Commissioners Reach Decision on Constable's Salary, Sheriff's Vehicle

Garza County Commissioners' Court reached a decision Monday, February 27 regarding the salary of Constable Mike Harper who had appeared before the commissioners in an executive session on February 13 to request a change in the \$1 a year budgeted for the elected position.

In Monday's meeting, County Judge E.A. Howard made the motion that Harper's salary should be adjusted to meet that now paid precinct 1 and 3 constable Lonnie Gene Peel, along with \$25 monthly for travel expenses, and that a new line item be put in the budget for this increase.

Judge Howard's motion was seconded by Commissioner Herbert Walls and the motion carried by a vote of 4 to 1, with Commissioners Aten and Ellis voting with Howard and Walls.

Monday's ruling did not affect the insurance benefits which are included as part of the constable's salary, but it was entered into the minutes that the precinct 2 and 4 constable position is a new one for Harper and that he has two years from the time he took office to be certified.

Harper was unable to attend Monday's court, but was represented by Pat N. Walker.

In other business, the Garza County Sheriff's Department acquired a second new vehicle Monday when a bid was awarded to Vyas Motors for a 1988 Chevrolet Caprice to be delivered immediately at a cost of \$15,232.

The other bid came from Smith Ford in Slaton for a 1989, police package Ford Victoria for \$13,949 with delivery in six to eight weeks.

Requests for bids on the vehicle stated that delivery must be made immediately.

Judge Howard made the motion that Vyas' bid be accepted because of the immediate need for the vehicle by the sheriff's department. The motion was seconded by Walls and the motion carried by a vote of 3 to 2 with Aten voting with Howard and Walls.

Another 1988 vehicle had been purchased from Vyas Motors February 15, 1989 for \$13,529.

South Plains Association of Governments was represented in Commissioners' Court by Karen King, Jerry Casstevens, Robert Marshall and Tim Pierce who each gave brief statements on the services offered the county by their departments at SPAG.

Also addressing the court were Jim Collins of Perdue, Brandon and Fielder, a firm whose practice is limited to the collection of ad valorem taxes for entities who levy that tax, and Ron Kirchoff of KMK

Enterprises, a voter registration service.

No decision was made on either of the proposals.

The sewer ordinance which will go into effect state-wide in September was discussed, with Judge Howard in favor of establishing a county sewer ordinance for local inspections.

The sewer ordinance states that after September 1, 1989 no new cesspools can be dug and that existing cesspools must be inspected either by the state at a cost of \$200 per inspection or by a local inspector. No cost was quoted for the local inspections.

AChain Letter...Anyway You Package It

The overwhelming desire to get something for nothing has absolutely inundated Garza County, and from what I can see in area newspapers and television, the entire South Plains...perhaps all of West Texas.

If you haven't been asked to buy the instructions and put your name on the sheet of paper and get thousands of dollars in return, then you must have been napping or been out of the country.

I chose not to participate for a number of reasons, the least of which is my rock-bottom policy of paying for something I think has some value...and a piece of paper that I sell to someone else doesn't qualify as something of value.

Another reason is that the "pyramid scheme" is illegal...by federal and state statutes.

The state law in question is very clear...under the section titled Fraud, Section 32.48, Endless Chain Scheme.

(1) "Endless chain" means any scheme for the disposal or distribution of property whereby a participant pays a valuable consideration for the chance to receive compensation for introducing one or more additional persons into participation in the scheme or for the chance to receive compensation when a person introduced by the participant introduces a new participant.

Cultural Resources Report Completed Garza County Citizens Praised

Several Garza County citizens were praised by Prewitt and Associates in a massive two volume report on the Justiceburg lake site.

The Phase I Cultural Resources Investigations at the Justiceburg Reservoir on the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River was recently completed and submitted to the city of Lubbock.

A copy was also delivered to Post Mayor Giles McCrary.

"We are pleased to send on behalf of the City of Lubbock the final report of survey of the proposed Justiceburg Reservoir project completed by Prewitt and Associates, Inc.," the cover letter from Freese

and Nichols, Inc. cultural resources director Susan L. Andrews comments.

"We feel that the report makes a significant contribution to the understanding of cultural resources in a little-studied area, and hope that you will find it of interest as well," Andrews adds.

The acknowledgment to the report by the authors for Prewitt and Associates:

"Seldom is there a reservoir survey where the fieldwork proceeds smoothly as has this one.

It is a welcome relief and a sincere pleasure that the fieldwork at Justiceburg Reservoir was accomplished in such an atmosphere.

The people of Garza County land the Water Utilities Department of the City of Lubbock are thanked for their gracious hospitality.

The landowners in the project area and the people of Post and

Justiceburg made the short field season a pleasant one.

We frequented the Miller's Fort Justice trading post to come in out of the rain, rendezvous with visitors, or to simply chew the buffalo fat.

We were always greeted warmly and left well fed.

Many of the landowners and local residents of Post, Justiceburg and Polar supported our efforts and assisted us by providing useful information.

Mrs Pearl Nance, Mr and Mrs Ewell Morgan, Mr John Ward, Mr Billy Wayne Williams, Mr and Mrs Ernest Ford, Mr Billy Huddleston, Mr Walter Boren and Mr Giles McCrary were especially helpful.

Local amateur archaeologists Frank Runkles of Post and Emmett Shedd, formerly of Post, were gracious enough to allow us to review their collections and shared their knowledge of the area.

Shedd also provided valuable information on sites in and around the project area.

Cotton Trading Sets New One-day Record

Cotton trading over the TELCOT cotton marketing system set a single-day record on February 21 of 385,599 bales, far exceeding the previous one-day record of 86,421 bales set in June, 1986.

The previous record was broken during the first hour and 20 minutes of trading and sales averaged approximately 50,000 bales per hour throughout the day.

TELCOT officials offered no explanation for the sudden surge in buyers' interest in Texas and Oklahoma cotton citing a lack of recent developments or news about major export sales. For the week ending February 16, total bales sold TELCOT were 63,727.

TELCOT, an electronic cotton marketing system introduced in 1975, is available to Texas and Oklahoma cotton producers through their local gins.

Photographers' Program is on Testing Lens

Caprock Photographers will meet Tuesday, March 7 at the Southwestern Public Service meeting room at 7 p.m. We extend an invitation to all who are interested in photography to join us.

At our last meeting, Bill Mueller announced his tentative plans for the fall photography show. Marie Neff and Ray Mason were appointed to the Purchase Award committee. The club voted to add a new category to the fall show, Garza County Scenes. We have lots of pretty country around Post, so get your camera out and start taking pictures.

Each month, one of our members puts a photo on display in the front window of the SPS office. This grandmother took advantage to it! We hope you enjoy our efforts.

Bill Mueller presented the program on how to test your lens. You should check the lens on your own camera before purchase to see if the image is clear or fuzzy. If you use a multiplier, make sure it matches the lens you have. Check the lens in daylight to see if the multiplier is multi-colored. It should show at least a violet color. Bill had taken pictures of a brick wall using f stops above and below what the camera meter said to use. One word of caution, if you continue to get fuzzy pictures, it could be an eye problem. He spent much of his time making sure everything ran smoothly, guiding visitors around the project area, running errands or tracking down information or informants that saved us considerable amounts of time.

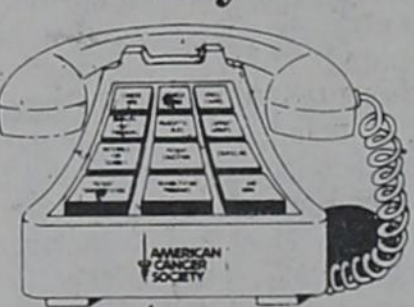

postal authorities if an investigation is started," the BBB letter emphasizes.

"Based on previous experience with this type of scam, the person at the top of the ladder (the one who started it) gets all the cash and there comes a time when those involved reach what is termed the saturation point, this happens when there are no more people to ask to participate," the BBB continued.

"It is mathematically impossible for everyone to make a lot of money with this kind of get-rich-quick scheme," the letter added.

Exactly. And, although I think the law on this is silly and an unnecessary infringement on the rights of people to use their money however they wish, it is the law.

Furthermore, the idea of getting something for nothing is so prevalent in our society, that to me this scheme strikes at the very foundation of our national economic problems.

When we shift a piece of paper from one to another in exchange for a \$5 money order...we are producing absolutely nothing.

And our national productivity is what has set us behind in the world...where the Japanese and other Asian countries have whipped us in the market place with their strong work ethic.

It's not the pyramid scheme that is hurting us...it is the idea that we can get something for nothing.

Whether we sit waiting for the mailman to bring us our latest round of money orders from other folks looking for their money orders, or for the monthly government check, it's all the same.

The biggest scam in the nation starts in Washington...where the federal government spends money it doesn't have and creates junk money from thin air to pay for stuff we don't need and for salaries to people who produce nothing for the country.

Then we shift the money from one pocket to the other and call it social welfare.

No wonder these pyramid schemes are so popular among our working folks...everyone sees their chance to strike it rich...with little or no major investment.

It just doesn't work...for the vast majority of us, we just get taken for another ride.

The old adage, if it appears to be too good to be true...it probably is.



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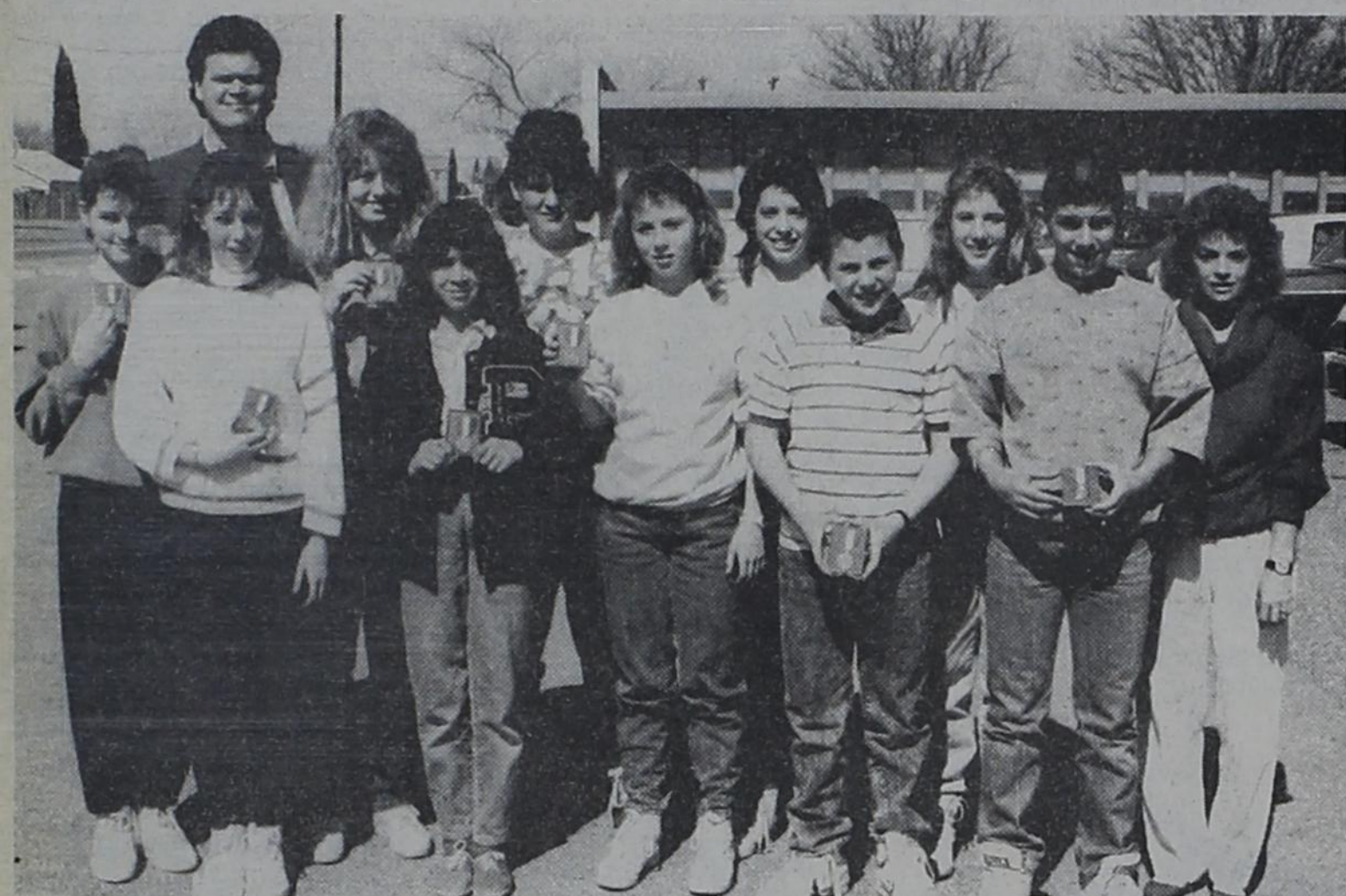

In the Neighborhood

John Christopher White, expressing himself in wood sculpture, was a recent visitor as guest artist and demonstrator in the Southland Schools where he explained to the students how he is able to see and develop sculptures that seem to emerge naturally from the patterns and the shapes of woods.

He uses native woods of juniper and mesquite, utilizing the shapes and grains in the woods to enhance the movements and details in his sculpture. The wood selection and the work involved in shaping, sanding and finishing are the results of a planned sculpture that formed in his mind.

"Art is an expression of the soul," White said. "The more clearly an idea is expressed, the better the art. Having a piece of work that is both pleasing to the senses and able to convey a message, is my idea of good art. Having a message worth conveying is my idea of successful art."

"Scripture says, 'out of the abundance of the heart a man speaks.' For me, fulfillment and a sense of satisfaction come through being able to express my joys and concern in a clear and meaningful way. The fun comes in doing it in wood.

"Wood carving is the most challenging form of sculpture I've encountered - convincing a tree to change the shape it has held for centuries is just plain tricky, as the chips fly we usually end up with a compromise, the like of which cannot come out of metal, clay or stone," White added.

He was born in Amherst and raised in Lubbock and attended the National Institute of Fine Arts San Miguel de Allende, Guanajuato, Mexico for three years.

He has exhibited on state, local and international levels and has won top awards where he has shown his work. He will be remembered in Post as a participant in the last O.S. Art Show, with his magnificent peacock carved in juniper.

White's appearance was co-sponsored by the Southland Schools and the Caprock Cultural Association.
