MORE STUDENTS RIDING BUSES

MORE PUPILS BROUGHT TO PERRYTON SCHOOL DAILY BY SCHOOL BUSES THAN IN 1936-37 TERM

The intricate transportation system for carrying rural students to the Perryton High School has been revised under the direction of A. Burgess, superintendent. The increase of 29 miles per day is made by the buses bringing 44 students to the school than last year. Total miles covered per day was 556 as compared with present total of 564. Salaries drivers showed an increase of \$1.00 per month or equal to a total of 230 miles is brought daily to the school.

At the present time 11 buses are carrying students from Perryton. Approximately 564 miles is covered each day. Waka and Hunt operate independent buses to school. Communities covered number of buses are as follows: Waka, 3 buses; Ochiltree and Allen, 1 bus; Farnsworth and Allen, 1 bus; Twichell, 1 bus; Newland, 1 bus; and north, 5 buses.

Waka and Hunt communities are served by three buses each in the respective towns send one bus to Perryton. The school sends 12 students and 3.50 per bus.

Superintendent Burgess stated the revision was made by a study of the schedules and combining automobiles and buses on the various routes. Two were discontinued. Drivers for the buses are selected on the basis of merit and reliability.

SCHOOL ELECTION APRIL 2

Trustees expire; hold election Saturday, April 2nd.

Trustees for the Perryton Independent School District will be elected the first Saturday in April. The Board of Trustees for three years is on the Board of Trustees for District.

The Board of Trustees have appointed Sam Hergert and J. N. Conner to hold the election in the Perryton box, and L. R. Conner at Farnsworth.

Farm Program Has Many Features For Wheat Farms

Stillwater, Ok., March 7 (Special)

The new AAA Farm bill offers wheat farmers a well-rounded wheat program including acreage allotments, agricultural conservation payments, wheat loans, crop insurance, and marketing quotas if supplies are so large that quotas are necessary.

The following brief summary of how these provisions in the new farm bill will operate for wheat farmers is given by H. P. Moffitt, AAA administrator for Director Ernest E. Scholl of the Oklahoma A. and M. College Extension Service.

ACREAGE ALLOTMENTS: The Act provides for acreage allotments to wheat farmers each year which will produce enough wheat for domestic consumption and exports and provide a substantial surplus for reserve. The Act will aim to provide a supply each year of around 900 million bushels. Wheat allotments will be made for 1938, but only for the See No. 2, Back Page

CALF OF CLAIR BRILLHART TO BE BOUGHT AT AUCTION; MAY BE SOLD THROUGH LOCAL MARKETS

Clair Brillhart won 24th place in a class of 51 calves on his entry in the Amarillo Fat Stock Show, March 8. He was awarded a premium of \$4.50 on the calf. Since this is the first attempt he has made in preparing stock for exhibit, this is a creditable showing.

The calf will be sold at public auction on Friday morning, March 11. The Perryton Chamber of Commerce will bid for the animal and will return him to Perryton to be resold on next Tuesday, March 14. It is likely that the meat will be sold through local meat markets next week.

"Over 200 calves were shown at the exhibit and the competition was keen," stated E. W. Thomas, county agent.

PANHANDLE FARMERS MAKE APPLICATION FOR CHARTER AT AMARILLO MEETING FRIDAY, MARCH 4

Grain growers from West Texas and New Mexico gathered in Amarillo March 4 to prepare application for a charter to bring into existence a huge grain marketing cooperative.

The tentative name selected is Southwest Grain Growers, Inc., with the alternate name, Producers Grain Growers Inc. It is to have an authorized capital stock of \$1,000,000. The charter will probably be granted about March 15. The charter application was signed by 27 grain growers.

C. O. Roach, A. E. Pittman and J. S. Slaughter were among the 160 delegates attending the organization last Friday. Mr. Roach served on the committee to recommend a corporation name. Mr. Pittman was a member of the committee recommending number and method of electing directors.

CCC Anniversary

Fifth Birthday of CCC Observed by Perryton Camp First Part of April

Arrangements are being made by Company 2874, CCC, Perryton, for the observance of the fifth anniversary of the Civilian Conservation Corps, March 31-April 5. The Departments of Agriculture and Interior are cooperating in this celebration.

Capt. G. W. Coffman Jr. in charge of Company 2874, and D. E. Aulry, superintendent of the Perryton Soil Conservation Service, are formulating plans for a joint affair.

Interesting and educational exhibits will be displayed in the recreational hall. Officers and enrollees will act as guides and hosts, and escort the visitors on the tours of inspection.

FIRST MEETING TO BE HELD AT SCHOOL HOUSE FRIDAY NIGHT, MARCH 11 TO LAY PLANS

There will be a meeting of Junior Chamber of Commerce members and others in the high school building next Friday evening, March 11 at 7:30 to make plans for organizing Volley Ball teams among the business men of the town and all others interested in the game.

EVERY ELIGIBLE CHILD SHOULD BE ENUMERATED

It is very important that every eligible school child residing in the Perryton Independent School District be enumerated in the school census now being taken. Children who will be six years old and under age 18 on September 1, 1938 are eligible for enumeration. They should be enumerated in the district where their parents reside. Then if they desire to attend the Perryton school, they should be transferred on the rolls by their parents during the summer before August 1. The school district receives \$22.00 in state and \$4.00 in county aid for every child enumerated so it can be readily seen how important it is that every child of school age be included in this census. If children are not old enough to attend school now then telephone or drop a card to Superintendent Roger A. Burgess and an enumerator will be sent to the home. Failure to enumerate means a financial loss to the school of \$26.00 for every child thus overlooked.

School Band, 4-H Club Members and Others to Amarillo

The Perryton community was well represented at the Amarillo "Mother-in-law Day" yesterday when the 56-piece school band, 37 4-H Club boys, approximately 150 school children and many parents and others viewed the big parade, attended the fat stock show, took in Home Demonstration Club conferences, and saw and heard the first lady of the United States.

County Agent E. W. Thomas stated that as near as he could figure, 37 boys from the Ochiltree county 4-H Clubs were in Amarillo for the fat stock show and that 32 of the boys marched in the parade that preceded the "Mother-in-law" parade. Ochiltree was second only to Wheeler county in the size of its delegation in the parade.

The 56-piece Perryton school band was accorded a fine reception by the thousands of people that viewed the big parade and it was one of the most colorful marching units in the line of march. Perryton people were justly proud of the appearance and performance of their own red and white clad boys and girls as they paraded up Polk Street.

The float prepared by the women of the Ochiltree County Council of Home Demonstration Clubs was one of the most attractive in the entire parade and the club women are to be congratulated.



TEND PLAINS DROUGHT RATES

ILTREE AMONG COUNTIES WANTED EXTENSION ON FREIGHT RATES FOR LIVESTOCK FEED

Extension for two months more of agency railroad rates in shipment of livestock in 15 counties in Texas Panhandle was announced Friday, March 5, by Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson. South emergency rates for South and Southwest Texas counties, previously had been granted in those counties and because of alleviation of drought conditions in those counties and because request for extension was made at the hearing held in Austin last

month. The Panhandle counties' representatives presented evidence to show conditions still were in bad shape and that it would be necessary to ship in feed to carry stock through March and April. The emergency rates had expired under the order on March 1.

"We are glad to announce," Thompson said, "that ranchmen in Panhandle drought counties will have protection by emergency freight rates until ranges have recovered."

Such benefit has inured to Texas for the past two years by reason of drought rates. At times they have been vigorously fought by the railroads, but I believe now that the fact of the rates were to the best interest of the railroads as well as to the ranchmen because by being able to ship their cattle, the ranchmen furnished something for the railroads to

carry. The counties given the extended time are Carson, Dallam, Gray, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lamb, Moore, Oldham, Ochiltree, and Randall, Roberts and Sherman.

TEXAS RELIEF GETS POTATOES

SURPLUS FROM THREE STATES USED BY TEXAS COMMISSION; DISTRICT 16 TO GET 108,000 LBS.

Surplus potatoes from three states will be added to the diets of families receiving relief. According to R. L. Montgomery, Director of Commodity Distribution, Texas Relief Commission, the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation, under the direction of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, is now engaged in buying surplus potatoes in Idaho, Colorado, and Utah, in order to bring about orderly marketing and to protect growers.

As a result of this buying program, the Texas Relief Commission has received 2,988,000 pounds of this nourishing vegetable during February, and Mr. Montgomery states that he expects 12,000 pounds more from the corporation as its program progresses.

District 16, comprised of 26 counties in the Panhandle, includes Ochiltree, and received 108,000 pounds of the above potatoes during February to be distributed through its local storehouses and truck service at the Amarillo warehouse.

During the month of February, 107,200 pounds of Irish potatoes were distributed to families on relief in the above 26 counties in the Panhandle.

purpose of computing AAA payments to farmers. The act provides that compliance for 1938 shall be checked against the general soil-depleting goal for each farm. The first acreage allotments which will apply fully will be those for 1939.

PAYMENTS: Payments to farmers will be made under the provisions of the 1938 Agricultural Conservation Program. The act also provides for parity payments to farmers, but only if specific additional funds are made available for this purpose.

LOANS: Wheat loans are to be made to farmers in any year in which the farm price of wheat on June 15 is less than 52 per cent of the parity price of wheat, or in any year in which the July wheat estimate is more than the normal domestic consumption and exports of about 700 million bushels. These loans are to be made by the Commodity Credit Corporation and are to be made at between 52 and 75 per cent of the parity price at the beginning of the marketing year. Loan may be made in 1938 if prices or supplies are within the limits set by the act.

CROP INSURANCE: The act establishes a Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. This corporation will offer crop insurance to wheat farmers, beginning with the 1939 crop. Farmers who store wheat under marketing quotas may use some of this wheat to pay premiums on crop insurance. Under the crop insurance plan farmers can pay premiums in wheat and receive loss payments in wheat.

MARKETING QUOTAS AND REFERENDUM: Marketing quotas are provided in years when the total supplies of wheat exceed approximately 950 million bushels. Marketing quotas when approved by a two-thirds majority of farmers in a referendum, will apply to all commercial wheat growers. Farmers who produce less than 100 bushels of wheat are exempt from the quotas. When there are marketing quotas, each farmer will be asked to hold a part of his crop off the market in order to keep prices from being demor-

der to keep prices from being demor- in 1938 unless funds are provided by Congress for parity payments on wheat in 1938.

PANHANDLE PARAGRAPHS

The scarlet fever epidemic which was feared throughout the country seems to be well under control by the health authorities since only two new cases have been reported this week. A total of seven cases are in the county at the present time.—Boise City News.

Congressman Phil Ferguson (D-Okl.) stated last week that in a report he received from the United States Department of Agriculture, \$104,208 would be spent in the three Oklahoma Panhandle counties, Texas, Cimarron and Beaver, for the purpose of purchase of sub-marginal lands.—Beaver Herald Democrat.

What is believed to be the first irrigation well to be brought in as a real producer in Hemphill county was struck at the Hoover Dairy Farm near the Southwest city limits of Canadian, Saturday noon. The farm is operated by the Hemphill Produce Company of this city.—Canadian Record.

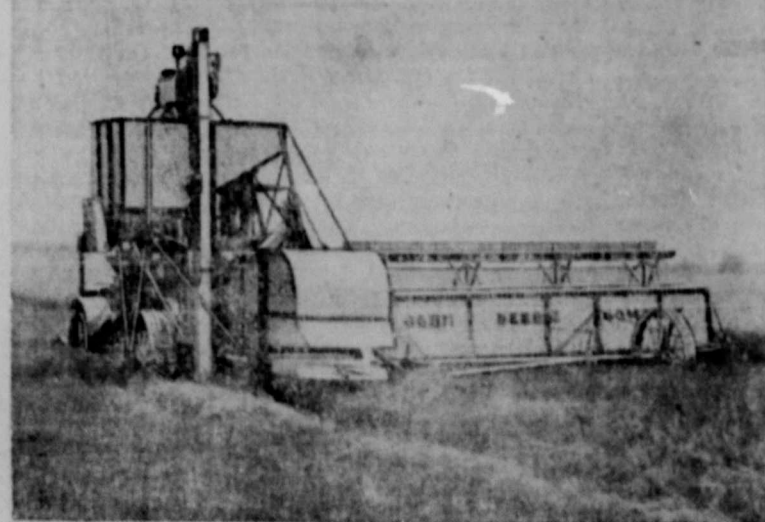
