RANGERS HERE TO PROBE MURDER

A. & M. HELD JOINT HEIR TO OIL LANDS

DEATH OF LEE STEGALL WILL BE GONE INTO

MYSTERIOUS SHOOTING IN MOTLEY COUNTY IS INVESTIGATED

HICKMAN ON CASE

THREE RANGERS TALK TO MOTLEY COUNTY OFFICERS HERE

The strong arm of the Texas Ranger service reached out into West Texas today as a complete investigation of the fatal shooting of Constable Lee Stegall, of Flomot, Motley County, there Monday night, got underway. Captain Tom R. Hickman, and Sergeant M. T. Gonzales, of the Fort Worth Ranger company, and Private W. H. Kirby, who has been stationed at Borger for some time, arrived in Lubbock this morning and immediately went into conference with Motley county officials, here to meet the Rangers.

While reports from Matador to the Daily Journal today said that Motley county is quiet and there is no hint of further violence, the Rangers were sent to West Texas by Governor Dan Moody after Sheriff Claude Warren, of Motley county, requested their presence. Deputy Sheriff Gabe Garrison, of Flomot, a special deputy, were in Lubbock today conferring with the Rangers. The shooting of Stegall, the Journal that Motley county is quiet.

Investigation to Follow. Indications were this afternoon that only one of the visiting Rangers would go to Motley county and that his mission would be more investigation purposes than anything else, following the belief that an outside officer will be able to clear up the shooting more rapidly than a county official.

Murder charges have been filed against Calvin Barnes, Paul Landry, Adolphus Mosley, Harmon Mosley and W. F. Allen, all of Motley county, Sheriff H. L. Johnston.

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BALKAN ROW IS ECHOED TODAY IN ARMS MEET

LEAGUE IS INADEQUATE TO GUARANTEE PEACE SLAV CHARGES

GENEVA, Dec. 2.—The tension in southern Europe caused by rivalry over Albania had an echo in today's session of the security committee of the preparatory disarmament conference when M. Markovitch, Jugo Slavian representative, cited the case of Albania as proving that the existing League of Nations system of guarantees was absolutely inadequate.

M. Markovitch recalled that Albanian independence has been solemnly guaranteed by the great powers, and that Albania, as a member of the League also, was likewise guaranteed territorial integrity. Yet Albania felt that her national security was so feeble that she believed it imperative to have recourse to special alliances with Italy.

Not Dismayed Sufficient. Apparently, declared M. Markovitch, neither Albania nor Italy deemed League protection sufficient.

He added that Jugo Slavia only desired to continue friendly relations with Albania.

Count Von Bernstorff, the German delegate, caused a sensation when he declared that any reform as regards international security should not fail to give due importance to article 19 of the covenant of the League of Nations which provides for the revision of international treaties.

The former German ambassador to the United States did not mention the content of this article, merely referring to number 19, but when the words fell from his lips there was an immediate stir among the delegates many of whom turned around or leaned across the aisle.

COOLIDGE LAUDS NATIONAL SPIRIT OF UNITY IN DEDICATING STONE OF NEW MEXICO IN CAPITAL MONUMENT

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Dedicating New Mexico's stone in the Washington monument, President Coolidge today declared this tribute another evidence of the unity which binds the forty-eight states into one nation.

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EARLY TURKEY MARKET URGED

DECEMBER 10 LATEST FOR BEST PRICES COLLIER SAYS

(By Associated Press) FORT WORTH, Dec. 2.—Texas turkey breeders today were warned against holding their flocks for higher prices, by John B. Collier, president of the Texas Poultry and Egg association, who declared the turkey raisers would find themselves in similar circumstances with the cotton farmer—a surplus on hand and prices low.

"The farmer who markets his turkeys early is the man who will show a profit," Collier warns. "Texas as will ship 700 car loads of turkeys north and east for the Christmas trade, but Texas must take into consideration the fact that the northwest also will ship many turkeys to northern and eastern markets. This crop was held off here. Thanksgiving market because the birds were not matured."

"To hold turkeys after December 10 will mean they will not be marketed," Collier said. Thanksgiving turkeys around 27 cents a pound on foot, and some dealers paid as high as 30 cents, but the last shipments were bought around 26 cents, it was pointed out. Dealers here declare that if the Christmas market is flooded late the prices will drop even lower.

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HALF OF TEXAS ROYALTIES DUE SCHOOL, CLAIM

CONSTITUTION MAKES COLLEGE BRANCH OF TEXAS UNIVERSITY

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 2.—Section 13, Article 7, of the state constitution, making Texas A. & M. college a branch of the University of Texas was interpreted Friday by Representative J. Herschel Boggs of San Angelo, as making the college a "joint heir" to the University's West Texas oil lands and entitling it to half of the \$7,000,000 royalties.

"I am informed that the A. and M. college has never received one dollar of the money," said Boggs who led an unsuccessful fight in the 40th legislature to have the university lands taxed for local school purposes or sold.

"There is not a doubt in my mind but what our forefathers who wrote the constitution meant what they said when they wrote Section 13, of Article 7, in which they stated that the A. & M. college, is hereby made and constituted a branch of the University of Texas."

ROGS REVIEW EASON'S MARK S GOOD WORK

ATTENTION NOW TURNS TO BASKETBALL WITH PROSPECTS BRIGHT

FORT WORTH, Dec. 2.—With the ball season a thing of the past, the Christian University this week will turn its attention to basketball. The Horned Frog basketball team began working out Monday morning under the direction of Coach Madison Bell.

However, the past football season is not without its interesting points from a T. C. U. viewpoint. The Frogs were the only eleven to win the Texas Aggies, crowned champions of the Southwest Conference in football, although the Aggies finished in fifth place. The Christians battled the Farmers to a scoreless tie.

Noteworthy Games
The Frogs tie with Texas University and their defeat of Baylor are happy thoughts to be remembered in the future. The fact that the Christians held Centenary to the lowest score of any of the games the Louisianians played with Southwest teams is very noteworthy.

The Frogs got their upset of the season when they lost a hard battle with the Arkansas Razorbacks, 10 to 6. They got another jolt a week later when they were downed by Centenary, 7 to 3, and the final disappointment came Thanksgiving day when the S. M. U. Mustangs jumped over the Purple 28 to 6.

Remarkable Showing
Looking at the season from all angles, however, the Frogs made a remarkable showing. With only a few veterans to build his team around, Coach Bell moulded a fighting aggregation that made many of the "experts" look sick with their great performance against Texas and the Aggies. Injuries soon began to take a heavy toll on the Frogs, however, and they were severely handicapped in practically all of their games after the first two or three were played. Captain "Blackie" Williams was out a great part of the season with an injured leg, thus weakening the backfield offense.

His first string center, Bill Palmer, hurt in one of the first non-conference games, Coach Bell developed one of the outstanding pivot men in the circuit out of Amos Melton, who played guard the year before. The great "Rage" Matthews, outstanding end of the South, was handicapped in several games by severe colds which developed into bronchitis at one time. Thompson, star fullback, "Slim" Steadham and Albert Acker, veteran ends, and "Buzz" Morgan, speedy halfback, all fell victims of bad ankles and were out of several games. Ineligibilities took comparatively small toll but added to the trouble of the coaches nevertheless.

Matthews Outstanding
Coach Bell has set a permanent star in his crown in the development of Raymond "Rage" Matthews as an end. Coming to T. C. U. as a big and awkward but unusually aggressive recruit from Polytechnic high school of Fort Worth, Matthews was used as a guard in his first varsity year. The next year he was shifted to end and won undisputed all-conference honors at that position. He even received honorable mention in an all-American team selection. This year he was the unanimous choice of sports writers and others who picked all-Southwest teams and was selected on the second all-American team of the New York Sun. This was his last year with T. C. U. Coach also will lose by

graduation. "Blackie" Williams, N. L. Clark, Lowell Parrish and Jimmy Grant, backs; Amos Melton, center, and Steadham, Acker and Alexander, ends.

Nine men passing on, yet Bell will have the largest number of veterans left to build his 1928 eleven from that he has ever had. And with a fine group of freshmen coming up from Coach "Dutch" Megers' undefeated Polytechnic, the football season should loom much brighter for T. C. U. next year.

DAIRY COWS IN HALE TEST HIGH IN BUTTER FAT

PLAINVIEW, Dec. 2.—The report of J. A. Stark, official cow-testing association for the first month of his work shows that Hale County dairy herds are well above the average dairy herds of the United States relative to fat produced. "This fact is outstanding because of the fact that the cow-testing association has been in operation for only such a short time and farmers have not as yet had an opportunity to benefit by the work in weeding out unprofitable animals," R. M. Milbollen, County Agent of Hale County said in commenting on the work of Stark.

Higher Than Average
Hoard's Dairyman, one of the dairy-farming journals of the United States in its issue of October 25th, issued a list of results of 41 cow-testing associations in the United States showing that the average fat produced in the 41 associations was about 20 pounds while the Hale County Association ran higher than that.

The high herd average for the 41 associations was exactly 33 pounds while the high herd in the Hale County Association produced 41.5 pounds. There were only five herds in the entire 41 which produced more fat than the Hale County herd which is owned by Fritz Fuchs, Jr.

The twelve high herds in the Hale County Association averaged 33.7 pounds of fat or 9.7 of a pound more than the average given in Hoard's Dairyman.

Heavy Increase In Express Is Noted

DALLAS, Dec. 2.—Failure to find on paper enough water to supply the minimum requirements of all parties seeking it caused failure of the all-Texas water commission, which met here all day Thursday with representatives of hydro-electric interests, to reach an agreement, it was announced by J. A. Kemp, of Wichita Falls, chairman of the water committee.
Property rights to the waters of all Texas rivers were involved, but the waters of the Colorado river, over which there has been a heated contest by agricultural and power interests for some time, were particularly in question. In this instance, however, chairman Kemp expressed the hope that additional data and figures would provide a solution. This hope was largely bound up in the possibility of increasing the water supply through better impounding of flood waters.
The committee will meet again on at the call of Chairman Kemp.

COMMERCIAL HATCHERY
Material is being placed on the ground for the erection of a building which will house Ralls commercial hatchery, the same to have a capacity of 14,400 eggs, and to be owned and operated by Mr. W. H. Humphries, who is coming here from Anson, Texas.

Mr. Humphries, for the past few years has owned and operated a commercial hatchery of 2,700 egg capacity in Anson. Having had such successful experience no doubt Mr. Humphries is well qualified to render real service in supplying baby chicks to the people of Crosby county. The plant at Anson is not being sold or transferred, but will continue to operate under the management of Mr. Humphries' brother-in-law.

The machines in the local hatchery will be two in number, both of the Backeye make. One 12,000 egg machine, the other a 2,500 egg machine. The machines will be used in connection with the hatchery chamber, feeders, brooders, drinking containers, feeders and such other supplies as are needed on an up-to-date poultry farm will be carried in stock.

Arrangements have been made with Mr. P. E. Ralls, executor of the estate of this city, to finance the building and sell it to Mr. Humphries. The building is being constructed on a lot just east of the Methodist parsonage. It is to be a two-story, 24 by 36 foot building. The lower floor will be with partitions and will have a four-inch concrete base. The upper floor will be a home consisting of five rooms and a bath in which the Humphries family will live. The house will be provided with lights, water, sewer and natural gas.

For the past few years, people of Ralls trade territory have been hindered in their diversification program, for the reason that no hatchery was accessible and baby chicks from distant points were unsatisfactory. A recent survey by the chamber of commerce of 239 to 240 showed an average of 128 head of poultry per farm. This is evidence that the people of Ralls territory are interested in poultry raising and proof enough that this hatchery has a splendid field for operation.

Ralls people are indebted to their banks and to the chamber of commerce for this latest addition to the town's industries. It being a project that the chamber of commerce had been working on for some time.

NUMEROUS NEW FACES SEEN IN U. S. CONGRESS

MORROW AND CALLES BEGIN TOUR TODAY THRU COUNTRY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—When the seventieth congress meets next week 73 seats in the senate and house will be filled by members other than those who held the seats in the last session.

The incoming members are not all beginning their national legislative careers, however.

Brookhart Returns

One of the senators, Smith W. Brookhart, republican, Iowa, returns to the body in which he formerly sat. Six of the new senators previously served in the house. They are Carl Hayden, Arizona; Alben W. Barkley, Kentucky; Millard E. Tydings, Maryland; and Elmer Thomas, Oklahoma, all democrats; and William S. Vare, Pennsylvania, and Frank L. Smith, Illinois, republicans.

Senators who will be new to the capitol halls are Charles W. Warren, Colorado; Frederick Steiwer, Oregon; Arthur H. Gould, Maine; and John J. Blaine, Wisconsin, all republicans; and Hugo Black, Alabama; Sam G. Bratton, New Mexico; and Robert F. Wagner, New York, democrats.

Vare and Smith Expected

Vare and Smith will be on hand for the opening, but the question of their right to senate membership must be threshed out before they will be seated.

Of the 53 incoming representatives nine have been members of the house before. They are J. Earl Major, Illinois; James F. Fullbright, Missouri; Everett B. Howard, Oklahoma; John J. Casey and Everett Kent, both from Pennsylvania, all democrats; and U. S. Geyer, Kansas; Robert H. Glancy, Michigan; John D. Clark, New York; and James A. Hughes, West Virginia, republicans.

Beck Also Returns

James M. Beck, former solicitor-general, will return to Washington to fill the republican seat left vacant in the Pennsylvania delegation by Vare's election to the senate.

James M. Harlett had been elected but he resigned in October without having taken the seat.

Five members of the house in the last session have died, and with one exception, all seats have been filled by representatives of the same political allegiance. S. Harrison White, democrat, Colorado, will succeed the late William N. Vaile, republican, who had represented the Denver district.

Other New Faces

Charles Tatgenhorst, republican, Ohio, succeeds the late A. E. B. Stephens; Rene L. DeLoeu, democrat, Louisiana, succeeds the late Ladislav Lazaro; Clarence E. Hancock, republican, New York, succeeds the late Walter M. Magee; and Franklin F. Korrell, republican, Oregon, succeeds the late M. E. Crumppacker.

Of the 44 other incoming representatives 23 are republicans and 21 are democrats.
