WEST TEXAS POSSES HUNT SLAYER

EVASIVE TALK
OF HOOVER IS
SMITH TARGETDEMOCRATIC NOMINEE
REBUKES OPPONENT
FOR UTTERANCES

BOSTON, Oct. 25.—Alfred E. Smith has opened his final drive for the presidency by hitting back at Herbert Hoover, who, he declares, has described the democratic theory of public ownership and public development as "state socialism" and at the same time used words "to conceal rather than convey meaning."

Before a shouting audience that packed every foot of the Boston arena last night, the Democratic presidential nominee took issue with the utterances of his rival on the questions of water power, farm relief and prohibition and declared the time had come when the need of the nation was leadership.

Today, the nominee turned his back toward New York where he will arrive long after night fall and stops at Blackstone and Providence, R. I., Waterbury, Derby, Shelton, New Haven, Bridgeport and North Norwalk, Conn.

The Governor's overnight stay in Boston was almost one of continuous shouting—except for the time when he slept. From the moment he arrived until after he retired to his room at a hotel after the night's speech, he was the center of a cheering crowd which 500 police were unable to hold.

His address at the Arena climaxed a full program and was made only after the nominee had stopped at the office of the party headquarters, 100 State street, where he was unable to get into the building.

He was introduced to the gathering, which filled every one of the 10,000 or more seats and packed all available space in the aisles and galleries, by Mrs. Francis Wilson, daughter of Woodrow Wilson, and tears came to his eyes when she referred to him as the man of whom her father once had said:

"I believe he feels in an unusual degree the impulses and compulsion of the nation and the world's affairs."

Takes Hoover Statement.
After wiping his eyes, the standard-bearer of the party Wilson twice said to victory thanked the audience.

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 25 (AP).—Balked by adverse winds and unfavorable weather, reports from the Graf Zeppelin on her latest trip today, Oct. 25, were that she was unable to start.

CONFER WITH LOCAL
BACKERS OF MOVE

Harvey Dean, state highway engineer with headquarters in Austin, will arrive in the city sometime this afternoon and will go over plans laid thus far for a system of hardsurface roads in Lubbock county, George Field, division highway engineer, said this morning. Mr. Field did not know how long Mr. Dean would remain in the city but he said that in addition to the paved highway project the Austin man would also likely confer with him on other matters dealing with the department.

Members of the Lubbock County Good Roads association have been awaiting the inspection by Mr. Dean before carrying on their campaign for a 175 mile system of paved roads in the county. J. A. Ritz, chairman of the organization, said today. As soon as Mr. Dean completes his inspection and makes his suggestion the good roads body will continue the campaign, the chairman announced.

Wilkins Sails For
Polar Exploration

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Oct. 25 (AP).—Sir George Hubert Wilkins today sailed south on the whaler Hektor for a new conquest of polar regions by airplane.

The Australian airman and explorer, who last summer started the world by flying across North Polar regions from Alaska to Spitzbergen, was headed for Deception island. There he will establish a base for exploration by air of large spaces of the antarctic.

Schedule Probe
By Grand Jury

DALLAS, Oct. 25 (AP).—A grand jury investigation was scheduled for today into the slaying by police yesterday of W. P. Fletcher, 49, in a pistol battle, after Fletcher had wounded a policeman who sought to question him.

Police went to the Fletcher home upon a report that he was threatening his wife. Fletcher, an eight-year-old daughter in his arms and his small son beside him, drew his pistol and opened fire on the officers, wounding A. Ivey, policeman, in the arm.

Fletcher then fled into a wooded section near his home where a squad of police cornered and shot it out with him. The fugitive fell with a bullet through his head and several other wounds.

Babe Ruth Brings Down
House-And Himself Too

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 25.—"Babe" Ruth, king of swat, pinch hitting as a stump speaker for Governor Alfred E. Smith at a meeting here last night, along with John W. Davis, received a lusty welcome from the audience when he pleaded the cause of the democratic nominee, but the throng was no less uproarious a few moments later when a flimsy chair in which he was seated on the rostrum creaked and then collapsed.

The Babe, intently listening to the remarks of Mr. Davis, discovered his plight too late. Newspaper men sitting at a table beneath the rostrum scrambled in every direction as

the Home Run King hurtled forward, but the player averted a complete fall by clutching steadfastly to a nearby railing. Grinning sheepishly, Ruth righted himself and arose as Mr. Davis and others rushed to his side to ascertain if he had been injured.

Ruth, waving the brown derby which he has adapted, finally brought the audience to order and Mr. Davis resumed.

Ruth had previously compared the political career of the democratic nominee to that of a baseball player who "delivers the goods," declaring that in the political game, as in baseball, a clean fighter always wins the public's esteem, regardless of petty prejudices.

SILVER STILL
HAS HOPES TO
ESCAPE CHAIRYOUTHFUL FT. WORTH
ACCUSED SLAYER DUE
FOR DEATH-FRIDAY

HUNTSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 25.—Bob Silver is still hopeful that his life will be saved.

He telegraphed his mother, Mrs. Mary Louise Silver, at Austin, an encouraging telegram to this effect today. At the prison, however, and almost in the same breath as his hopeful statement, he said, that if necessary, he is ready to die.

He also said that just before he stepped into the electric chair, unless Governor Moody intercedes, he will have a statement to make. When asked for details of the statement he continued that it would "express my faith in God and that I believe my sins forgiven. It also will be a farewell to the world."

Prison Chaplain W. E. Miller, standing by Silver when the latter made his declaration, cautioned the sentenced man to "put faith in prayer."

Plans for the execution continue to go forward. Warden E. F. Harrell called Governor Moody's office at ten o'clock this morning and said preparations would be continued unless interrupted by executive clemency either in the form of another reprieve or commutation. He expects to have final word from the governor by 4 p. m.

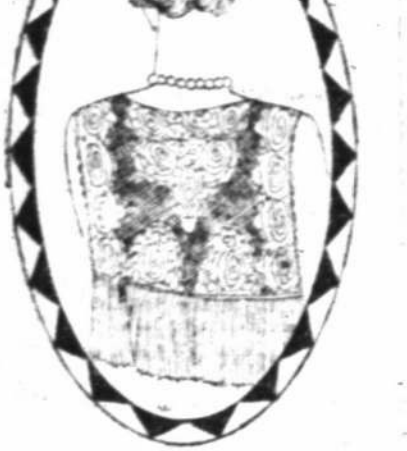

of the last Democrat to sit in the White House for her introduction, and took as the text of his address a quotation from Herbert Hoover's acceptance speech.

"We shall use words to convey meaning, not to hide it," the Democrat read.

He said his rival had uttered these words in August but it was not until last Monday night at Madison Square Garden in New York City that Mr. Hoover had "let the cat out of the bag."

In that speech, the nominee added, his rival had referred to the Democratic theory as one of "state socialism."

"Well, how do the members of Congress feel who voted for the development of Muscle Shoals by the government?" he asked amid laughter and applause.

Does Mr. Hoover seriously desire the American people to believe, he went on, "that the application of the Jeffersonian theory of states' rights is socialism? He does not mean that."

Present System Anarchy. Referring to prohibition the governor said: "If my plan is socialism, then the present bootlegging and hijacking and racketeering that is going on is anarchy."

The governor said he had been called a socialist before and if his views on water power development were socialistic then former President Roosevelt, Charles Evans Hughes, Owen D. Young and others were members of the Socialist party.

He added if his views on farm relief were socialistic that Vice-President Dawes, Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, and others must come under the same classification and that Senator Charles Curtis of Kansas, Hoover's running mate, was 50 per cent socialistic because he had first voted for the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill and then voted to sustain President Coolidge's veto.

No convict shall be permitted by the prison authorities to witness the execution."

If the law is enforced no newspaper reporters or state rangers reported to have gone to the prison for a "friendly visit," can attend Silver's execution unless he requests it.

PICKER NEED BEING FILLED

FEDERAL AGENT AVERS STEADY STREAM OF LABORERS COMING

"Steady in the boat" is the advice of R. F. Nelson, representative here of the U. S. federal farm workers bureau at Fort Worth, to the farmers of this section who are needing cotton pickers.

Word from the state headquarters yesterday stated that the highways from Central Texas to the South Plains were lined with transient pickers on their way to the cotton fields in this area. C. W. Woodman, head of the state bureau, advised that this trend of farm workers should satisfy the wants here within the next week.

50 Pickers Distributed About fifty pickers reported at the local Chamber of Commerce offices this morning and were distributed where they were needed most.

"The kind of weather we are having is worth thousands of dollars to the farmers of this section," Mr. Nelson said this morning. He stated that although a heavy freeze at this time probably would do considerable damage to the cotton that a frost would not prove of any material harm.

Mr. Nelson said that all parts of the South Plains needed pickers but that the most pressing immediate need was found between Lubbock and Sudan. According to his statement today cotton in every direction of here is maturing rapidly, creating a demand for additional pickers.

Erroneous reports that cotton in this section was spotted is being denied by the state headquarters in the appeal for pickers here.

HALF MILLION HOSPITAL FOR DALLAS, PLAN

GROUP OF CITIZENS IN NORTH TEXAS CITY BACK PROJECT

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Oct. 25.—A \$500,000 hospital dedicated to alleviation of the sufferings of the children of the state of Texas and backed by an endowment of \$1,000,000 or more is to be added to the group of hospital buildings which has made Dallas one of the outstanding hospitals of the Southwest.

Preliminary plans for financing and building of the hospital were made last night within an hour by seventy-one sponsors. The institution is to be known as the Texas Children's Hospital. The charter for the institution provides that it is to be an entirely non-sectarian and a philanthropic enterprise. It will occupy a piece of land near the medical group here, which was donated to the sponsors by a citizen. The tract is an acre in extent and the hospital windows will overlook Severchon Park on one side. Near it are Parkland Hospital, the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for crippled children, the Dallas Baby Camp, Hope Cottage for the care of babies, the Presbyterian Children's Clinic and a number of privately owned clinics and hospitals.

Incorporators are G. B. Dealery, W. M. Whitson, P. R. Freeman and Alex Spence. These four will act as a board of directors. ALLOWS LITTLE TIME FOR CAMPAIGNING ON TRIP TO PACIFIC

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (AP).—Herbert Hoover has allowed himself little time for campaigning on his return trip to his California home to vote on November 6.

Departing from Washington one week from today, he will leave his train only once during the five days' journey—at St. Louis on the night of November 2, where he will make his only set speech of the trip. In that he will discuss the development of inland waterways and farm relief, subjects of special interest to the people of the Mississippi river valley.

Other stops of the special train of the Republican presidential candidate will be made for operating purposes and with the announcement of his plans at his headquarters late yesterday it was stated that there would be no efforts to organize demonstrations at any of these. The nominee, however, will greet those who visit the stations to welcome him and will make extemporaneous talks to them.

Hoover Itinerary Given.

The first stop will be at Cumberland, Maryland, early next Thursday night and Hoover will make a brief talk there. 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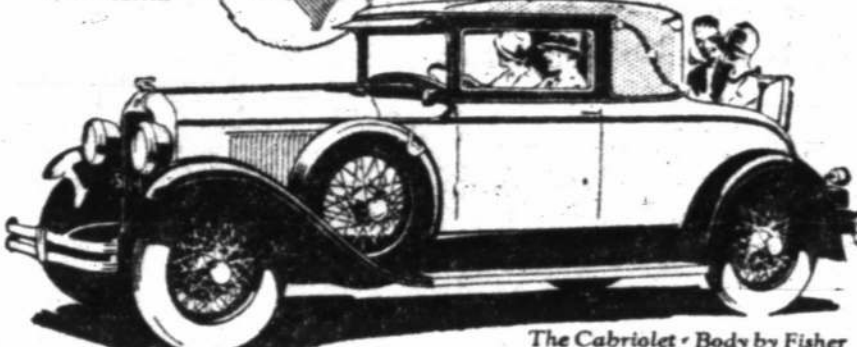

The latter was probably prompted by the slightly lower ginning figures than suggested by some of the recent reports, but the advance of 18.80 for December and 19.64 for March met a good deal of realizing or liquidation and considerable southern selling. This soon eased the market off to 18.82 for December, or about 4 to 5 points below yesterday's closing quotations, and the market was rather nervous and irregular at the end of the first half hour. October contracts sold off to 19.74, or 6 points net lower under liquidation attributed to the circulation of notices representing about 5,400 bales. The final liquidation of October contracts sent the price about 25 points below yesterday's closing. The weakness of the near position had an unsettling effect on the general list. December declined to 19.45 and March to 19.40, making net declines of about 8 to 15 points on the near active contracts. October trading ended in October at midday prices steady slightly on covering. October went out at 19.28 to 19.30 compared with 19.80 at the close yesterday.

NEW ORLEANS TRADING.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 25 (AP)—The cotton market was two-sided in early trading today advancing approximately 8 1/2 a bale when the Census Bureau's ginnings total proved smaller than expected but losing the gain later on profit-taking attracted by the higher prices. When the offerings were absorbed the market rallied on trade buying on scale down orders and at noon prices were 11 to 12 points above the lows and to within 2 to 4 points of yesterday's close.

ROBINSON HITS HOOVER VIEWS ON FARM HELP

SAYS NOMINEE'S SPEECH IN NEW YORK WAS FARMERS' DOOM

(By Associated Press)
SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Oct. 25.—The New York speech of Herbert Hoover was attacked by Senator Joe Robinson last night as a document that pronounced the doom of agriculture legislation and was "illustrative of that smug complacency with which the powerful always regard the unfortunate victims of avarice."

The speech, Robinson declared, disclosed the republican presidential nominee as totally unable "to comprehend the nature and causes of the farm problem."

"His denunciation of the proposal to make the tariff effective for agriculture as 'state socialism' not only proves," Robinson said, "his utter lack of sympathy for the desire of farmers to enjoy prosperity, but also his very prejudiced viewpoint, which prompted the open appeal in his New York speech of all the forces of retrogression."

To the millions of farmers who work twelve hours a day in the struggle of life on the farms, the millions of farm wives in the United States who are constantly exhausted by drudgery to those who have been compelled to give up the struggle of life on the farms and join the unemployed in industrial centers, this New York speech by Mr. Hoover must prove discouraging to a point approaching despair.

Discussing water power, Robinson said: "Mr. Hoover proposes to turn the water powers of the country over to the power monopoly, and calls his proposal sound business reserve these resources and develop them for the use and benefit of the public."

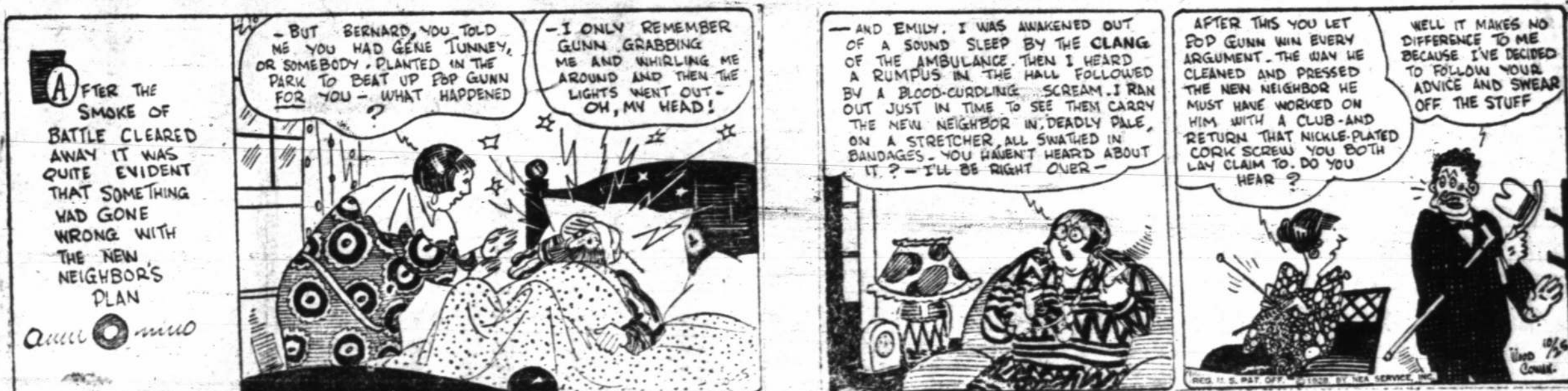

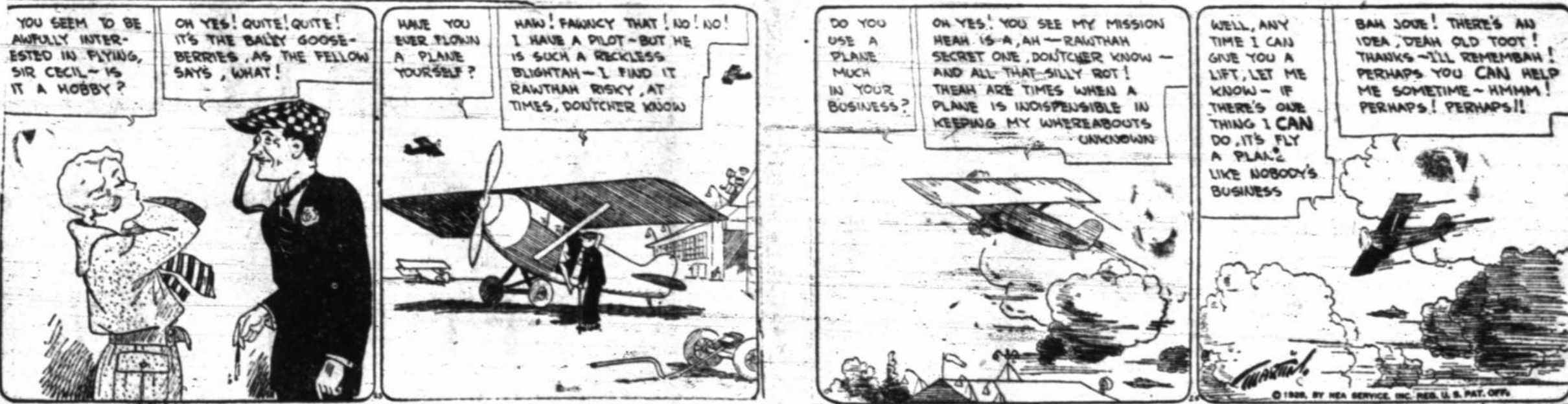

PROSPERITY IS REGION BAND MADE ISSUE BY HUGHES IN TALK

CHIEF JUSTICE TELLS CHICAGO CROWD THAT HOOVER QUALIFIED

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Charles Evans Hughes, in his second speech in behalf of the candidacy of Herbert Hoover, declared here last night that the political aims of the great majority of the American people would be summed up broadly in the words "prosperity and success."

The former associate justice of the United States supreme court and secretary of state under President Harding, arrived in Chicago only a few hours before the time set for his address in a hall on the north side of the city.

"Progress demands stability, patience in dealing with problems on their merits, the search for the practical way, the talent to recognize it and leadership in pursuing it," he declared.

"If I were asked to name the man who in my judgment is the leading progressive of our day, I should name the republican candidate for president, Herbert Hoover. To think progressively, that is, toward betterment, to plan to achieve something worth while by practical methods in the interest of the American people, is as natural to him as to breathe."

Mr. Hughes said much had been done in this campaign in an effort to belittle the "prosperity we enjoy," but that he would not discuss it.

As to progress, Mr. Hughes said the republican nominee's "whole bent is in devising improvements and in seeking a more abundant life for all."

"Mr. Hoover has no notion that this can be done by putting government unnecessarily into business," he continued. "He knows that would wreck both government and business. He knows you cannot make the community rich by impoverishing the individuals that compose it. But he knows that government can help or harm. He knows that prosperity can be greatly stimulated by sound governmental policies and methods. He believes the policies which will aid most are those of the republican party."

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Pioneers of American industry were guests last night at a dinner given jointly by Columbia University, The Institute of American Meat Packers, The New York State Chamber of Commerce and the New York City Merchants' Association.

The men honored included Thomas A. Edison, Henry Ford, Orville Wright, Charles M. Schwab, Julius Rosenwald, George Eastman and Harvey S. Firestone. Cyrus H. K. Curtis and Glenn H. Curtis had been included in this list, but were unable to attend.

The dinner, given at the Hotel Astor, followed upon the fifth conference of major industries held during the day at Columbia under auspices of the university and the Meat Packers' Institute, with the cooperation of the Chamber of Commerce and the Merchants' Association. Speakers at the conference represented finance, printing and publishing, communication, meat packing, automobiles and iron and steel.

Charles E. Mitchell, president of the National City Bank, told the Columbia audience that danger in the current financial situation seemed "largely psychological."

"I do not think we have need at the moment to be fearful," said Mr. Mitchell. "I can not see what is going to disturb the situation."

Frank B. Noyes, president of the Washington Star and of the Associated Press, represented the news and publishing industry at the conference. Answering critics of newspapers, he maintained that the press was making steady progress in accuracy in breadth of information and in ethical standards.

Walker S. Clifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, described the advance of the art of communication.

Other conference speakers were Harold H. Swift, vice-president of Swift and company; Myron C. Taylor, chairman of the finance committee of the United States Steel Corporation; and Charles F. Kettering, president of the General Motors Research Corporation.

WEIRD LIGHTS

Move Bodies Of Royalty From Windsor Castle

LONDON, Oct. 25 (P).—Unaccustomed activity within the walls of Windsor Castle and mysterious lights in the famous St. George's Chapel there were explained today when it was learned that bodies of minor members of the royal families were being removed. The remains of these historic personages will now rest in ground specially consecrated for them at Frogmore in Windsor Park, the burial place of Queen Victoria and the Prince Consort.

The bodies were transferred because the royal mortuary beneath the chapel is becoming full. Henceforth the mortuary will be reserved for sovereigns and heirs to the throne.

Newspapers today said that about nine coffins of minor members of the royal family had been removed. These were said to include three of three relatives of Queen Mary.

HOLDS COTTON ESTIMATE LOW

GOVERNMENT MAN IS OF OPINION YIELD WILL BE MUCH LARGER

Basing his opinion upon an inspection tour around Amherst, Littlefield and Sudan, R. F. Nelson, United States federal employment bureau representative here, yesterday made the statement that the estimates of the cotton yield of this section had been placed too low.

He declared that the cotton in that area is more mature than in the immediate vicinity of Lubbock and the eastern part of this county, and that it now promised greater production than was previously thought possible.

Mr. Nelson yesterday received word from the governmental employment bureau headquarters at Fort Worth that many carloads of cotton pickers had started in this direction and should be in this area soon.

The need of pickers in the section visited is greater than around Lubbock, Mr. Nelson said. He predicts, however, that the immediate shortage of pickers would be met by the middle of next week.

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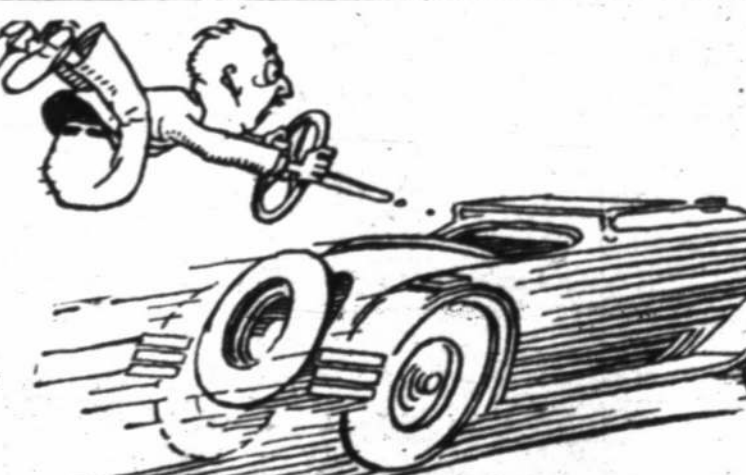


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
