### All Producers In County Urged To Cast A Ballot

Convenient Polling Places Will Be Provided For All Who Will Vote Saturday

With the Cotton Referendum Election scheduled for next Saturday, officials are urging every landlord, tenant or sharecropper to come out and vote, whether they are for the allotment in 1941, or against it.

A great deal of publicity has been given to this election in an effort to get as representative a vote as possible, as in former years, only a small percentage of those qualified to cast a vote have shown interest enough to go to the polls.

The AAA Quota method has been officially adopted by a majority for the past two years, but it must be voted on each year, to see whether or not it will be continued.

The voting, which will begin at 9 A. M. Saturday morning, will be strictly private, with each one voting being the only one to know how his vote is cast.

For all cotton producers convenience, the following list of polling places has been provided for residents of Dawson County: O'Donnell at the Highway Filling Station; Lamesa, in the Court House; Ackery, in the school house; Welch, in the school auditorium, and Patricia in the Co-op Gin Office.

A series of meetings have been conducted over the county so as to acquaint cotton producers with the proposition and explain how the marketing quota will be set up in 1941, in the event the majority approve the referendum.

The main thing, officials state, is that everyone who has a vote coming, to vote Saturday, regardless of whether his vote be for or against the marketing quotas.

### Dawson County Ginnings Slightly Ahead Of 1939 With 26,959 Bales November 14

Estimates Of Ginnings Place Yield About Same As 1939 With Much Longer Ginning Season Seen

Cotton ginnings in Dawson County are slightly ahead of 1939, according to figures released this week by R. S. Stanfield, special agent of the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census.

Prior to November 14th, 1940, there had been ginned a total of 26,959 bales in this county as compared with 26,462 bales on the same date in 1939.

There had been a total of 23,849 bales ginned prior to November 1st, which was the last previous government report on the crop for this year.

Ginning is reported as very slow during the past two weeks by gins over the county, with the explanation that many pickers have gone back to South Texas, and that much of the crop is now being gathered by local people.

Estimates place the total yield as approximately the same as last year with some few claiming that more will be ginned in 1940 than in the preceding year.

## Old - New Commissioners Court Go On Record As In Favor Of Road Bond Issue

At a recent meeting of the present, as well as the incoming Commissioner's Court, every member went on record as favoring the voting of the proposed Road Bond Issue, as the only safe way to handle the road situation in Dawson County, according to a statement made today by a member of the Court.

It was pointed out at the meeting that there would be absolutely no additional tax upon the property of the county to pay off this issue, as it would be retired from the State gasoline tax.

It was further shown, that only those counties, which have such an issue, can hope to participate in this tax highway, as all funds from the State Highway Department will go towards the building of roads, only that are important to the National Defense.

This bond issue will take care of all building and maintenance of state roads in the county, and will enable the county to use its funds for the building of lateral or farm to market roads.

It was further shown that other counties in the state are voting issues as rapidly as possible so as to share in this tax, sixteen million dollars worth having already been voted by various counties over the state.

"As a matter of our own self-protection, we deem it necessary and important that the voters of Dawson County go to the polls and cast their vote in favor of these bonds," a member of the Court said, "I will surely regret it later on, as we have nothing to lose in voting the issue, and everything to gain."

## Death Picks The Holidays

### December's Fatal Accident Quota Is 3,500 For The Nation

There's a linsel decorated town this Christmas season with 3,500 care free men, women and children in it. They smile now, untouched by tragedy.

Ruddy faced from December's nippy cold, but bright eyed with anticipation of good things to come, they call cheerful greetings to each other as they scurry along on workaday errands. Sudden death is hiding just ahead.

At intersections, red-clad Santa Claus smile, ring their tinkling bells and slap their arms about their fat stomachs, keeping warm as they hover close to their money pots. Evergreen streamers, twined with bright red, trail from wires overhead. Christmas decorations now; but the evergreen has to do with death, too.

Ere Christmas these 3,500 will be dead. The town wiped out. Not European, to be ravaged by war, but American, to be blighted by tragedy, that stalks streets and highways.

This is, of course, a mythical town. But the people aren't imaginary. They are live, active people walking the streets of bustling cities and towns and riding the nation's highways.

**Widely Scattered**  
They are scattered in a thousand places, but enough to populate a thriving little county seat. They have this in common: Be-

fore Christmas they will be the victims of December's fatal traffic accidents.

"That's not a pretty Christmas picture, but December's not entirely a happy holiday month because death takes no holiday," says W. G. Johnson, chief statistician for the National Safety Council, who has analyzed December's traffic deaths.

"The Christmas month is the outstanding candidate for doubtful honors as the worst traffic death month of the year. Perhaps it is a discordant note to mention a gruesome topic just at the start of the holiday season. But if we can save 100 lives, or 10 lives or even only one life by doing so, and pointing to the danger of December's traffic, it will have been worth the price.

### Normal Toll Is 3,500

The normal December toll is 3,500 lives. This usually is equalled in number by October, but mileage travelled in October is ten per cent greater than December's. That makes the Christmas month the most dangerous.

"The averages for the past three years show that, mile for mile, December traffic is more than one and one-half times as deadly as that of June, one of the big summer travel months.

"The records of the few states that we studied analytically disclosed that the actual Christmas season is the most dangerous of the year."

Johnson said many factors are involved in causing December accidents.

"Accidents on rural highways soar uniformly high during the last four months of the year, but city deaths rise sharply to a December peak," he said.

### Night Accidents Soar

"Night accidents soar in the winter. About 2,500 of the usual 3,500 December deaths occur during darkness.

"Among persons under 24 years old many other months take a larger traffic toll, but for all ages over 25 the month of December is the most severe. It is the peak month for pedestrian deaths in all age groups 15 years and over.

"It appears that a combination of weather, light conditions and Christmas season travel is the cause of the holiday death toll."



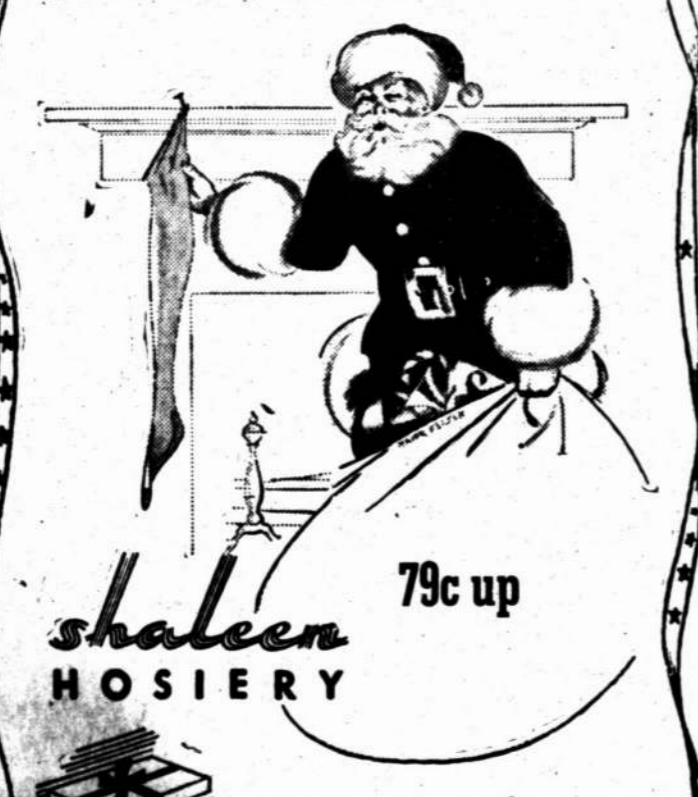

## South Plains Cotton Ginnings Exceed 1939

For the first time this season 1940 cotton ginnings exceeded those of 1939 for the corresponding date, when totals up to Nov. 14 showed 322,157 bales compared to 315,808 for last year.

Hockley County leads the area, with 45,893 bales to place 14th in the state; Lamb County is a close second with 41,174 bales to place 16th in the state, and Lubbock is third with 39,036 bales to rank 15th.

Net increase is 7,077 bales. For the state, ginnings were 2,728,505 this year compared to 2,544,264 a year ago.

Eleven counties in this area show increases over 1939; Bally, Briscoe, Cochran, Dawson, Floyd, Gaines, Hockley, Lamb, Motley, Scurry and Terry.

Lynn County ranks fourth in the area; Dawson, fifth; Terry, sixth and Bally seventh. All of these counties gained more than 20,000 bales.

Leading the state is Ellis with 65,064 bales, compared to 71,274 a year ago; Collin is second with 64,879 bales compared to 58,628; Ft. Bend is third with 60,751 bales compared to 32,851 bales; Fannin is fifth with 56,641 bales compared to 49,805; Nueces is sixth with 53,915 bales compared to 78,615 and Wharton is seventh with 53,126 bales compared to 35,470.

Going into Open Market Jones County ranks 12th; Runnels 21st; Haskell, 23rd among other West Texas counties.

Approximately 50,000 bales were ginned over this area during the first two weeks in November. The Dec. 1 totals will not, it is believed, show that much of an increase over the mid-November total.

A higher portion of cotton now being ginned is going into the open market as rains have reduced the price to below that acceptable to the Commodity Credit Corporation, except with a penalty that puts the loan below the open market.

### Diphtheria More Prevalent During Winter Weather

In as much as cold weather is now here and colds and sore throats are very prevalent, we cannot overlook the hazard of diphtheria. Your children can be protected from diphtheria safely and simply. Diphtheria is a disease caused by a germ which is passed from one person to another by kissing, sneezing or handling the same article. Sometimes the germ may get into a child's nose or throat from a person who is carrying the germs. It kills infants and small children. It can kill in two ways, either by choking a child to death or by the membrane of diphtheria in the throat as deadly as a strangling hand, or the poison it produces can attack the heart, so that a child, who is to all appearances well and ready to get about, may collapse when he begins to run and play.

It is unnecessary for any child to suffer from diphtheria. Protection against this disease is possible by the early use of such preparations as Tonsil. About 90 per cent of all deaths from this disease occur before the age of five years. It may be too late to protect the child adequately if the parents wait until the child is in school. Every infant should be protected against diphtheria during the first years of life. Tonsil will make 90 to 95 per cent of children immune or safe from the disease. wingmen offensively. In fact, the tall stringy lad was shoved into the backfield for duty near the windup of the campaign when the Sweetwater coach, Larry Erddy, was short of ball toters. Most of the circuit's mentors agreed that he is the best pass snatcher in the loop.

Clifton Patton, a 210-pounder from Big Spring, gets the call at one tackle berth. This young giant had an important part in the excellent line play of the champion Steers, shining especially on the defense.

The other tackle is manned by Raymond Evans, defensive backbone of the Odessa forward sector.

Guard Bob Eidson closed out his fourth campaign with the Midland Bulldogs, something of a record in itself this day and time. The four-year letterman is stocky, standing only 5'9" and weighing 155. He's fast, a crushing blocker, good tackler and fine interference runner. What's more, he's a redhead.

Nal Battle of Big Spring, the other guard, is a 149-pounder with all the savvy of a high grade lineman. An excellent offensive player, Battle has gained greater distinction for his roving defensive play. He teams with Frank Barton to give Big Spring the best pair of guards in the circuit.

The center is Jack (Red) Coats, a fairly little man (160 pounds) but a mighty rugged lad. Red has no peer as a linebacker in District 3AA. He has played most of the season end to end to the backfield at times when injuries seemed to swamp the Odessans. During the campaign he had a perfect record on snappacks and his blocking on passes proved to be a big factor in helping the

Bronchos pile up a fine aerial record.

The all-district backfield includes Billy Hogan of Odessa at quarter, Wendell Williams of Midland and Gus White of Lamesa at the half-back slots and Pete Presley of Big Spring at fullback.

Hogan, a triple threat in the true sense of the word, was the 3AA leading scorer for the season, with 70 points. In his final game against Wink Hogan tabbed two touchdowns and added two points after touchdown to wind up three points ahead of Williams. Hogan played every minute of every game this season, had a punting average of better than 40 yards and completed more than half the passes he threw.

Williams is a rugged defensive man, a line backer, as well as Midland's ace ball toter. The 190-pounder had his biggest day of the year against Odessa in the Bulldogs' final conference game. Williams scored all of his team's points that afternoon to lead Midland to a 16-14 victory. He can pass and punt as well as tote the ball. He lettered two years and was converted to the backfield from end.

White is rated by many coaches, scouts and critics in this section as the best player in the district. The Lamesa back is likened to the great Boone Magnus of earlier Oil Belt days by Dewey Mayhew, Abilene coach. He's not the bruising type runner, but his change of pace and spinning gets the work done in an open field. White racked up 47 points this season and did all of the Tornadoes kicking for extra points, punting, and late in the season most of the passing.

Presley, the fullback, has the speed of a tailback and he's just about as versatile. This young man does the punting for Big Spring, plays safety and can chunk a fair

pass. He's extremely hard to bring down, running low and hard—Abilene Reporter-News.

There's only one change the Courier sports writers would have made in this team, and that was the placing of L. Z. Oswald of Lamesa at one of the guard positions. Oswald was the defensive backbone of the Tornado line, making as many as six and seven tackles in a row in many games to throw opposing ball carriers for losses and no gain.

Oswald played his most masterful game against Sweetwater, holding the Mustangs at bay almost single-handed until late in the game when injuries forced him out. Sweetwater scored all of its points only after Oswald went out.
