SANDERSON PROPERTY OWNERS AND RESIDENTS ARE DUE PROTECTION

EDITORIAL

We believe that the full realization of the terrible catastro-
phe that would befall Sander son should a fire break out in
the business district of the town was forceably brought home
to the residents Sunday when the fire broke out in the store
room used by the Yeates Barber Shop, and which destroyed
a thousand dollars worth of theatre equipment as well as did
several hundred dollars worth of damage to the building. No
sane person would doubt the results had the fire not been dis-
covered before it reached the rafters of the building.

It is a common saying among the residents of Sander son
that there has been no serious fire loss in the past twenty
years and that we have credit for a good fire record. That is
all true, but we are way out of line with the law of averages
and sooner or later it is going to catch up with us. When that
happens Sander son is going to suffer losses that will run into
thousands of dollars unless she is prepared.

And to be prepared she must have a fire department of
some kind—a fire department properly equipped for com-
bating fires and saving property and fire loss. Before a
water fighting department can be organized we must have
fire plugs installed from which to pump water. And if there
is not sufficient water for such a department as the present
shortage indicates, then a truck with a tank of about 500
gallon capacity with a booster should be purchased, or a
chemical plant. It is going to take drastic action to get
results, and the first step toward this would be incorporation
of our town so that organized effort can be placed behind
the movement.

People who believe in our town, who wish to see it progress
and prosper, will realize that we must offer prospective resi-
dents fire protection. We must give them a town that looks
and is clean—and a citizenry that takes pride in its yards
and premises.

A fire that got a head start with a gentle breeze, as we
usually have, to fan it, and the present water set-up and
fire-fighting methods—without any equipment what-so-ever,
without fire plugs, and not enough water—would wipe San-
derson off the map. Let's prepare to save our town that
has been built over past years.

phalt surface. Plans call for the
paving of First and Second
Streets, starting at the railroad
and going north six blocks, or to
Kerr Avenue. First street runs
on the west side of the school
and courthouse and second street
runs on the east. Intersecting
streets in between the two will
also be paved.

This will give paving complete-
ly around the school grounds and
the courthouse, as well as each of
the other blocks which lie be-
tween the two streets running
north and south. The paving is
to be twenty feet in width which
will be ample, and will eliminate
much of the dust that is stirred
up each day by traffic over the
two streets and sifted into the
school rooms and into the court-
house.

It is understood that present
plans call for paving of other
streets as soon as funds are avail-
able and will tie into pavement
that has already been put down.
With this procedure, it should be
but a few years until all streets
of Sander son are hard surfaced
and dust is practically eliminat-
ed altogether.

Payment for this work is to
be made about one-half in cash
and the balance in warrants to
be issued which will be retired
in one year and bearing interest
at the rate of five percent per
annum.

"The Little Princess" With Shirley Temple Photographed in Color

This is above all the first Shirley Temple vehicle to come to the screen photographed in full color. Miss Temple's supporting cast is nameful beyond precedent. It offers the oncoming Richard Green, well up in recent fan popularity surveys, as a clean-limbed young Britisher carrying the love



interest, a simple but adequate one, with Anita Louise as the beautiful and somewhat persecuted young woman of his affections. As directed by Walter Lang it ranges from orthodox narrative, soundly appealing to adults, to shamelessly fabricated humors delicious to juvenile eye and ear. Logic cause-and-effect, time-equations and prosaic considerations in general kind are tossed over at various points in the late stretches of the picture but by then nobody cares about such trifles. The Temple charm has functioned then, to cushion improbabilities thoroughly and the color-process by then has applied a high deep gloss completely concealing lose story ends.

The early portion of the picture is strong in family appeal. The Little Princess' father places her in a boarding-school to await his return from the Boer War, and their farewell is an acting triumph for both players. As the story goes, word is received that the father has died in action, whereupon the stern boarding-school mistress reduces the child from student status to that of slave. Unwilling to believe that her father is dead, the little girl runs away from school to a nearby hospital looking for her father among the injured soldiers returning from the front. She narrowly misses finding him several times but Queen Victor, visiting the place, aids her in the search, which is ultimately successful.

Midway in the picture a dream sequence presents Miss Temple and the principals, plus ballet, trapeze, soldiers, and so on, in a rhymed fantasy and ballet, an eye-filling and independently charming interlude.

In order to achieve his objective, John Garfield, the reporter, gets himself sentenced to "Blackwell's Island." There he is subjected to a series of persecutions which it is planned by the gang leader, will end with his death. But he manages to escape, lay his evidence before a new and honest commissioner of correction, and co-operate with that official in a sensational raid on the jail. Flowers Should Be Watered Less Often and Heavier

Watering flowers a little every night may be fun, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, but the flowers will do better if they are watered thoroughly once a week and allowed to dry out somewhat in between times.

A summer mulch of peat moss or a similar mulch will prove more than worthwhile in holding back weeds, keeping the soil cooler, and reducing surface evaporation. A more robust plant and larger, brighter flowers will result.

Some plants will do better if they are pinched back when they are six to eight inches high. Such plants as the zinnia will develop into a much bushier plant if this method is used.

Another pointer listed by Rosborough is the removing of blooms. As blooms reach their prime they should be removed before they have a chance to seed. This will not only result in more blooms, but a longer blooming period.

Instructions Are Given by Doctor For Lifesaving

"No elaborate equipment is needed to save a life from drowning," is the opinion of State Health Department officials. "In fact, actual harm is done by the misuse of so-called lung-motors. Modern resuscitation apparatus has been perfected so that oxygen and carbon dioxide can be used without inflicting more damage to cases of asphyxiation and drowning. It is tragic enough to have a drowning accident, but it is far more tragic if no one present at the time knows how to save a life by artificial respiration.

The prompt application of artificial respiration is of primary importance, and for this purpose the prone pressure method is the easiest, simplest and most effective. This should begin at once and continue rhythmically until natural breathing is established—this may take four or more hours. Procedure:

First: Kneel and straddle the patient below the hips placing the hands on the small of the back with the fingers over the lowest ribs, tips of fingers just out of sight.

Second: With arms straight, while counting one, two, swing forward bearing weight on body firmly but not violently.

Third: Swing backward while counting one, straightening up and thus relieving pressure—this allows air to be drawn into the lungs.

Fourth: Rest in this position for two counts.

Fifth: Repeat those movements rhythmically forward and backward without interruption, about twelve to fifteen a minute until natural breathing is restored.

Sixth: Meanwhile, if assistance is at hand, a physician should be sent for, the patient's tight clothing should be loosened at neck, chest, waist and he should be kept warm.

The patient should not be moved until he is breathing normally and then should not be allowed to get up but should be carried in a lying position to a place where he can be kept warm and receive medical attention.

Old Fiddlers Preparing For Stamford Contest

Stamford.—Several fiddlers already are preparing to compete in the annual old-fiddlers contest which will be held here July 5 as a part of the Texas Cowboy Reunion which meets July 3, 4 and 5. The contest is limited to musicians 50 years of age or over and music must be of the "breakdown" variety. The contest will be held this year for the first time at the cowboy bunkhouse on the Reunion grounds instead of at the downtown auditorium. It is the Reunion's biggest free attraction. Beginning at 8:30 a. m., it usually lasts until noon.

Prizes totalling \$32.50 will be awarded, first prize being \$15, second \$10, third \$5 and fourth \$2.50. No entry fee is charged. Each contestant is allowed to play two tunes of his own selection. He may play alone or select a second, but only one accompanist is allowed. Jim Stell of Stamford is chairman of the committee in charge of the contest.

Out of State Tourists To Receive Aid From Patrol Headquarters

State police were ready today to give vacationers "diplomatic immunity" when they travel through states with Texas' out-dated driver's licenses.

If motorists planning out-of-

state trips will contact their district highway patrol headquarters, they will receive letters declaring their driver's licenses are still good even though they bear an April expiration date. Licenses were indefinitely extended pending action by the Texas legislature in writing a new license law.

Police in most large cities have been notified of the license extensions, but Texans have encountered trouble with officers in smaller communities, according to reports to state police. The explanatory letters will not, take the place of driver's licenses, state police warned.
