Local Boy Seriously Injured In Train Mishap at Waco

ENROUTE HOME WHEN ACCIDENT OCCURED

The entire town was saddened this morning (Thursday) when the message arrived from Waco that Jimmie McKinnon had received a serious injury when he attempted to board a train Wednesday night. A leg was crushed so badly that it was necessary to amputate it.

Jimmie left Lamesa a few days ago to go to Austin where he intended to enter the State University this term, but due to illness had started home when the accident happened.

Corpus Boyd, another Lamesa boy was with Jimmie, and in a telephone message to him about noon today, he stated that Jimmie was resting fairly well. Jimmie's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred McKinnon are going to Waco tonight to be with their son.

R. F. C. To Furnish Cans to Co. Residents

The local RFC office expects a shipment of cans this week to be distributed to residents of this county who wish to can their home grown products and give the RFC back only a very small percent of their canned stuff.

Where the producer furnishes the labor, equipment and the products they will be allowed to keep 75 per cent of the vegetables canned and 90 per cent of the meat, the other 25 and 10 per cent to be turned into the RFC office, who will then distribute it among the needy of the county.

Cotton Pickers Asked To Sign at RFC Office

Dawson county families wishing to pick cotton in this county are asked to sign at the local RFC office, located in the old Panhandle Lumber Company office, and a list of farmers desiring pickers will be furnished him. Officials of the RFC stated this week that a number of Dawson county farmers were wanting pickers, and people wanting this kind of work should come in at once.

Wilkes Grocery Being Remodeled

The Wilkes Cash Grocery is this week being remodeled on the inside with many new shelves and other attractive cases being added. All the fixtures are being repainted and the management stated this week that they hoped to have everything spick and span by the last of the week.

Season Tickets For Students On Sale

The season tickets to the football games this season are being sold to children attending the public schools this week. The sale of tickets started Wednesday morning and will end Friday at one o'clock.

A race between classes of the high school is being run to see who can sell the largest number of tickets. The loser will entertain the other classes with a stunt program next Friday night. Tickets are being sold for five games on the local gridiron, namely, Hamlin "Pied Pipers", September 29; Hobbs "Oilers", Post "Antelopes", Brownfield "Cubs", and Slaton Tigers, November 11, being the last game.

The tickets will be on sale to the school students at 50c each for high school students and faculty members, and 35 cents for elementary students.

New supplies have been ordered to take care of others who will want to sign this pledge. Already merchants are finding that their customers are asking if they are members of the NRA and "Where is the Blue Eagle?" One consumer asked the question last Saturday "What does this entitle me to?" The answer was given him. "You have the right now that you have signed to demand of any merchant where you trade that he belong to the NRA and display his Blue Eagle. If you go into a place of business and there is no Blue Eagle you are bound not to trade in such a place.

Another man asked, "how will signing help me?" The answer "When all the unemployed, or a major part of them are put back to work, and this is what NRA means, you will be getting more for your products."

Another said, "Will I have to sign this pledge?" The answer, "You will have to either sign it or answer to the President of the United States." Another said, "I had rather sign voluntarily than for the President to tell me that I must sign. I am for the President ALL THE WAY."

SAN ANGELO MAN FOUND DEAD IN LOCAL HOTEL ROOM

Forrest London, 29, of San Angelo Texas, was found dead Monday morning about 11:30 o'clock in a room at a local hotel.

Mr. London was enroute to Lubbock by bus Sunday night and stopped in Lamesa apparently too ill to continue his journey. He was carried from the bus to the hotel where he registered and secured a room. He retired about 10 o'clock, telling the clerk that he was feeling better, and to call him next morning in time for him to dress so that he might take the noon bus on to Lubbock.

Not answering the call about 11:20 Monday morning, the clerk entered the room where he found the body. Local doctors summoned stated that he had been dead some eight or nine hours.

The remains were sent to San Angelo Monday afternoon for burial.

Mr. London lived with his parents in San Angelo, who are pioneers of that section. Besides his parents he is survived by one sister and one brother.

UNCLE SAM MEANS BUSINESS ON NRA

He has set up in Lamesa a Compliance Board for enforcement of the N. R. A. This is a Federal body and will proceed in a business like manner to work our N. R. A. problems. It will get specific instructions from Washington that will govern its actions and procedure.

The board in completing its organization and in session Monday night of this week makes the announcement: "We desire to work with the employee, the consumer and the employer in causing the NRA program to become the most efficient and effective in our community. It is part of our President's program and we feel should have the support of the entire public. We are expecting a minimum number of complaints in this county. But when complaints come to us we hope to be able to bring about conciliation and a full cooperation of the NRA agreement without much trouble or embarrassment to all parties concerned. If, however, we cannot do this it becomes our duty to report to NRA officials at Washington and of course then abide by their decision. We hope to be able to proceed in a business like manner and shall not at any time listen to rumors. We can hear no complaints except as a body and not as individuals. We call on the public not to pay any attention to rumors. As we understand it if the Blue Eagle is displayed in any business that business is properly in line and should not be criticized until by Federal authority it is ordered removed. All complaints coming before us must be made out in writing and signed by the complainant before we can consider same.

"Above all we must have the full cooperation of the public, as we try to serve gratuitously on this patriotic job."

The local board is awaiting full instructions and further information from National NRA headquarters before announcing its policies and plan of procedure. These are expected in the next ten days.

It is expressly desired that it be known that the local compliance board has no enforcement or punishing powers. It will conduct trials and submit facts to Washington and direct enforcement comes from Federal authority.

Stress is also placed on the fact this local body is not aligned with any other organization in the community but is an agency of the National Government. It is also pointed out that this board will serve for 45 days and without pay.

Home Owner Bonds Attracts Interest

Created by an act of Congress and approved by the President in June of this year, the Home Owners' Loan Corporation is attracting much interest among local people along with other home owners of the nation.

The corporation was created by Congress in an effort to protect the home owners from inequitable enforced liquidation in time of general distress, and was declared by President Roosevelt as a proper concern of the Government.

It has a capital stock of \$200,000,000 subscribed by the United States of America, and may issue bonds up to \$2,000,000,000 in order to carry out the objects for which it was created. The earnings of the Corporation will be derived from interest received on the loans. The margin between the rate of interest paid on the bonds and the interest received on the loans and investments will, it is anticipated cover costs of operation and, eventually, the setting up of adequate surplus and reserves.

The Corporation will function for a 3-year period ending June 13, 1936 by making an exchange of its bonds in acquisition of first mortgages on homes, and by making loans in cash in certain states. Negotiations will be conducted through local managers who have been appointed in every state.

We are indebted to J. L. Shoemaker Jr., of the First National Bank here for data and references concerning this plan, and those interested in this method of protecting themselves from the loss of their homes would do well to secure further details from him.

Bond Provisions

These bonds are the direct obligations of the Home Owners' Loan Corporation, and the fixed assets of the Corporation which support these bonds will consist of all the first mortgages on homes as described above, including those made in cash provided by the issuance of capital stock and those acquired through the exchange of bonds. The bonds will constitute the only fixed liability of the Corporation, ranking ahead of the capital stock and the earnings thereon. As payments of principal on loans are made and loans satisfied, the Corporation will retire bonds. The Corporation has the power to purchase its bonds at any time and may call bonds by lot at par. Every bond will be retired before any capital stock is liquidated.

The Treasury Department has agreed to accept these bonds at par to secure the deposit of public moneys, likewise the trustees of the Postal Savings System have also made them eligible to secure deposits of Postal Savings Funds at market value.

By the terms of the Home Owners' Loan Act of 1933 the bonds are free of all Federal, State, municipal and local taxation (except surtaxes, inheritance, estate, and gift taxes) and are guaranteed fully and unconditionally as to interest only by the United States of America. No taxes may be imposed on the Corporation its franchise, capital, reserves, and surplus, nor upon its loans and income. The Corporation is required to accept these bonds from the borrower at face value in payments of interest and principal due it on indebtedness whether the payments are in part or in full.

The Attorney General of the United States has rendered an opinion up holding the legality and regularity of this issue of bonds. Copies of the opinion will be furnished on request.

Many Enter Fair Baby Doll Parade

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 20.—Many entries in the Baby Doll Parade which will be held as one of the features of the 1933 State Fair of Texas have already been received, according to Otto Herold, president of the exposition. The Baby Doll Parade will be held in front of the auditorium at noon on Saturday, Oct. 21, at which time more than 100 babies with their baby dolls and baby buggies are expected to parade before the judges for the prizes offered the three selected as the best. Prizes will be paid in gold.

The contest is open to any girl owning a doll and doll buggy in the State of Texas and the only requirement is that she be under the age of ten years. One entrant and one adult accompanist will be admitted to the fair free for the contest immediately preceding the parade. Entries can be mailed to the secretary of the State Fair.

Cotton Consumption Increases In Texas

Austin, Sept. 27.—Consumption of cotton by Texas cotton mills during August was 6,423 bales or about 33 per cent greater than the 4,817 bales consumed in August last year but was almost 10 per cent less than in July of the current year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

"Production of cotton goods amounted to 6,520,000 yards, or 6 per cent less than in July," the Bureau's report said. "This was, however 42 per cent above August last year. Sales of cloth, 3,882,000 yards were 35 per cent below those of July and 48 per cent under August, 1932. Unfilled orders, 7,690,000 yards, declined 20 per cent from July and also from August last year.

"Active spindles, numbering 162,584, declined 2.8 per cent from July but were 17 per cent above August last year, while spindle hours were 4 per cent below those of July but 21 per cent above those of August, 1932.

8-Semester Rule In Effect In League

Austin, Texas, September 27.—This year will see the inauguration of the new 8-semester rule of the Interscholastic League (adopted a year ago last spring but effective September, 1933). This rule is based on attendance in school rather than on participation in League activities, according to Roy B. Henderson of the University of Texas Bureau, and makes ineligible any participant in any League event, either literary or athletic, after he or she has been in high school eight semesters.

This rule is predicated on the belief that the Interscholastic League is designed for the average high school boy or girl, and that such a student would be handicapped in competing with older, more experienced boys or girls.

The first application of this rule will be with the opening of league football this month.

McDonald Says Texas Farmers To Get About \$260,000,000.00

Washington, Sept. 27.—J. E. McDonald, Texas commissioner of agriculture, added up tonight the benefits, actual and prospective, to Texas cotton farmers from all the administrative motives in his behalf, including today's action making probable a minimum price of ten cents and figured the total at more than \$260,000,000.

"Texas will have a crop, according to latest estimates of roughly, 4,000,000 bales," he said. "At the ten cent figure that means around \$200,000,000. In addition our farmers get \$44,368,000 in cotton 'plow-up' checks. And they also will get a minimum of \$16,000,000 as bonuses in consideration of the differential between the present minimum price of ten cents and the former six cent level."

The commissioner went on to say that today's action thus meant, practically speaking, a minimum of all time better than 13 cents a pound.

The NRA. What It Is And What It Means

Text of Address Delivered By National Recovery Administrator, Hugh S. Johnson, N. R. A. Rally, Madison Square Garden, New York City, Tuesday Night, September 12, 1933 Reprinted by Special Request

This is a milestone in the program of the President's great plans. The old system of enforced non-cooperation in industry had failed through our dreary years. For a century we had denied to our people the right to participate in any national economic program except through a so-called rugged individualism. The President's idea was that the nation can trust its industries to cooperate to abolish abuses, and it can trust our people to act with them.

Under the Recovery Act, American trade and industry are invited to combine with Government to work out their own salvation. They are

asked to take their workers into this partnership and the whole people are shown a way to support this common effort. If ever a great public measure was conceived in faith in the institutions and the people of a great Nation, this is the measure.

Let us go back into our memories half a year. The banks were closed in dread of dangers worse than we have ever known. The future was so black with clouds that even the wisest among our leaders saw no light. Factories were closed or were operated only by the daring of their management, and no man could be perfectly sure that six months would still see his family fed and sheltered.

In this murk there were plenty of foolish prophets of disaster. Men talked of a dictatorship. It was freely said that our political structure was in danger and some times that what is loosely called the capitalistic system had completely failed. Such legislation as is the Recovery Act was sought by men who now wonder whether we are not so far on the way to recovery that there should be no action at all to avert disaster.

Some memories may be short, but I can never forget the urging under which, against all my inclinations, I took this thankless and exposed position. There were no more corporals of industry who insisted that decisive and instant action were imperative. There were then not a few, who in the light of what had happened in other countries believed that an economic Czarism was necessary. The Capital was full of cure-all proposals, not by unknown visionaries, but by some heads of great industrial corporations.

In the midst of this confusion the newly elected President projected a few simple ideas of his own. He dissolved no parliaments and he departed not at all from our constitutional forms. There is a sort of unconscious irony in a few of the things he did. For almost forty years some men in industry had complained that it had suffered most of its ills from a statutory denial of opportunity to act in unison. In this crisis he said, "very well—act together, but act with me for the common good."

Ilion T. Jones, of the Madison Avenue Church San Antonio. The meeting of this committee will be held before Synod convenes. The local minister is also one of the official delegates to Synod from Abilene Presbytery, being elected as such at the last regular meeting of Presbytery, which was held a few weeks ago in the local Presbyterian church.

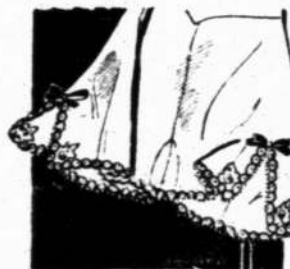
