Veteran Official Ends Courageous Battle For Life

Aged Cabinet Member Dies
As Result Of Emergency
Appendicitis Operation In
Washington Hospital

Fights Until Last

Funeral Services Will Be
Held In Wing Of White
House Wednesday Morning
In Hoover's Presence

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—James W. Good, secretary of war, died tonight after a blood-poisoning finally overwhelmed his courageous resistance.

The cabinet member died at Walter Reed hospital, where last Wednesday he underwent an emergency operation for appendicitis. Since then he had wavered, seldom conscious.

Unconscious All Day
He was unconscious throughout the day and hope had been abandoned hours before death occurred at 3:37 p. m.

Attending physicians were surprised in view of Mr. Good's 63 years by the vitality which enabled him to survive so long while infection permeated his system. Several times this evening it was thought he had taken his last breath, but the doctors bent over him and discerned a faint life.

Just before lapsing into the final unconsciousness, the secretary of war had turned to one of his physicians and said feebly: "I have never lost a fight in my life and I am not going to lose this one."

Optates Given
Toward the end opiates and oxygen were administered regularly to ease his pain and reinforce his strength. The stupor determined to live persisted but weakness

Patients Rescued In Hospital Fire

Over Hundred Are Rushed
To Other Buildings With
Explosion In X-Ray Room
—Damages Heavy

(By Associated Press)

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18.—One hundred and two patients in the University of California hospital here were rushed to other buildings for safety today after an explosion in the X-ray department on the third floor started a fire that imperiled the building.

The blaze did not only a few thousand dollars damage, but over \$15,000, being confined to corridors and four rooms. The only casualty reported was Miss Juanita Costenbader, night telephone operator, who leaped from a third floor window after sounding telephone warnings throughout the building and calling the fire department. She injured an ankle.

216 In Hospital
There were 216 patients in the hospital, but more than half of them were left undisturbed in wings of the building not considered endangered. The entire equipment of the San Francisco fire department answered the alarm, and the situation was cleared up in a comparatively short time.

"Doc" Stewart Is Shot To Death By Companion Hunter

Former Texas University
Football Coach Victim Of
Accidental Shooting During
Hunting Trip

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 18. (P)—J. W. O'Brien, San Antonio oil well operator, today at 4:30 p. m., aimed at a deer, shot and killed E. J. Stewart, the "Doleful Doc," of University of Texas football, 30 miles from Kerrville.

The shooting was accidental. Stewart and O'Brien were hunting in a pasture together. Bill James, University of Texas line coach, and C. A. Bradford of Austin, G. I. Hoffman and G. N. Hoffman, Illinois, and H. W. Dew, Houston capitalist, who started out with Stewart and O'Brien, were hunting in another pasture.

Hit By Buckshot.
The accident occurred at the Frank Hatch place, known also as the old Kemp place, 30 miles from the heart of the Hills hotel, Stewart operated at Kerrville. O'Brien was 25 feet from Stewart when he fired at the buck. A charge of buckshot struck Stewart with full force.

Youthful Fliers Plunge To Death

Two Cadets Are Instantly
Killed As Plane Crashes
Near San Antonio; Both
Men Flying Graduates

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 18.—Flying Cadets Justin E. Russell, 27, and George S. Coffey, 23, members of the observation section, Kelly field, were killed almost instantly shortly after noon Monday when the plane in which they were flying crashed near the edge of a field 11 miles north of Boerne.

Cadet Russell was dead when nearby farmers reached the demolished plane. Coffey, pilot, died ten minutes later.

Wrote Near Ground
According to witnesses, the plane evidently was descending for a landing and was within 50 feet of the ground when the nose of the ship suddenly lowered and crashed.

Both men were graduates of the primary flying school at March Field, Riverside, Calif., and entered the advanced flying school here in October.

Cadet Russell gave his home address as 8115 Desert avenue, Chicago. Cadet Coffey gave his address as 315 Kearney street, Atchison, Kansas.

MIDLAND YOUTH KILLED
MIDLAND, Nov. 18. (P)—Charles Frank Latham, 18 year-old Midland boy was killed on a Brewster county ranch yesterday when his gun discharged accidentally. Latham was taking his rifle from the back of automobile when the accident occurred.

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Marshall Ratliff Wounds Deputy In Attempted Escape

Famous Cisco "Santa Claus"
Bandit Overpowered By
Other Officers Before He
Could Make Escape

Shot Three Times

Victim Has Little Chance
To Recover; Ratliff Ends
Period Of Motionless In
Tory For Freedom

(By Associated Press)

EASTLAND, Nov. 18.—Marshall Ratliff sentenced to death for his part in the Cisco "Santa Claus" bank robbery shot and wounded his jailer Tom Jones, in a spectacular, but unsuccessful attempt to escape tonight.

Feeling against the bank robber, who was returned here recently from the death cell in the state penitentiary for a sanity hearing, was running high in Eastland tonight as Jones, wounded three times, fought for life at the hospital.

Lain Motionless.
Ratliff, since his return here, had lain motionless upon his cot simulating paralysis and had done it so well that jail authorities had become convinced he was unable to move. He had to be moved from the cot and the jailers fed him his food.

Tonight Deputy Sheriff Jones and jailer E. P. Gilbert went to the cell block to feed the prisoners and left the door to Ratliff's cell open. The prisoner slipped out while they were feeding the other prisoners, descended to the jail office and obtained his parole.

Earthquake Rocks New England Area

Alarm Caused By Tremors
Along Coastline Monday;
Buildings Tremble And
Furniture "Dances"

(By Associated Press)

BOSTON, Nov. 18.—An earthquake shook the eastern coastline from Rhode Island northward to Newfoundland today. Buildings trembled, furniture was moved and considerable alarm caused by the tremor which occurred at approximately 3:35 p. m. and was felt at intervals up to 4 o'clock.

Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, New Brunswick and all the New England states felt the shock. The trembling of the earth was felt as far west as Albany, N. Y.

Center Determined
The center of the quake was believed to be near Nova Scotia, as the shock was more severe there than in any other place. The only reports of serious damage came from Nova Scotia, where several isolated places it was said that houses had been torn from their foundations and the bridge from bridge at Grand Narrows near Cape

Sensational Murder Trial Of George McManus Opens

Death Of Broadway
Gambler Echoes
In Courtroom

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Two were chosen but only one juror remained when the first day of the trial of George A. McManus, accused of the murder of Arnold Rothstein, Broadway gambler and racketeer, was adjourned today.

Mark H. Simmons, a stock broker and the sixteenth taleman called for examination, was selected as the first juror but two hours later he was excused when a doctor's certificate was presented saying he was suffering from stomach ulcers.

Salesman Chosen
Eugene A. Riker, a traveling salesman who had been out of the city a great deal during the past year in which the Rothstein case has been front page news much of the time, thus remained the sole juror in the jury box at the end of the day.

Judge Charles G. Nott, Jr., of general sessions, presiding, allowed Riker to go to his home for the night after first exacting from him a promise not to discuss the case with anyone.

James D. C. Murray, defense counsel, challenged all the talemen who had been previous jury duty in a murder trial, especially in which the evidence was circumstantial. Assistant District Attorney George N. Broderick examined especially on any prejudice that might have been engendered in the prospective jurors' minds by criticism of the police and the district attorney, voiced by administration opponents in the recent city elections.

STARRED TO DEATH
JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., Nov. 18. (P)—John Kipper, 27, was stabbed to death today in the presence of his mother. His 17-year-old brother was arrested later and police said that the lad, red-eyed from weeping, readily admitted that he had killed John in a quarrel that started at the breakfast table.

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Victims Missing For 2 Weeks; Woman And Man Held

(By Associated Press)

TEXARKANA, Tex., Nov. 18. (P)—The bullet riddled bodies of two brothers, Arthur and Lee Madison, were found late today in an abandoned well near Artes, Ark., 13 miles east of here.

The bodies were found by a searching party organized by relatives after the brothers had been missing for nearly two weeks. They lived seven miles east of here in Miller County, Arkansas.

Shortly after the bodies were recovered, two suspects, a man and a woman, were arrested at the man's home, located two miles from the Madison's residence. The man had served a year in the Arkansas penitentiary on a liquor charge. He was 35 years old. The woman, 20 years of age, was said to be a sweetheart of the man.

Officers expected further arrests. They believed moonshine activities in Miller county a motive for the shooting.

Each of the bodies bore wounds from three shotgun charges. Arthur Madison was shot in the left side, in the back and in the jaw. His brother was shot in the right ear, in the back and in the right arm.

After their bodies were found the sheriff's office was notified. An attempt was made to locate the bodies from the hole with a hook failed. Tom Smith, farmer, was then roped to the water edge and tied ropes to the bodies.

The well is located about 200 feet from a cemetery. It had about 20 feet of water in it. Tracks around it led to the discovery.

SUTTON EXPECTED

Atlanta School Head Will
Speak In Lubbock

Dr. Willis A. Sutton, superintendent of Atlanta Ga. schools, is expected to arrive in Lubbock this afternoon at 4 o'clock for three speaking engagements here in the next few days.

Dr. Sutton, one of the nation's authorities on child welfare, will speak tonight at the Fathers' and Sons banquet to be held at Texas Tech gymnasium, and Wednesday will speak twice. His first appearance will be for school children only at the high school auditorium at 9:30 o'clock in the morning and the second will be for the general public at 10:30 o'clock.

Olney Constable Is Shot To Death

OLNEY, Nov. 18. (P)—Constable Ed Langford, about 43, was shot and killed here today in an argument with J. N. Reese, an oil field worker, who was arrested and placed in jail at Graham.

The shooting occurred in the office of Justice of the Peace D. M. McCarron to whom Mrs. Reese had gone with a complaint that her husband had threatened to kill her.

Reese passed the office and was called in to explain his threats. Langford asked him, as he entered, whether he was armed. He fired through the partially closed door, striking Langford in the region of the heart.

Reese was arrested later by Deputy Sheriff Taylor Anderson. The gun was found at a hotel where he had turned it over to a friend.

THIEVES ACTIVE HERE

Three Filling Stations Of
City Are Robbed

Thieves in Lubbock continued their week-end depredations Sunday night when they broke windows in three filling stations of the city and took gasoline from pumps after unlocking them. Nothing but gasoline was reported stolen.

The Continental station at Sixteenth and Avenue H, the H. & D. station at College Avenue and Sixteenth street and the Phillips station at Seventh street and Avenue H, were robbed.

No trace had been found of the robbers last night and the police department had no information as to the estimated loss in the robberies.

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Twenty-One Year Old Victim Near Death Of Wounds

Mrs. A. D. Stevens Freed
Under \$5,000 Bond After
Cutting Affray Monday
Afternoon

Makes Statement

Operation Is Performed In
Effort To Save Life Of
Iva Lackey; Family Trouble
Blamed For Act

A 21-YEAR-OLD mother, Iva Lackey, of Morton, this morning lies critically injured in the Lubbock sanitarium, and her mother-in-law, Mrs. A. D. Stevens, 40 also of Morton, was released last night on \$5,000 bond as the result of a cutting affray Monday afternoon about 4 o'clock.

Mrs. Stevens was arrested shortly after the affray, which occurred in front of the Lackey home on the main street of Morton, and charged with assault with intent to murder. A \$5,000 bond was set and the woman was released.

Makes Statement.
According to a statement made by the injured girl last night while on the operating table, she was unarmed while Mrs. Stevens had a pocket knife with which she attacked her.

Her strength slowly waning from loss of blood, and while attendants hurriedly were preparing to operate, the young mother told her story in a weak voice.

Tells Story.
"I was out on the front porch with my baby and sister and her baby when Mrs. Stevens came by," she explained. "She said something to my sister on the porch and then she said that my baby wasn't anything to her. I told her I was not talking to her."

"There was a dog on the porch and I kicked it. She asked me who kicked the dog and I told her I did."

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County Judges Are Chosen For Living Room Contest

Tech Faculty Members To Select Winners; Rooms Will Be Improved With Not More Than Fifty Dollars

Those Taking First Place In County Will Be Given Trip To College Station For Course

Misses Jean Dorrel and Vivian Johnson, instructors in the school of home economics at Texas Technological college, have been chosen as county judges for the state living room contest of 1930, which is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service of Texas A. and M. college and the United States department of agriculture.

Miss Louise Baird, county home demonstration agent, is head of the county contest.

The first living rooms to be scored are those of Mesdames T. U. Hunt, C. G. Seagler and J. N. Montgomery, of Acuff community. Miss Baird and the two judges will visit these homes this morning. The rooms will be scored as they are, with no improvements made in the living room, which must not be later than November 30. At the end of the contest in April, the original committee will score the rooms once more, grading them according to the improvement made in proportion to the expenditure, which is not to exceed \$50.

Two Classes.

One winning living room will be chosen for each of two classes, and will be entered in the district contest in May for which the district home demonstration agent will be the judge.

In June, state honors will be awarded by the state committee, which is to be appointed by the Extension Service.

Winners in the county contest will be awarded with a trip to College Station for the farmer's short course, which is offered at A. and M. college in August.

Three district prizes in each class will be offered by the Semi-Weekly Farm News as follows: first prize, \$10; second prize, \$5; third prize, one year's subscription to the Semi-Weekly Farm News.

State Prizes.

State prizes to be offered by the Semi-Weekly Farm News are as follows: first prize, \$50; second prize, \$25; third prize, \$15; fourth prize, one year's subscription to the Semi-Weekly Farm News.

The following information is to be filed in the office of the county home demonstration agent: story of the activity, simple floor plan before and after improvement, Kodak pictures before and after improvement, list of improvements made, use of materials on hand, gifts and value of each, voluntary labor performed and cash expenditures.

You may not be violently pro-sun-tan, but at least you owe dark powders a debt of gratitude, according to Catherine Olesby, beauty stylist, who have banished the tanned nose.

"Don't you remember," she asked, "I did, 'the old days when powdering one's nose was the one gesture to synthetic beauty that could be spoken of, or indulged in, in public?"

"Every woman carried a large powder puff, and her way of adding to her attractiveness at a critical moment was to slap this a few times across her nose quite unthinkingly that the rest of the face merited a little consideration, and it was always white or pink powder that was liberally scattered over the cheeks."

Then she gave me a little hint about make-up which was new, and I pass it on to you—when selecting the powder for your skin, match up your background, not your foreground colors.

"Your foreground colors are your cheeks, your chin and your nose, while the neck represents the background."

"You see," she explained, "really there is more of a solid expanse of unbroken skin on your neck than on your face, and you should match the powder to this, particularly since you will naturally accent your cheeks and chin with just a suggestion of rouge anyhow. Then you are all in one color tone."

"Until recently women have been slaves to pink powder, and consequently their faces never matched their necks, and the whole effect was bad. Powder with a light tan or 'off white' base, are much more harmonious to the average skin than a pink powder, though pink powder looks more alluring in the box."

Miss Olesby is responsible for creating some of the "best sellers" in the whole field of cosmetics, and she is one of the very few who has a kind word to say for soap and water.

"Nothing like it for cleanliness, and for removing the dust and dirt that is ever present in the air," she said. "The only important consideration is to use a pure soap."

Nothing is less logical, she says, than to use cosmetics without knowing what they are for. Many women, she finds, use astringents when they should use a preparation to open the pores, and others work a heavy cream into their skins when they should use only the lightest and most easily absorbed dolls.

It is her theory that the American woman has a particular difficulty in cosmetics and make-up because she is so cosmopolitan in type that she has no pattern to guide her, but must work out her own particular problem in features and coloring.

French Provincial House Is Sturdy, Picturesque

Many consider this modest domestic architecture of the French Province unique, because of its varied and picturesque qualities.

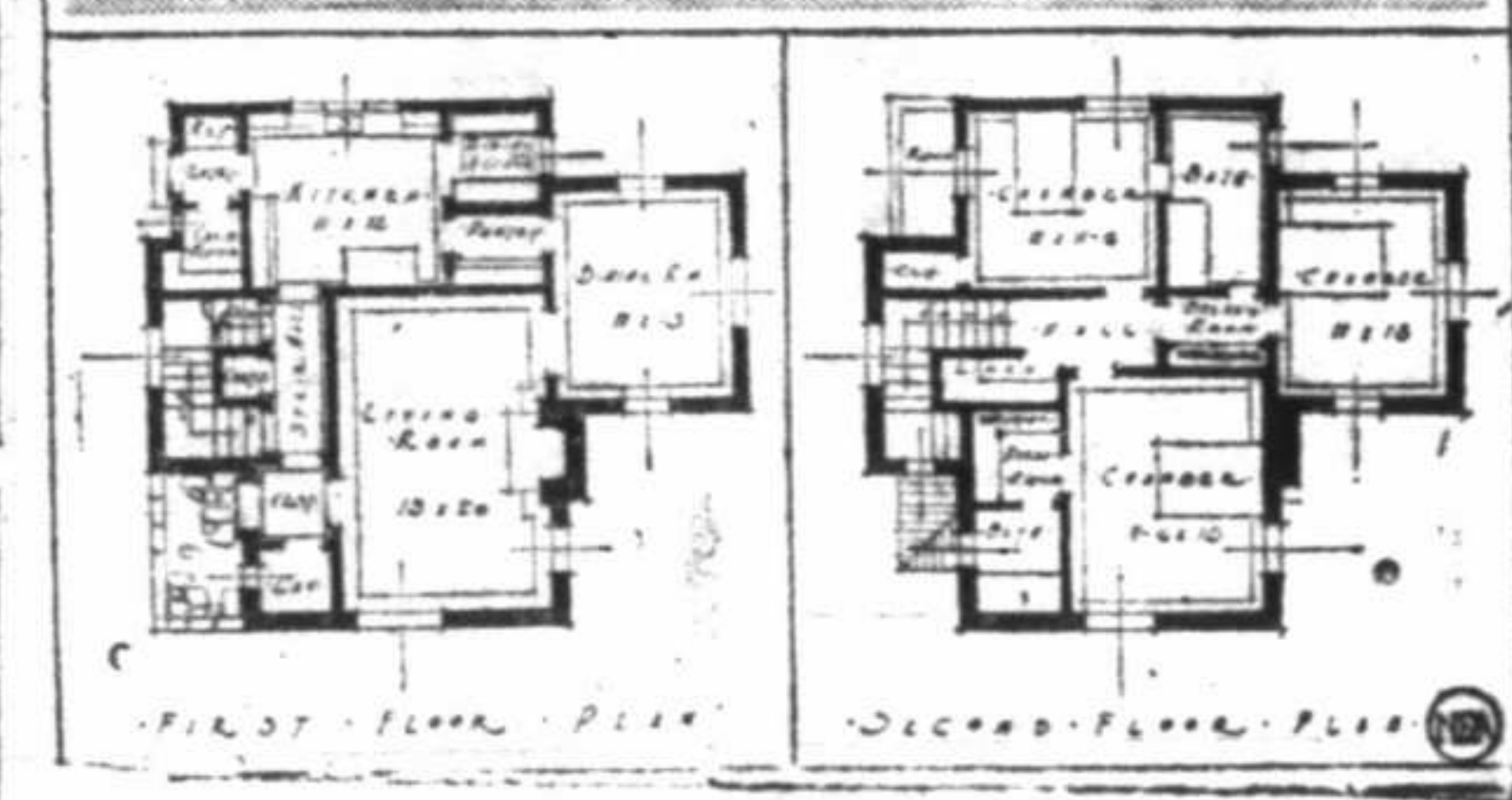

Ballinger To San Angelo Extension Is Up In Hearing

Proposed Line, Opposed By Santa Fe, Taken Up For Consideration By I. C. C. At Washington Monday

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18. (AP)—Building plans of the Texas and Pacific system for extending a line 40 miles from Ballinger to San Angelo in Texas against the opposition of the Santa Fe system came up today for further consideration in an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing.

The inquiry began in San Antonio last month, when formal application of the Abilene and Southern, subsidiary of the T. and P., to spend \$2,000,000 on the construction and operation of the Santa Fe company were recorded.

Auditor Testifies. Today's proceedings began with the testimony of A. J. Blair, auditor of the Texas and Pacific system, as to valuations and operating results of that property.

J. B. Payne, vice-president of the Texas and Pacific in charge of traffic, was recalled after Blair's appearance to enable Santa Fe counsel to cross examine him on his San Antonio statement. Payne repeated in answer to queries of O. B. Ross, Santa Fe attorney, his original statement that the extension would reach "the large and rapidly developing agricultural territory around San Angelo, with all field service opportunities as well."

He said his line hoped to participate in this traffic. He repeated also the declaration that the extension would improve passenger service in territories south of Abilene, although he told Ross he had been able "only in a general way" to study bus and truck facilities for transportation in that area.

A number of statistical exhibits, relating to rates and operations in the Texas territory were filed. Examiner H. C. Davis, conducting the inquiry, will be called upon to recommend after testimony has been completed, such actions as he concludes the commission should take on the application.

Airport Head Is Witness to Crash

DALLAS, Nov. 18. (AP)—Preston Sneed, director of airports, came near witnessing a personal tragedy last night, just before his months of work for installation of flood lights at local landing fields was rewarded.

A plane, bearing Mrs. Sneed, from San Antonio, crashed into the roof of a frame house when the pilot was unable to locate Love Field in the darkness.

Mrs. Sneed was only slightly injured, and another passenger, Leonard D. Crawford, of San Antonio, suffered slight injuries. The plane crashed into the roof of the house, demolishing it.

Appropriations of funds to install flood lights at the fields was approved by the city commission last week, but equipment has not been purchased.

TARIFFS RESTORED. WASHINGTON, Nov. 18. (AP)—The senate today voted to restore the existing tariff of \$2.10 a pound on unstemmed and \$2.75 a pound on stemmed wrapper tobacco. The house bill raised these duties, by 40 cents a pound.

The vote was 49 to 26 for retention of the present rates.

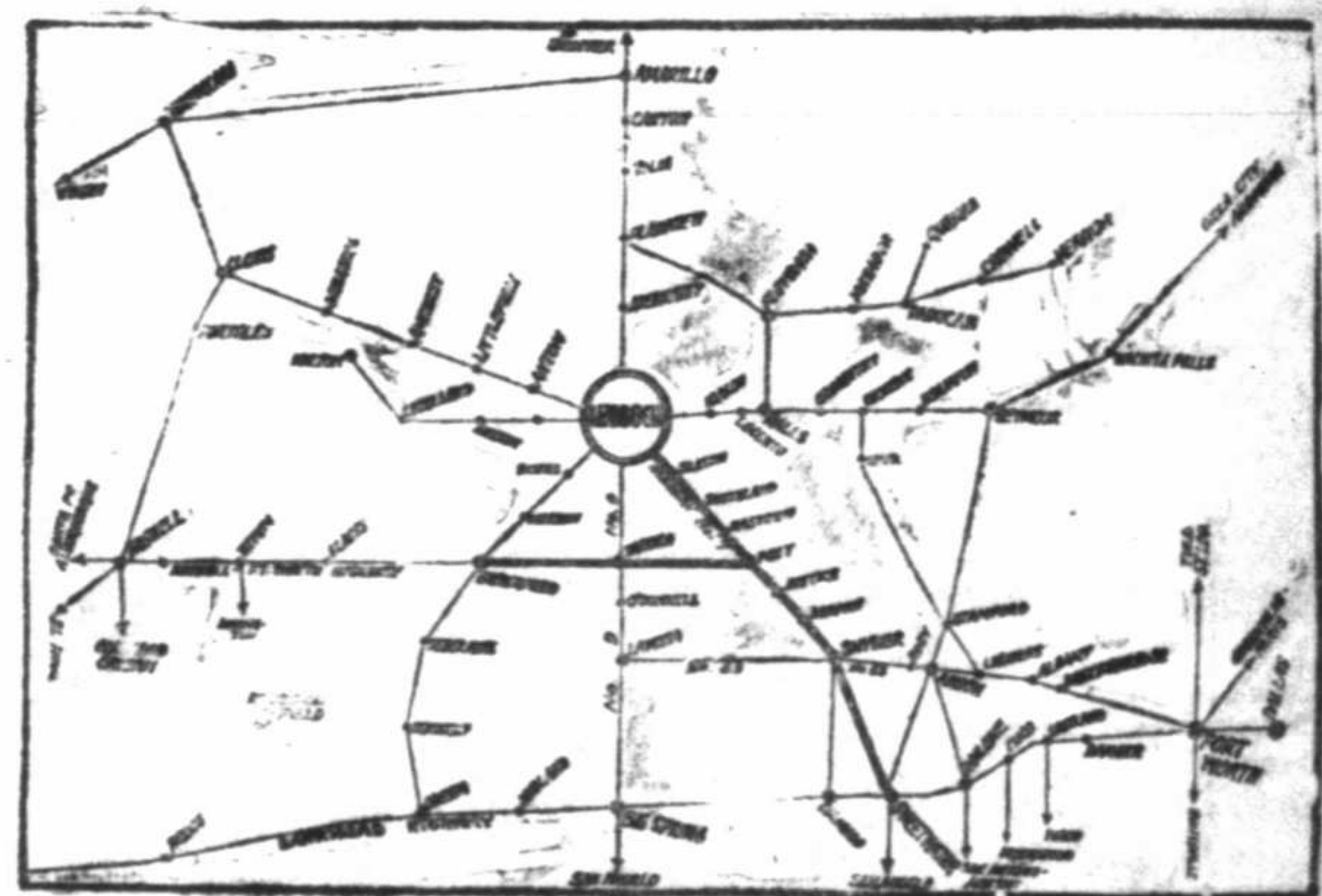

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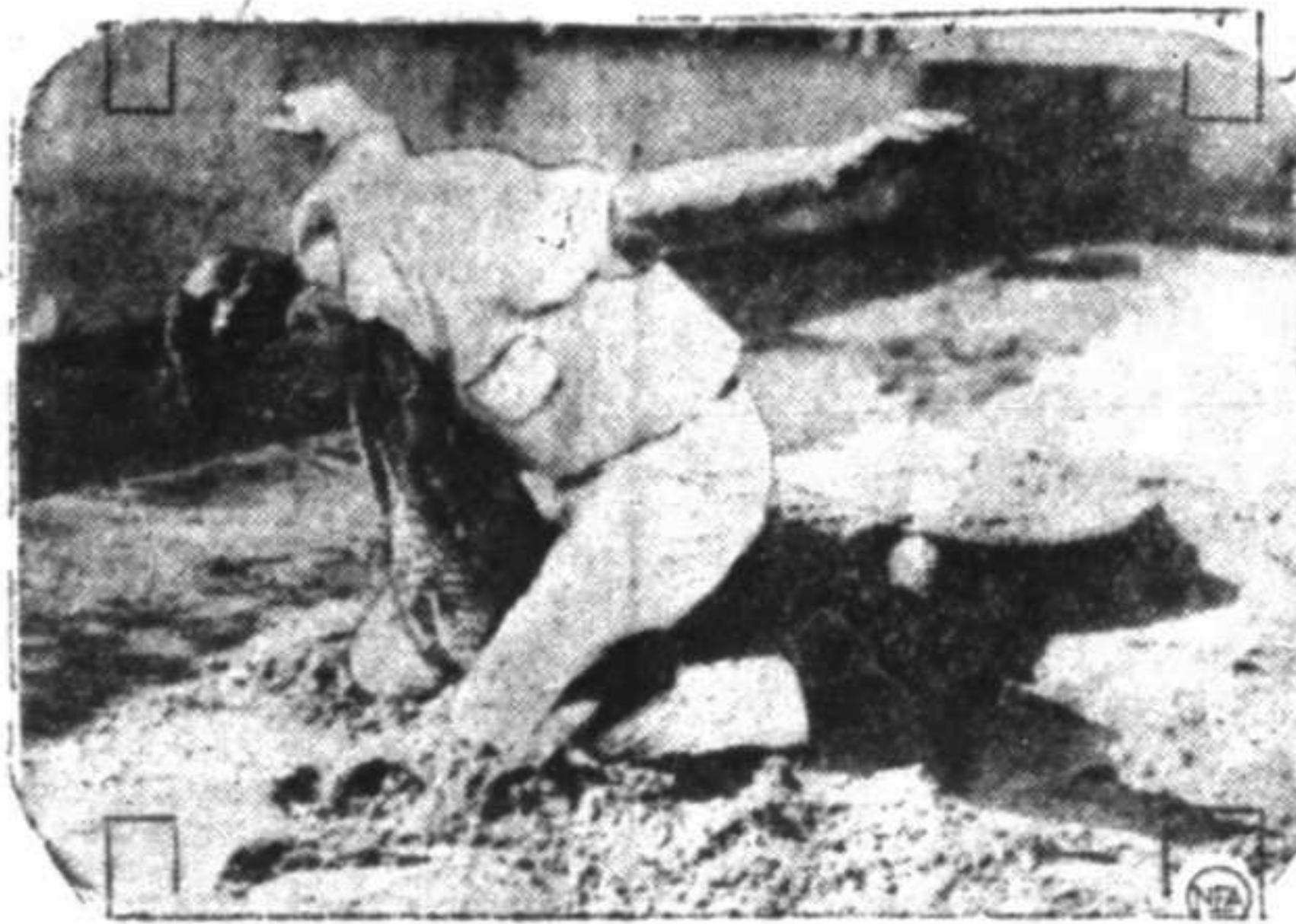

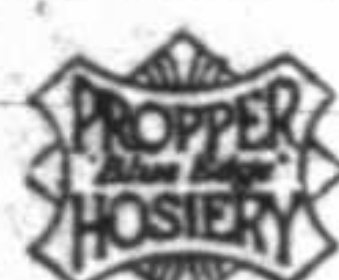

"Diamond Jim Brady used to say that being a sucker was one of the greatest pleasures imaginable—if you could afford it. I stand at the head of the class and enjoy it. Sure there's fun being a sucker. The real sucker is a smart guy who knows he's being taken and likes it."

Greed is the main fault of suckers, I suppose. They want an edge want more than they are supposed to get. That's why they're easy to take. I'll take the smartest man or woman in the world if they're looking for an edge. In other words, people who want an unusual advantage, or who are looking for something for nothing, are the ones more easily beaten at their own game."
