Hereford Church People Show Proper Courtesy to the President; Special Program Given.

As announced, most of the churches joined in a Peace and Prayer Services at the court house Sunday night. The large district court room was filled to overflow, many being turned away, not being able to find a seat or convenient stand place. It is estimated that 600 people were in the room. A special program was given. Dr. G. A. Faris of the Christian church was master of ceremonies and pronounced the opening prayer. Special songs for the occasion were given by the choir made up of singers from the different churches. The different ministers had some part in the program. Rev. Henson of the Methodist church, Rev. Baker of the Presbyterian church, offered up prayers for the suffering people of Europe; Rev. Farmer made a short talk about the Red Cross Society and took up a collection for that cause, obtaining \$49.82 to send to that fund. Short addresses were made by E. W. Harrison and J. E. Garrison. The exercises were closed by the audience singing "America."

Making Future Texas Citizens.

University Station, Oct. 8.—The responsibility for the physical development of students in the University of Texas rests upon the department of Physical training. Every male freshman entering the University must furnish the department with a "Personal History Blank" properly filled out, which gives complete information concerning the physical make-up of the individual who is the subject of the same. He then undergoes a medical examination which describes his present physical condition accurately and in detail, so that any abnormal or dangerous condition can be made the subject of conference with the athletic directors; and the proper exercises prescribed for. The normal students are given the exercises calculated best to produce an all-round, healthful, symmetrical physical development.

The prime object of the department is not to produce athletes, but to develop large numbers of strong, clear-headed, healthy students. This regime consistently followed, makes unnecessary any special effort to secure athletes. They spring up naturally from among the thousands of more students engaging each year in athletic exercises at the University. As an illustration of what this system has done for the athletic teams of the University of Texas, the record of last season is illuminating. The University football team sustained but one defeat, and that at the hands of a team which defeated Westpoint and was considered among the five strongest teams of the whole country. The University basketball and soccer team were undefeated, and champions of the Southwest. The University Tennis Team came out of a hard season champion of the Southwest, and to this distinction added also the scalps of Illinois and Missouri Universities. In track athletics, the University of Texas team was victor over the holding the southern championship. University wrestlers defeated the best wrestlers of the University of Nebraska; which institution was champion of the Missouri Valley Conference. The baseball team took 23 straight victories from college teams, thus breaking the world's collegiate record for straight victories.

In short the University teams won distinction in every competitive test they entered.

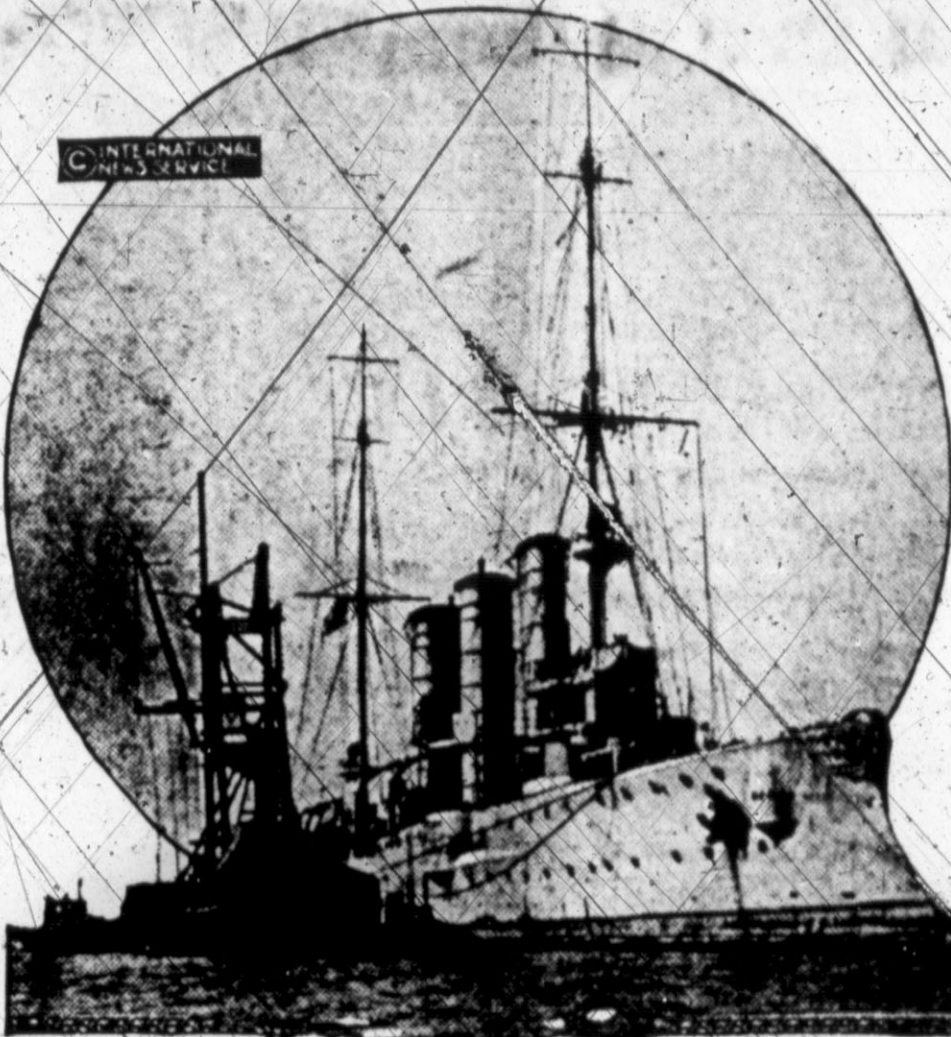

Sunday School Contest Proposed

There is some talk of two or three of the Hereford Sunday Schools engaging in a friendly attendance contest. The proposition is to figure the percentage of attendances and to compare these "batting averages." The school obtaining the highest average or rank to be declared the winner. IRRIGATION HERE BEATS IDAHO'S

Former Hereford Country Citizen Says Conditions Are More Favorable Here

James F. Harris, who left this county about four years ago for Idaho, has been here for some days on business and visiting. He has been in the irrigation districts of Idaho and upon his arrival here stated that the best improvements he saw in this section are the big irrigation wells. "Irrigation is making Idaho and irrigation will make Hereford, if the people will get down to real farming with water," he says. "You have pure water, not poisoned with weed seed, a soil that is fertile and a subsoil that will not allow the upper soil to water-log; good level land, ready for the plow and practically no hard work of leveling; straight irrigation ditches and a climate that excels anything in the United States," he added. "and there is no reason whatever that the farmers with an irrigation well should not make good money each year and become independent. The practice of good farming and the feature of speculation cut out, will bring about the desired result."

Mr. Harris is certainly speaking from experience as he has spent four years where they do not attempt anything without water. He says that they have no hard years where they can turn the water on. This only brings in first-hand evidence of what the Brand has contended for all the time. If good, common sense farming, combined with stock raising and feeding, was the rule and practice of the irrigation farmers in this section, success would crown their efforts.

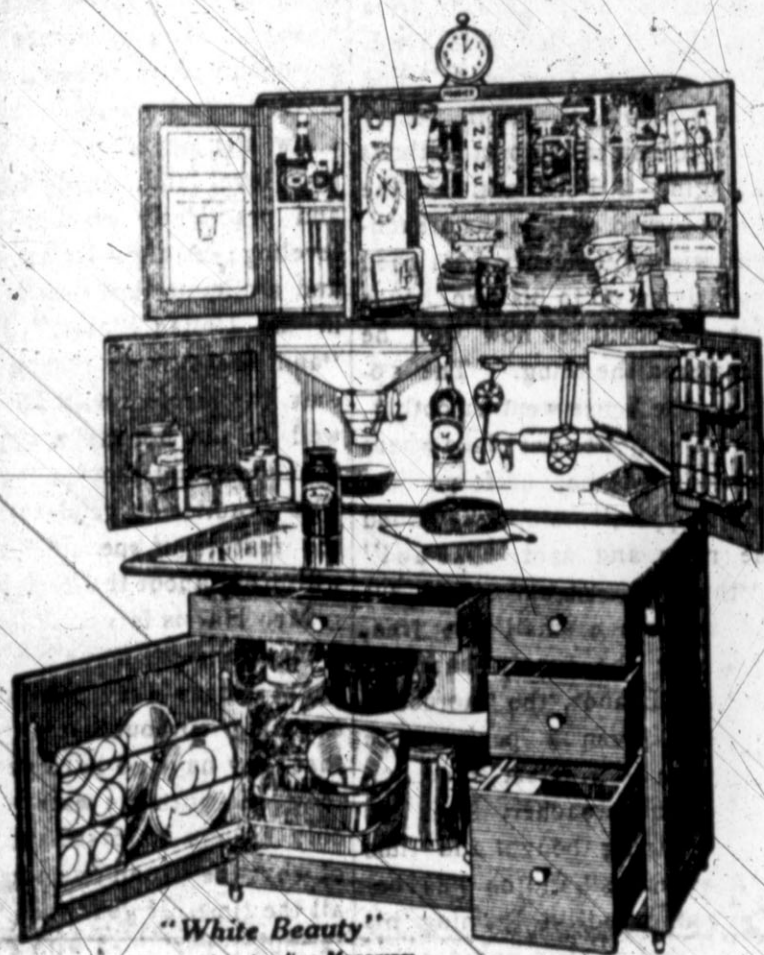

Deaf Mutes Begging.

It seems that many of the inmates of the Deaf and Dumb Institute when they leave that place for the summer vacation take to the road as veteran beggars. Many of them have visited Hereford soliciting money for the purpose, they say, of completing their education. Some of them carry with them sealed and officially signed letters from the officials at Austin. Many of them are able bodied young men with the exception of the loss of the two senses. While the loss of any one or two of the avenues of information is a great calamity to any person, when the physical strength of the unfortunate one still remains good, we think it unwise to encourage them, especially while they are young, to go about the country asking alms and money gifts of the people. If the heads of the departments and the teachers at Austin encourage such a practice, even by giving them letters of recommendation, they are doing the boy a great injustice. It teaches them to be "dependents," takes the "life" out of their ambition to forge ahead even despite their afflictions, gives them a shamefacedness which will follow them to their graves, and lastly makes "beggars" out of every one of them. We do not believe the people should give money to an able-bodied person, especially a boy or young man, who is able to go to the fields and labor or to engage in some profitable trade or business. No doubt, many of the towns have been imposed upon by those who "played the game" of being deaf. Some of our citizens saw very suspicious looking maneuvers the last time one of the deaf mute boys visited Hereford, and we believe the citizens should be careful in extending aid where there is danger of displacing their confidence.

SALARY VS WAGE

Eagle Pass News-Guide: An
American boy who wants to learn
the business in all its various de-
partments, and who has enough
stick-to-itiveness to master the pro-
fession, can get a job in this office.
We want a boy who wants a "job"
and calls his remuneration "wages,"
not one who wants a "position" and
calls his weekly stipend a "salary."
State Press: What business is it
of yours if an employe of your of-
fice is pleased to refer to his com-
pensation as "salary?" He might
even call it saleratus without afford-
ing you reasonable grounds for ob-
jection. The main question as re-
gards yourself is whether or not
your apprentice earns his pay. If
he earns it (and gets it) it is his,
and being his, he can call it what he
likes. Except etymologically, there
is no difference between a salary
and a wage. The two terms mean
the same thing, except that wage im-
plies a higher antecedent. Funda-
mentally wage means a pledge,
while originally salary meant the in-
finitesimal allowance which a soldier
received on his salt account. In
reality salary means "salt money,"
and that means that a salary isn't
much. Notwithstanding this deriva-
tion, it has become customary for
salaried persons to rebel at being
at being called wage-earners, the
theory being that a salary is higher
than a wage. Put it isn't necessar-
ily true that a salary is greater than
a wage or a wage smaller than a
salary. We read frequently of big
salaries, and not infrequently en-
counter people who claim to be
drawing them. But when Saint
Paul wished to convey to the Ro-
mans an impression of the enormity of
sin he said "The wages of sin is
death." If he had said the salary
of sin is death the expression would
have been puerile rather than, as it
stands, a lofty and austere warning
quoted ten thousand times a day.

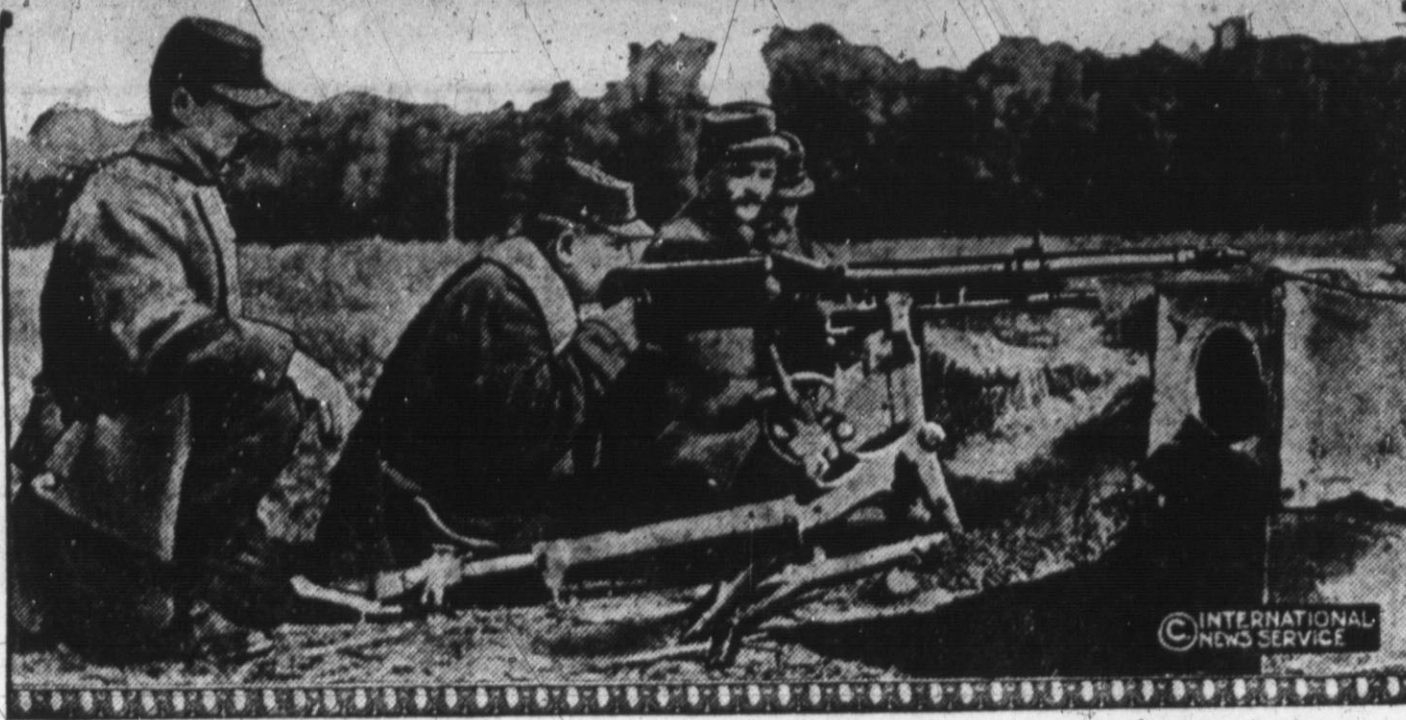

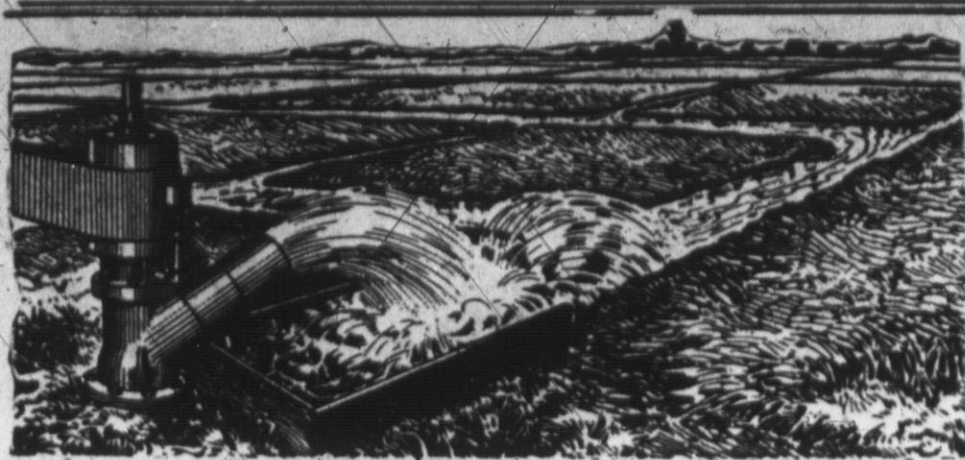

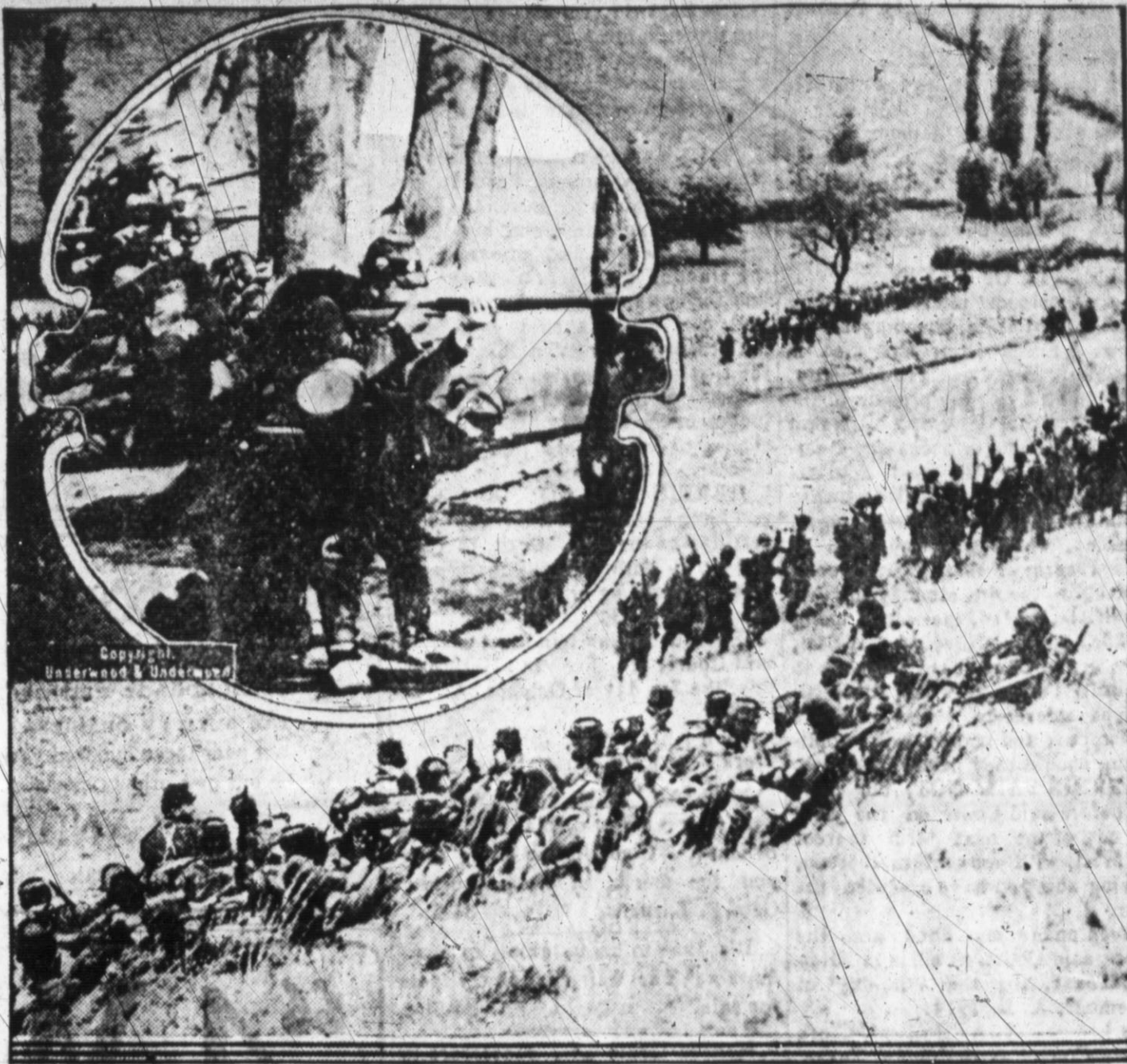

lished in the 69th judicial district; but
if there be no newspaper published
in said judicial district, then in a
newspaper published in the nearest
district to said 69th judicial district
for four weeks previous to the re-
turn day hereof, W. E. Baldwin,
Everette Baldwin, Marion Baldwin
and John Baldwin, whose residence
is unknown, to be and appear before
the Honorable District Court, at the
next regular term thereof, to be
held in the county of Deaf Smith,
at the Courthouse thereof, in Here-
ford on the second day of Novem-
ber, A. D. 1914, then and there to
answer a petition filed in said court,
on the 7th day of October, A. D.
1914, in a suit numbered on the
docket of said Court No. 833, where-
in N. R. France is plaintiff, and W.
E. Baldwin, Everette Baldwin, Mar-
ion Baldwin and John Baldwin, de-
fendants. The nature of the plain-
tiff's demand being as follows; to-
wit:

Plaintiff avers that on or about
the first day of March 1914, he was
the owner of 160 acres of land situ-
ated in Deaf Smith County, Texas,
and being the S. E. 1/4 of Survey
No. 23, in Block K-11, Certificate
No. 4-555 issued to the G. C. & S.
F. R. R. Co.

Plaintiff claims to own said tract
of land and that he is entitled to
possession thereof.

Plaintiff avers that on the 10th
day of March, 1914, the defendants
unlawfully entered said premises
and dispossessed plaintiff thereof,
and still holds said premises.

Plaintiff further avers that on the
9th day of April 1908, the defend-
ant W. E. Baldwin, together with
his wife, Jennelle Baldwin, made,
executed and delivered to plaintiff,
their five promissory notes in writ-
ing, bearing date last above men-
tioned, by the terms of which they
promised to pay to plaintiff the sum
of \$416.00 on or before March 1st,
1910, 1911, 1912, 1913, and 1914
respectively, all notes bearing inter-
est from date at the rate of 6 per
cent per annum, interest payable an-
nually, each of said notes providing
that interest, if not paid when due,
should become principal and bear
interest from due date at same rate
of interest as the notes, said notes
also providing for the usual 10 per
cent attorney's fees if placed in the
hands of an attorney for collection.
That by the execution of said notes
herein mentioned, the said W. E.
Baldwin and Mrs. Jennelle Baldwin
became liable and promised to pay
plaintiff the several sums of money
in each one of the notes specified.
That all of the notes are long since
due and unpaid to plaintiff's damage
in the sum of \$3,000.00.

Said notes were given as part pur-
chase price for the tract of land
heretofore described herein; that
vendors lien was retained in the
deed of conveyance and defendants
are hereby notified to produce said
deed on the trial hereof or second-
ary evidence will be offered of its
contents.

Plaintiff further avers that Mrs.
Jennelle Baldwin, who was known as

Nellie Baldwin, has since died leav-
ing three children of herself and W.
E. Baldwin, said three children be-
ing minors and have no guardian of
their person or estate in the State
of Texas.

Plaintiff prays that defendants be
cited to appear and answer this pe-
tition as required by law, and that
on final hearing he have his judg-
ment for the title and possession of
the tract of land herein sued for,
and for costs of suit. But in event
that the court should hold that
plaintiff is not entitled to recover
the title and possession of the land
above described, then he prays for
judgment for his debt and the fore-
closing of the vendors lien on the
land above described.

you before said Court, on the said
first day of the next term thereof,
this Writ, with your endorsement
thereon, showing how you have ex-
ecuted the same.

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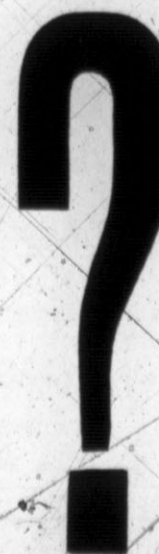
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
