Troy Mills' Have An Unusual Cactus



The above cactus, which looks like a misplaced stick in a plant, suddenly began to grow at a tremendous rate of speed, in the front yard of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Mills of the Oklahoma Cutoff, last week. It stands 12 feet high in the picture.

Mr. Troy Mills and his wife were amazed, one morning last week, to look out their front window and see one of their cactus plants standing fourteen inches taller than the previous day.

They were even more astonished the next morning, to notice it had added another fourteen inches.

Mr. Mills began to measure it each morning and it averaged fourteen inches per day for seven days, until it reached twelve feet in the air.

Just what kind of cactus it is, Mr. Mills doesn't know, but he has had it in the front yard for five years and this is the first time it has grown in such a manner. It is still reaching for the sky.

IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

NEW PROVISIONS IN DRIVER SAFETY RESPONSIBILITY LAW

To make the Texas Safety Responsibility Law as effective as possible, the 1963 Legislature enacted several amendments. The strengthened law became effective January 1, 1964.

To protect your driver's license and motor vehicle registration, you should know the following facts about this new law:

In any accident in which a person is killed or injured or where there is damage to the property of any one person to an apparent extent of at least \$25 or more, the operator of every motor vehicle involved is required within 10 days to report the accident in writing to the Texas Department of Public Safety. If the accident involved death, personal injury or damage to one person's property of at least \$100, the accident then comes under the Safety Responsibility Act and its requirements must be met. Accident report forms can be obtained from any law enforcement officer.

The Department of Public Safety is required by the law to suspend the driver licenses and all motor vehicle registration plates of both the operator and owner of vehicles involved in an accident coming under the Safety Responsibility law, UNLESS:

Evidence of liability insurance coverage in the minimum amounts of \$10,000 where one person was injured or killed, \$20,000 where more than one, and \$5,000 for property damage is reported to the Department of Public Safety, OR a release signed by damaged or injured persons is filed with the Department of Public Safety. Other evidence of financial responsibility is covered by the new act. In addition, the operator and owner must file proof of financial responsibility for the future and maintain it for five years.

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WHOSE GIFT?A dishonest signboard, in our opinion, is no more ex-
cusable than a crooked politician, a cheating businessman
or a lying newspaper.Signs—like politicians, businessmen and newspapers
—should say what they mean and mean what they say.Therefore, we are in sympathy with a current move-
ment to change the wording on those thousands of signs
throughout the nation that try to tell us that the federal
government is giving us most of the money to build our
new highways.The plain truth is that the federal government is not
giving anybody anything. The United States Treasury does
not contribute one nickel toward the nation's federal-state
highway program. Every dollar placed in the Highway
Trust Fund is collected through special taxes levied di-
rectly on highway users and not on anybody else — chief-
ly through the 4 cent federal tax on gasoline.Pinning the truth a little closer to the mat, it should
be added that not only are motor vehicle owners paying
this bill—they are overpaying it by more than 50 percent.
Of the maximum \$5 billion collected through federal
highway user taxes each year, only \$3.3 billion go into
the Highway Trust Fund. The remaining \$1.7 billion go
into the Treasury Department's General Fund and are
spent for a variety of projects having no connection with
roads.So instead of signs that talk about federal aid and
the like, why not give the motorist the credit he deserves
as the source of all that money?Maybe the signs should read, "You motorists have
paid—and overpaid—for this highway system. Don't let

COMMENTS FROM THE CAPITOL

It is interesting to note that
on the same day, in two differ-
ent parts of the world, two men
spoke differently on the same
subject. Adlai Stevenson pa-
tiently explained to one audi-
ence that peace was necessary
for the salvation of mankind.
Whereas Khrushchev scored the
West and denounced "imperial-
ist exploitation" of the under-
developed countries. K's
message was read to represen-
tatives of 116 have-not nations.
It was a direct order to the un-
derprivileged to arise and con-
front the West.It is my contention that we
cannot continue our sweet,
peace-loving policies while our
adversaries—particularly the
one who has enslaved and held
so many countries in captivity
—continue to exhort the world
to attack us.You would think the Admin-
istration silly if we sent dollars
directly to Cuba... so we send
them indirectly; we give aid to
Morocco... and Morocco buys
sugar from Cuba. It is silly,
isn't it? And not only silly but
downright stupid is the admin-
istration of our aid program to
Red satellites who supply Cuba
with electronic equipment and
military hardware.Sukarno told the United
States, "To hell with your aid".
In his speech, he turned to the
U. S. Ambassador and said,
"When was it that you wanted
to stop your aid?" Though no
answer was made by the Am-
bassador, we trust that the
Administration will break its
silence and thunder its reply to
the baiting, egomaniac Mr. Su-
karno, saying briefly—"Now!"
This is the same Sukarno
who has broken every promise,
reneged on the plebiscites he
pledged and for whom we for-
sake our ally, the Netherlands,
a NATO member. Still we con-
tinue to pour our millions into
the rat hole of Sukarno's anti-
U.S. Indonesia.Everywhere I go, I find that
intelligent people are for equal
rights for the colored man. Be-
yond a doubt, he's entitled to
them. And making sure that he
gets them is what the current
Civil Rights Bill is supposed to
be all about. But is it? Because
the sad fact is that it also in-
cludes deceptions that threaten
the basic rights of the majority
while pretending to serve the
minorities. Politicians have
twisted the wording around so
that it turns over to the federal
government the power to trample
on our traditional American
freedoms.For example, the bill says an
employer must not show "dis-
crimination." But what is "dis-
crimination"? What does the
bill really mean?It could mean, for example,
2½ percent of the workers in
a plant must be American In-
dians, 12 percent Negroes, and
so on.It could mean that an em-
ployer could be hauled before a
federal board on charges filed
not just by an aggrieved em-
ployee, but by any person or or-
ganization that presumes to act
"on behalf" of the employee—
even without his consent.Unquestionably, there is a
real need for civil-rights legis-
lation. But, in the name of all
that's decent, let it be the right
kind of legislation and not a
camouflaged power grab.It is one of the great myster-
ies of financial operation that
Robert B. Anderson, who is con-
sidered a financial genius and
became Secretary of the Treas-
ury, could not operate Radio
Station KTBC in Texas profit-
ably—but the L. B. Johnson
family could, did and ran it up
into a young fortune.It could happen nowhere
else in the world but in the
United States and, of all places,
New York... the Puerto Ri-
cans there DEMAND that the
school teachers in the public
schools which Puerto Rican
children attend MUST know
and speak Spanish! Moreover,
they DEMAND that the history
of Puerto Rico be taught!Do you remember way back
when immigrants coming to
this country were glad to be-
come Americans... even
thought it their duty to study,
understand and speak English
... and learn the history of the
United States—rather than ex-pect our public schools to teach
in the immigrant's foreign lan-
guage?Americans have been duped
again... you remember when
the administration promised
that at least 50 percent of the
American wheat we were send-
ing to Russia would be sent in
American ships. Well, the "ex-
cuse" is that there is an insuf-
ficient number of American
ships. The wheat is being sent
in bottoms belonging to other
nations.The lamest excuse I ever
heard was that offered by De-
fense Secretary Robert S. Mc-
Namara who stated that the
reason we did not "do some-
thing" about the Cuban situa-
tion at the time of the missile
confrontation is that we were
"terribly short" of fighter and
transport planes and needed
vessels. No amount of white-
wash will cover up the fact that
we have failed to deal effec-
tively with the Cuban threats.The so-called "war on pov-
erty" is a great ideal but the
Administration's program adds
up to little more than a revival
of the old New Deal WPA. The
fact remains that the only effec-tive way to eliminate poverty
will be to encourage the growth
of job opportunities in private
industry. This, the Washington
planners do not seem to under-
stand.When I was in Russia, I was
astounded to find daily papers
affixed to buildings throughout
cities. They were fastened in
cases under glass for all who
wished to read. Currently, my
friends write me that there are
cartoons depicting the "aggres-
sor United States" taking prod-
uce from little African nations
by force. Another, with an ugly,
giant American soldier stand-
ing astride the Panama Canal
with dead, mutilated bodies of
Panamanians around his bloody
feet. Still a third, I am in-
formed, shows the United
States Navy turning away
boats bound for Cuba and laden
with food.The important part of this
disclosure is not that it repre-
sents anything new or a depar-
ture from the previous Russian
brain-washing of their citi-
zenry—it is projected now be-
cause in the midst of all our
sweetness and light, when the
Administration is asking us to
think kindly of the Russians, to
feed them and extend credit,
nothing has changed from the
Russian point of view. We are
still the dirty name, in their
state-controlled propaganda.Looking about through his-
tory, one finds adages that con-
veyed the feeling of people. For
instance, the Romans had
"Wherever a Roman, there is
Rome". In Colonial times, the
rattlesnake flag bore the motto,
"Don't tread on me." In the
days when our West was newly
opened, the cadence of the
people was symbolized by the
expression, "Live each day so
you can look every man in the
eye and tell him to go to hell."
Medieval France sported a flag
bearing a thistle with the slogan,
"Who bruises it gets
stung." And Scotland's flag
portrayed a thistle and con-
tained the Latin motto, "No one
wounds me without being pun-
ished."Today our motto seems to be,
"Let's be nice to our enemies
and hope they will have a
change of heart," or "Let's not
look at it and maybe it'll go
away", as in the case of Cuba.Ever since the Court of Ap-
peals "freed" Gus Hall and his
party members, they are more
flagrant than ever in issuing
directives for work stoppage,
inciting civil disorder and ad-
vocating our submission to the
dictates of the Soviet demands.
Under the guise of better
American-Soviet relations,
there is intense pro-Soviet ac-
tivity across the land by the
people who support any and all
the doings of the USSR. It would
be interesting to know where the
money which supports the
meetings sponsored by the Com-
munists in this country comes
from. Who pays their railroad
fare, hiring of halls, decora-
tions, electric bills, posters, fly-
ers, advertising and, for that
matter, the salaries of their

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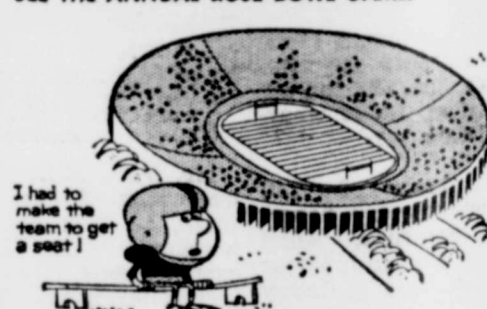

BABSON DISCUSSES RUGGED INDIVIDUALISM

BABSON PARK, Mass. — I have long declared that moral rejuvenation is a "must" if we are to come through the rigors and dangers of the present day and age with our civilization intact. In an effort to specify ways of bringing this about, I have talked with you about religion, ethics, thrift, education, and even a closed attention to land ownership and its responsibilities as possible remedies for today's "moral" problems. At this time I want to discuss the importance of keeping rugged individualism alive in our society.

Trend Against Individualism
Undoubtedly the greatest threat to individualism is the dependence on social groups to bring about "improvements" in today's changing world. For example, politicians and labor leaders want men to be manageable in units. Their goals can be far more easily achieved if individualism can be submerged. It is next to impossible

to get a story across to men separately, one at a time; but if ideas and thoughts can be instilled in social groups, objectives can be gained.

Look at the history of the Soviet Union and its successful expansion of Communism—not only within its borders but in many other countries as well. The Soviets developed collective farms chiefly because an independent farmer would think too much as an individual for them to be able to fit him into the Russian program. Even though the Russians and the Chinese leaders are now in open conflict, they still agree that individualism must be stifled for Communist success.

Our History of Democracy

It is worth while for us to look back occasionally on the sort of past that brought about the democratic way of life for which we have often been willing to lay down our lives. In America's a-borning period, the rugged individual never let his private convictions be smothered by the group judgment of a committee, a board of directors, or even a political party. A man believed that "one with God is a majority."

Democracy came from many hours of "cracker-barrel" discussion in country stores where quiet reigned. Thinking requires quiet, and time enough to relax and chew things over. The change from the Little Red School House to the conformist type of school of today marked the end of a healthy era. A farmer's son in the days of the Little Red School House began his education in the early dawn. His best schooling actually began with his daily chores—feeding and watering the animals, operating the farm machinery, planting, growing, and harvesting crops. He had to be alert and ingenious enough to meet emergencies. Sane reasoning was essential.

Out of such a life came honesty, thrift, common sense, industry.

Independence and Health

At schooltime, such a lad was not loaded into a bus and driven to some regional school miles away. He walked to school building up his independence and his bodily vigor. Even if he had to face into a blizzard, the very resistance to such a storm gave him strength of will at an early age. Even in his local Red School House his individualism was developed by his having to dig out most of the facts he wanted. The rule of "God helps those who help themselves" was implanted in him right at the start.

At recess and at noon there were healthful diversions—baseball, tag, run-sheep-run. During the walk home at the end of the school day, he had time to go over in his mind and stash away what he had learned. After supper there was homework, a kind of discipline and refresher that some "educators" now talk of eliminating. He did not have to buck the noise and confusion of radio and TV, indiscriminately distracting the eyes and ears, usually making it impossible to think out problems of the day.

Swinging Back Toward Individualism

The atmosphere of the Little Red School House gave America its greatest men, strong and fearless and very definitely rugged individualists. The pendulum has now swung too far in the other direction, tending to make "softies" of our young citizens. We can swing back simply by noting these facts. We can encourage our youngsters to do regular chores to read more, to think for themselves, and to engage in healthy pursuits such as gardening. I still think gardening—next to the Red School House—is a wonderful character builder.

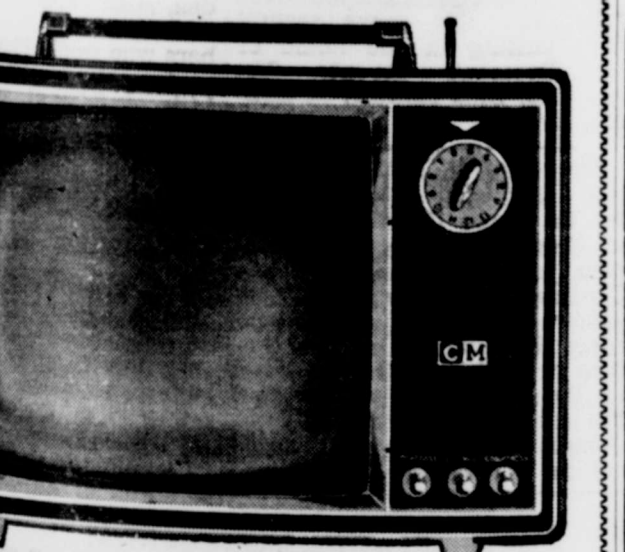
FFA Boys Receive Degrees Annual Convention, April 23

Sixteen Earthquakes a Year

The estimates of the damage done by the Good Friday earthquake in Alaska were still incomplete, at this writing. Property damage amounted to roughly \$500 million, according to early reports. The death toll was much lighter than it might have been; less than 150 lives were lost.

The earthquake will almost certainly rank among the top ten news events of 1964. Alaska's economy has been prostrated. Much of the Alaska Railroad and the highway system will have to be rebuilt.

Property damage from highway accidents in the United States amounts to \$3 billion annually—the equivalent of 16 Alaska earthquakes! In 1963, 43,406 Americans lost their lives in traffic accidents, an average of almost 120 fatalities a day. The Alaska earthquake death toll was little more than a normal day's highway fatalities.

As President Johnson said recently, "There is an obvious and urgent need for a program to improve our highway safety rapidly and significantly. As a nation, we cannot continue to tolerate the drain on our resources, and as human beings, we cannot continue to tolerate this terrible pain, suffering and loss of life."

There are three elements in safe driving—the driver, the vehicle and the highway. Probably the greatest opportunity for making driving safer lies in the highway element. We know that the fatality rate on modern freeways is only half the national average for all roads and that the freeway accident rate is two thirds less.

We can't make all of our roads into freeways, of course. But we know that our older highways have many hazards that should be removed—narrow bridges, steep grades, sharp curves, rail crossings at grade, dangerous intersections, skimpy or rough shoulders.

There is no such thing as a safe driver or a safe vehicle if the highway is unsafe. Most accident reports place the blame on driver error or driver carelessness, but there is no denying that the highway itself deserves a major share of the blame for many accidents.

President Johnson has asked the Secretary of Commerce to encourage and assist State and local governments in developing priority safety programs to remove hazards on highways with high-accident experience. Such programs should command the support of all citizens.

Tale of the Teabag



After the first hand-sewn silk pouches, tea-bags were made of gauze. Today they are made of a special filter paper, heat-sealed. Modern machinery automatically fill the bags with, exactly enough tea to make one cup.



The teabag was "invented" in 1904 when a New York tea merchant sent out samples of his tea in little silk bags instead of the usual tin boxes. His customers found them so convenient for brewing tea, they began to order their tea packaged in the little bags.



This year, as the teabag celebrates its 60th anniversary, Americans will use over 15 billion of these convenient, time-saving, labor-saving packets at home and in restaurants. The teabag is one of the earliest examples of pre-measured portions for individual service.

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
