of dry goods, owned and managed for the past two years and a half by Mrs. Henri Gay Ison, was sold last Thursday, November 8, to Mr. Richard M. Massad of the Lad and Lass Shop in Lawton, Oklahoma. The stock was packed by Mr. Anderson, Mr. Massad's partner, who operates their outlet store in Lawton, and shipped by truck on November 9.

The Ison store was established in February 1934 in one of the Ohlenbusch buildings which it had continued to occupy until last Friday. It carried the name of Fred B. Ison, the founder, as style of the firm even after Mr. Ison's death. The business had as its slogans: Pays to Buy Cash and Nationally Advertised Brands of Merchandise.

The name of Fred B. Ison has been almost continuously connected with the dry goods business in Loraine and Mitchell County, except for World War I and Ranger boom interruption, since Mr. Ison went to work for Gus Adams in 1912 in a building where the cheese plant now is.

Mrs. Henri Gay Ison, who taught in the Loraine schools until Mr. Ison's health failed, plans to continue living in the Ison family home on Market Street, which she has occupied since she went there as a bride in 1929.

Mrs. Herman Ohlenbusch, 73, well known former Loraine resident for many years, and resident of New Braunfels since 1940, died in New Braunfels Tuesday night, November 6, from injuries sustained in a traffic accident.

Interment was in the Roscoe Cemetery Thursday, Nov. 8.

Mrs. Ohlenbusch was born in Lavaca County October 24, 1883, and was the former Emma Mueller.

Mr. and Mrs. Ohlenbusch moved to Loraine in 1911, to the present Wiley Walker farm, where they lived until 1926, then moving to the old T. J. Coffee place adjoining. In 1935 the family moved to Goldthwaite and eight years later to New Braunfels.

Mrs. Ohlenbusch was a charter member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Loraine, and at the time of her death, a member of Cross Lutheran Church in New Braunfels.

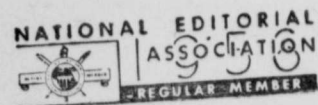
