was the fact that, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, expenses were down for the year.

“There’s so many moving parts,” Bryant said. “Students did travel, but they didn’t travel as much. There weren’t basketball tournaments. There were some missing football games, things like that. So we didn’t have to spend as much as I had budgeted. Employees didn’t travel. They’re just now starting to travel. I’m actually traveling for the first time this week. Y’all (the school board members) didn’t travel. There was a lot of online stuff. Then sub pay is down because we have trouble finding subs because of COVID and because our pricing’s not real good. Payroll is down in general, specifically because enrollment was down. So as a result, we didn’t have to fill as many positions.”

Superintendent Jay McWilliams said payroll reduction meant a big savings for the district during the COVID year.

“Just teachers alone was like, \$1.2 million that was budgeted but not spent, just on teachers alone,” he said. “Now that’s salaries, benefits, the whole nine yards, but that’s a big chunk of change.”

Then the State of Texas threw another wrinkle into the mix.

“The state said, ‘Okay, we’re going to do a ‘Hold Harmless,’” Bryant said. “Which meant, basically, since everybody in the state was down because of COVID, we were going to be paid for a certain amount of students so we don’t have to take the whole hit.”

Yet another wrinkle: Just as the school leaders are hearing about the third installment of the Elementary and Secondary Students Emergency Relief (ESSER III) grant, which should net the district \$9.6 million, it has also received the ESSER II grant of about \$4.2 million. Good news?

“ESSER II has now come down as of last Thursday/Friday, and they’re telling us that what they’re going to do is, they’re going to look at the Summary of Finance and pay us off the better of the two,” Bryant said. “Meaning, our actual enrollment versus the Hold Harmless. Well, our enrollment is down so far that our Hold Harmless will be the winner. It will be the greater amount. So then, they will take ESSER II, and say, ‘If you got money from the Hold Harmless, we’re taking it away.’”

The way that should work out, Bryant said, is that the \$4.2 million grant will be reduced by the total of the Hold Harmless – which she estimated at a minimum of \$1.6 million.

“What they’re telling us is that they’re going to take that out of 2021,” she said. “So that goes against my bottom line. I’ve gone from a surplus to a deficit now. It’s a moving target.”

Bryant spoke briefly on some of the considerations she’s making for the 2021-22 budget.

“On the budget, it’s very lean right now. I didn’t put in the positions that we didn’t need,” she said. “What’s in the budget right now: No step increases for teachers. No across-the-board raises. No buses or vehicles, we don’t really need any buses. We kind of need vehicles...we have had three totaled in the last year and a half. Right now, the elementary repairs are not in there. There’s no new technology, we’re in really good shape.”

In other business, the board held a public hearing on the ESSER III grant. The district held a public meeting Monday to discuss the grant with members of the public, and about 50 people attended that meeting. No one spoke publicly at the school board meeting.

The school board led off the meeting by recognizing the district’s elementary and secondary teachers of the year. The elementary school honoree is Georgia Molina, a fourth-grade math teacher at Goliad; while the secondary school honoree is Tabitha Barbee, a seventh-grade Texas history teacher and coach for volleyball and track.

The school board accepted grants from the Lady Steers Booster Club and the H.O.P.E. Foundation. The booster club donated \$10,000 toward the purchase of a new scoreboard in Steer Gym, and six \$1,000 donations, one to each of BSISD’s girls’ sports teams. The H.O.P.E. Foundation gave grants to 10 teachers totaling \$24,751.

The board also approved an interlocal agreement with 1 Government Procurement Alliance for cooperative purchasing services; approved the fifth year of a five-year contract with the district’s food service provider, Aramark; and approved a budget amendment and expenditure of up to \$800,000 for new turf at Memorial Stadium. McWilliams said the current turf is 10 years old, and could begin to pose a hazard to players due to wear. The district has received a quote for the new turf in the amount of \$791,000.

The board also approved the sale of five tax properties totaling \$15,000.


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Reflections: Why Go To Church

Last week we made our first road trip in more than a year, a thousand-mile round trip to Santa Fe at the foot of the Sangre de Cristo mountains. People were everywhere. The roads were packed, as were the usual stops at McDonalds and Love's. Restaurants were busy with waits of an hour or more.

The year of isolation appears to be over, and everyone wants to go somewhere.

But will we return to church? Michelle Boorstein, writing for the Washington Post, pondered the question: "All year clergy have been waiting to see if slews of people will decide to become virtual-only members, flit between multiple virtual services, or just quit congregational life altogether."

As I have thought about it, I have asked myself the question, "Why should I go to church?"

I should go to church because, down deep, I believe in Jesus Christ.

I think it is what He would want me to do. Even though the Jewish authorities turned against Him, it was always Jesus' custom, or "habit" to attend the synagogue each Sabbath. (Luke 4:16).

And even though churches are seldom what they ought to be, I need to follow Jesus' example.

I go because I need to be encouraged in my faith and I want to encourage others. While I have been disappointed by some pastors and church leaders over the years, I have found many more that inspire me. I find that going to church lifts my spirits. Other believers take an interest in me and pray for me. And I seek to do the same for them. (1 Thessalonians 5:11; Hebrews 3:13).

I go to church because churches make the world a better place. All churches, as we know, are flawed. Someone once asked me if I knew of any churches that did not have any problems. I asked if he knew of churches that didn't have any people. Where there are people, there will be problems. But most churches seek ways to feed the hungry, help the poor, comfort the grieving and care for the aging. Churches pull us outside ourselves and call us to a higher and better world.

I go because I want my children to go.

Even though my children are grown and gone, I still want to be an example to them, as I sought to

be when I was raising them. Going to church is a discipline. Sometimes I don't feel like it. But I have learned over the years that the best things in life require effort.

Worship, Christian fellowship, and service are disciplines that I believe are worth passing on to the next generation.

I am sure there are many other reasons why people attend church. There are other reasons why I do as well, but these are the three that stand out in my mind.

Soon, I hope, churches will be filled with welcoming smiles, warm embraces and joyful singing.

As the Scripture says, "And let us consider how we may spur one another on to love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another – and all the more as you see the Day approaching," (Hebrews 10:24-25).

How many yokes can we place on the neck of a plow horse? Just one.

And how many yokes can we carry on our necks?

Just one.

But the religion of the mixture of Law and grace comes along side us and intends to place two yokes upon our necks – the heavy yoke of the Law and Christ's easy yoke. Imagine a plow horse carrying two yokes on his neck.

This would be ridiculous; this would be confusion. However, this is exactly what the religion of the deeds of the Law does.

A yoke is not a yoke without a burden.

We do not place yokes on our necks just because they look pretty.

If Christ's yoke is easy, then this also means that His burden is light. The legalists promise us an easy yoke when they tell us that salvation is by grace through faith. But then they demand that, with that easy yoke, we pull the heavy burdens of the Law and religious regulations. However, easy yokes and heavy burdens do not belong together on the same neck.

It is impossible to pull the heavy burden of the Law with Christ's easy yoke.

The appropriate combination is; easy yoke and light burden. Christ's easy yoke and light burden is – confess and be cleansed. But the heavy yoke of the Law demands that we atone for our own sin by bringing a sacrifice.

Legalism says that we must combine the two yokes in order to carry both burdens. But having to pull two separate burdens with two separate

The Cubs beat the Padres five times in six games in a 10-day stretch, including a three-game sweep at Wrigley Field last week.

Darvish (6-2) retired the first nine Cubs batters before Pederson hit a towering home run to right-center field leading off the fourth to tie it at 1.

Darvish pitched well but took the hard-luck loss when the Cubs scored the go-ahead run in the seventh on Anthony Rizzo's double-play ball.

Arrieta allowed one run and four hits in five innings, struck out six and walked one. He allowed Manny Machado's RBI single in the third.

Rex Brothers (2-0) pitched a perfect sixth for the win. Craig Kimbrel pitched a perfect ninth for his 15th save in 17 chances.

OAKLAND, Calif.— Sean Manaea pitched six innings of two-hit ball, and Oakland handed Arizona its 19th straight road loss, the longest such streak in major league baseball since 1985.

Mark Canha had two hits and two RBIs for Oakland, and Jed Lowrie finished with three hits. The AL West leaders won for the sixth time in seven games.

The Diamondbacks dropped their seventh straight game overall.

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Cowboys' Randy Gregory seeks break from suspension-filled history

FRISCO, Texas — Randy Gregory wanted to make sure he didn't spend too much time away from the Dallas Cowboys' facility this offseason.

It's been six years since that was even an option for the oft-suspended defensive end.

The 28-year-old Gregory is part of the club in the spring for the first time since he was drafted in 2015. The NFL's substance-abuse bans have kept him away, and dropped football way down his list of priorities during the times he was on his own.

The former Nebraska standout believes he can help a much-maligned defense in 2021, but that confidence only partly comes from how he played after his fourth suspension ended last season. Another part is more difficult to measure.

"It's a lot of self-love," Gregory said this week during the Cowboys' mandatory three-day minicamp. "There was a time in my life when you could ask me to say one good thing about myself and I couldn't. I could say 20 bad things.

"I have come a long way from that. I can say a lot of good things about myself. I am proud of myself. I am proud of where I am at. I am proud of the journey I took. A lot of guys don't make it as far as I have."

Gregory tested positive for marijuana at the combine before he was drafted and his first suspension came soon after his rookie season. He played just two games total over two seasons in 2016-17 before career highs of six sacks and 14 games in 2018.

Another ban cost him all of 2019, and he was reinstated just before the start of last season while having to sit the first six games. He's never gone

two full seasons without being suspended, but has that chance this year.

Maybe then Gregory will be closer to his wish.

"I want to get away from that past," Gregory said. "I feel like there's a certain narrative you guys have to follow or choose to follow as far as my journey. That's what people want to read about and hear about.

"I've done a great job the last few years with the team on and off the field and I'm looking forward to the future, if that's three years, five years, whatever it is. I'm having fun. I'm doing what I need to do."

Gregory had 3½ sacks in 10 games last year and said he was vocal with coaches about wanting more playing time while they were easing him back in on a defense that gave up the most points in franchise history.

Defensive coordinator Mike Nolan and defensive line coach Jim Tomsula, hired by Mike McCarthy after he replaced Jason Garrett as coach last year, were fired after just one season. They were replaced by Dan Quinn and Aden Durde.

"He'd better want to play more because I plan on playing him more," McCarthy said. "I think the most important thing for him is he's been here every day. I didn't know Randy this time last year. He's doing great, looks great and we're expecting big things from him."

The Cowboys knew they were taking a risk when drafting Gregory in the second round, but they have stuck with him through the suspensions in part because the front office knew Gregory would be a bargain because of how the bans affected his contracts. The \$1.9 million he's due to make in 2021 is by far the most of his career, and then he will be an unrestricted free agent.

"Where I came from, I am not thinking about a damn contract right before the season starts," Gregory said. "I still got a lot to do."

Playing a full season would be one of those things. Injuries interrupted the two other chances he had, as a rookie in 2015 and again three years later.

Taking on a bigger leadership role would be another, since DeMarcus Lawrence is the only defensive lineman who has been with Dallas longer than the 28-year-old Gregory.

"I think that's one of the biggest things for me that I've always struggled with is my leadership skills on and off the field," Gregory said. "I feel like guys are looking at me for input and advice or looking at me to make a play and show people how it's done."

Being a team leader was far from Gregory's mind each of the past five offseasons. That it's even a possibility says plenty, as Gregory realized in a recent conversation with his father.

"He reads all this stuff, knows all this stuff talked about me," Gregory said. "He's like, 'It's funny. I don't see you being talked about as much in the media this year. I don't know if it's 'cause you're here and there's not that storyline or what?'"

"Yeah I think that's a good thing. It's a win, I would agree. I think I understand why it's being asked. It takes time to build trust and that's what I'm going to do."

Finishing a normal offseason will help build the trust.

USA Basketball sets plan for Olympic camps in Las Vegas

For USA Basketball, the last stop before the Tokyo Olympics will be Las Vegas.

The men's and women's national teams will hold training camps in Las Vegas in July, they announced Thursday, and they'll be playing seven exhibitions there against other Olympics-bound national teams as well.

USA Basketball will open its men's training camp, led by coach Gregg Popovich, in Las Vegas on July 6. The Olympic men's teams from Australia, Nigeria, Argentina and reigning Basketball World Cup champion Spain will also be spending some time in Las Vegas; Argentina will start its training camp there this month.

The U.S. women's training camp under coach Dawn Staley will likely open around July 12; the WNBA break for the Olympics starts after the games of July 11. The Olympic women's teams joining the U.S. in Las Vegas are Australia and Nigeria.

It'll all take place at the MGM Resorts, which was announced as USA Basketball's training camp home and resorts partner with the sides having now agreed to a multi-year sponsorship deal.

"USA Basketball is proud to expand its partnership with MGM Resorts," USA Basketball CEO Jim Tooley said.

"We're excited to bring our national teams to their properties as we prepare for the challenging competition that lies ahead this summer."

The U.S. men are seeking a fourth consecutive Olympic gold medal, the U.S. women their seventh in a row. Both will enter the Olympics ranked No. 1 by FIBA, the sport's international governing body — though it remains unknown who the Americans will have on their rosters for the rescheduled Tokyo Games.

Those rosters could be set by the end of June. Some top NBA players such as Stephen Curry of

the Golden State Warriors, Kawhi Leonard of the Los Angeles Clippers and Damian Lillard of the Portland Trail Blazers have expressed some interest in being part of the Olympic team; others, such as LeBron James and Anthony Davis — Los Angeles Lakers teammates who were dealing with injuries when their season ended last week — are not planning to join the team.

All teams in Las Vegas will be taking part in what USA Basketball described as "comprehensive health and safety protocols ... including mandatory and regular COVID-19 PCR testing, administered to athletes, coaches, officials and staff in accordance with FIBA and USA Basketball recommendations and CDC guidelines."

Those concerns are why the international teams opted to spend time in Las Vegas. Argentina's men's team is conducting the entirety of its three-week camp there before flying to Tokyo, simply because it believes a controlled environment and less traveling between different countries will minimize virus-related risks before the Olympics.

"We were lucky and, at the same time, we deserved it to get an organization like USA Basketball to extend this invitation to us," Argentina coach Sergio Hernandez said. "In such a complicated context it doesn't get better than this."

The games are set up as part of five doubleheaders, and fans will be able to attend the matchups at MGM's Michelob Ultra Arena. Tickets go on sale next week.

The Nigeria-U.S. women's game will be a prequel to the teams' Olympic meeting on July 27 in Tokyo, the first game there for both of those teams. Nigeria and the U.S. are both in Group B at the Olympics, along with Japan and France.

The Australia-Nigeria men's game is also the warmup for an Olympics-opening matchup. They'll play in a Group B game on July 25.

The men's teams from Spain and Argentina — the teams that played in the World Cup final at Beijing in 2019 — are both in Group C for the Olympics. They'll both spend some time in Las Vegas but are not scheduled to face off there before flying to Japan.

FIBA RANKINGS

Las Vegas will see the top four men's teams in the FIBA rankings there for the exhibitions: The U.S. is No. 1, Spain No. 2, Australia No. 3 and Argentina No. 4. Nigeria is ranked No. 22.

The U.S. women also hold the No. 1 FIBA ranking, and their July 16 opponent Australia is ranked No. 2 in the world. Nigeria's women are ranked No. 17.

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Contract Bridge

Bidding quiz

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has gone:

North	East	South	West
1♥	Dble	Rdbl	Pass
Pass	1♠	?	

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands?

- ♠853 ♥AJ72 ♦QJ9 ♣K84
- ♠KJ93 ♥J6 ♦AJ942 ♣K5
- ♠7♥KQ84 ♦AJ76 ♣AJ98
- ♠J62 ♥Q5 ♦KQ53 ♣K962

1. Two hearts. Your redouble announced 10 or more points, but not necessarily heart support. By bidding two hearts, you show not only your trump fit but also that the redouble was based on minimum values (your one extra point above a minimum redouble is nothing to get excited about). Three hearts would show a stronger hand. Partner should pass two hearts with a dead-minimum opening bid and continue bidding with anything more.

2. Double. If we assume that partner has a normal opening bid — in which case he will pass your penalty double — East is apt to wind up with his arm in a sling. He is likely to go down three — 800 points — and, in fact, he might go down even more. It would be a mistake to let East off the hook by bidding two diamonds or two notrump at this point; some of the juiciest penalties in bridge are

exactad at the one-level.

3. Two spades. Game in hearts is certain, and the spade cuebid is made to alert partner to the possibility of a slam. A jump to three hearts (forcing) would not fully reflect the promise of the hand, so some other bid — such as two spades (or three spades if you play “splinter” bids) — is necessary to suggest a slam.

Some might argue that a two-spade cuebid in this sequence promises the ace or a void in spades. However, it is much more flexible to treat this cuebid simply as showing a hand with enormous potential for slam. In the present case, with your strong minor-suit holdings sitting directly over the doubler, plus your excellent trump support and singleton spade, you have ample justification for such a bid.

4. Pass. There is simply no better call available at this stage. You should therefore let East's spade bid roll around to your partner to see what he wants to do. Your pass is 100% forcing — partner is not permitted to pass. If he rebids one notrump or two hearts — both weak rebids — you should pass, as you have no extra values. But if he names a new suit or makes a jump-rebid, you will certainly bid again, while if he doubles one spade (for penalties), you will happily pass.
