## New Finance Bill Will Hurt County's Schools

Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook school systems will have to come up with additional local funds as a result of passage of the new school finance bill by the Texas legislature Monday.

Many legislators said the bill wasn't good, but the best they could come up with.

School administrators in Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook would probably concur with that opinion, as it seems to hurt most the school districts in this general area and especially small rural schools.

Colorado ISD superintendent Lloyd McKee has said that the local school district will have to come up with \$118,000 in additional funds for the 1975-76 school year and even more than that the following year, making

### Methodist Ministers Appointed

### Sentenced To Three Years

John Edward Miles, 17, of Colorado City, waived jury trial and was tried before 32nd District Judge Weldon Kirk Monday.

Miles had his earlier 2-year probation sentence on a forgery charge dismissed, as well as a previous indictment for sale of LSD, and was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary in Huntsville on a purse-snatching charge, a theft constituting a third degree felony.

Miles had been arrested and held in county jail since May 25 and will receive credit for the time already served.

the second year's local fund assignment about \$454,000. The breakdown of that total is as follows:

--74-75, local funds amounted to about \$168,000.

--75-76, local funds will have to be about \$286,000.

--76-77, local funds will increase to about \$454,000.

The former ratio of state-local funds has been changed from the 80-20 for the past year to 75-25 this coming year

and about 70-30 for the following year.

Loraine ISD superintendent L. R. Dunn also said the Loraine school system would be hurt by the increase in local fund assignments. From a present local share of \$18,000, the increase will amount to \$45,000 raised locally in 1975-76 and \$55,000 from local monies in 1976-77.

Dunn said since he hasn't seen a copy of the bill, he doesn't know if the figures shown above must be added together or whether that is the amount to be raised each year by the Loraine school district.

According to preliminary figures he had, Dunn estimated that funds from state sources would be used mainly for the teachers pay raise which was part of the new bill. He estimated an increase of \$39,000 in state funds for 1975-76 but said that \$30,000 would be for teachers salaries.

L. M. Dawson, superintendent of Westbrook schools, also said that the Westbrook district would have to pay about \$28,000 in additional salaries, all raised locally since Westbrook is a budget balance school and receives no money from the state except for a small transportation allowance.

Both Colorado City and Loraine school administrators are discussing the possibility of changing the assessment ratios in their districts in order to raise the additional funds.

McKee said the \$118,000 increase needed from local funds possibly can be obtained from the existing budget this year. However, the additional \$168,000 required next year seems to be out of reach without a major reassessment of property or increasing the assessment ratio from 55% to 75% or 85%, which would raise the amount needed, according to information from local school officials.

Colorado City's present tax structure is based on 55% of actual value and Loraine's school taxes may have to be raised, Dunn said.

School boards of the three school districts have been held up in working on budgets for the coming year, waiting to see what the legislators would do.

Now that the finance bill has been passed, meetings will have to be held to work on budgets and school administrators and board members must come up with the additional money.

### Box Office Opens

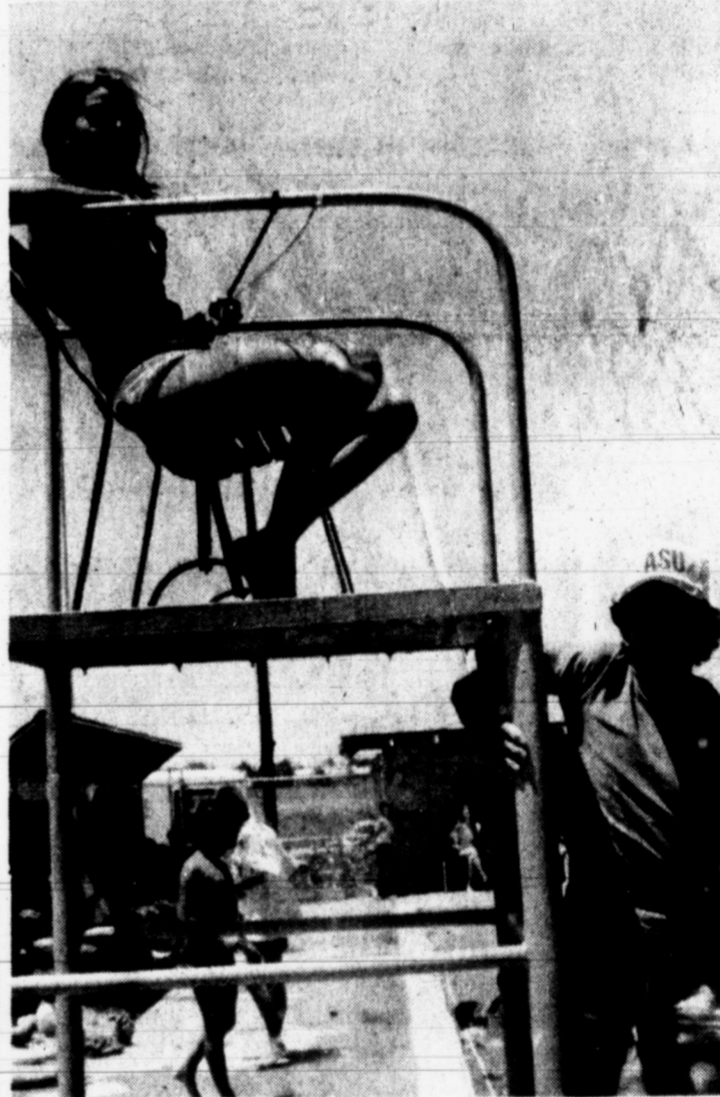
Box office opens today to the general public for reservations to the next Playhouse production of "The Silver Whistle."

## Crop Varieties List For County

Crop demonstrations have been planted in Mitchell County for the 1975 harvest through the cooperation of Mitchell County extension agent Bob Benson and county farmers.

The following demonstrations have been planted:

-- April 3, a 12-variety grain sorghum demonstration planted on the Rob and Whit Holman farm, 12 miles southeast of Colorado City.

-- April 29, an 8-variety grain sorghum demonstration planted on the Don and Curtis Latimer farm, 3 miles northeast of Colorado City.

-- May 14, a 10-variety cotton demonstration planted on the Don and Curtis Latimer place.

-- May 14, a 10-variety cotton demonstration planted on the Wayne Oliver farm 3 miles north of Loraine.

-- May 16, a 12-variety cotton demonstration planted on the Rob and Whit Holman farm.

-- May 20, a 10-variety cotton demonstration planted on the Curtis Shaw farm north of Buford Gin.

Benson said that two cotton demonstrations will be planted in the next few days on Linden Solomon's farm in the northwestern part of the county, a fertilizer demonstration and a narrow-row demonstration.

In Church League action Monday, the Loraine "A" team won over Church of Christ 11-5 and Baptist Mission won over Calvary Baptist 15-3.

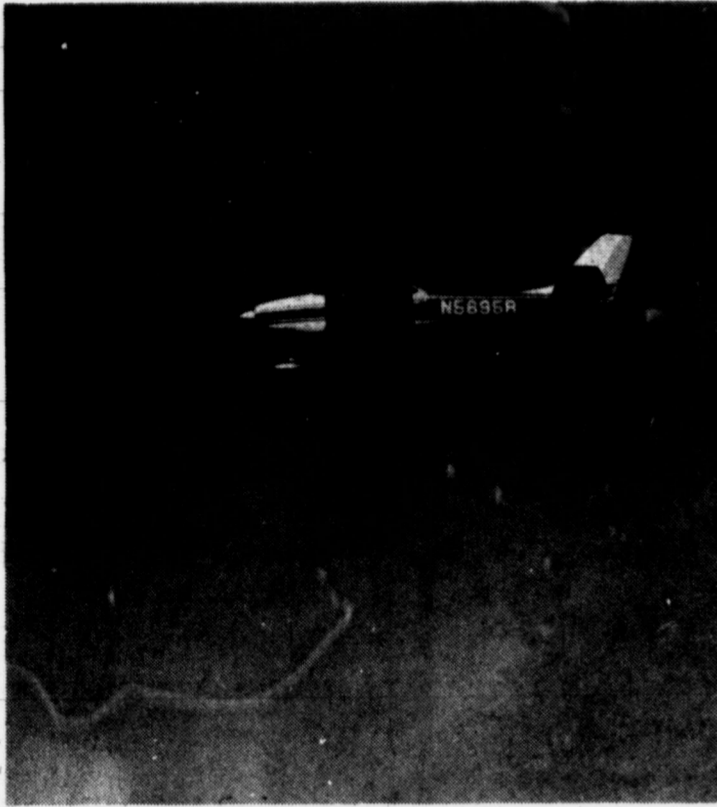
Tuesday night, St. Ann's came from behind to defeat First Baptist "A" 10-9 and Methodist "B" won over Loraine "B" 19-7.

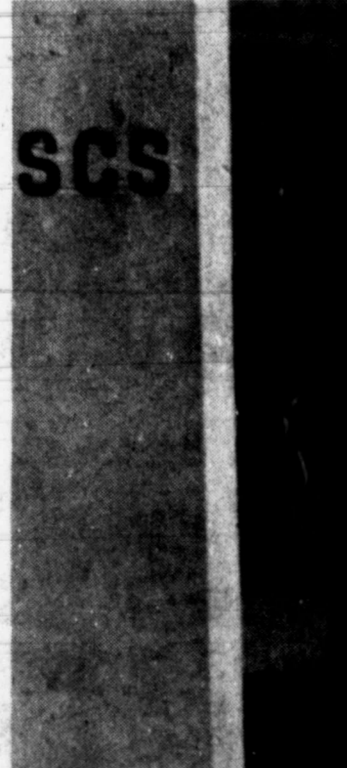

**The Monticello choo-choo.**

## Barfield, Parker Build Tri-Cycle

Harold Eugene (Gene) Barfield of Roanoke, Ala. and Norman (Buck) S. Parker of Franklin, Ga. and semi-residents of Westbrook are the owners and builders of the first tri-cycle in Mitchell County.

The tri-cycle is a three wheel vehicle which was constructed from the rear-end of a wrecked Volkswagen and the front end of a motorcycle.

In spending approximately a month on the modification and construction of the bike, Barfield and Parker traveled to many surrounding towns including Colorado City, Abilene, Big Spring, Odessa and Snyder looking for the badly needed parts.

The tri-cycle, itself, consists of headers, super mag wheels, 10 inch wide low profile M60 tires, wheelie bars, beer keg (which was constructed for a gas tank), king-queen seat,issy bar, molteeze cross mirrors, and taillights, and other standard equipment.

The bike, being constructed with a Volkswagen motor, has a stick shift located where a motorcycle usually carries the motor. The bike has a reverse, first, second and third gear.

Barfield and Parker, both 25 years of age, arrived in Colorado City in late March. Since early April, they have been employed by Whitesides Construction Company in Westbrook.

Barfield is employed as a mechanic for T.A. and W.D. Whitesides. He was formerly in the Green Beret division of the army.

Parker is employed at Whitesides Construction Company as a roustabout pusher in the oil fields. He worked as a highline electrician for Georgia Power Company.

Their next project is to build two choppers, a modified motorcycle.
