## ABERNATHY BANK ENTERED BY ROBBERS

### GIRL SHOOT'S STEP-FATHER IN FAMILY QUARREL

#### ROBBERS ENTERED BANK

ABERNATHY, July 26.—Robbers last night entered the First State bank of this city, broke their way into the outer vault through a stucco and the wall with a sledge hammer, opened the steel door from the inside, littered the floor with contents of private lock boxes, attempted to batter their way into the money vault but failed, and escaped leaving practically no trace. The robbery occurred between midnight and dawn.

#### SMALL AMOUNT OF LOOT TAKEN EARLY TODAY

The loot was estimated by N. C. Hix, cashier, at between \$75 and \$100, including a sack of securities totalling approximately \$50. The robbers failed in their efforts to reach several hundred dollars in the money vault, but battered the vault door, jimmied the combination so that it was necessary to burn the door before bank authorities could have access to the papers contained therein.

#### ENTRANCE NOT GAINED TO MONEY VAULT BUT SAFE BATTERED

Entrance to the building was gained through a transom over the rear door, one glass being broken out, and the door was pried open from the inside. A hole was dug with a pick or sledge hammer through the stucco and the wall of the outer vault, through which it is presumed one of the robbers climbed and opened the steel door from the inside.

#### THE NUMBER IN THE PARTY, IF MORE THAN ONE, IS NOT KNOWN, BUT IT IS BELIEVED THAT MORE THAN ONE WAS ON THE JOB, WHICH APPARENTLY WAS NOT DONE BY AMATEURS.

The party apparently worked systematically and deliberately, and bank officials believe that two or three hours was required for the work.

#### CONTENTS OF FIFTY OR MORE PRIVATE LOCK BOXES IN THE VAULT WERE SCATTERED HELTER-SKELTER OVER THE FLOOR. A LARGE SLEDGE HAMMER, APPARENTLY THE ONE USED BY THE ROBBERS, WAS FOUND ON THE FLOOR OF THE VAULT THIS MORNING, AFTER THE ROBBERY WAS DISCOVERED WHEN EMPLOYEES REPORTED FOR WORK.

#### TO COPY FINGERPRINTS

Various pieces of oak equipment and the broken glass from the transom, together with the hammer and other articles are now in the care of officers, and efforts will be made to take fingerprint copies from the various pieces of equipment.

#### CLIPPING AS PROOF OF THEIR STATEMENT THAT THEY BELIEVED THE JOB WAS DONE BY PROFESSIONALS, BANK OFFICIALS SAID THE ROBBERY EVIDENTLY INTENTIONALLY OVERLOOKED SEVERAL LIBERTY BONDS FROM THE PRIVATE BOXES, ALL OF WHICH WERE REGISTERED.

#### MANY STORES TOLD

Various stores are told about the town today, all of which seem to agree that the robbers used a light touring car, which was heard by more than one to go noisily through the streets about 2:30 or 4 o'clock, and officers are on the lookout for a woman who drove up to a filling station late last night and wanted a place to park "where someone slept." The car suddenly disappeared shortly after the garage keeper said.

## Here Are Fourteen Good Summer Deserts, And They're All As Easy To Make As They Are To Digest

The housewife who can serve an interesting, out-of-the-ordinary dessert to her family will seldom hear of those "tips" that mother used to take.

However, during the hot weather few women want to spend hours concocting an elaborate dessert, which after all may be too rich for summer temperature.

The ideal summer dessert is easy and quick to make, easily digested and refreshing. Very often the actual nourishment is found in the dessert at the end of the meal instead of the main course. This is particularly true when a vegetable dinner is planned.

The dessert that can be prepared in the morning and tucked into the ice box until wanted for dinner is always popular with the cook, and its chilled, appetizing smoothness makes it popular with the family.

The following recipes offer a tempting variety:

**Pastery Tapioca**  
One-half cup pearl tapioca, 2 cups milk, 3-4 cup granulated sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup whipping cream, 4 quart red raspberries.  
Soak tapioca two hours in 1 cup cold water. The water should all be absorbed. Add salt and sugar to milk in top of double boiler. Add tapioca and cook until clear. Chill thoroughly and fold in cream whipped until stiff. Serve with red raspberries.

**Chocolate Custard**  
Two squares baking chocolate, 2 cups milk, 3-4 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons flour, 7 eggs, 6 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla.  
Heat milk in top of double boiler. Add chocolate cut in small pieces and beat constantly with an egg beater until the chocolate is melted and thoroughly incorporated in the milk. Beat yolks of eggs with flour and sugar mixed and sifted. Slowly add to hot milk, stirred constantly. Cook over hot water until custard coats the spoon. Turn into buttered baking dish and cover with whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry with powdered sugar and 1-2 teaspoon vanilla. One-half teaspoon vanilla is added to the chocolate custard when it is removed from the fire. Put pudding into a moderate oven for eight minutes to puff and slightly brown the meringue.

**Fruit Ambrosia**  
One cup finely diced fruit, 1-4 cup sugar, 1-4 pound marshmallows, 1 cup whipping cream, 1-4 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.  
Cut marshmallows in quarters using scissors. Sprinkle fruit with sugar and combine with marshmallows. Chill thoroughly for several hours. When ready to serve, fold in cream whipped until firm with salt and vanilla. The cream should be very cold so that the whole dessert will be well chilled.

**Banana Trifle**  
Four bananas, 2 oranges, 1 lemon, 3-4 cup powdered sugar, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatine, 2 tablespoons cold water, 1-2 cup boiling water, 1-2 cups whipping cream, 1-4 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.  
Peel bananas and rub through a sieve. Squeeze juice from oranges and lemon and add to banana pulp. Sprinkle with sugar. Soften gelatine in cold water and dissolve in boiling water. Stir fruit mixture. Cool in ice water, stirring constantly. When cool, fold in cream whipped with vanilla and salt. Turn into a mold and chill on ice for several hours.

The small amount of vanilla and salt added to the last two recipes seems to blend the flavors of the fruit with the cream.

### EX-CHAMP FILES SUIT TO COUNTER CLAIMS OF EX-MANAGER

(By Associated Press)  
PHILADELPHIA, July 26 (AP)—Reasons for his break with Jack Kearns are assigned by Jack Dempsey in his answer to a suit by Kearns in federal court here. Kearns filed suit last September to recover \$519,959.59 from Dempsey. Making a counter claim for \$279,526, Dempsey avers in an affidavit that he terminated an oral contract with Kearns because he learned his former manager in 1914 in Kings county, Washington, under the name of McKean, Kearns pleaded guilty and served part of a one year's sentence for a moral crime.

**Reputation Protected.**  
"My reputation as a boxer is such as to require me to employ only a person of unimpeachable character as my manager," the affidavit says. This oral agreement, the former champion avers, terminated July 28, 1925, when he first learned of Kearns' criminal indictment and turned over to his former manager one half interest in a \$300,000 Los Angeles apartment house which Kearns accepted as full settlement.

For Dempsey's fight with Tom Gibbons, Kearns, the affidavit alleges, received \$239,500, but kept it all in addition to \$15,000 in admissions to exhibitions at Great Falls, Montana, prior to the fight at Shelby, and other monies which they were to have shared equally under the oral agreement.

Almost any day you can see a bright and shining example of this form of amusement—a dimpling, cooling baby of from one to five years perched on the lap of mamma or pappa while the latter attempts to maneuver the youngster and other cars all at the same time. If baby monkey with the hand gas feed, turns off the lights, punches mamma or pappa playfully in the eye or decides to take the wheel it's all right—providing of course there isn't a car or a pedestrian in the way. If there is—good night! Somebody will gather up the remains in a bucket. Remember this the next time you saunter forth to drive the car with the baby on your lap: If a person could better operate a car with a chortling, playful, wrizzling little baby on his lap auto manufacturers would supply one with each machine. No, you may think you can drive just as well thus handicapped but you can't—and that's that.

WASHINGTON LETTER

REVIVE OLD CHARGES OF FAVORITISM IN STATE DEPARTMENT PROMOTIONS
BY RODNEY DUTCHER

WASHINGTON, July 26.—Inter-national discussion continues in the Department of State, and the consular insurgents hope to obtain a congressional investigation of the foreign service promotion system.

Members of the preponderant consular branch continue to charge favoritism and unfair discrimination on behalf of a small group of wealthy and socially select members of the diplomatic corps.

They are doing missionary work among members of Congress and claim to have excited considerable interest, although high officials of the department will exert every effort to forestall any formal investigation on the ground that it is unnecessary and that if there is anything wrong with the promotion system, it is fast being remedied.

Public revelation of the bitter row within the service three or four months ago was followed by some developments for the better, according to the consuls, but they are far from satisfied.

Squabble Over Plum Passing
Their complaint that members of the diplomatic branch were being promoted much oftener than the consuls, although all were supposed to be equal under the Rogers Act, has been met by a promotion list which affected some 25 consuls and no diplomats.

Now that the consuls are getting a few promotions, it is alleged that those who have been of service in the department here, where they have established social contacts with the right people, are the ones being taken care of.

TAXING THE AUTO
Thomas P. Henry, president of the American Automobile Association, gives the motorist something to think about. He cites figures to show that during the last decade state taxes per capita have increased \$6.29. Instead of manifesting a proportional increase, automobile taxes have jumped by leaps and bounds. The increase for each motor vehicle amounts to \$12.65.

The automobile was not present in such vast numbers ten years ago. The revenue derived from the motor vehicle then was about 11.2 per cent of state taxes. The advent of the "practical" motor-vehicle car changed all this. The automobile became a highly taxable piece of property because it was owned by so many taxpayers. It pays now, Mr. Henry points out, almost 50 per cent of state taxes. Automobile taxes have not yielded more simply because there were more cars; the tax itself has increased as the automobile became a valuable commodity.

Registration of cars for the ten-year period shows an increase of only 57 per cent, as compared to a total tax increase of 1246 per cent, according to the consuls, but they are far from satisfied.

NEW YORK, July 26.—Each year Manhattan swallows up \$9,000 American mothers.

The ill-equipped and broken-of-purse are clogging the avenues of opportunity as never before in the city's history, says a letter upon my desk. "For the clean lad who comes with a little money, a good stout heart and the willingness to do anything, there are still a few footholds. But the climb is long and often heart-breaking."

ON the other side of the picture —perhaps 75 per cent of those who have "winded" very nicely in this man's town are from "the provences"—as they call the outside world. The following towns are in the class with Lubbock in regards to milk service under the ordinance: Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Breckenridge, Brownsville, Brownwood, Bryan, Corpus Christi, Corsicana, El Paso, Fort Worth, Graham, Jacksonville, Jefferson, Kerrville, Martin, Marshall, Mexia, Mineral Wells, Nagavoches, Paris, San Angelo, San Antonio, Texarkana, Tyler, Vernon, Weatherford and Wichita Falls.
Dr. J. W. Rollo, city health officer, feels that this is a very creditable showing for Lubbock as most of the towns listed above are larger than Lubbock. He says that the people of Lubbock owe much to the dairy owners for their co-operation in making the milk safe for the patrons.
With the continual increase in the number of registered dairy herds in the county, the pure milk supply is assured.

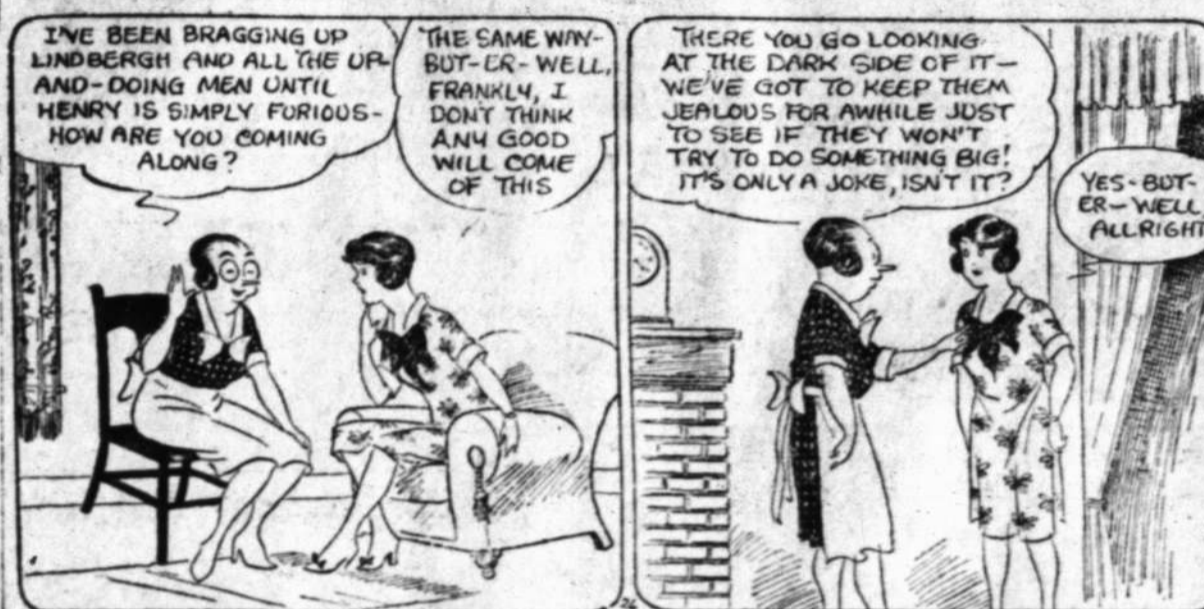

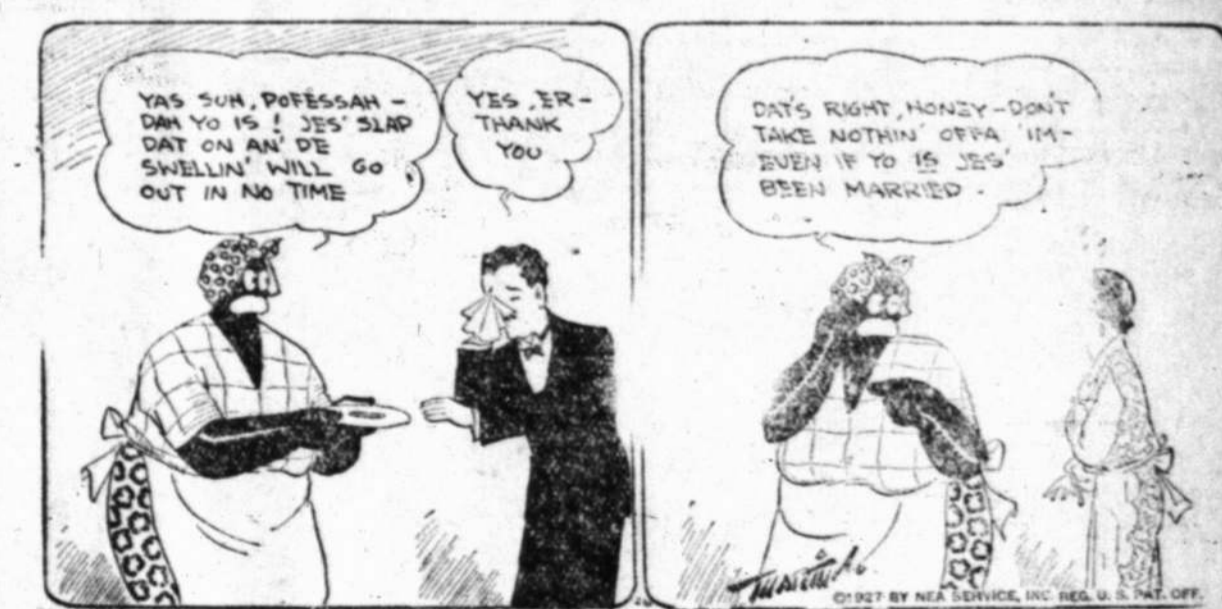

#### OIL WARFARE

NEW YORK, July 25.—Reports of threatened warfare among several of the world's largest oil companies over freight relations with Soviet Russia were intensified today by a statement of Mr. Henri Deterring, managing director of the Royal Dutch-Shell group, attacking the policy of the Standard Oil company of New York and the Vacuum Oil company which have contracts under which they purchase oil from Russia.

Mr. Henri, in his statement issued through his New York representative, charges the purchases of Russian oil by the American companies not only runs counter to the best interests of humanity and trade honesty, but are bound to replace American oil, of which there is at present a large over-production.

The Royal Dutch-Shell, aroused because the Standard Oil company of New York and the Vacuum company openly flouted its anti-soviet policies, says the Times, is preparing to invade the territories of the two latter companies in Europe, the far east and even the United States. The article adds that the Standard Oil company of New York is prepared if necessary to extend its operations to Central Europe and other territories and other places in which the Royal Dutch-Shell are interested.

The Rockefeller are expected to use their influence to prevent any widening of the breach among the three companies.

#### PRODUCTION REPORTS

TULSA, July 25. (AP)—Daily average production of crude oil in the United States gained 32,269 barrels during the week ending July 23, the Oil and Gas Journal says today. Oklahoma, due to further increase in the Seminole output, the area having passed the half million barrel mark, reported the largest gain with a daily average increase for the week of 33,429 barrels.

The daily average production for the Mid-Continent area was 1,573,655 barrels, an increase of 27,502. Production for the entire United States was given as 2,568,435, compared with 2,531,196 a week ago.

#### GASSER ATTRACTS ATTENTION

The Texas Company's big gasser located south of the Majmar pool in Lea county, under the caprock in section 25-16-21, continued to attract attention today after being cemented in.

Cement has been placed between the 12, 16, 8, and 8 inch casing, cutting off the gas except through the 6 inch casing; he gas is now being conducted a safe distance from the well through a four inch flow pipe. This has been done to avoid fire.

The well is still making 29,000,000

feet of gas and spraying from 20 to 25 barrels of oil a day. Investigation has proven that the oil coming from the bottom of the hole and the officials of the Texas company are well pleased over the showing. Tests made by the Phillips Petroleum company show that the gas will make a gallon of gasoline to every 1000 cubic feet, according to reports in Artesia today. Separators have been ordered from Casper, Wyoming and will be placed at the well to determine how much gasoline the gas will make.

The tools are still in the hole and all efforts to recover them so far have failed. It is expected that when the tools are taken out of the hole the oil flow will greatly increase.

El Capitan Oil company No. 1 32-wood, located 290 feet from the southwest corner of section 35, block A. R. M. Thompson survey, Hockley county, are abandoning this test. Last measurements showed the hole to be bottomed at 3215 feet.

Cap Slagle of the Exploration Oil company, who has charge of the company's tools in this district is in Lubbock.

#### CHECHAKO IS PLUGGING

The Chechako Oil company is plugging the No. 1 Jim Owens at 2821 feet. This well is located in the center of the northwest quarter of section 26, block 4, T. & P. R. survey, Motley county. A show of oil was picked up at 2821 feet in this well. Mr. J. F. Pennington, secretary of the McElroy and Dixon Creek Oil companies of Amarillo, is also president of the Chechako Oil company.

Mark Anthony and his brother Scott are in Lubbock today enroute to Amarillo, from California where they have been visiting friends. Mark was formerly with the Pacific Pipe Line company in Panama.

#### REZANA PETROLEUM IS MAKING

REZANA Petroleum is making numerous tests for all structures with geophysical instruments in Dawson and Gaines counties in the northern area, which is part of the South Plains country. The scientific instruments, including the torsion balance, are under the supervision of A. Von Weizden of Dallas. Professor Schwader of Berlin, who has been active in the development of the torsion balance visited Mr. Von Weizden at Lamesa.

### Work On Revival Tabernacle Here Near Completion

Forty-five workmen, including members of the carpenters union, laborers and pastors of two churches of the city, completed the skeleton form of the tabernacle for the Union Revival services today, and the roofing, seating and all work of the structure is expected to be completed within the next two days.

Lunch for all the workers was prepared by a committee of women representative of the various churches of the city. Rev. E. H. White and Rev. W. P. Jennings, representing the ministerial alliance in the capacity of assistant care-taker, hammered steadily through the morning hours and joked with the "boys" at lunch time.

The tabernacle, 111 by 86 feet in dimensions, together with available surrounding space, will seat 5,000 persons, committee workers say. Traffic on all streets bordering the structure will be checked in order to expedite convenience for those attending the meetings.

The principal part of the pavilion will continue to be used for stock judging purposes, the dean said, remarking that eleven half days per week would be taken up in actual judging work.

### Shames Of Hendrik Hudson! Look At This NEW YORK BROKER AND WIFE PLANNING SUITS Scion Of Old Family And Spouse To Quit

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 25.—Spencer K. Hudson, a member of the New York stock exchange and a direct descendant of Hendrik Hudson, was accused today by his wife of having used every method within his \$3,000,000 means to "shame and annoy" her.

Mrs. Hudson, in a supplemental complaint filed today in her suit for separation, charged that the Wall Street man had "shame and humiliated" her and "shamed her" and that he had even tried to have her deported from this country.

Kicked To Government Mrs. Hudson, who is said to have been a Hungarian motion picture actress before her marriage November 15, 1925, said her husband had told the immigration authorities that she was not of good moral character and had evaded customs in importing jewelry.

The Hudsons' marital actions became of a public nature in May, 1926, when, in opposing his wife's application for alimony pending trial of a separation suit on grounds of desertion, Hudson's counsel announced that the broker was allowed no latch-key after his marriage. He said that he could enter his home "only on his wife's express invitation," although he had spent \$49,000 on furnishings.

Changes Counter Action The first of the present year the broker Hudson was permitted to change his counter action from separation to divorce from Mrs. Hudson and in the new action accused his wife of being friendly with an employee of a detective agency.

The accusation was met with a counter-accusation that the broker was intimate with a member of the original Florida-Gator nest.

In her supplemental complaint, Mrs. Hudson today charged that her husband had bribed and intimidated her witnesses so that they would testify in her behalf, and that he had had detectives tap her telephone wires, "baited" employees to offer her mail and had had disreputable persons call her "vile and unpraiseworthy" names in the street and other public places.

## THREE JURORS ARE TAKEN IN LEBOUF CASE

### QUESTIONS IN DEATH PENALTY FOR WOMAN ASKED BY STATE

(By Associated Press)  
FRANKLIN, La., July 26.—Three jurors had been selected for the Leboeuf murder trial when court was recessed for lunch today.

Twenty-one of the petit jury venire had been examined. The defense had rejected seven without cause and the state six, while the defense had challenged three with cause and the state two.

Selection of the jury was begun early last night.

**Woman's Case Up**  
Whether they were willing to find a woman guilty and thus send her to the gallows was asked of veniremen today in selecting the jury to try Mrs. Leboeuf and two men.

Emil Vuilleumot, district attorney, first asked each man he questioned whether he had conscientious scruples against the death penalty and then whether he would send a woman to her death.

Mrs. Leboeuf and Dr. Thomas E. Dreher are charged with having caused James Beadle, a trapper to slay Leboeuf as a result of intimacy between Dr. Dreher and Mrs. Leboeuf. One juror was chosen last night.

**Others Summoned**  
The judge ordered that names of ninety persons be drawn from the tales jury box to be summoned for jury service.

Attorneys for the defense objected on the ground that it would be prejudicial to the defendants to draw the list before the regular venire of thirty was exhausted.

The motion was overruled and the defense accepted.

## CLUBMAN HELD AS COWARD FOR WOMAN'S DEATH

### THREE MEN CLEARED OF CRIMINAL INTENT IN LAKE TRAGEDY

(By Associated Press)  
SEATTLE, July 26.—Creigh Nelson, wealthy Seattle club man and broker, and two other men last night were branded by a coroner's jury as cowards and held morally but not criminally responsible for the death of Miss Violet Maude Payne, music and dancing teacher who fell from Nelson's yacht after a liquor party here early last Wednesday.

Although prosecutor Erving D. Colvin announced there would be no further investigation of the tragedy unless additional evidence is uncovered, Nelson still was held under a \$20,000 bond. The other two men were freed.

**Showed No Effort**  
Evidence was given that Nelson and the other two men and Mrs. Winona Gorman, the fifth member of the party, stood by without making any real effort to rescue Miss Payne, although it was testified that one of the men lowered himself into the water and made a half-hearted search for her.

The coroner's jury found that Miss Payne met death when she accidentally slipped and fell into Lake Union while stepping from the boat to the Seattle Yacht club dock after what was termed a "wild party" aboard the vessel.

Nelson and the other two men—Captain A. F. Bickner, skipper of the boat, and E. E. Barrington, assistant secretary of the Yacht Club—were in the opinion of the jurors, made "no real effort to rescue" the woman, but on the contrary, stood by and watched her struggle for her life in the lake waters.

Further, the jury of four men and two women found that Nelson, Bell and Barrington conspired to conceal the fact of Miss Payne's death from police. Little censure of Mrs. Gorman was voiced by the jury.

Mrs. Gorman, Captain Bell and Barrington were the three released from jail at the conclusion of the inquest.

The verdict also said "we find by the evidence, that while not criminally liable, Nelson, Bell and Barrington are cowards and morally responsible for the death of Miss Payne."

Attorneys for Nelson announced they would seek today to have his bond vacated.

DENVER, Colo., July 26.—Carl Phinney of Austin, assistant secretary to Governor Dan Moody, was recovering in his hotel room Monday from injuries suffered last week when a nightmarer caused him to leap from a speeding Colorado, Southern train in New Mexico.

Phinney from his bed here today gave an account of his midnight plunge.

"The train was on detour because of a wreck near Trinidad, Colo., and the story of the wreck must have gripped my subconscious mind," said the secretary, "dreaming that our train was wrecked, I smashed the window in my pullman berth and leaped to the ground with nothing on but my pajamas." Phinney said that he was partially stunned by the fall and suffered a bad

## BIRDMEN JUST ESCAPE DEATH

### FORT BLISS SCENE OF MIRACULOUS CRASH OF AIRPLANE

EL PASO, Texas, July 26 (AP)—Lieutenant Sam Harris, piloting a United States army plane, and L. C. Hollis, his mechanic, narrowly escaped death when their ship crashed to the ground here Monday during the U. S. army air maneuvers being conducted at Fort Bliss.

By only a miracle, which was caused in a delay in taking off, the plane carried no explosives, although other planes were carrying bombs which are being used in the war game.

Although thousands were on hand to witness the "air war" few persons saw the crash due to a mist which shrouded the maneuvers in the sky.

**Hits Air Pocket**  
Harris' plane was one of five attack planes flying in squadron formation. The squadron started to turn, Harris' plane was on the inside, and only a short distance from the ground. He checked his speed to allow the other planes to turn without breaking up the formation, and was traveling at the minimum speed when the ship hit an air pocket.

The plane sidled and Harris gave it "the gun" but there was no air to "bite into," and the ship squashed to the ground.

Lieutenant Harris had been ordered to take a ship into the air loaded with bombs, but when the ship was discovered to be too heavily loaded he was ordered to take the air in another ship.

Had the ship been carrying its cargo of bombs both men would have been blown to pieces, war game umpires said.
