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## ANIMAL RUNS INTO HOUSE

### Rabid Skunk Bites Boy Protecting Baby Sister

A four-year-old boy was bit by a rabid skunk here Wednesday as he apparently sought to protect his infant sister from the animal.

Donnie Hartsfield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hartsfield, began Friday receiving anti-rabies vaccine shots.

Daily treatments for the boy began just as soon as State Health Department laboratory in Austin notified city officials that the skunk definitely was rabid.

Donnie was bit at his home, located two miles north of Colorado City on State Highway 208 (to Snyder), as he grabbed the rabid animal.

The boy was playing at the front door when the Hartsfield's large Collie dog ran to the house with the skunk in pursuit.

Door to the house was opened during the excitement and the skunk ran into the living room, according to Jess Bolin, grandfather of the boy.

Mrs. Hartsfield was in the house holding her four-week-old daughter.

As the skunk ran into the room, Mrs. Hartsfield screamed.

"And Ronnie jumped onto the skunk," Bolin reported. The child's hand was bit by the skunk. Teeth of the animal broke the skin.

As the skunk ran under a bed, Mrs. Hartsfield and the children went outside the house. Since Mr. Hartsfield was away from home, they summoned Frank Morgan—at a business firm nearby—to their aid.

Morgan succeeded in getting the skunk outside, then killed the animal.

The group immediately was fearful of rabies because of the fact that the Hartsfield's big dog was running from the skunk.

So the head of the skunk was preserved immediately and taken to city officials here for quick dispatching to state laboratories in Austin.

A telegram Friday notified city officials that tests were positive—rabies.

The Hartsfield family could determine no reason for Ronnie grabbing for the skunk, except that he was trying to protect his baby sister.

And the boy, himself, could offer no other explanation.

Residents in a wide area around where the rabid skunk was killed have been warned to keep their pets under observation for 40 days.

"All citizens—especially in that area—should be on the alert for any evidence for rabies," advised Dr. J. D. Williams, veterinarian.

The close watch was advised for wildlife and livestock, not just pets.

Seventy-seven athletes of Colorado High School, and their coaches, will be the honored guests Tuesday night at the Quarterback Club's first annual All-Sports Banquet.

Considered one of the top schoolboy mentors in the nation, he has led his Abilene teams to 58 victories, 49 in a row, taken three-straight state championships, for a record of 58-3-2.

His overall coaching record is 121 wins, 24 losses and 4 ties.

Moser's Eagles were eliminated from the 1957 state playoffs on penetrations, 5-3, after scrapping the Highland Park Scotties to a 20-20 semi-final standoff.

The tie stopped the Eagles' win streak at 49, but still good enough for a national record.

Moser coached at Lexington, Mo., and McAllen, Tex., prior to moving to Abilene. He is a native of Missouri but liked Texas when he was stationed here during World War II.

Moser is superstitious, like many coaches. When his teams are winning, he wants to park at the same place at church every Sunday, eat out at the same places and wear that salmon-colored shirt that has carried him through every win since the El Paso High play-off contest in 1955.

Moser was a standout high school athlete at Chillicothe, Mo., and played center at the University of Missouri. He was an All-Big Seven performer as they went to the Orange Bowl in 1939. Despite being relatively small for a college lineman, Moser blocked six punts during his career.

Master of ceremonies for the banquet will be Rev. Don McCoy of the First Christian Church.

Among the 77 athletes to be honored, 23 are girls who played basketball and volleyball.

The boys to be honored were members of the football, basketball, track and tennis teams.

Coaches include Homer Jefferson, Dean King, Ronnie Gurler, Larry Morton, Win Talley, Bob McMillan and Mrs. Jack Merket.

## State Jaycees Start 'Jody Simpson' Fund

Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce Saturday began a statewide fund to aid Mrs. Goodwin Simpson, recuperating from plane crash injuries in a Corpus Christi hospital.

The project, named the Jody Simpson Fund, began with Jaycees from all areas of Texas making freewill contributions at the State Jaycee convention in Austin.

Just prior to the start of contributions, the state convention in general session voted resolutions of sympathy to the families of the late Goodwin Simpson and Bob Kirschbaum, Jaycees killed in the plane crash in Mexico.

Both Simpson and Kirschbaum were former presidents of Colorado City Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The "Jody Simpson Fund" originated as a means of Texas Jaycees to "show appreciation for the service Goodwin Simpson rendered to Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce" as a state vice president.

All money collected in the fund will be applied to hospital and medical expenses for Mrs. Simpson, who this week had her left foot amputated.

Donations to the fund can be sent to the state Jaycee office in Grand Prairie.

# Farmers Hit Labor Ruling As 'Critical'

## Policy Cuts Off Bracero Supply

Mitchell County Farm Bureau leaders Saturday described new Department of Labor policy for bracero workers as "not workable."

Processing of Mexican nationals for Texas farm labor has stopped entirely, they reported.

And the situation is causing a critical shortage in farm workers for the Mitchell County area.

The Farm Bureau leaders—Tom Moore, president, Murrell Blassingame, Elton Harrell, Ross Hargrove and J. D. Hill—were among a Colorado City delegation who participated in a special farm labor conference Friday in Big Spring.

Others attending were Jeff Taylor, Elmer Martin and Ernest Larmer of the Chamber of Commerce and Mrs. Sybil K. Barber, Farm Bureau office manager.

The conference was sponsored by West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Howard County Junior College to view specifically the affect of new Department of Labor policies on the hiring of farm workers.

More than 125 representatives from farm groups in West Texas and New Mexico participated in the parley.

Unemployment in other states has put a stop to the processing of braceros for farm labor in Texas, the Farm Bureau group reported.

"Certification must be obtained from the Texas Employment Commission," Blassingame explained, "before a farmer can get any braceros."

"Now, that won't do, because the U. S. Department of Labor forces you to go to other states for workers if there is a labor surplus (unemployment in other states)."

Blassingame said farmers who have sought to obtain workers from other states have reported almost complete failure.

"They have had to pay transportation for prospects to travel from other states to Texas to just look over the jobs, whether they remained to work or not," Blassingame said.

Hill said that a group of farmers at Dumas had gone through the entire process.

They traveled to Oklahoma City in search of 200 workers among packers who needed jobs.

"Two hundred of the packers were expected to show at the Oklahoma City employment office," Hill said, "but only 100 were there."

"Fifty of those walked off after learning the duties and housing facilities that would await them at Dumas."

"After screening the remaining 50, they wound up with 15... 15 who would go to Dumas and look the jobs over."

## THREE NEW TESTS SPOTTED

### Blue Danube Oiler Extends Mitchell's Iatan-East Field

Iatan - East Howard Field has been extended 1.25 miles northeast on the Mitchell County side.

The extension was logged with completion of Blue Danube Oil Company No. 1 Foster, a 55.61 - barrel producer.

Other major developments for Mitchell County also centered in the county's western area with Iatan - East Howard gaining a new drilling site, Westbrook Field logging two new drilling locations and one well completion.

Blue Danube No. 1 Foster was completed with 25 per cent water after treatment with 15,000 gallons. Oil gravity was 28 degrees.

Site for the field extension was 330 feet from south and west lines, Section 46, Block 29, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

Production was perforations between 2,684 and 2,694 feet with pay topped at 2,670 over tota depth of 3,102 feet. Completed in the Westbrook

Field was Col-Tex Refining Company No. 11 Standard Oil of Texas, pumping, 72.38 barrels of 24.2 gravity oil plus 10 per cent water.

Pay was topped at 3,006 feet for Col-Tex No. 1 Standard and perforations were set between 3,006 and 3,110 feet over total depth of 3,150 feet.

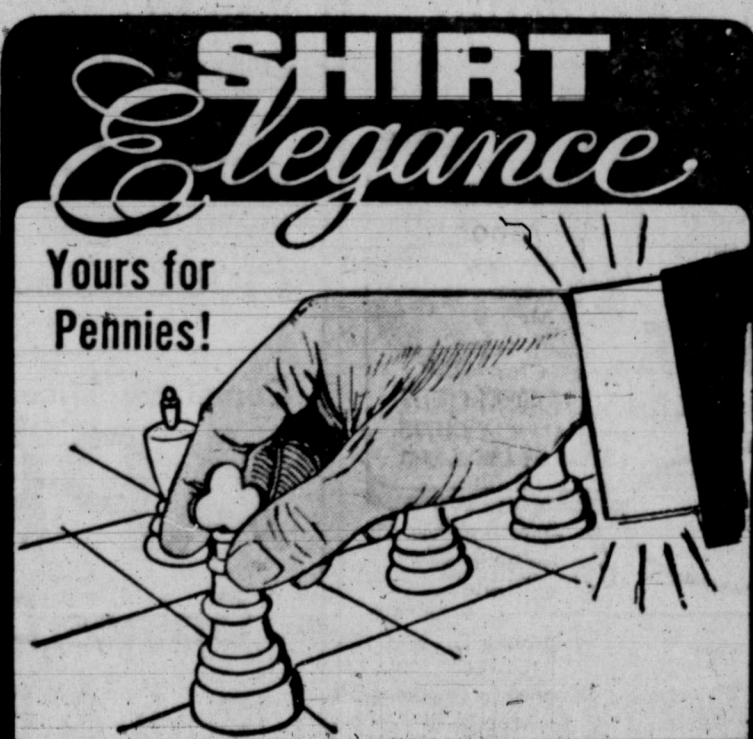

## Judge Slates Meeting to 'Save A Life'

Mitchell County's portion of the statewide campaign to save at least 254 persons from traffic deaths during 1958 will be launched here Wednesday.

County Judge Sam Bullock, named by Governor Price Daniel to head the campaign locally, has called the Wednesday meeting for 9:30 a. m. Invited to participate in the meeting will be mayors, law enforcement officers, school superintendents, press, radio and other interested persons.

All interested citizens are invited to attend the meeting, Judge Bullock emphasized. The statewide campaign to save at least 254 persons—one for each county in Texas—is being sponsored by the Governor's Highway Safety Commission.

The meeting here Wednesday will be coordinated with the official start of the campaign—a 15-minute broadcast by Governor Daniel over a statewide radio network.

Judge Bullock said citizens in the meeting here will hear the governor's broadcast, then discuss ways and means for a more active highway safety program within Mitchell County.

More than 2,500 persons were killed on streets and highways last year and 122,000 were injured.

## Messimer in Race for Commissioner

A third candidate is in the race for Mitchell County's Precinct 2 commissioner's post. He is L. R. Messimer, who recently was elected mayor of Westbrook on a write-in vote.

Messimer Saturday instructed the Record to announce his candidacy, subject to the July Democratic Primary election.

He has lived in or near Westbrook since 1922, except for a few years when he resided in Ward County while employed for Standard Oil Company of Texas.

Messimer, a veteran of World War II, is employed by Theiss Drilling Company. The candidate said he had been considering the commissioner's race since Jan. 1.

"I will resign the office of Westbrook mayor," Messimer said, "if I should be elected to the office of Precinct 2 commissioner."

"As a property owner of Mitchell County since 1926, I am interested in the business of the county and would do my best to make you a good commissioner."

"Any support or influence will be appreciated," he said.

Hill said the policy to shift unemployed workers in other states to farm work is not workable.

"Those people are not looking for farm work," he said, "and we still have a shortage."

"Just because people are unemployed, it is no sign they will work on farms."

"But before we can get certification for Mexican labor, we must follow this process," Hill said, "and it won't work."

Blossingame said the Labor Department policy for seeking workers from unemployment areas comes from an interpretation of the certification law for bracero labor.

The law requires proof no labor supply available at the time and place before braceros can be certified.

"And the new interpretation is that we have to go to different areas within the state and even out of the state before we can prove there is no labor supply," Blossingame said.

"If we ask for labor at the TEC office in Sweetwater," Blossingame said, "and they tell us there are 200 workers in Oklahoma City . . . then we have to go up to Oklahoma City."

The Farm Bureau leaders urged individuals and groups to contact congressmen and senators in regard to the critical situation resulting here.

Last year approximately 900 braceros were employed in Mitchell County during the cotton harvest season.

In the past braceros were used almost entirely for harvest—but now farmers have had to turn to them for full time work—for irrigation workers, hoe hands, tractor operators and etc.

Sheep and goat raisers are looking to braceros, too, to aid them in shearing and lambing season.

Prevailing wage established here last fall for braceros was 50 cents per hour.

"But even if we raised that to \$1.50—which a farmer can't pay," Hill said, "we couldn't get hands from other states."

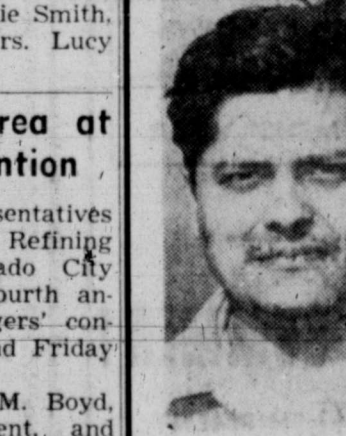
