Hart Junior High tied for first place in the District Track meet Saturday in Levelland. Participants scored 44 points.

Jimmy Brown, Guillermo Carrascas, James McLain and John Henry Robinson were members of the first place 440 relay team. They finished in 50.0 seconds.

The 880 relay team of Robinson, Carrascas, Brown and Jerry Swindle also took a first place win. Their time was 1:45.5.

a 10.4 performance in the dash and a whopping 17'10" in the broad jump.

Rex Henderson, Terry Newman and Ricky Mitchell were members of the dairy cattle team.



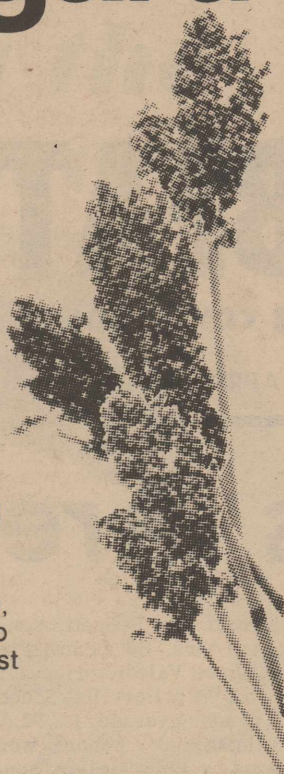

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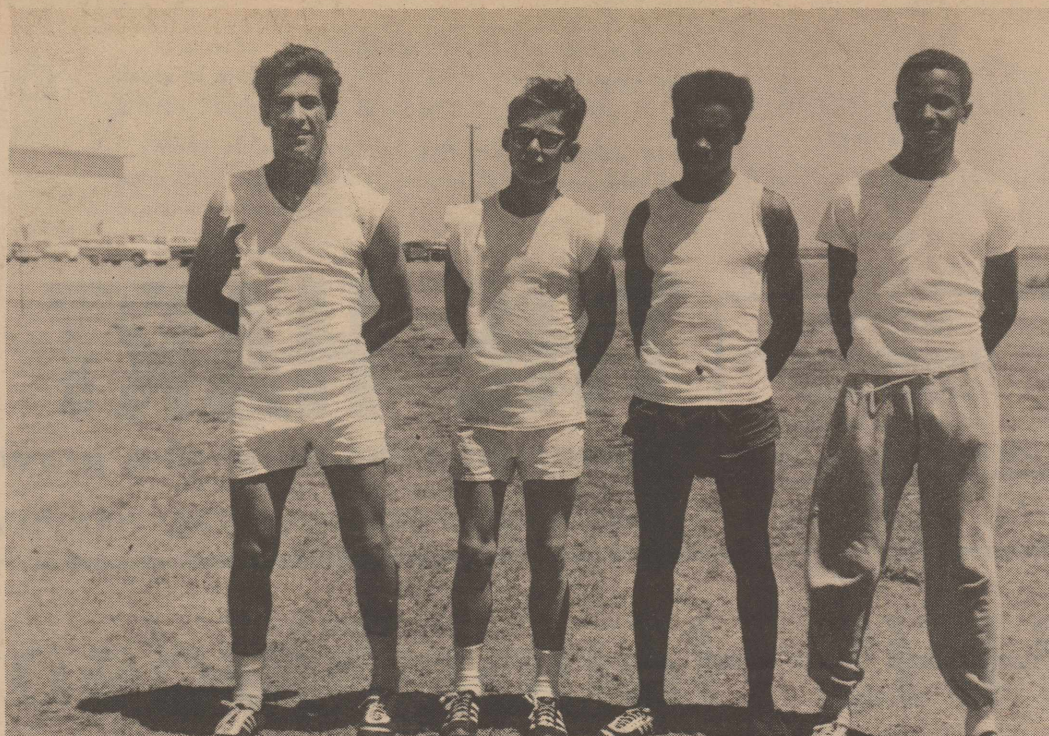

Moments OF Meditation

C. T. Cunningham, Pastor of The First Baptist Church

In chapter 2 and 3 of the Revelation, we find Jesus' words to seven of the churches. Let's look at these letters.

First we see the church which had lost its first love. (2:1-7) In many ways this was a good church. It did many good works, it worked hard and patiently, it sought the truth - but it had forgotten its early promises, and its good deeds, many though they were, could not compensate for the devotion to Christ which had become smothered in their desire to be active in good works. Good works may truly be the evidence of our abiding faith - but they also become a poor substitute for that faith.

Then there was the persecuted church that remained faithful. (2:8-11). Someone has said that what the church of today needs more than anything else is a good dose of persecution. One would hate to see

this happen; but it is true that there is nothing like persecution to eliminate the weak and vascillating, of whom we have too many in our churches.

Third, the church swayed by false doctrine. (2:12-17). This was a church that was situated in the very heart of evil teaching, and within the church were those who had been influenced by false teaching and sought to bring it into the church itself.

Fourth, the church that countenanced immorality. (2:18-29). Let me make just one statement in this regard: In the light of increasing sexual permissiveness in our day, the church cannot, must not be silent in its denunciation of evil. To remain silent is to lend our endorsement.

Next, the dead church. (3:1-6). The terrible thing about this church was that it had a fine reputation - but was DEAD. Do you know a church that fits this description?

Sixth, the church with an open door. (3:7-13). A church whose opportunities for service are such that it faces an open door - a church whose doors are open to all men - a strong church, which has kept the faith and passes through the door of opportunity in the service of her Lord.

Last, the Luke-Warm church. (3:14-22). There is nothing more nauseous than a luke-warm cup of coffee. Iced coffee, hot coffee, these are palatable; but luke-warm-ugh! And the same is true of a church which is luke-warm. To such a church God says, in effect, "You make me sick!" I think we shall have to admit that the vast majority of those whose names are enrolled in our churches cannot be described as "red-hot Christians." Most are luke-warm, paying weekly lip-service to the Christ who has done so much for them. Let us search our hearts. "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit sayeth to the churches."

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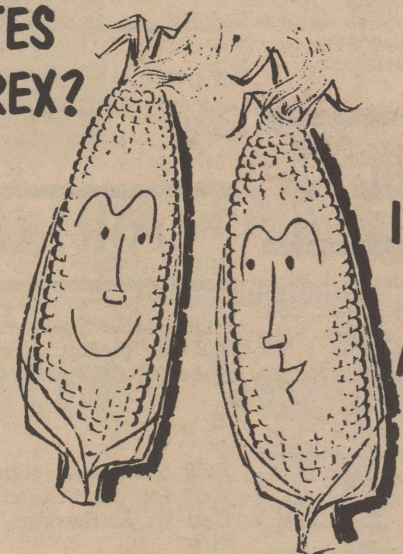


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Lucky Me, I Am An American

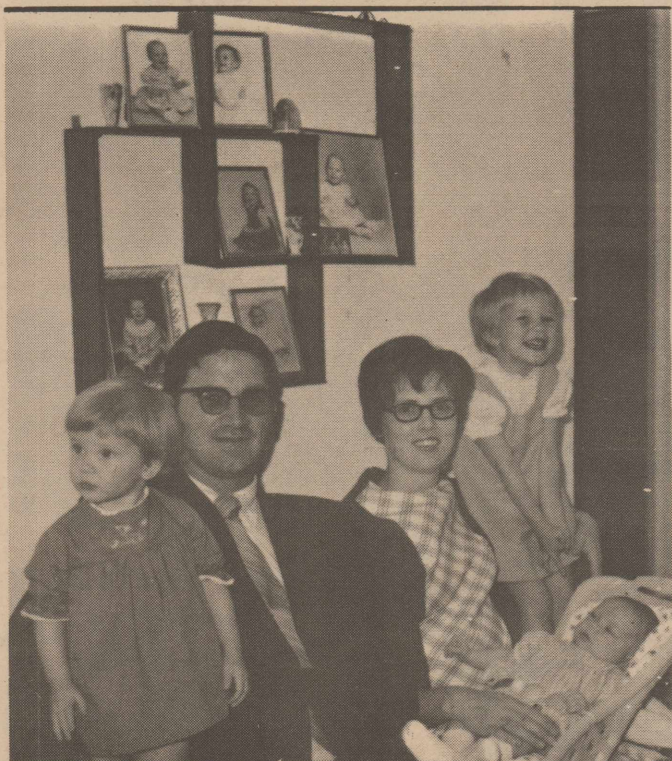
