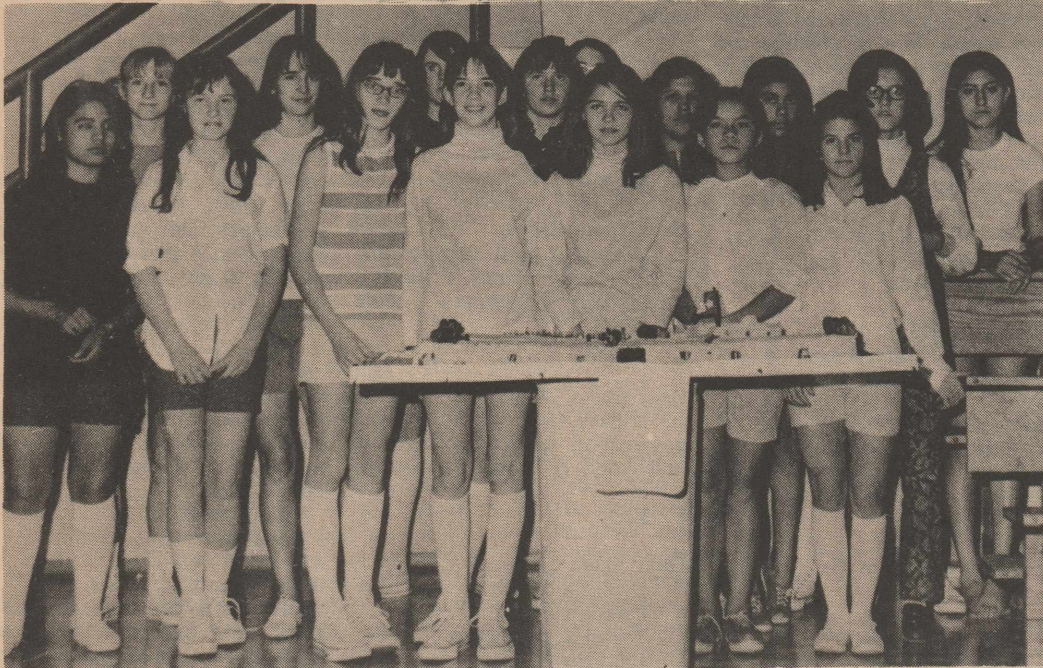

CRADLE OF TEXAS LIBERTY - Seventh grade girls social studies class will have good reason to "remember the Alamo" having made this replica of the entire mission complex as it stood before the illustrious battle.

Replica Of Alamo Designed By Girls' Social Studies Class

Girls in the seventh grade social studies class designed and constructed a replica of the Mission San Antonio de Valero which was built in the year 1718.

Called the "Cradle of Texas Liberty," only the chapel is still standing. It is today known as the Alamo.

This replica is of the mission before the Battle of the Alamo. It was founded by Father Olivares and was besieged for thirteen days by a Mexican army led by Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna.

Colonel William B. Travis was holding the city with 187 men. The Texans fell back into the mission and then back into the Alamo to fight and prepare to die fighting.

Santa Anna demanded unconditional surrender. A shot from a small cannon within the walls was the answer and the Lone Star flag was run up from the roof of the hastily improvised fort.

For thirteen days the gallant defenders of the Alamo withstood the Mexican assault.

Martinez Infant Rites Held Here

Last rites were conducted at 12:30 Saturday, Dec. 5, in St. Joseph's Catholic Church for the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Martinez.

Father Raphael Chen officiated. Burial was in Hart Cemetery under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home of Olton. The child was stillborn Friday, Dec. 4.

Other survivors include one brother and four grandparents.

But on March 6, 1836, the attackers gained entrance and in the last fierce hand-to-hand struggle every one of the Texans died fighting.

Their bodies were piled in front of the Alamo and burned, and the flame which lit that pyre ignited all Texas. The fall of the Alamo welded the scattered Texans into a united people.

The workshop, conducted by Dr. Carl Page of Lubbock, District Medical Director, was attended by Mrs. L. C. Morrison; Mrs. James Kennedy, service chairman; Mrs. Claude Forson, public education chairman and Mrs. Trent Downing, publicity chairman.

The regular monthly meeting of the group was conducted Monday with 16 members present. Also present was Dan Harris of Lubbock, district representative of the American Cancer Society.

Service items were displayed at the meeting and it was announced that two Hart clubs will help make these items, which are distributed free of charge to cancer patients in the county.

From then on, the cry was "Remember the Alamo! Remember Goliad!" Some of the men that died a noble death in the Alamo were Lieutenant Colonel William Barret Travis, commander of the garrison; Davy Crockett, the frontiersman and James B. Bonham. Approximately thirty non-combatants were spared.

Cub Scouting Under Way After Training Session

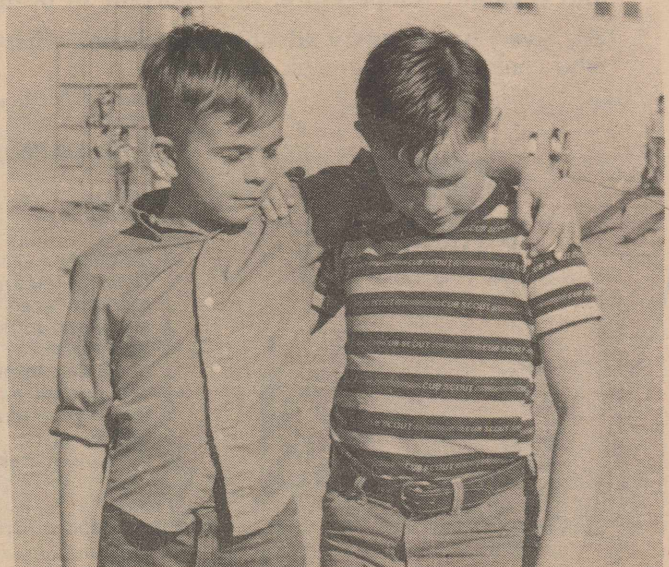

CHICKEN CHOW MEIN

Mrs. Viola Jordan, Gray County Courthouse, Pampa

- 5 lb. chicken (I sometimes use a large, fat fryer)
- 1 medium sized onion
- 1 small can mushrooms (chopped)
- 1 small package spaghetti
- 1 no. 2 can tomatoes
- 1/2 cup ripe olives (chopped)
- 3 tbs. Worcestershire Sauce
- 1 button garlic
- 3/4 lb. grated sharp cheese

Cook chicken with one button garlic until tender. Cool and bone chicken. Cook spaghetti in plain water. Saute onions, add tomatoes with a pint (2 cups) of broth. Make a paste of 2 tablespoons of flour and cold water and add to onions and tomato mixture and simmer 30 minutes. Add chicken, mushrooms, olives, spaghetti. Sprinkle grated cheese on top of mixture and bake in a large baking dish for 30 minutes in a hot, gas oven (400 degrees). Serves 10 to 12.

**Longhorn Girls Win Trophy
In Springlake Tournament**

Hart Longhorns girls came home from the Springlake basketball tournament last weekend with a second place trophy. The boys were defeated in consolation.

In the first games of the tourney, Hart's girls walloped usually tough Springlake 39-24. The boys lost a heart-breaker, 50-49, even though a last second shot went through the cords by Ricky Farris. There was some controversy on the play as fans thought he had been fouled which would have given the Horns another chance at victory.

In Friday's games, both teams bested Sudan. The girls won 37-34. The boys, playing a fine game, came out ahead 56-44.

**Tailwater Systems Prove
Their Value This Crop Year**

The past year has put many farm irrigation systems to a severe test. Extremely dry conditions farmers experienced in 1970 proved the inability of many systems to effectively handle the acreage they were normally expected to cover.

Improper planning - perhaps! Inferior management - a possibility! Not enough wells to do the job - likely! But recognizing the problem is only the first step in solving it. Farmers must look objectively at what can be done to prevent the reoccurrence or at least substantially reduce this problem.

Producers who have tailwater recovery systems are able to testify to their worth following this 1970 crop year. The desire of every producer applying irrigation water is to apply irrigation water uniformly throughout the length of his field with the highest efficiency and the lowest possible cost. Tailwater recovery systems are a sure way of doing this.

A large portion of the soil

in Castro County has a moderate intake rate. To apply water evenly across this soil, it must be applied at a rate fast enough to reach the lower end of the field before the upper end is saturated. Then the water must be allowed to run long enough to saturate the lower end. By the time this is accomplished tremendous amounts of water are lost from the furrows.

It is very common to find a tailwater recovery system returning as much as 1/3 of the original well yield. Pumping cost to return this water to the upper end is generally about 25 per cent of an equal volume of water pumped from an irrigation well.

The Soil Conservation Service in Dimmitt can provide you with assistance in planning, design, layout and installation of a tailwater recovery system for your farm.

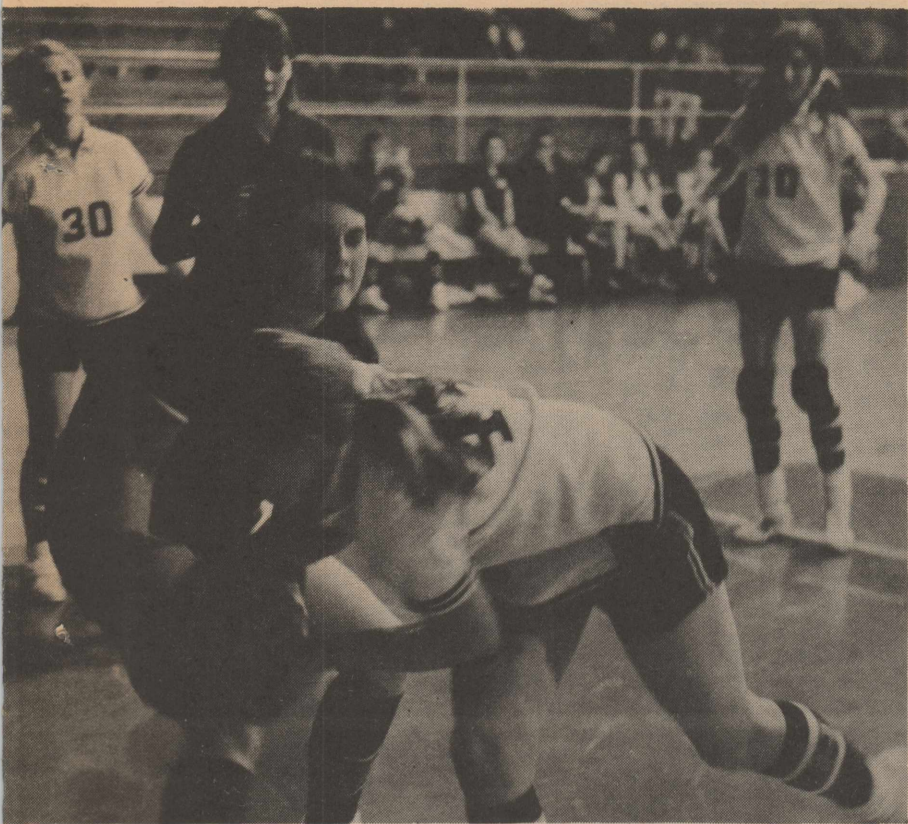

Financial Facts

A commodity base provides a built-in form of supervision over the behavior of money. The trend is increasingly

toward the issuance of non-commodity debt money. However, this built-in restraint is swiftly disappearing and governments have had to seek out substitute procedures for stabilizing currency.

These efforts have led to an expansion of the powers of central banks and to the establishment of the International Monetary Fund at the end of World War II.

The IMF was set up on the recommendation of an international conference of experts held at Bretton Woods in 1944. Its purpose is to establish foreign exchanges and its constitution provides for:

International consultation and collaboration with a view to pro-

moting exchange stability, facilitating multilateral trading throughout the world; and,

Checking disequilibrium in the balances of international payments between the member countries.

Homemakers Haven

Here it is—holiday time. Let us remember that Christmas still causes the thoughts of men to turn toward those values which abide in our changing times. It is the one season of the year when all of us seem to remember the eternal truths that the Christ Child symbolizes. We realize that without love for God and man in our hearts, our lives are empty and purposeless. Through the miracle of giving, Christmas offers us an opportunity to show our interest and affection, our sympathy and compassion, our love and good will toward man. A nice gift might be a homemade cake, pie, box of candy or even a friendly visit. The main thing is to not give way to cynicism and mutter that Christmas has become commercialized. It never will be, unless you let it be. Christmas is not commercialized unless you have commercialized it.

ROAST TURKEY

For a beautiful golden-brown turkey to carve at the table, place turkey breast up in a shallow roasting pan. Roast at a low temperature according to the following chart. Place a tent of aluminum foil loosely over bird when turkey has started to brown or when turkey is first put into oven it may be covered with a white cloth dipped in melted oil. When cooked this way, the breast meat of the turkey will be less moist than the thigh meat.

Set oven at 325 degrees.
8 to 12 pounds - 4 to 5 hours
12 to 16 pounds - 5 to 6 hours
16 to 20 pounds - 6 to 7 1/2 hours. For extra well done, add 5 to 10 minutes per pound.

BASIC DRESSING RECIPE

1 loaf light bread, toasted
1 small recipe of corn bread
2 c. celery, chopped
1 onion, chopped
1 to 2 T. poultry or sausage seasoning
6 hard boiled eggs, chopped
Broth to make dressing proper consistency

Put toasted light bread into large bowl and cover with cold water. Let set until bread has softened then put into colander to drain. After it has drained, add corn bread and mix well. Then add celery and onion, that has been simmered until tender, either in some of the broth or water with butter added. Mix thoroughly, add seasoning and eggs. Add enough broth to make it proper consistency. Put into a well buttered pan to bake until bubbling and browned in 375 degree oven. Bake approximately 1 hour.

GRITS

Cook until done:
8 c. boiling water
1 T. salt
2 c. grits

Add:

1 1/2 sticks oleo
1 roll garlic cheese
2 T. Sherry
2 T. Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. Tabasco sauce
2 beaten eggs
1 can green chilies

Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

VANILLA CLUSTERS

Mix in saucepan:

1 c. sugar
1 pkg. Vanilla Pudding and Pie Filling Mix (4 oz.)
1/2 c. evaporated milk
1 T. butter

Cook over medium heat to full rolling boil, reduce heat, cook and stir constantly for 3 minutes. Remove from heat and add 1 cup pecans. Beat until begins to thicken, then drop by teaspoons full on wax paper. For a variation, use one package chocolate pudding mix and one small can salted peanuts. You can also use different kinds of mix and still use pecans.

24 HOUR ANGEL SALAD

2 c. cooked chilled white rice
1 lb. can fruit cocktail, drained
1 - 303 can pineapple chunks, drained
1 c. Yogurt
1 c. finely chopped dates
3 oz. flaked cocoanut
1 lb. pkg. miniature marshmallows

Day before serving, combine chilled rice, fruit cocktail, pineapple, dates, cocanut, marshmallows, and Yogurt. Refrigerate in bowl with tight lid. Toss occasionally. When ready to serve, stir up fruit mixture, pile lightly in bowl and serve.

CRANBERRY SALAD

1/2 lb. raw cranberries, ground
1 c. fresh grapes, cut fine
2 whole apples, shredded or sliced thin
Pour over these 3/4 cup sugar and let stand over night or until it has mellowed. Then dissolve 1 package of raspberry

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Jello with 1 cup water (there will be juice enough on the fruits to make rest of liquid) When Jello has cooled, pour over the cranberries, apples and grapes.

QUICK CANDIED SWEET POTATOES

Mix 1 cup brown sugar packed, 1/4 cup water, 1/4 cup butter, and 1/2 teaspoon salt in a skillet. Cook until mixture bubbles. Add 6 to 7 cooked sweet potatoes. Cook a few minutes until potatoes are caramelized. Then place potatoes in baking dish, dot with marshmallows and place in moderate oven until tops of marshmallows turn golden brown.

LEMON CHESS PIE

4 eggs
2 c. sugar
1/4 c. milk
1/4 c. butter, melted
1 T. corn meal
1 T. flour

2 lemons and grated rind of 1 lemon

Beat eggs, then add sugar, meal, flour, butter, lemon juice and rind. Add milk last. Bake in crust in 350 degree oven until inserted knife comes out clean.

CRUSTY COCONUT PIE

1/2 c. milk
1 1/2 c. coconut
1 c. sugar
3 eggs
1/4 c. oleo
1 tsp. vanilla

Pour milk over coconut and set aside while creaming sugar and oleo. Add eggs and beat well. Then add coconut, milk and vanilla. Pour into unbaked shell. Bake 325 degrees until golden brown and firm.

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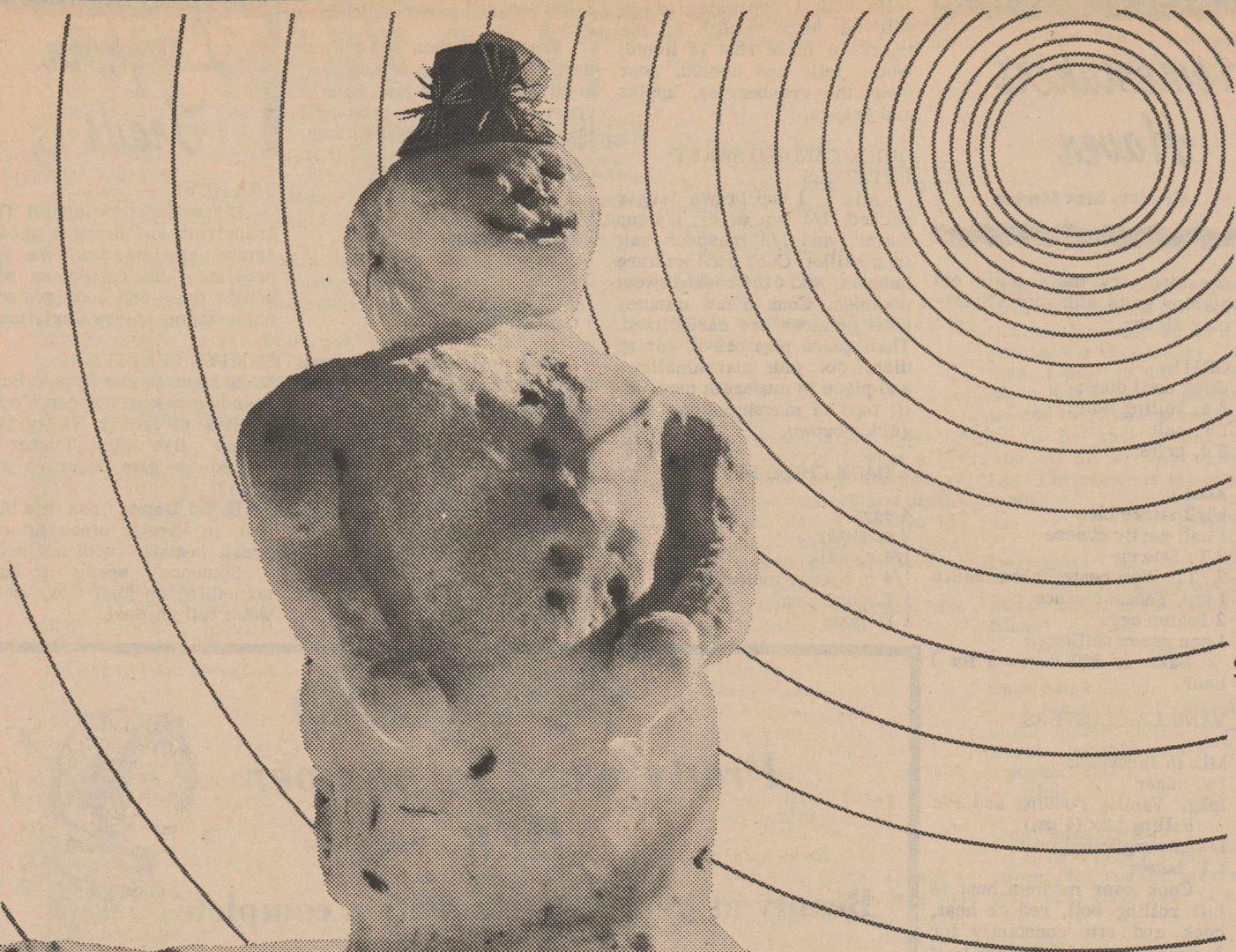

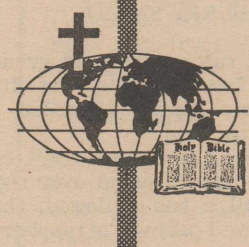
