STAR CAR PULLED MILE- LONG HILL IN HIGH.

A very interesting description of a hill climbing contest between a Star car and another four-cylinder car in the same price class, that took place recently on a mile-long hill at Camp Wood, in which the Star bested its opponent, has been received by the Wall Brothers & Jordan Co., from L. D. Shugar, Star dealer at Sabinal, which for originality of language and style has Ring Lardner beat to a frazzle, Mr. Jordan declared.

The letter, devoid of its rather uncouth language, is substantially as follows:

"Will write a few lines and tell you how I put it over an agent. At Camp Wood they have a mountain with a road winding around it to the top to the cedar brakes where they haul cedar down in trucks. This Agent works for — at Kerrville. He has sold lots of cars around there, so he and I got into an argument about the power and pulling qualities of each car.

"He had tried to make this road with his car from every angle and could get no further than the first hard pull in high gear. He bet two to one that I couldn't do it either, so we had it out on a recent Saturday.

"My driver had to back the car (a Star), in high gear with trace chain and padlock, the back to the top and had to go in high gear from the start. So when all was ready he started with a 100-yard run at the hill over a rough road, then with a sudden turn to the left, starting on the hill at about a 35 per cent elevation for 40 yards, then gradually to the right at the next turn. Then suddenly to the right at about 5 per cent elevation, the worst loop on the road and he made it at 18 miles per hour. On the next stretch he had time to gain speed for over 100 yards for the next pull, which was another hard one. Then suddenly to the right at about 46 per cent elevation when at the top of this he thought he was through.

"He stopped and killed the motor, when he was told he had another 100 yards to go to reach the top of the hill. So he got in the Star again, started the motor and went off in high and made 38 miles per hour at the end."

The Star representative said his opponent was badly beaten and that he got a good deal of advertising out of the contest. He also mentioned the name of several other makes of cars that had been unable to make this hill in high, some of them in a much higher price class than the Star.

FOUR MORE LOTS ADDED TO OUR PARK SYSTEM.

That Junction is to have one of the finest little park systems of any small town in the State is now no longer a question in the minds of those who have been working and hoping for the fulfillment of this proposed complete park for our people to enjoy for all time to come.

Two weeks ago the matter of leasing the park to J. J. McWright of Corpus Christi, who is under contract to erect buildings, beautify the grounds, build walks and driveways and otherwise construct a park of the first class, was chronicled in this paper a couple of weeks ago.

Last week at a meeting of the interested business men of the town, it was decided to circulate a subscription list for contributions towards carrying out a proposal on the part of the directors, to buy the four lots now offsetting the lands owned by the county and others purchased by the Chamber of Commerce during the past two years. These lots belonging to N. H. Skaggs, were thought to be unreasonably high at \$500, but it was thought best to buy them, as this would complete, what was thought would be all the land necessary for a complete park of the first class. These lots were located on the highest point in the entire park lands and a well is located on them. Over this well a first class water furnishing system will be installed from money available from the park fund, that will take care of the entire park, allowing plenty of water for camp use and irrigation.

On Monday, the Commissioners' Court took up the matter, and by unanimous vote, passed an order appropriating \$162.50 which sum added to that subscribed here in town, would pay for the lots. The fact was brought to the attention of the Court that only two men, outside of town, had contributed, and in as much as the parks were for the use and benefit of all the people, it was only fair that those outside the town assist, and the Court agreed to the reasonableness of the facts.

The amount of \$337.50 was contributed here on solicitation of Mr. Heyman and Secretary Browning, who circulated the subscription list. The names and amounts contributed are as follows:

COMMISSIONERS' COURT HELD MEETING MONDAY

The regular November session of the County Commissioners' Court was held here Monday with all members present. General routine matters were taken up.

The Livestock Sanitary Commission had made a proposition to the Court, asking that the county take up the Warrants issued to May, the Commission's inspectors, stationed in this county, until such time as the State would have funds available to take care of the expenditures. The Court, after considering the matter, passed an order to accept this proposition, provided the entire salaries of said inspectors. Heretofore this county has been paying half the salaries, while it is said that many other counties are not doing this. It will not be known for a few days whether the Sanitary Commission will meet the county's proposal. The deficiency warrants would be carried by the county until December 31st, this year.

Two wolf bounties were paid. There will likely be a called session some time towards the last of the month to attend to the South Llano road change, which is mentioned in another article in this issue.

EVERYTHING IN READING FOR ROAD CHANGE

Information was conveyed to the Commissioners' Court Monday, by citizens of Evergreen and Telegraph communities that everything was in readiness for the work to begin in the South Llano road change, beginning at 10-mile crossing.

Over \$400 in cash had been raised and plenty of volunteer workers are ready to start as soon as the right of way is surveyed, according to these gentlemen who appeared before the Court.

County Judge Farmer stated Tuesday that it was necessary that twenty days elapse before anything could be done, as the law requires this in road changes. The petition was presented on November 2nd, and was favorably acted on.

POLO TOURNAMENT

At noon the large crowd enjoyed a fine barbecued calf, furnished by Messrs. Rieck, Bundy and Cardwell.

In the afternoon Junction played the Divide boys to a tie, while Camp Wood defeated the Rocksprings team 4 to 2, thus winning the tournament championship.

Eddie Bode and E. G. Hill acted as referees during the four games. All teams wore uniforms and it was an easy matter to distinguish the players on each team. Camp Wood colors were green and white; Rocksprings green and yellow; the Divide boys, Red and white and the Junction team, blue and white.

NEW TRAPPING LAW AFFECTING FUR BEARERS.

In as much as a law was passed by the last Legislature prohibiting the trapping of fur bearing animals for the purpose of barter or sale of the furs of such animals, we are giving herewith some provisions of the law that our readers may be familiar with its requirements.

A license can be secured from the County Clerk or from game Wardens, upon payment of \$1, that will entitle the holder to trap anywhere in the State. It is not necessary for the owner of land to procure a license to trap on his own premises, or for the tenant of any land to trap on lands rented by him, provided he has been a tenant on such land for one year previous to the time of trapping.

There is a closed season for ten years on fox and beaver. Quite a bit of discussion has been given this provision of the law, locally, as foxes are predatory animals in this country, and this fact would preclude any enforcement of the law as to ranchmen catching them, to protect their poultry, lambs, etc., but the law does not prohibit the trapping of foxes, but prohibits the barter and sale of their pelts.

According to the law printed on the back of the license, the open season is from December 1st to February 14th, inclusive. We are informed that in the Acts of the Legislature as printed, the closed season is from February 15 to November 13th, inclusive. This conflict will likely result in favor of the law as printed in the Acts of the Legislature. The 13th is evidently a typographical error, meant for the 30th.

WOLVES AND A CAT CAUGHT NEAR 8-MILE.

In talking with A. L. Mudge Saturday, the Eagle reporter learned of some good predatory animal catches that have been made recently in the vicinity of the Mudge ranch. A government trapper, Mr. Spaw, has been on the job up there for several weeks and during September, caught two young and one old wolf. In October, one grown one was caught and the first week of this month, he caught the large female, known and dreaded by all the stockmen out that way. Her six puppies had been killed in a den some weeks back.

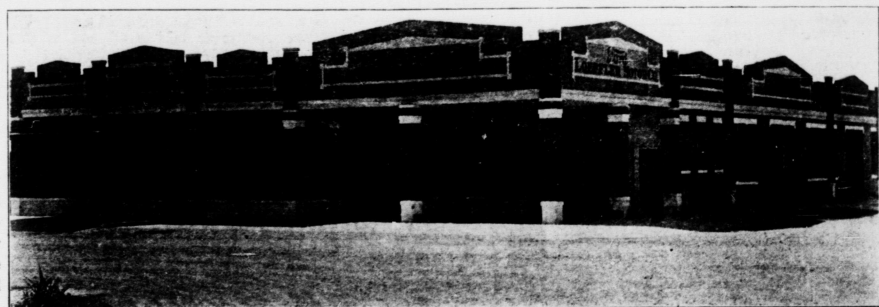

PRINCIPLES OF GARDEN INSECT CONTROL.

(By R. R. Reppert, Entomologist.)

Chief interest in insect control will now center about the home gardens and commercial truck crops. The damage to these by insect pests of various kinds has already been unusually heavy, and a word concerning their control is timely.

Pests of importance now, and during the later colder winter weather, are so numerous that mention can be made of only a few of them. The fall army worm, dark in color, has been a serious pest of grasses and garden crops for a month or two already and may continue its damage up until frost. This has the appearance of the common cut worm, but does not burrow into the soil. The cut worm, as is well known, is found during the day time just beneath the soil surface at the base of the plant it has cut off. The cut worm is now doing some damage in many sections. Its damage will continue throughout the winter on warm days, and with the opening of spring may be expected to be severe, not only to garden crops, but also to field crops.

The web-worm is greenish, dark, with darker spots, somewhat smaller and more slender than the ones just mentioned. It is perhaps more readily recognized by the slight web it spins on the leaves while feeding, and which often extends to the soil at the base of the plant. Several green worms attack cabbage and lettuce, continuing their work during warm spells throughout the winter.

All these are chewing insects, and so in general can be killed with arsenical poisons. It is of small importance for the gardener to know the exact kind of insect he has to control. If the plant foliage has holes eaten out or is ragged about the edges, indicating that the insect responsible has torn off bits of the leaf and has chewed and swallowed these bits, then the insect can usually be controlled by these arsenicals.

The safest arsenical to use is lead-arsenate. This may be dusted on the plants lightly while they are wet with dew, or can be applied as a spray in the proportion of one and a half pounds of poison in fifty gallons of water. About three pounds of whale oil soap or if this cannot be obtained, of common laundry soap added to the fifty gallons of water will make the poison stick better, but of course where soap is added only soft water should be used.

The web worm mentioned has its food more or less protected by its web and so is not so easily killed as other insects of this biting type. For this and for others that prove hard to control, it is best to substitute Paris green for the lead arsenate in the same proportion. The formula just given. As Paris green is apt to burn the plant foliage, it should be used with great care on tender plants.

The cut worm, while killed by sprays as just mentioned, is better controlled by poison bran mash, as advised for grasshoppers, placed in small quantities at the base of the plants. While our own experience will not permit us to give assurance of results with this mash against the fall army worm, we believe the gardener may well give it a trial.

The web worm usually begins its attack on careless weeds, and these should not be allowed even to sprout in or near the garden.

If the leaves, instead of being eaten away, merely wilt, curl or turn yellow, then the insect present is of the sucking type—that is, it sucks the sap from within the same manner as the mosquito draws blood. Since poisons do not penetrate to the inner tissues of the leaf, it is useless to apply arsenical poisons against these. A common type of sucking insect is the green turnip louse, that

gathers in immense numbers on the under side of turnip leaves and soon kills the plants. These as well as most others of the sucking type, are controlled by nicotine sulphate solutions sprayed to the under surface of the leaves. Nicotine sulphate can be purchased now of most any seed dealers. A better way of applying nicotine sulphate is by mixing it thoroughly with dry slaked lime and dusting it over the plants, providing a cover of cloth to confine the fumes for one minute.

The Harlequin cabbage bug, of the sucking type, is resistant to nicotine sulphate and about the best that can be done with this insect is to hand pick it into cans of water with a film of kerosene on top. Cabbage, turnips, and other more valuable food plants, can be protected by planting at intervals among them rows of mustard, which this bug prefers. After it has collected on the mustard, plant and bugs can be destroyed by spraying with pure kerosene or piling straw over the plants and burning them.

In the control of garden insects as well as those attacking field crops there is nothing more effective than to plow the soil deeply as soon as the crop has been harvested, turning under all crop residues with any insects that may be present. Keeping down all weed growth during the growing season, as well as during the winter, even while no crops are occupying the soil; and burning all trash about fences and other waste places during the winter—better, if possible, not to allow weeds and grass to grow in such places to make trash.

The general suggestions given here it is hoped, will enable the truck grower and home gardener to solve many of his insect problems. Further detailed information on particular insects and the preparation of insecticides, will be gladly furnished if application is made to the Entomologist, Extension Service, College Station.

KIMBLE COUNTY REAPS RICHES IN PECAN CROP

F. E. Garrett, local manager of the grocery store of Butt & Garrett, Inc., at Junction, was a business visitor in Kerrville last Friday and was very enthusiastic over conditions in that section of the Hill Country, especially the fine pecan crop which is being harvested along the Llano rivers and its tributaries. Asked by The Sun as to the pecan shipments, Mr. Garrett stated that more than 250,000 pounds of choice nuts had already been gathered and shipped out and that the total shipment for the season would probably be close to 800,000 pounds. Shipments were made by truck to Menard and Kerrville, the major portion coming this way.

Mr. Garrett said that what at first was thought would only be a fair crop had turned out to be a bumper one and that the growers were realizing a heavy profit owing to the prevailing good prices. Judging by reports from other sections of the State, Kimble County will lead this year in the production of pecans.

For many years the Junction pecan has been favorably known in all the principal markets and many leading nurserymen from other sections have been obtaining their grafting and budding stock there. The natural growing conditions are ideal, resulting in thin-shelled and richly flavored nuts of large size. With the quick access to market now afforded by good roads and trucks, Kimble County residents are fast developing their nut-growing industry and many growers have begun to apply scientific methods in pecan culturing, resulting in a superior product that commands the highest market price.—Kerrville Mountain Sun.

A clean cut race between the Fergusons and Lynch Davidson ought to be a pretty satisfactory program for all and thus give us the net results of a showdown unhampered by a list like that of two years ago when we had more than half-dozen to choose from.

This, too, will be the best possible way to get away from the Klan issue in politics, since both are against the Klan and thus the Klansman could choose on basis of merit according to their political leanings and get their bearings for a more clean cut program of such fraternal matters of a non-political nature that may be of interest to this organization.

Kimble County ought to produce more cotton, more feed stuff, more fancy pecans and should have more fine poultry, more purebred Hereford cattle, more thoroughbred sheep and goats and should raise more vegetables. We have the soil and climatic conditions; we have the water and we have the demand that will insure fair prices. We have a county of boundless resources if only we can bring ourselves to realize it. What we need is more intensive methods. Much land that now produces only light yields could be made to produce several times what they are doing at present. It only takes a small plot of land to produce hundreds of dollars' worth of vegetables, but gardening must be studied in order to get best results. Too many fresh vegetables and fruits are shipped in. We ought to produce more.

What could be more fitting than that the ultimatum delivered by the Council of The League of Nations, commanding Bulgaria and Greece to withdraw their troops behind their national borders, and to cease hostilities forthwith, should have been formulated and delivered practically on the eve of Armistice Day? Time which modulates the passions and provides a deeper background for mutual understanding, time which levels the sceptre, has brought much of moral advancement to the world, but never has it given to us a happier augury than now when it turns the consideration of Armistice Day to one of softened joy in place of inspiration for the renewal of hatreds and continued bitterness of soul. It seems almost as if that great apostle of peace, dying practically discredited, had arisen in the spirit to stretch His arms over the peoples of the world in calm but forceful command that reason henceforth shall reign supreme. Men in our national congress may differ as to the wisdom of this great nation entering into the entangling alliances of the League; readers of ten thousand newspapers may hold ten thousand different views, but all will rejoice that renewed bloodshed on the field of battle, with its incident horrors and human suffering has been checked, and muskets silenced by the influence of a great American. As the years roll on that influence must grow in power, carrying in place of sadness, solace to those stricken souls whose dear ones went west for human freedom. No more need Armistice Day cause the eye to flash in memory of great wrongs done. Rather may it now make the stricken soul pass from that pain that is almost pleasure in its sacrifice, to pleasure that is almost pain in its nobility.

Without any attempt at flattery, but just as a matter of interest in the common good, and with only a desire to modestly give a few flowers to the living, it is a source of much gratification to The Eagle to know that Rev. J. Virgil Davis is to be in Junction for another year. While having no ties of membership in the church of which he is pastor, we have been rather closely associated

with Rev. Mr. Davis during his past year's work here, and we feel that a man of his ability, of high ideals for church and the community in which he lives, cannot but react for the good of this town and county. He is a man that is first a Christian then a Methodist, and although consecrated to life's work, is also a man of broad and constructive ideas, and is always found on the job in advancing the religious, social and educational interests of his community. He meets his own obligations, financially and otherwise, and insists that his church be operated in a business-like manner.

Those who are familiar with local conditions know that he has been seriously handicapped during his first year here, and with an opportunity to continue the constructive program begun last year, this coming year's work will be conducive of even greater results than the one just passed, and we know that the good people of Junction, whether a member of his church, or of some other church or even those not members of any denomination, are glad that he is to continue with us.

A dispatch from the daily press states that a crowd of negroes and a few whites attending the American Negro Labor Congress enthusiastically cheered declarations of William Montgomery Brown, deposed Protestant Bishop, favoring communism and racial equality of negroes and whites. "Long live communism!" he shouted. "Long live the American negroes on an equal footing with American Caucasians." Others of his statements were:

"I was railroaded out of the House of Bishops at New Orleans; or perhaps I was Jim Crowed."

"Capitalism is politically bankrupt, the church supporting it is religiously bankrupt. Communism is sure to come."

"The only religion is the desire to make the most out of life."

"There is more hope for the workers in the international labor defense movement than in any other. * * The social system is now enslaving you. You are not trying to overthrow society, you are trying to liberate it from ignorance, class prejudice and hatred, ruin and oppression."

"I am trying to liberate religion from the supernatural." He advised against concluding "that the church is bad."

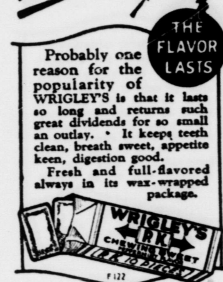

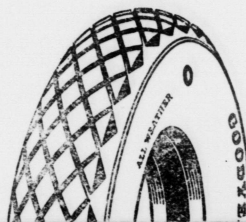

NEWSPAPER KNOWLEDGE

Most of us get the bulk of our knowledge of the world about us from newspapers, and there is no denying the value and importance of what comes to us in that way. We snatch up the twenty or thirty great pages in the morning or evening, turn them over impatiently, from a strange habit of skipping and picking and tasting, tuck away in our memories a hodge-podge of facts and events and incidents, and out of that construct the ground-work of our equipment for dealing with life.

First in politics. We read a few sentences of a speech in Washington or in Texas or in Idaho. Then we glance over the financial columns to see whether our favorite stock is doing all we expected of it. Perhaps a scientific lecture holds that will prolong life or ease it or end it, or we take a vague whiff at the new books. A neighbor may be dead, and we wonder what he did with the money, if he had any; or his daughter may be married, and we criticize her picture. Then a taste of a sensational murder makes a savory desert.

We can roam over the whole world in a few minutes. The aviators take us to Iceland, Siberia or to Patagonia. An earthquake in Japan—it must be unpleasant for the Japanese, but we cannot give them more than a flash of sympathy, because our eye is drawn to the erratic performances of the Bolsheviks or the decorous doings of the frock-coated League of Nations.

It is all informing, all educative, in a sense; but it is pitifully superficial. The newspapers' information in itself is not always accurate, and the scraps and shreds of it that we carry away cannot be said to form a mental foundation of substantial validity. We are doing our best, and the varied character of our knowledge may in some degree make up for its lack of solid basis. All the same, it is a good thing to have at least one subject that you know more about than the news paper does. It makes little difference what it is. It may be spiders, or old china, or the history of music or printing, or anything you please. But have more than a mere newspaper knowledge of something, and you will find it gives an additional significance to life.—Exchange.

SAN SABA VOTES IRRIGATION DISTRICT BONDS

The proposal to issue bonds in the sum of not more than \$20,000 for irrigation purposes was carried in the valley Tuesday by a practically unanimous vote. The actual vote at the three voting boxes was as follows: San Saba, 263 for the bonds and 12 against; Algeria, 75 for the bonds and 22 against; Live Oak, 102 for the bonds and 29 against. Total for the bonds 440, against bonds, 63. This is a majority of about 7 to 1 for the procedure of the temporary surveys and estimates.

It is understood that a validating suit will be the next step towards the actual issuance of the bonds and the submission of them to the Attorney General's office for final approval. There are quite a number of details to be worked out and it is likely that actual surveying will not begin before the first of next year, possibly next spring.—San Saba News.
