Oliver Roberts Barton Says: *** Companionship Allows Child To Train Self

It is easier to teach a child good traits if there are other children in the house. Kindness, sympathy, patience, interest in affairs other than his own, indeed all sorts of desirable things can be cultivated more quickly if he has playmates.

But an only child makes it more difficult. How can we teach a child behavior toward others, if there are no others to behave toward—except

this elders? Adults will not produce any natural reaction as companions. Adults are in a world beyond a child's comprehension.

He may be dominated by adults guided by them, and disciplined by them, but except in cases where parents have a rare conception of the child mind there will be little of what we may call character contact.

Develop Together

Two children will develop more quickly mentally if they are together than if they are allowed to grow up alone. Their mental processes are stimulated and personality takes on a positive rather than a passive tone. Character begins to shape itself, and after all, what is character except behavior toward others?

What would character avail us if we lived as hermits in a world alone? Man is a "social creature." He has lived in groups practically always. It is to prepare the child for his comrades with people when he is older that is the object of his training in babyhood and childhood.

The way to teach him behavior toward others when he is grown is to teach him behavior toward children when he is little.

A child brought up alone is likely to keep on developing the elemental traits he was born with and which, in spite of centuries of civilization, are almost his sole heritage from pre-natal ancestors.

He is born with four—some of the two kinds, called subjective fear. He is born with a temper or develops it at a very early age. Jealousy, selfishness—in fact about the same characteristics we find in the lower animals are heritage of the ages. He does not have to be taught these. Keeping them under control calls for patience and wisdom on the part of his parents.

Most Cultivate Virtues

On the other hand, he possesses virtues, if he possesses them at all, in the most incipient form. They must be cultivated. If you wish a child to be honest, truthful, kind, unselfish, brave, friendly, helpful and all the rest, it is up to you. He won't know how to be these things until you show him how.

Don't wait until a child makes mistakes and then you are teaching him by whipping him. Child training doesn't mean punishing. It means to take him in hand as a little baby and patiently show him over and over again the right things to do.

This will be easier to do if he has a brother or sister to play with. Otherwise it may be difficult for you to know exactly what processes are going on in his mind.

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Apricots, cereal, cream, toasted salt codfish with broiled tomatoes, reheated rolls, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Jellied bouillon, radishes, and ripe olives, baked carrots, Boston brown bread, and butter sandwiches, jelly roll, milk, tea.

DINNER—Stuffed and rolled round steak, chard greens with tomato sauce, bananas and nut salad, custard pie, milk, coffee.

Baked Carrots. Five or six new carrots, 1 medium sized onion, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1-2 teaspoon sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons butter, few grains pepper.

Wash and scrape carrots and cut in quarters, lengthwise. Place in a well buttered casserole. Peel and mince onion and onion. Season with salt and sugar and dot with butter. Cover casserole and bake in a moderate oven about one hour. Remove cover for last 15 minutes and increase heat to brown slightly.

Taking Out a No Trump—1

Your partner has bid a no trump. Second hand has passed. There is no contest and the score is clear. What should you as third hand do? Should you pass or bid a suit? Why and when should you show your strength or your weakness by a suit bid? Should you show anything?

Many an argument at the bridge table has followed a take-out. When should you take out? To answer what procedure to follow at times baffling. There is no unanimity of opinion thereon among advanced players and even the experts differ. What, then, is the average player to do?

Bear in mind that the principal aim of bidding is to make game. Every initial bid is made with this object in view. To accomplish the result, however, is not always possible.

After the declarer has made an initial no trump bid you must examine your hand for the purpose of ascertaining whether game can more readily be made at no trump or in your major suit, or whether it is more desirable to play the combined hands in your minor suit.

Your partner by bidding a no trump has merely said to you, "I would like to play this hand in a no trump. If, however, you have sufficient strength in a major suit making game may be easier in the major than in the no trump; therefore I want you to declare your major."

If your hand offers no assistance for my no trump and game at no trump does not appear probable, it may be advisable for you to show me your weakness by declaring your minor suit.

In taking out, you always must bear in mind that game can more readily be made by playing one hand in a major suit declaration than in a no trump or a minor suit. Copyright, 1928, by the Ready Reference Publishing Co.

GAMBLING CHARGED

Flourishes In New Orleans,
Statement Says

NEW ORLEANS, July 11 (AP)—Charges that gambling in all forms flourish in New Orleans "under protection of constituted authorities" and that in one specific instance policemen received \$6,000 "within a short time" for their protection were made by representatives of the New Orleans association of commerce before a special

commission of city council here today.

W. S. Bender, chairman of the association's anti-gambling committee, declared he had reliable information that "card games, dice games, roulette and gambling on race horses are being operated extensively in New Orleans."

The hearing is the result of the association's petition to Gov. Huey P. Long, to close gambling houses in adjoining parishes and that officials reply that "New Orleans would have to come with clean hands" before he would act on the petition.

THREE ARRESTED

Are Held For Shooting Man
Near Austin

AUSTIN, July 11 (AP)—A third young man was in Travis county jail today in connection with the wounding of George Pearson of Pflugerville, shot Tuesday as he fought a gang of alleged tire thieves whom he had pursued for miles on their moving truck.

Pearson, 26, is not believed to be seriously hurt. Two of the men held are brothers. Two charges of theft of automobile tires have been filed in justice court here and an assault to murder complaint may be lodged later.

Officers said Pearson discovered the men apparently attempting to strip tires from his truck. They drove away swiftly in their own truck, Pearson following them in a roadster. Overtaking the fleeing machine, he climbed aboard and fought with the occupants.

CROPS IMPROVE

Slaton Rain Was Boon To
Those Planted

SLATON, July 11.—Crops are showing remarkable improvement following the one-half inch of rain which fell here Monday. The fall was much heavier in some parts of the Slaton territory, according to reports by several farmers who said they received moisture amounting to from two to four inches on their farms. Some reported small damage by hail, but this was inconsiderable, taking the territory as a whole, and it is expected that the damaged crops will outgrow the effects in a short time. No hail fell here.

NEW YORK, July 11. (AP)—A leader in the business industrial world—John J. Raskob, of General Motors Corporation and E. I. DuPont de Nemours—will direct Governor Smith's campaign for the presidency.

Raskob, who never has been active politically and who is listed in "Who's Who" as a republican; was named to succeed Clem Shaver, as chairman of the democratic national committee at a harmonious organization meeting of the committee here today. He is a close friend of the presidential nominee, who suggested his selection.

Born in New York state at Lockport, the new chairman, calls Claymont, Del. his home. He also has a summer residence at Centerville, Md., where Governor Smith went last Saturday to attend the funeral of one of his sons, killed in an automobile accident.

Given wide powers by the national committee in the conduct of the campaign, Mr. Raskob immediately appointed Herbert Lehman, New York investment banker, as director of finance, succeeding Jesse H. Jones, of Houston. He also was authorized to name an advisory committee and without delay announced selection of Senator Gerry of Rhode Island as its chairman.

Was Dick Howe, Raskob, small of stature and mild mannered, was a "dark horse" for the committee chairmanship. Until today Senator Gerry and a few others had figured mainly in speculation. His appointment was proposed by Josiah Marvel of Delaware at the meeting which lasted only 45 minutes.

The new chairman's first act was to deliver a brief speech in which he warned the committee against indulging in the coming campaign, declared that the party never had enjoyed such prospects of success at the polls, and asserted that Smith, if elected, could be depended upon to show constructive leadership in the direction of the Nation's affairs.

Smith Friend of Farmer He also described the nominee as a friend of the farmer, and referred to the prohibition question without mincing words.

Contrary to expectations neither Governor Smith nor his running mate, Senator Robinson, attended the committee session. Later both nominees joined the committee members at a luncheon across the hall at the National Democratic club.

The Governor had come down from Albany for the occasion and while here plans to map out with Raskob and other leaders a campaign plan. Mr. Raskob was authorized by the committee to consult both Smith and Robinson regarding dates for their official notification, and to fix them. He said these details and others would be disposed of before next week.

In perfecting its new organization, the national committee decided to have five vice chairmen, and the following were appointed by Mr. Raskob to the posts: Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross, former governor of Wyoming; Mrs. Florence Packey, of Kansas; Frank Hague, of New Jersey; Governor Byrd of Virginia, and Scott Ferris of Oklahoma.

Before retiring as director of finance, Mr. Jones presented a report showing that contributions and collections pledged to the national committee since January, 1925, had totaled \$464,000, exclusive of the \$200,000 convention fund contributed by citizens of Houston and \$44,000 raised from convention programs, concessions and the like. The intake, he reported, as enough to pay off the 1924 deficit and leave approximately \$200,000 on hand to start on this year's operations.

PROBE DIVORCES

Paris Determined To Halt "Mill"

PARIS, July 11. (AP)—Records of every divorce granted to foreigners in France during the past two years are to be investigated by one ministry of justice, but there is no danger that any decisions already handed down will be declared void. Decrees "ground out by the American divorce mill," which the government now is determined to gear to low speed were "definite and will not be changed," it was said at the palace of justice tonight.

French advocates disciplined this week for various acts in connection with obtaining divorces for American clients are to have their day in court July 21.

This indisposition, which closely resembles hay fever in its symptoms, heretofore had invariably seized Mr. Coolidge in the spring time and bothered him until late summer. In Washington the chief executive submitted to weekly treatments for it from a nose specialist.

CHURCH ROW PENDING

Hearing On Injunction Is Continued

DALLAS, July 11. (AP)—Adjustment of the alleged difference in specifications of the two-thirds completed fundamentalist Baptist church tabernacle in a Dallas residence district with those required by the city building code will be left temporarily to the church and the city building inspector.

By mutual agreement of attorneys for the church protesting property holders and the court decision of District Judge Towne Young scheduled for today as to whether the temporary restraining order against erection of the tabernacle should be made permanent was continued indefinitely.

TRASH FIRE SCARE

Reflection of Flames Bring Alarm

Reflection on nearby buildings and the smoke of a trash fire on 12th street between Avenue G and H caused an excited passer-by to turn in a fire alarm at about 10 o'clock last night.

RADIO FIGHT LOOMS

Constitutionality Of Decree Attacked

WASHINGTON, July 11. (AP)—Constitutionality of the federal radio commission's ruling refusing broadcasting rights to 162 stations beginning August 1 was challenged today at the commission's hearing on application of certain of the stations for retention of their licenses.

Nicholas Schneider, station WBBM, Union City, N. J., and C. A. Sorenson, station KICK, Red Oak, Iowa, two of the dozen stations heard today, were overruled on the plea, but they noted exceptions for use in possible recourse to a court of law. Schneider further said that the 1927 radio act was unconstitutional as it provided for taking property without due process of law.

"DRY" ELECTORS

Constitutionalists May Join Republicans

DALLAS, Tex., July 11. (AP)—Texas Democrats who oppose the election of Governor Alfred E. Smith, self-styled "Constitutional Democrats" probably will name a full set of presidential electors, bound by instructions to vote for Herbert Hoover, at a statewide meeting here next Tuesday, according to an announcement today by former governor, O. B. Colquitt, one of the anti-Smith leaders.

Colquitt added that a state executive committee to be named at Tuesday's meeting probably would be empowered to negotiate with the republican state executive committee toward withdrawal of the republican ticket of electors and substitution of the constitutional democrats' slate.

FARM POLICY TODAY

Indiana Organization To Formulate Plan

INDIANAPOLIS, July 11. (AP)—The Indiana farm bureau federation's political policy in the approaching campaign will not be determined until tomorrow morning. At that time its board of directors will consider recommendations which were submitted here late today by a committee.

The committee's recommendations were understood to be in effect that the non-partisan political policy of the federation be maintained, but that the 60,000 members be asked to "carefully consider the state and national platforms of both republican and democratic parties before casting their vote in the November election."

MOODY SPEAKS

Address Is Void of Personal Remarks

CORPUS CHRISTI, July 11. (AP)—Without once referring to the name of an opponent, Gov. Dan Moody spoke to more than 1000 people here tonight when he gave a review of his administration. Neither did Governor Moody mention the presidential race.

The governor discussed the highway department, education, textbooks, the prison system, executive clemency, taxation, the health department and judicial reform. He was introduced by Judge H. R. Sutherland, Nueces county democratic chairman.

Governor Moody said 2400 miles of highways had been contracted for and placed under construction in the 18 months of his administration.

\$100 Fines Facing Tardy Talesmen

Judge E. R. Holmes, Yazoo City, after holding the court nearly an hour said the absent talesmen each would be fined \$100 unless they established good alibi.

Mrs. Mabel Walker Whitebrandt, assistant United States attorney general is here with a staff to assist the grand jury.

Upward of 300 postmasters from over the state have been summoned to appear. Estimates placed the number of witnesses here for the session today at between 5 and 75. Republican patronage in this state long has been a subject of controversy which revolved about Perry M. Howard, negro assistant attorney general and national committeeman from Mississippi. Charges and counter charges have been made by the Howard faction which is opposed by a "Lily White" group headed by George L. Sheldon, former governor of Nebraska and now a Delta resident.

T. J. Willis, counsel for the Sheldon group, forecast a "house cleaning" in the party in the immediate future.

HOOVER PLANS TRIP

Will Go To Coast Home For Notification

WASHINGTON, July 11. (AP)—With his formal notification just a month away, Herbert Hoover, republican presidential nominee, was completing today plans for his trip to his home at Palo Alto, California, and for relinquishing his post as Commerce Secretary.

He also conferred with a number of party leaders, among them O. F. Glenn, republican senatorial nominee in Illinois, and representatives Bacharach and Keithback of New Jersey. The two members of Congress brought encouraging reports of the outlook in their state, Bacharach promising that New Jersey would give the Hoover-Curtis ticket a plurality of 600,000.
