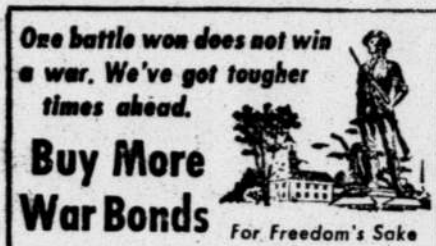

Joe And J. M. Peterson and Local 4-H Boys Win Honors At Plainview Stock Show

Dawson County made a fine showing at the 17th annual Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show which was held at Plainview April 11 through the 14th, taking several honors and prizes. Lee R. Pool, county agent here, estimates that Dawson County winnings at the show amounted to \$150.00.

Joe Peterson took 4 head of cattle to the stock show, and J. M. Peterson took 21 head, with the 4-H boys entering 3 head.

In the Junior Bull Division, J. M. Peterson took first place, winning a blue ribbon and a \$10.00 prize. He also won first place in the Senior Get of Sire Class.

Joe Peterson won third place out of a class of 36 in the heifer class division. He also placed 7th in that division. It is an outstanding honor to win in that division.

In the Junior Yearling heifer division, Ernest White, local 4-H Club boy placed 11th in the opening class and 4th in the 4-H division. In the senior yearling heifer division Donaman Phipps placed 11th in the opening class and 3rd in the 4-H division, out of a class of 26.

In the Junior Bull Class Division Earl Hatfield placed 6th in the opening class out of a class of 22.

The 3 local 4-H boys won approximately \$25.00 at the show. They took third place in the County Herd, composed of 5 breeders. All three of the 4-H boys participated in this event, along with 6 or 7 other county entries.

Carl Rountree bull showed in the Junior Bull Calf division, and placed 8th.

Local citizens attending the show report that more animals were entered in this show than ever before. Three states were represented at the Plainview Dairy Show, including Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. This is the first year in which all three states have entered.

Delgene Reese herd from Waco and the T. H. Fuston herd of Cleburne have shown in shows all over Texas, where they have repeatedly been winners, and they were among the entries at the Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show.

Dawson County citizens showed so much interest in the show, that plans are being made to have a dairy show here next year. There was no show this year, because there were no barns open.

Northwestern Co. Gets Exploration

MIDLAND, April 15 — Permian lime wildcat to 5,250 feet has been staked in Northwestern Dawson County by the Lion Oil Refining Company as its No. 1 Everitt J. Turner 660 feet from the south and east lines of section 17, block C-38, psl survey.

Located on a block of 1,000 acres the test is two miles south of the Terry County line and three miles east of the Gaines County line. Lion holds an additional 1,000 acres in the area. It is 4 1-2 miles northeast of the recently announced Ray A. Albaugh No. 1 Scanlen, 5,000-foot wildcat northeast of the Cedar Lake pool in Gaines.

1945 Crop Plans Should Be Made At Present Time

Editor's Note: The following is an article from the local AAA office giving the outlook on edible fats and oils:

Now is the time when farmers make the crop plans which will make or break our oil supply position for the year 1945. We are fixed all right for 1944. We have had the biggest slaughter of hogs in history. We have turned out the oil from the 1943 crop of soybeans, peanuts and flax—the biggest ever grown in the United States. We are going to be able to import more from foreign countries than we did earlier in the war.

But what about 1945? Farmers will give the answer with their plantings of the oil crops this spring. We will need even more fats and oils in 1945 than in 1944. That will be a year of heavy demand for explosives and other military products of the oil crops, or great demands for fats as food. But, it will be a year of smaller production of animal fats, as the hog population declines under the need of adjustment of animals to feed supplies. We will have 400 to 500 million pounds less of these fats than in 1944. We must replace this with oil crops. That replacement will require the full national goal, acreage of these crops. Should oil crop acreage fall short of the goal for 1944, the nation risks falling short of a critical war material in 1945.

The March 1, Intention to Plant Report indicates that Texas will fall short of the peanut goal, by about 275,000 acres. The situation is similar in other oil crops. Although increased price supports for soybeans and peanuts were announced after March 1, and acreage planned is somewhat greater than indicated on March 1, it appears that present plans are still far short of the goal.

The direct war use for oils must be met — glycerine for explosives, plastics for guns, other weapons and equipment — glue for construction of hulls for PT boats and planes. We need edible fats and oil to feed our Army.

Local Board Issues Reminders About Gasoline and Tires

Officials at the local War Price and Rationing office request that local citizens do not call at the office for their gasoline or tire certificates, as they will be mailed to you as soon as they are ready. The cooperation received from those who have applications in for approval, will mean a lot to the girls who have charge of the tires and gasoline.

This will also remind you that all of the tractor gasoline and non-highway gasoline will be approved by the board before it can be issued from the local rationing office. If you see that you are running out of gasoline, please apply so that the Gasoline Panel may pass on it at their meeting on each Thursday in the month. This will enable the group to issue the gasoline immediately.

An unlimited number of losses are occurring in the gasoline section of the Rationing, and it will be very necessary that you give a definite amount of information on the reporting of the losses, according to officials of the local board.

Collection On Car Tags Increase To Total Of \$52,947

Tax Assessor-Collector, R. W. (Buster) Herndon reports that to date automobile tax collections amount to \$52,946.95. During this same period in 1943, he states that records show that \$51,044.52 had been collected for car tags. Records reveal that there is a difference of \$1,902.43 between last years collection and this years, and that the increase is credited to this year's collections.

Herndon states further that approximately 350 more cars have been registered in Dawson County thus far this year, than at the same period during 1943.

He also reports that to date 96.48 per cent of the 1943 tax roll has been collected, amounting to \$50,815.98. This also shows an increase over the 1942 collections when approximately 86 per cent of the 1942 taxes had been turned in by this time.

VICTORY GARDENS

Unfavorable weather conditions have greatly delayed victory garden plantings throughout the state. Authorities are afraid that many of the early plantings throughout the state have been damaged so badly, or destroyed, that if people intend to have vegetables, either fresh or for canning, they must grow them in their own victory gardens.

Every effort should be put forth to have a victory garden at each farm and city home. Mr. Prentice Cooper, Governor of Tennessee and Chairman of the National Garden Advisory Committee, in a conference in Washington made a survey of the victory garden program for 1944 and transmits to you the following information:

"The surveys indicate lagging interest in victory gardens this year, whereas a definite need exists for all the food your state can grow in 1944, for the following reasons:

First, because nearly 50 per cent of the 1944 commercially canned vegetables and 70 per cent of the commercially canned fruits have been reserved for government requirements. Second, because of the increased shortage of manpower to grow food commercially and for family use. Third, because of greatly increased food needs of our allies. In some cases, this need for food has doubled. Fourth, because the home grown food supply would help to hold living expenses down. Fifth, because food grown at home saves transportation, manpower, and scarce packing materials."

He urges each and every individual to be aggressive in his leadership for more victory gardens, em-

Soil Tillers To Strike It Rich

VICTORY Gardeners have a generous supply of seeds awaiting them at the start of the 1944 growing season and adequate quantities of tools, fertilizers and insecticides.

That is the word from the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the nation's seedsmen and supply houses.

"But gardeners should order their seed early because of the seed store help shortage and transportation problems," the department says in a message to Victory Gardeners.

Seedsmen at the start of war

phasizing that this would be a distinct national service and would help the nation to reach its goal of 22,000,000 victory gardens in 1944.

County Agent, Lee R. Pool and County Home Demonstration Agent, Myrtle Dickie Negy, encourage every family in Dawson County to take this message to heart so that we may have plenty of fresh vegetables on our tables and a surplus for canning.

built up American sources for seeds normally imported from countries later overrun by the Nazis. That explains why there have been no more serious shortages than were reported last summer.

"As always, a few varieties of seeds will be scarce but, as always, there will be available similar varieties as good, and in some instances, better," says Harry H. Hobbs, vice president of the Ferry Morse seed company of Detroit.

A similar statement came from David Burpee of the W. Atlee Burpee seed company of Philadelphia.

"There is enough seed for all Victory Gardens if gardeners will accept another similar variety when the type they order is not obtainable.

"The present demand is 50 per cent greater than a year ago and we suggest that gardeners order their seeds as early as possible."

The War Production Board, convinced of the importance of Victory Gardens, is doing everything possible to assure adequate supplies of hoes, rakes, spades and spading forks for 1944. Supplies of sprayers and dusters also will be more liberal.

"Insecticides and fungicides should be at least as plentiful as last

year," the department reports.

The nitrate situation improved this spring and the nitrogen content of Victory Garden fertilizer is back to the pre-war standard: 5-10-5 mix for the east and south. The

Need For Victory Gardens This Year Greatest Ever

A record number of Victory gardens is imperative this year because there is a very real need for all of the food Texans can grow, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Governor Prentice Cooper of Tennessee recently telegraphed Governor Coke R. Stevenson of Texas that a survey by the National Garden Advisory Committee, of which he is chairman, indicated lagging interest in planting gardens. He explained that maximum production of gardens will ease a series of critical wartime emergencies. For example, nearly 50 per cent of the

Good Sanitation Protects Health

Incidence of diseases generally associated with poor sanitation is extremely high in Texas this spring, according to reports received by the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service from the State Department of Health.

During one recent week, 145 cases of dysentery were reported in Texas, and this is 100 more than the figure given for this particular week in the seven year median. One hundred and five cases of malaria were reported, in comparison with 81 for the seven-year median, and increases were shown for polio and typhus.

Home grown food, Governor Cooper adds, helps to hold down living costs, and saves transportation, manpower and scarce packing materials.

In the south half of Texas, Rosborough says, cold, wet weather has delayed or prevented cool weather vegetables such as English peas, spinach, cabbage, carrots and head lettuce. But these still can be planted in the northern half, with the possible exception of English peas. In areas where late April and May are likely to be hot the peas may mildew, but application of dusting sulphur will hold this disease in check.

In all areas sweet corn and white potatoes still may be planted and in central, east and south Texas green beans, squash, cucumber, swiss chard seed and tomato plants should go into the ground now. But he suggests waiting until the soil has warmed thoroughly before planting butter beans and okra, or setting pepper and eggplant plants. Gardeners also should wait until both days and night are warm before planting blackeyed peas, cantaloupes and watermelons. Inoculation of green and butter beans and blackeyed peas before planting will stimulate early growth and greater production.

"With a little effort and management most Texas families can produce an abundant supply of fresh vegetables for home use during the summer and fall," Rosborough says. "It's economical and patriotic to have a garden."

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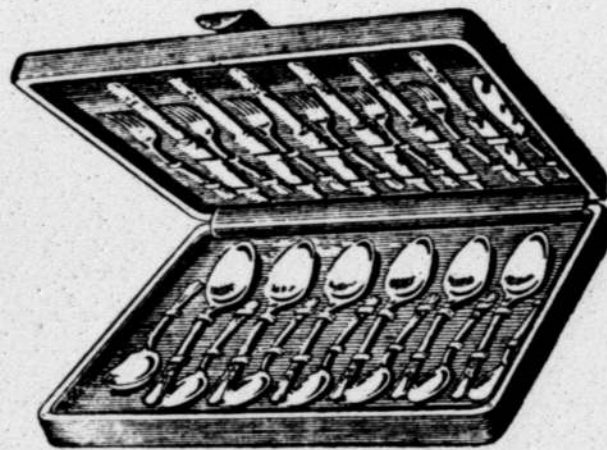

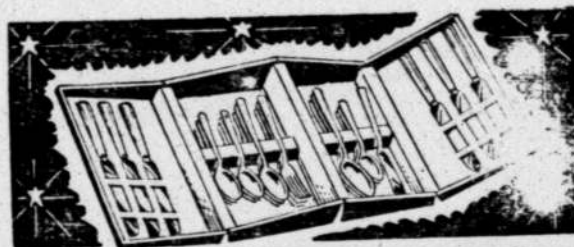

Shortening Made Ration Free Sun.

WASHINGTON, April 15 —OPA Administrator Bowles announced Saturday night that shortening and rationed salad and cooking oils became point free at 12:01 a. m. Sunday.

Heretofore, these items have cost housewives four red points per pound. Lard previously was made point free on March 3, because of the heavy marketing of hogs and continued improvement in the laid supply.

"Current available supplies of lard are at a high level and we have enough shortening and salad and cooking oils on hand to meet civilian demands," Bowles stated.

"Thus, there is no need to require point currency as a means of controlling movement of these commodities."

Butter and margarine are not affected by the action.

TUSCON, Ariz. (AP)—John Molnar has recovered the use of his voice after a 13-year lapse.

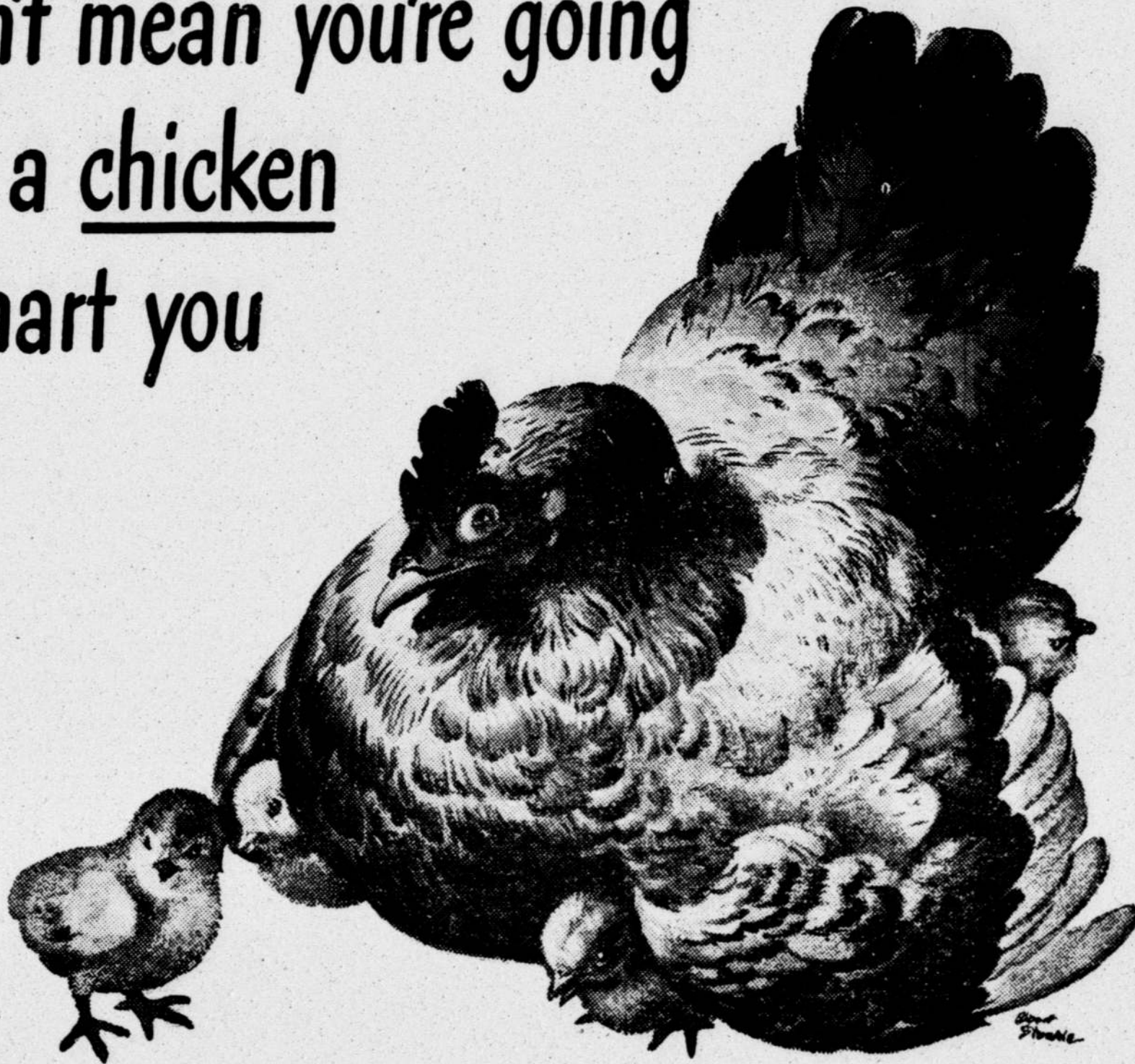
An automobile accident left the right side of his body paralyzed and he was able to speak in a rasping whisper only with great difficulty. Four years ago doctors told him his vocal cords were

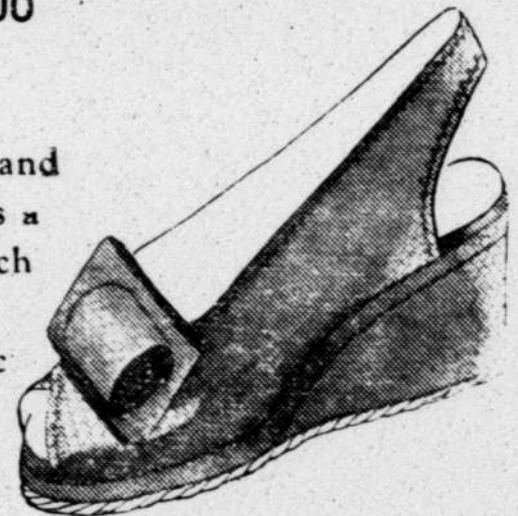

Lamesa's C of C Favors Air Policy

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The Lamesa Chamber of Commerce's resolution favoring the U. S. domestic airlines' five-point international air policy "assures inland cities of the post-war opportunity for developing commercially by air as coastwise cities developed commercially by water," V. P. Conroy, TWA's traffic vice president, said today.

Recent adoption of the resolution by the Lamesa Chamber "should serve as an exemplary move to every community in America interested in the tremendous post-war air age," Conroy said.

"Air transport precludes the necessity of first land and then water travel, and assures the inland cities equal access to both domestic and foreign markets."

The five-point international air policy, adopted in Washington last July by sixteen domestic airlines, stresses free and world-wide competition, subject to reasonable federal regulation, as a "must" in developing a sound U. S. aviation program.

Other points recommended include private ownership and management, federal encouragement and fostering of a sound world-wide flight, and acquisition of civil and commercial outlets required in the public interest.
