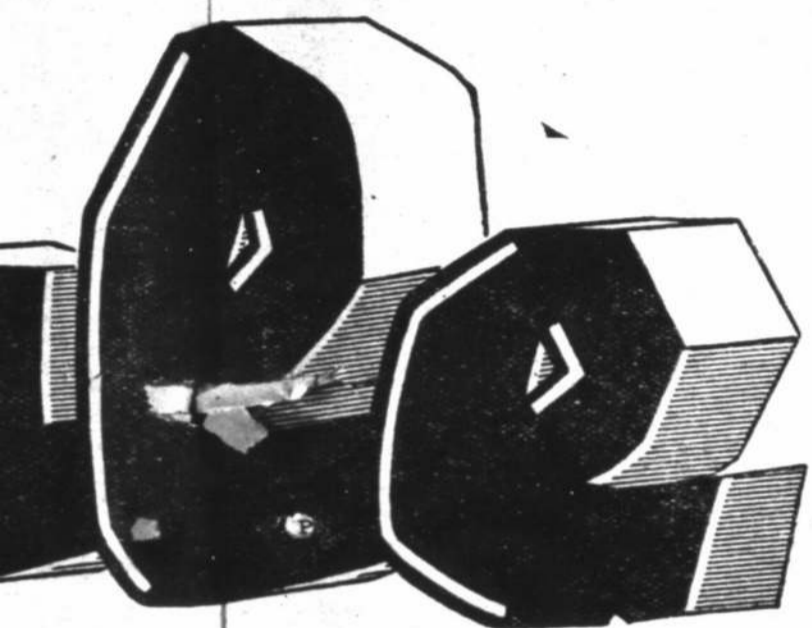

## Hot Weather Calls For Careful Living

Keeping cool and standing the heat during the hot summer months is in a large measure dependent upon the individual, health authorities agree. Over indulgence in food or exercise may cause much suffering.

"The clothes we wear and the food we eat play an important role in keeping us comfortable during the hot season," said Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer.

"Summer clothing should be light in weight and color and of a porous texture. White clothes reflect the rays of the sun and therefore are cooler. Frequent change of clothing, particularly of that next to the skin, is especially conducive to comfort.

The summer diet should consist of light, nutritious, and easily digested foods. Fresh fruits and vegetables are particularly desirable as hot weather foods because of their ease of digestion and wide range of variety in the manner they may be served. Meat and heavy pastries should be eaten sparingly. A balanced diet may be maintained without these foods. Do not eat when you are tired.

"Exercise should be taken in hot weather but good judgment must be used in the amount that is taken. Swimming is fine exercise and is more refreshing than other forms of exercise. If sun baths are to be indulged in, care should be taken to accustom the skin by exposing the body for short periods in the beginning.

"Plenty of rest is necessary during hot weather. Sleep a sufficient number of hours and eat at regular meal times. Acquire regular habits of living and develop a cheerful outlook on life, and you will find that it will help you to spend a comfortable summer at home or on vacation."

# Practical Cookery

When the heat of summer becomes so torrid you feel you just can't eat anything, try an ice cold beverage. Juices left from canned and fresh fruits can be utilized when the intense heat creates such a loss of water from the body. They can be used as a foundation or added to a tea base to make appetizing drinks at meal time or a cooling draught on a hot afternoon.

Usually a blended flavor is more pleasing, so two or perhaps even three varieties can be used to an advantage. A good general proportion is one half fruit juice and one half water or other liquids such as cold tea or ginger-ale. Some lemon juice should be added in every case as it brings out the flavor of the other fruits. Jams, Jellies, and preserves may also be used by adding water and straining. Beverages of this sort should not be too sweet.

Tasteful fruit juice combinations are: pineapple juice, apricot juice, lemon juice, and gingerale; lemon juice, orange juice, spices and tea; orange juice, pineapple juice, lime juice, tea; peach juice, fresh grapes, lemon, gingerale; sour cherry juice, grapefruit juice, lemon juice, tea; strawberry preserves, lemon water.

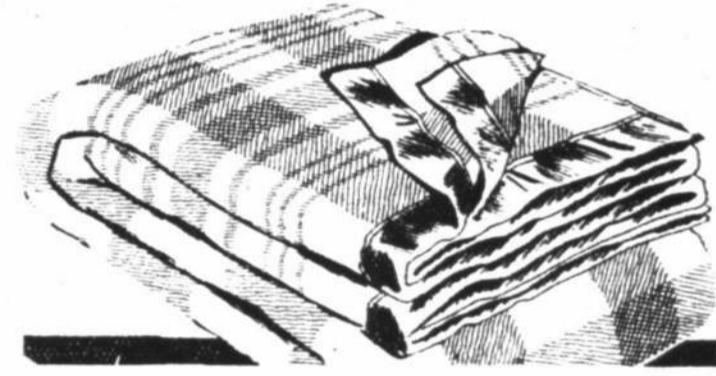

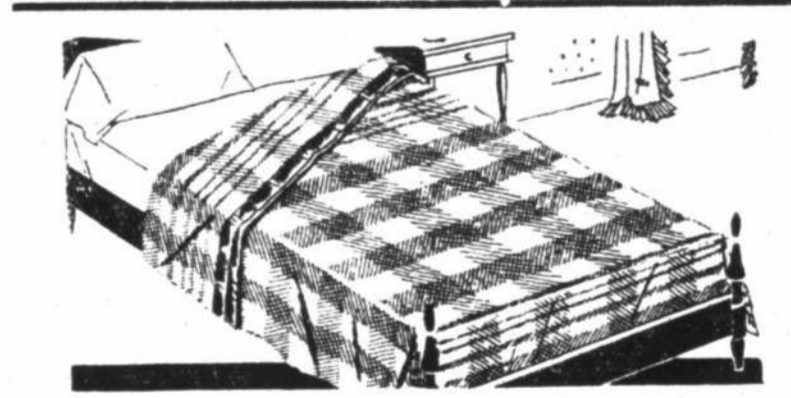

I planned at all times to keep my family neat, and clothing clean and tidy. To do this of course I had to make a list of things needed for a family of four. After inventory had been taken, I rechecked my list to see just what was needed for a full wardrobe.

It has been very easy for me to keep a record of wardrobe expenditures, as I've kept records for the farm for years, and I know it pays.

I not only planned for my own family, but have tried in every way possible to help my co-operator in planning wardrobes, patterns, styles and various ways, for better and happier homes.

Two ladies have asked me to lend them my foundation pattern, to make dresses and pajamas, the results being very satisfactory, as I taught them how to make pajamas by using pattern, and how to use same pattern for dresses.

I have made for adults 5 slips, 5 print dresses, 1 pair pajamas, 1 gown, 1 wool dress, 1 swaggar suit, 1 net dress, renovated and lined 1 spring coat, 3 blouses.

For children I have made 4 shirts, 1 wool dress, 6 pairs shorts, 3 under slacks, 10 pairs pants, 6 slips, 1 wool skirt, 14 dresses, 3 pair overalls, a total of 72 garments, and at least that number that were patched and renovated. Of course all these articles weren't made for my own family, it has been a pleasure to serve both far and near, and I feel that our club work is growing by leaps and bounds to happier, peaceful, and better planned wardrobes.

We only have six active club members. I have had my foundation pattern rechecked.

- 1 Foundation pattern, rechecked 2
- 2 Make dress and slip by pattern 4

My clothes closet is two and one-half feet deep and four and one-half feet long. I've arranged my closet, so that nothing is out of place at any time. There is one across the top for which I use in storing winter clothing and things that are not needed very often. Then in one end I have a row of shelves, seven in number. I hardly know what to do with so much room, at least, but soon found that I didn't have a shelf to spare. A rod reaches from one end to the other, giving me ample space for hanging all clothing.

What a pleasure to know that your clothes and whatnots are in their proper places at all times. Nothing is more soothing to a woman's nerves than to know her wardrobe is ready for visitors at all times.

#### S. J. R. NO. 18 A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Section 48, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the establishment of Teachers' Retirement Systems, and making an appropriation for the election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read as follows:

"Section 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and no school districts, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has not taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund for the moneys paid into the fund.

All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Funds, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, which is November 3rd, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing retirement and the creation of a retirement fund for persons employed in public schools and colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing retirement and the creation of a retirement fund for persons employed in public schools and colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

#### S. J. R. No. 3-a A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by striking out Section 20 thereof; providing for local option on the question of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes; providing that spirituous liquors, or liquors composed in whole or in part of the products of distillation shall not be sold for private profit, except to the State; providing that the Legislature shall pass laws relative to the sale, possession, transportation and manufacture of such spirituous liquors; providing for the establishment of State dispensaries; providing for the manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of all liquors which are exclusively products of the fermenta-

tion process; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered, or exchanged for beverage purposes in any county or political subdivision wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and prescribing the form of ballot.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20 thereof and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Article XVI, Section 20:

(a) It is hereby declared to be the policy of this state that the open saloon shall not be re-established. The sale of spirituous liquors, manufactured in whole or in part by means of the process of distillation and/or liquors compounded and/or composed in part of such spirituous distilled liquors, for private profit, is prohibited within this State except when such sale is made to the State. The State of Texas shall have the exclusive right to purchase at wholesale and to sell at retail such distilled spirituous liquors. Such sale shall be made only in unbroken packages and no such liquors shall be consumed on the premises where sold. The Legislature shall pass laws to prescribe regulations relative to the manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of such spirituous liquors and relative to the establishment of State dispensaries; provided, however, the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the sale for private profit and possession of distilled liquors for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes.

The manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of all liquors, the alcoholic content of which is entirely and exclusively the result of the fermentation process is hereby authorized under such restrictions as may be authorized by law.

(b) The Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the

sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within the prescribed limits; and such laws shall contain provisions for voting on the sale of intoxicating liquors of various types and various alcoholic content.

(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange in any such county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicants whatsoever, for beverage purposes, unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; provided that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties and political subdivisions, thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature.

Section 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the third day of November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for the establishment of a state dispensary system having the exclusive sale of distilled liquors, and providing for local option."

And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for the establishment of a state dispensary system having the exclusive sale of distilled liquors, and providing for local option."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the

necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appro-

printed out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

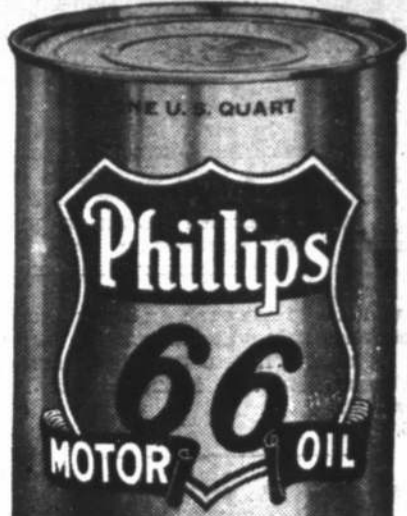
