WHY NOT A THIRD PARTY?

For a number of years citizens of Southern States have been criticized and degraded by Northern States for their political beliefs. In two political campaigns during this century some states have bolted both primary parties and run their own candidate for the Presidency of the United States. Practically every year there has been some talk of the organization of a third major political party. Is this the time to do it?

Rabid Sheep Dies In City Limits

A rabid sheep belonging to J. C. Bible, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Bible, died Saturday afternoon at their home in the southeast part of town. The head of the sheep was carried to Austin Saturday night and the Health Department telephoned the Bibles Monday that the sheep definitely had rabies.

This is in the City Limits of Santa Anna. Just a few weeks ago a dog died just east of town with rabies, but it was not in the City Limits.

The Bibles said the sheep was examined by Dr. J. Ray Martin, county veterinarian. They quoted Dr. Martin as saying this was the 33rd case of rabies found in the county since January 1, and that in his opinion rabies had reached the epidemic stage in the county.

Many animals over the county are afflicted with the disease. Dogs, skunks and fox are the primary animals affected. Any of these animals can spread the disease.

A check with the City Hall Tuesday morning showed not one city license for dogs has been sold here in 1960. Only six were sold in 1959 and only 21 were sold in 1958. This does not necessarily mean that no dogs in the city have been vaccinated this year, but it is a good indication that at the most, not very many have been vaccinated.

This situation is serious. It is known that rabies exist right here in the City Limits. The people who own dogs and the City Officials are going to have to do something about it. In discussing the situation with Mayor Ford Barnes Tuesday morning, he said the city would immediately begin picking up unlicensed dogs and they would be disposed of in accordance with the law. He advised anyone who owns dogs they consider valuable to have them vaccinated immediately and have city licenses put on them. In order to purchase a city license, you must first have the dog vaccinated, then present a receipt for the vaccination at the City Hall to purchase a City License. The license costs \$1.00 and lasts for one year, the same length of time a vaccination lasts.

In order for a dog to run free in the City Limits, they are supposed to wear a City Li-

cense at all times. Any dog, regardless of whether it has been vaccinated, is subject to being picked up and disposed of if it is not wearing a City License tag.

Mayor Barnes said that because of the seriousness of the situation, a determined effort would be made to rid the town of all unlicensed dogs. This effort is now underway. Your cooperation with the city officials is urged.

Any dogs that are not licensed should be reported to the City Hall immediately. As soon as possible someone will come to the neighborhood and pick the dog up.

Mr. Bible said at first the disease afflicting the sheep was thought to be some other disease, and he was advised to drench them (this advice was not given by Dr. Martin). He and Mrs. Bible drenched the sheep on Wednesday and after not getting the desired results, took the sheep to Dr. Martin on Thursday. Dr. Martin told them there it was rabies, but to wait until the animal died on Saturday to send it to Austin for examination. They took the sheep's head to Austin Saturday night.

Because both of them had places on their hands where the skin was broken, both of them are now taking anti-rabies shots to prevent them from taking the disease. When the disease develops in the human body, there is not much that can be done for it. It is deadly after it develops.

In describing the action of the sheep, the Bibles said she would butt anything that got in its way. She would butt the barn, posts and other sheep. She also attempted to butt them. She showed definite signs of a serious illness. She would bite weeds and grass off at ground level, then just drop them out of her mouth without any effort to eat them.

ONE COMFORTING THOUGHT: During recent months, the vaccination for humans exposed to rabies has been somewhat modified. Now you just have to take 14 shots, 14 days in a row. And they apparently do not make you sick, or at least nearly as sick as when the vaccine had to be administered in the stomach for 21 days in a row.

According to President Eisenhower, who proclaimed July 24-30 as National Farm Safety Week, accidents, in addition to draining our nations financial resources, "bring death, disability, suffering and hardship to thousands of farm people annually." Safety habits, therefore, are vitally needed if there are to be fewer deaths and injuries, less expense, grief and suffering on the farm and a prosperous national economy.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, which is pushing a farm safety education campaign in Texas, tells us that farm life can be enjoyed by practicing safety each day. The Council asks farmers and ranchers to check their home electric and heating systems, to check and repair equipment, to keep children away from machinery and livestock. It warns against falls, resulting from hurry and unsafe ladders. The farmer or rancher is cautioned to make sure all farm equipment is operating safely and to stop machines before unclogging, oiling, or adjusting them.

This is good advice, not only during Farm Safety Week, but the other 51 weeks of the year, too!

Some Light Rains In This Area

During the past several days some areas of Coleman County have received some very nice rains, and other areas have gone almost completely without any rain.

Locally, Santa Anna has received only a few light showers. Monday evening we received a nice shower for a few minutes. Altogether, it has not amounted to enough to be of any value.

The area in the northwest part of the county has received some good rains, but most of that has been pretty badly spotted.

There is still some prospect of rains in the area, but as time goes by, the prospects seem to get slimmer each day. And the entire area is badly in need of rain. Many acres of land in the south part of the county are still unplanted, and it has now reached the time of year that very little could be planted, even under proper moisture conditions.

More Rattle Snakes

Reports have been received on several more rattle snakes being killed in the area. Roy Bible continues to kill some of them every day or so. Saturday evening he killed a large one that was almost black, near the railroad tracks in the east part of town. This brought his total for the year to 58.

Billy Bob Jackson killed a 50-inch snake on his father's farm in the Plainview community on Friday of last week. Walter Holt said he killed a big one on the Buffalo road Sunday afternoon.

The rattle snakes are plentiful this year, and are still very dangerous. Most of the ones being killed are pretty good sized ones.

Brownwood Man Purchases Phillips Drug Store

J. C. Barkley of Brownwood purchased the Phillips Drug Store in Santa Anna Tuesday evening in a transaction that surprised the owners themselves. Barkley assumed management of the store on Wednesday. Purchase price of the store was not announced.

J. W. Riley, owner and operator of the store since January 1, 1946, said he had known Mr. Barkley for several years. Tuesday evening he asked what Mr. Riley would take for the store and when Riley set a price, Mr. Barkley took him up on the deal immediately.

Riley said he had not given much thought to selling, and certainly did not have to sell for any reason. He just set a price, and Mr. Barkley gave him a check for it.

The Phillips Drug Store has operated under the same name ever since it was established in 1886. It was established by S. H. Phillips and after his death Miss Ruby Harper and Dr. T. Richard Sealy purchased the store. Later a corporation was formed and a number of local persons owned a part of the stock, with the Rileys owning a one-quarter interest. In 1946 the Rileys purchased the entire stock.

Mr. Riley said he knows Mr. Barkley to be an honest, upright man and that he will work right in with the town. He has had many years experience in the drug store business and is a registered pharmacist. He was the former owner of the Palace Drug in Brownwood, which he sold to Bob Dunn about a year ago. Since that time he has been associated with the Corner Drug Store in Brownwood.

Bob Dunn is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Dunn of Santa Anna.

CITY STUDIES INSTALLATION OF LARGE WATER STORAGE TANK

For several weeks the City Council of Santa Anna has been studying the possibilities of installation of a 500,000 gallon water storage tank for the city water supply. At present the town has storage facilities for 110,000 gallons and it is not adequate for the needs.

During the past several months Santa Anna has earned a number of credits on fire insurance rates, but is unable to take advantage of them because of the inadequate water supply. The new storage facilities will allow the city to get the reduced insurance rates and is large enough for any foreseeable growth at the present time.

The present water supply tanks have been in use for many years, and are approaching the time when they will no longer be useable. They were worked over about two years ago and at that time they were determined to be useable for another five to six years, and with considerable more repair, possibly for 10 years.

In studying the possibility of new tanks, the city found out a new 200,000 gallon storage tank would cost an estimated 7 1/2 cents per gallon. With the addition of 300,000 gallons more water, the extra storage will cost about one cent for each gallon of storage, making the 500,000 gallon storage tank cost an estimated \$200,000.

The City Council proposes to increase the City Tax Rate 15 cents per \$100 valuation, and they feel the new tank can be paid for in a maximum of six to seven years with this tax increase. The city plans to issue time warrants for payment of the proposed contract with the interest rate being set at 4 1/2 for a maximum of 10 years.

It is estimated the citizens of

the town can save more than the \$20,000 in insurance premiums during the time it takes to pay for the new storage tanks.

The new tank will increase pressure on the city's water lines enough that a number of residents who live in the southern part of town will have much better water pressure than they do at the present time. In some locations now at periods of peak water use, some residents do not have enough pressure on the lines to get water they need, especially when present storage of water reaches about the half-way mark.

The Mayor and Councilmen invite citizens of the town to discuss the proposed storage with them, during their regular meetings.

The proposal calls for the new facilities to be erected on the East Santa Anna Mountain, at the same site where the present storage facilities are.

A notice to bidders for the proposed contract is being published this week in The Santa Anna News.

Polls Set Up For July 21 Wheat Quota Vote

Polling places for the July 21 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1961 crop of wheat were announced June 29 by Vernon Bullard, Chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum will be those who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1961 except growers taking part in the feed wheat program.

The wheat quota ballots may be cast on Thursday, July 21, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the following places: Coleman — Central Bank; Brownwood — Santa Anna National Bank Community Room.

Mr. Bullard points out that at present the wheat growers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to become effective. Under quotas, marketing penalties will apply on excess wheat resulting from noncompliance with the farm-to-market acreage allotment, and price supports will be available to cooperators on the crop at not less than 75 percent of parity.

On the other hand, if more than one-third of the voters oppose the quotas, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketing, but allotments will remain in effect as a condition for price support at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law.

Wheat growers voting in a referendum each year have approved marketing quotas for the past seven wheat crops.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Although budget balancing is the most discussed of the problems facing the next Legislature, many lawmakers expect redistricting wrangles may raise more blood pressures. Legislature is required by the Constitution to re-define legislative districts after each federal census.

It used to put off this troublesome task, but a 1946 law provides that it fall to act in the first session after a census, a Legislature Redistricting Board shall take over.

This insures, as it did in 1951, that the Legislature will redistrict — somehow, some way.

Battle will be between big city delegations who will demand more representation in line with their swelling populations and rural members who will try to hold on to as much as they can. In their election campaigns, many representatives promised

their constituents they'd be in there pitching for the home area. Members from growth areas said they'd go after extra representatives, state senators and congressmen.

A rural legislator told his people, "At least twelve rural districts will disappear in the next redistricting. I certainly do not want this district included in that twelve."

Incumbents cited their experiences as an asset. Personal feeling often enters into redistricting, and lawmakers are notably reluctant to "squeeze out" a popular and respected senior colleague by erasing his district.

HOME INSURANCE CUT

Beginning August 1, premium rates on certain types of homeowners' insurance policies will be cut 10 percent.

State Insurance Board announced the new lower rates would apply to the "homeowners package" policies which account for about 80 percent of the home coverage sold in Texas.

Reductions were made possible because insurance companies have already had a relatively low loss ratio on the package policies, first introduced about three years ago.

CREDIT RATE EYED

Board of Insurance also is considering a further lowering

of credit insurance rates.

Many loan companies require borrowers to take out insurance payable to the loan company in case something happens to the borrower before he repays.

Two years ago the Board cut in half the rates that could be charged for credit insurance. It was charged that loan companies were making excessive profits on loans through the insurance.

Board says that even now rates seem high, with losses running 27 percent of premiums paid in. If losses run less than 50 percent of the premiums, rates are considered too high.

NO ROAD PROBLEM

Stiffened federal road inspections pose no problem to Texas, says State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer.

New federal standards are no tougher than those Texas has insisted on all along.

Scandals stemming from misuse of federal road building money in other states has caused the Bureau of Public Roads to tighten its inspection requirements. Greer said the new federal approach will necessitate no change in Texas procedures.

Texans who have been motor-ing cross-country during their summer vacations will not find this hard to believe. So noticeably superior are Texas roads to those of surrounding states that returning Texans usually give a sigh of relief when they cross the state line.

SPEAKERS' BATTLES BOILS

Candidates for Speaker of the House continue their month-long battle of "claimmanship."

Rep. Wade Spilman added five to his list of House members pledged to support him and said this gave him a "rather conclusive" lead. Rep. James Turman of Gober claims a definite majority of 79.

Votes of 76 of the 150 House members are needed to elect.

Spilman also has invited the House General Investigating Committee to look into charges that members were being subjected to improper pressure on how to vote.

COLLEGE FUNDS SOUGHT

Texas Commission on Higher Education will ask the next Legislature for an appropriation of \$3,082,183 for the 1961-63 biennium.

Bulk of the increase asked is for meeting expected enrollment increases in the 18 state-supported colleges and universities.

In a discussion with members of the State Finance Advisory Committee, the Commission considered recommending an increase in state college tuition charges — now \$100 for a nine-months term. Dr. Ralph Green suggested raising this by \$50. It would bring the state an extra \$5,000,000 a year in new revenue, he said.

PRISON NEEDS CITED

Texas Board of Corrections also wants more money — a \$2,654,846 increase over their present allocation for the next two years.

"If the amount is granted, Texas prisoners will cost the state \$189 per day per man," said State Prison Director O. B. Ellis. "This is just a little more than half the national average."

Ellis and Corrections Board members regard prison needs as critical. Board Chairman H. E. Coffield of Rockdale reported that "the prison population trends indicate it will keep on multiplying."

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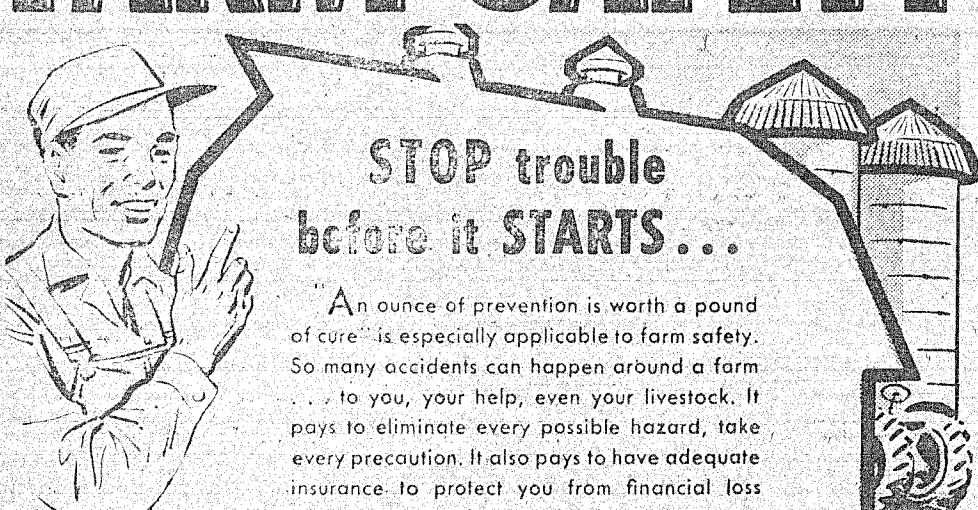

Hints on Keeping Cattle Shrink Low Listed

College Station — The heavy fall livestock marketing period is only a few months away, and producers are beginning to think about the returns they will get on their investments. Lloyd Bergsma, extension livestock marketing specialist, points out that selling price alone does not determine whether or not the producer will show a profit. A combination of selling price and pounds sold determines how much a producer can put in the bank, or how much he must borrow to continue operations for another year.

Cattle shrinkage can cut down on profits or, in some cases, it can even mean the difference between profit and loss.

Bergsma offers the following tips for keeping shrinkage low:

Keep physical activity of cattle at a minimum during marketing.

An overnight stand, or at least a few hours, off feed and water before loading results in less shipping shrink.

Make full use of the feed and rest stops for cattle shipped long distances.

Plan the loading job so that there are no unnecessary long delays.

Feed hay before shipping. Animals accustomed to hay will not only shrink less enroute, but will take hay at the sales yards or rest stops much quicker than those not used to hay.

If you are shipping long distances, make sure your animals have a chance to feed and rest before sale time. It will pay to allow from 24 to 36 hours for a refill.

Plan your marketing job so that you can avoid conditions that increase shrinkage. Exposure to wet, cold weather and really hot weather, and improper bedding and footing increase shrinkage.

Avoid excitement. Don't rush and crowd cattle into cars and through gates.

Don't overload or underload shipments.

Attend your cattle at the market. Make sure they have fresh hay and plenty of clean water.

Vitamins for Beef Cattle

College Station — The green in grass means greenbacks in the livestock producer's pocket. Green color in plants is caused by the presence of chlorophyll, the quantity of which is an index to the amount of carotene present. Carotene, which is formed only in plants, is an important source of vitamin A, an indispensable ingredient in beef production. Loss of green color in bays or foddies means that a large percent of the carotene is lost.

If cattle are not provided with green forage or a vitamin A fortified ration, vitamin A deficiency will occur. This deficiency is characterized by night blindness, watery eyes, swollen joints, rapid breathing, a staggering gait and a general loss of vigor. If the condition is not remedied, the cattle will become, unmarketable and eventually will die. Time required for cattle to become deficient varies. Young animals, which have not had enough time to store up a supply, become deficient faster than older animals.

A sufficient supply of vitamins A, C, D, E, K and the B vitamins is as necessary for normal growth and reproduction as proteins, carbohydrates, fats and minerals. Vitamins A, D and E are normally found in natural feeds, and vitamins C, K and the B vitamins are produced inside the body. U. D. Thompson, extension animal husbandman for the Texas A & M College System, has prepared an interesting and informative publication in which "Vitamins for Beef Cattle" are discussed. This publication may be obtained from the local county agent or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for MP-415.

Turkeys and Peaches On August Plentiful List

College Station — Turkeys and peaches will get feature support in all of the promotion efforts of the U. S. Department of Agriculture during August.

Here's why. Head-count marketings of turkeys during August are expected to run about a sixth larger than last year but tonnage will run even higher because of the increased proportion of heavy breed birds.

Also, cold storage of turkeys are higher than average and last summer.

More states harvest peaches in August than in any other month, so supplies will run heavy as the largest crop since 1946 moves to market—76.8 million bushels.

Both watermelons and cantaloupes remain on USDA's plentiful foods list for this region with retail prices low enough to attract heavy volume sales.

Onions and tomatoes are in the best supply of summer vegetables.

Broilers and fryers return to USDA's plentiful list as August marketings promise to run 12 percent above a year ago.

Other August plentiful foods include scallops and peanut butter. This USDA list is based on a survey of local and national food stocks readily available for the retail trade.

Hints Offered on Making Quality Hay

There's more to the production of a bale of top quality hay than just planting and mowing a field of forage. George McBee, extension pasture specialist, says that hay quality is affected by harvesting, curing and fertilizing.

For good quality hay, the crop should be harvested before it reaches the mature stage. McBee says that, even though yield is reduced if the crop is cut young, quality is greatly enhanced. The specialist recommends that grass type crops be cut between the boot and dough stages; and that clovers and other legumes be cut between the 1/10 and 1/2 bloom stages. When plants go beyond these stages, palatability and feeding values are greatly reduced.

Growers often produce high yields of good quality plants, then lose this quality through improper curing. Curing should be accomplished as rapidly as possible to prevent quality loss from sunlight, rain and dew. Overcuring, however, results in the loss of leaves, nutrients, dry matter and color, McBee continues.

The specialist concludes by pointing out that hay crops need fertilizer just the same as other crops. He says nitrogen is especially important to grasses for yield and protein content, but that the general type and amount of fertilizer to be applied should be determined by soil tests.

Too Many Fatal Farm Accidents

College Station — Farm people have a slightly higher percentage of fatal accidents than do other population groups, reports the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. The rate of accidental deaths from work and recreation activities on farms is increasing slightly each year, as is the death rates associated with machinery, drownings, firearms, burns and electricity. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council points out that a little care and caution on the part of rural dwellers could help remove Texas from these unpopular lists.

During the week of July 24, an intensive safety campaign will be conducted in Texas, and all over the nation. The Texas Council urges all rural residents to participate in the activities of National Farm Safety Week—not only for that week, but for the entire year.

"A little bit of caution could prevent a lot of grief," reminds the Texas Council.

Posters Warn License Need For Fishermen

Austin — A new warning to fishermen to buy licenses now is being posted in public places near the water for the benefit of fishermen, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

The large placards remind that a fishing license is required to fish in salt or fresh water, unless:

1. You are under 17 or over 65 years of age.

2. You fish on property which you own or upon which you reside.

3. You fish with a trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line having no reel or other winding device attached if you are fishing in the county in which you reside.

4. You have a commercial fisherman's license. But if you have a commercial license, then you must: (a) observe commercial size limits; (b) have a license for your boat, trawl, oyster dredge or nets of any kind if you use them.

If you are in doubt about your need of a fishing license, then see your game warden.

The current fishing license is in effect until August 31, when new licenses must be procured.

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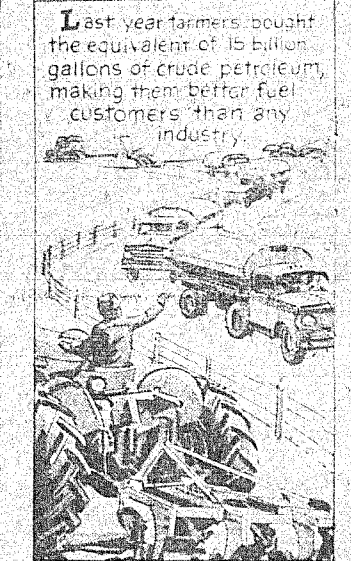

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

No one argues with the activities of legislatures and authorities in making people recognize their family financial responsibilities instead of letting their dependents become charges of the taxpayers.

Some great and extensive work has been done by authorities in forcing the irresponsibles to look after their own, instead of adding to the burdens of taxpayers.

This is C. W. Harder quite a simple principle, that of people being responsible for their own. Yet it seems too complex for understanding by those schemers who throw the American taxpayer's money away in foreign give aways.

A prime example is the millions of dollars American taxpayers are throwing into Ceylon to develop this large rich island in the Indian Ocean.

There is only one fly in this ointment. Ceylon is a member of the British Commonwealth.

As such, Ceylon belongs to a big family that covers a fourth of the world's land area on which live 683 million people, or almost one-fourth of the world's population. The headquarters of this large family is in London where the Queen holds the title, among others "Head of the Commonwealth."

But where would one think the money to develop Ceylon further comes from. From the American taxpayer.

There is no substance to the rumor that the schoolchildren of Ceylon are being taught a new national anthem which goes in part "God bless the Queen and keep the American taxpayer solvent," but fact remains the U. S. taxpayer is shelling out millions to Ceylon.

This is tantamount to a family occupying a house and conning his neighbor into keeping the place in repair for them.

Until 1948 Ceylon was a British Crown Colony which meant that British interests made money out of the island without plowing much, if anything, back into developing the island. That has been left for U. S. taxpayer to accomplish.

But of course, as a member of the British Commonwealth, Ceylon will always be tied commercially and in other ways to London, so profits made out of American-financed expansion will end up in London.

For one thing, Ceylon produces about a half million pounds of tea per year. It is possible tea from Ceylon played a part in a certain incident in Boston harbor.

This is just one of the many items that are getting the people of the nation to look with wide-eyed askance and indignation at the billions poured out in foreign give aways.

After all, what business firm will spend its own money to develop an account for a competitor. If that happened, heads would roll at next stockholder's meeting. Yet that is what the U. S. taxpayer is doing in Ceylon, a small but basically rich member of the British family of Commonwealths.

About Your Health

At the end of June — July 2 — there were only 19 cases of paralytic polio in Texas compared to 92 cases during the same period last year, State Health Department figures show.

Only two cases were registered in the week ending July 2. The five year median for the corresponding week has been 19 cases of paralytic polio.

Nonparalytic polio also shows a significant drop, with a total of 14 cases compared to 39 cases last year at this time.

Despite the encouraging figures, polio continues to strike hard and too often — most often at children below four years of age.

The series of three Salk anti-polio shots has proven overwhelmingly successful. Parents are urged to have their children of preschool age polio protected. A fourth booster shot is recommended for added protection.

During 1959 there were six documented deaths attributed to sports in Texas. Two of the deaths occurred from boxing injuries — the remaining four were caused from football, according to State Health Department figures.

Both boxing fatalities were in organized boxing. The two deaths were to persons 21 and 19 years of age.

In football, two deaths occurred among high school players in scrimmage contests. One death occurred to a 13-year-old in junior high school during football practice.

The fourth fatality was from injuries to a youth of 11, while

playing football at home with friends.

Scholastic regulations demand stringent physical examination before students are allowed to participate in organized athletics within Texas schools. Fatalities are usually the result of freak accidents or an unknown physical condition.

Organized athletics deaths are far below figures from other accidental causes — such as drowning. Each year thousands of Texas students engage in competitive athletics, indicating a small percentage of deaths resulting from athletic activity. V. A. Marks 30th Birthday Thursday, July 21

Thursday, July 21, a federal agency which has profoundly influenced the lives of nearly half the population of the United States will pause to mark its Thirtieth Birthday.

The Veterans Administration was formed by executive order of President Hoover on July 21, 1930, after Congress authorized him to "consolidate and coordinate governmental activities affecting war veterans."

The agency now serves a living veteran population of about 22,500,000, of which 67 percent served in World War II. They average 41 years of age. More than 5,400,000 — average age 30 — served during the Korean War. Nearly 851,000 of them are "durable duty" veterans, serving both in World War II and the Korean Conflict.

Less than 2,275,000 — average age 68 — served in World War I. Spanish American War veterans — average age 82 — number 40,000. A few less than 60 or so old-timers served in the Indian Wars.

The nation's veterans, together with their families, make up more than 46 percent of the total population of the United States.

The President and Vice President of the U. S. are veterans. So are six of the nine Justices of the Supreme Court of the U. S. And so are more than 300 of the 531 Congressmen and Senators on Capitol Hill in Washington.

Catching Crabs Provides Fun For Families

Angling — Crabbing as a family affair is fully described in the July issue of Texas Game and Fish magazine.

This time the crabs are the art of catching this interesting food on the Texas coast. A. C. Becker, outdoors editor of the Galveston News, tells how his children fish for crabs in the Galveston area.

"Crabbing's a cinch way to turn junior into a fisherman, and the rewards are long-range, too," Becker writes. "When dad's hair starts thinning out junior is a nice guy to have around to do the menial chores of launching the boat, rigging the tackle for a trip."

Tackle requirements for crabbing are simple and there's not too much know-how involved, according to Becker. All you need is a piece of string, a chunk of meat and a dip net.

When a crab takes on the piece of meat you move him in slowly and shake him into a handy tub or sack. They also can be caught with dropnets. And then, Becker warns, don't let one of the crabs bite your finger.

You Can Help Reduce Accidents On the Farm; Here Are 15 Ways

You, Mr. Farmer and Rancher, can help reduce accidents on the farm!

Mental alertness, safety consciousness, the ability to recognize hazards and a determination to eliminate them, and efficiency in all farm operations are more essential to safety in agriculture than many rules or regulations, says Sam Whitlow, president of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council.

However, for the sake of brevity, here are 15 good rules, which if followed, will help reduce the terrific toll of farm accidents, Whitlow points out.

(1) Keep walkways and steps in good repair, unobstructed and well lighted.

(2) Keep ladders in good repair and easily accessible in case of emergency.

(3) Always stop a machine before unclogging, oiling or adjusting it. Keep all machine guards and safety devices in place.

(4) Don't wear loose and floppy clothes around machinery.

(5) Start tractors smoothly and turn corners slowly — avoid ditch banks and soft ground — always hitch to the draw-bar.

(6) Speak to animals when approaching them. Keep THEM calm by acting with calm self-assurance YOURSELF.

(7) Always keep bulls in safe

bull pens. Never handle bulls unless they are properly restrained.

(8) Know and obey all traffic laws. Stop driving if you get sleepy. Never ride with a driver who has had a "drink."

(9) Keep your back straight and lift heavy loads with your leg muscles. Don't try to lift anything that is too heavy for you.

(10) Use the right tools for the job — make sure they are in good condition — keep them in a safe place.

(11) Give prompt attention to even minor injuries.

(12) Keep guns unloaded except when actually using them. Treat every gun as though it WERE loaded. And NEVER aim at anything you don't want to shoot.

(13) Don't use kerosene to start fires. Pour kerosene or gasoline outdoors to prevent the accumulation of treacherous vapors. Dry clean outdoors.

(14) Don't smoke around the barn.

(15) Never swim alone. Never dive into water without first determining the depth. And be careful around boats of any kind — never stand up in small boats.

GI Guaranteed Loan Program Extended 2 Years

World War II veterans have two more years in which to obtain Veterans Administration-guaranteed home, farm and business loans as the result of a bill signed into law July 14, 1960, by the President.

Under this same law, both World War II and Korean conflict veterans can continue to apply for direct loans from the Federal Government if they live in designated rural areas where GI loans are not obtainable from the local lending institutions.

The new law authorizes Treasury Department advances of \$159 million in each of the next two years of this direct loan extension program. New expiration date for the guaranteed loan program for World War II veterans and for the direct loan program for World War II and Korean veterans is July 25, 1962. The prior deadline for both programs was July 25, 1960.

Since it was started in June, 1944, the GI Loan Program has guaranteed more than five million loans to World War II veterans, totaling approximately \$41 billion, and to 775,000 Korea veterans, amounting to nearly \$9 billion.

Since direct loans were first authorized in July 1950, the VA has made 165,000 direct loans totaling \$13 billion in rural areas and small towns where veterans could not secure loans from local lending facilities.

While both World War II and Korea veterans may now apply for direct loans through July 25, 1962, Korea veterans may continue to seek VA-guaranteed loans through January 31, 1965, through previous legislation.

The GI loan interest rate of 5 1/4 percent remains unchanged by the new law.

The new law also will require that earnest money deposits veterans make be placed in trust accounts so that they will be safeguarded in case the builder becomes insolvent.

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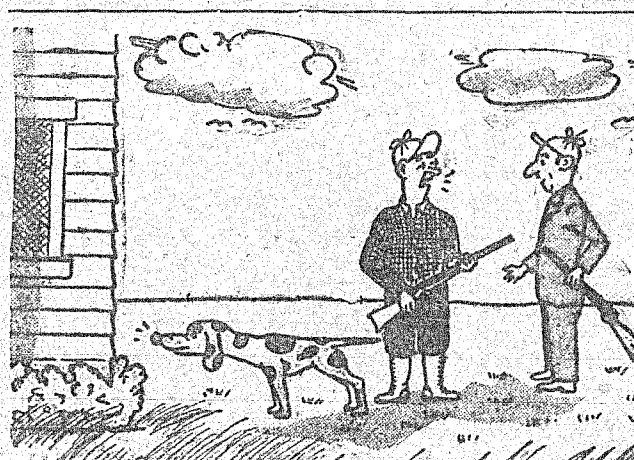

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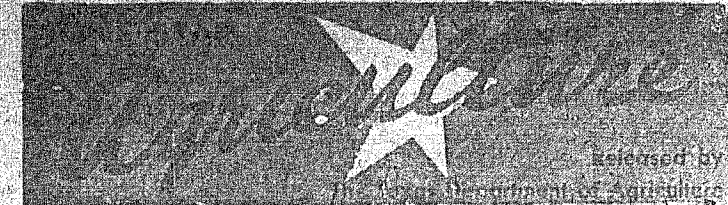

Suggested Ways To Help Old Folks Prevent Accidents
Old folks at home can be a problem.
Many have failing eyesight, deafness, stiffening of the joints and muscles, diminished sense of smell and other physical failings.
According to the Texas Safety Association such failings contribute annually to thousands of accidental home deaths.
Nearly 15,000 Americans over 65 years of age die each year in home accidents. About 11,500 are victims of falls. Fire burns and other deaths associated with fires account for about 1,500 deaths a year. Accidental poisonings, too, are a big problem among oldsters.
How can you help keep senior citizens safe?
To prevent falls, TSA suggests:
1. Increase the amount of light on stairs. Put a light by an older's bed.
2. Remove slipping and tripping hazards.
3. Install hand rails and grab bars in bathroom and hallway.
4. Make sure there's a clear path from bed to door.
Burns and fire deaths can be reduced by:
1. Following manufacturer's directions for installing and operating home heating equipment.
2. Make sure older persons know the best escape route from the house.
3. Working out a plan for family members to aid an older person in case of emergency.
4. Installing a home fire alarm for early warning.
Poisonings can be prevented if people will take these precautions:
1. Store internal and external medicines on different shelves in the medicine cabinet.
2. Store household cleaning agents away from food or seasonings.
3. Keep just one night's supply of medicine by the bed. That way, there's no chance of an over-dose.

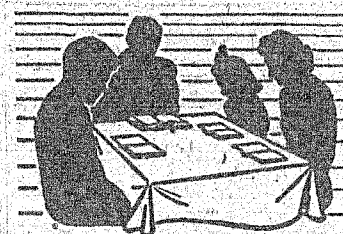
