Burkburnett Quiet During 4th Holiday

Burkburnett citizens celebrated the quietest independence day of many years during the weekend. Comparatively little activity was noticed in this town and over the state.

Road Workers Given Pay Hike

County Equalization Hearings
Open July 27

Men employed on road and bridge building, etc., for Wichita county in its four precincts were given an advance of 50 cents per day in their wages by action of the county commissioners court Tuesday.

Workers heretofore receiving \$4.50 per day beginning with Tuesday, July 6. Those heretofore paid \$4.50 daily will receive \$5.

The court voted Tuesday to convene as a board of equalization for 1937, and set the dates of July 27-30 for hearings. Taxpayers will be notified in advance if their renditions are subject to revision. Persons whose surnames begin with letters A to F, inclusive, are to be heard on Tuesday, July 27; G to M, inclusive, Wednesday, July 28; N through Z, Thursday, July 29; oil companies, morning of Friday, July 30; and banks, utilities, and railroad companies, the afternoon of July 30.

Routine business occupied the court during the remainder of a brief session. Celebration of July 4 on Monday occasioned the one-day delay in the weekly meeting.

Sill Oklahoma sustained a fractured shoulder when the army supply truck which he was driving hurtled into a ditch after striking a bed of gravel Friday at noon. The accident happened near the port of entry just across the Oklahoma border, and the soldier was brought to the Burk Burnett clinic where Dr. Phillip Carpenter administered aid.

The injured man was accompanied by private Mayberry a member of the same outfit, but Mayberry escaped uninjured except for bruises. The injured man was returned to the hospital at the fort Friday afternoon in a field ambulance.

Plans For Dallas Trip Postponed

Plans for the trip to Dallas scheduled for last Monday were postponed until some date in the future to be arranged by the directors of the chamber of commerce. The trip was postponed after it found impossible to arrange transportation for the members of the band. So many of the local citizens were out of town during the two day period that the securing of sufficient number of cars to carry band members was not possible.

First Aid Class For Women Plans To Start Study

Firemen's Auxiliary To Hold
Sessions For Local
School

Anybody Eligible

Members of the Women's auxiliary of the Volunteer Fire department plan to start a class in first aid under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Johnson in the near future. A similar class was recently completed by the firemen and twelve members received certificates.

The classes are sponsored by the Magnolia company which provides the books, certificates and examination and such incidental expenses as are connected with the special courses.

Although the class will be sponsored by the women of the auxiliary, it will be open to any women in the Burk Burnett area that is interested in learning the fundamental principles of first aid. The principles have made it possible for local citizens to save much suffering in case of accident and in a few cases the lives of victims of mishaps.

The essential treatments in case of emergency are taught and the fundamentals of the structure of the body in order that practical treatment may be administered at the time of the accident or shock.

Mr. Johnson is a capable instructor. He has a certificate from the Magnolia company designating him as a qualified instructor. The classes which he has handled have been successful. In a recent accident the life of a young man was saved by members of the fire department by the quick action in artificial respiration.

The women plan to complete the course as rapidly as possible and study every angle of first aid. There will be practical demonstrations with each of the special lessons.

State School Fund Increased To \$22

Word was received Wednesday by Burk Burnett school authorities that the scholastic apportionment for next year would be based on the per capita of \$22. The new apportionment represents an increase of three dollars over the present year, and will mean approximately \$3,600 more operating funds for the Burk Burnett schools. The total amount will be \$4,700.00 increase. This will be the greatest amount ever appropriated in the state for education aid.

The action of the state board of education stopped the move for a reduction of ad valorem tax launched by the governor. The automatic tax board will set in the near future, probably the last of this month. Until last year the per capita appropriation was \$17.50. It was raised to \$19.00 at that time.

Wichita county's new grand jury returned seven indictments against many defendants Wednesday afternoon, remained silent on the subject of marble machines and recessed until Sept. 7.

Numerous peace officers of the county were said to have reported to the grand jury room Wednesday morning, and it was intimated that questions were being asked about the prevalence of marble machines here and elsewhere in Wichita County. Judge Ernest M. Robertson of the 89th district court had charged the inquisitors particularly Tuesday morning upon that subject.

Two Thirds Of Wheat Unsold

County Farmers Holding
Over 400,000 Bushels

With the market price reported at \$1.08, only about one-third of Wichita county's 1937 wheat crop has been marketed.

More than 642,000 bushels have been received by elevators, railroad and elevator officials estimated Monday, with the receipts exceeding that of many years. Of that total only about 220,000 have been sold, more than 400,000 bushels remaining in storage.

Electra's elevators pace the county's total with 240,000 bushels having been received; Burk Burnett reported 112,000; Iowa Park, 86,500, and Wichita Falls 210,000.

The market price started at 87 cents, climbing to the present price since about May 25 when grain began arriving at the elevators. A daily increase was marked up to June 20, at which time the volume has gradually suffered a slight decrease daily.

With approximately 45,000 bushels in elevators, Electra has shipped 130 cars; Burk Burnett, with elevators reporting about 12,000 bushels, has shipped 79 cars; Iowa Park, showing 6,000 bushels in storage, has shipped 55 cars. Wichita Falls has received 210,000 bushels by truck.

Farmers Hope For Corn Saving Rain

Farmers in the Burk Burnett area were pushing the last of the wheat harvesting Wednesday, and anxiously waiting for a corn saving shower. Slight traces of moisture fell about dawn Wednesday morning, and scattered clouds indicated a promise for additional showers.

The wheat harvest passed the 100,000 bushel mark this week, and P. A. Johnson, MK&T agent reported that 80 cars had been shipped. The sudden jump in wheat prices this week did not bring the selling that was expected. With the grain at \$1.08, the top price of the year, a large amount of marketing was expected. However, local buyers indicated that at least 50 per cent of the farmers were holding or storing grain while waiting for additional increase. Other farmers have sold only a part of the crop.

This week the farmers were more interested in the condition of the cotton and corn. So far the cotton seems to have escaped damage from the hot weather and lack of rain. The corn has started burning, and unless there is rain within the next few days what promises to be a bumper corn crop will be definitely damaged. The corn planted on "tight land" has already been damaged. On sand the crop will be more resistant to the extended dryness.

BUSINESS MEN AND FARMERS ARE OPTIMISTIC OVER PROSPECTS IN BURKBURNETT AREA THIS YEAR

Prosperity of Farmer Reflected In Increased Business Activity Of Every Local Type Of Merchandise

Blast Victim Is Buried In Burk

Funeral services for A. N. Collins, one of the three victims of the Healdton blast last Friday, were held in Burk Burnett Monday afternoon at 2:30 with the Rev. Miles B. Hayes, pastor of the First Baptist church of Burk Burnett officiating. Collins was fatally injured in an explosion of a pipe line last Friday morning in the Healdton field. Two other men Arto Brown and Britt Witherlee were killed instantly. The fourth member of the group, W. A. Brown is still in grave condition and his surviving is considered doubtful by the physicians.

Collins died Sunday morning and his body was brought to Burk Burnett to the home of his parents Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Collins. Under the direction of the Owens Brumley home the services were held and the interment was at the local cemetery. Besides his parents he is survived by his wife and two small children.

The other survivors are three sisters, Mrs. W. T. Allen, Grand Junction, Col., Mrs. G. H. Farar, Mrs. Maude Collins, Burk Burnett; two brothers, Theodore Collins, and W. T. Collins, of Weseco, Tex.

Church Completes Cultivation Crop Of Cotton Devol

Members of the Devol Methodist church completed the cultivation of the experimental demonstration of cotton last Friday with an all day session at the Perry McArthur farm near the Oklahoma community. Using the crop as a means of paying the current obligations of the church, the members plan to demonstrate the solution of the finance problems of the small community in rural districts.

Under the leadership of the pastor Rev. W. O. Bucy the members planted 30 acres of cotton. Twenty acres were planted late and the other third early in the season. The work last Saturday completed the cultivation of the 20 acre patch. The members either volunteered to do the chopping or hired substitutes for themselves. The women helped in the process by feeding the men a large amount of food at noon.

Rev. Bucy has done a wonderful work during his pastorate at the church. The testimony of those even of other denominations is that the brilliant work of the minister has wrought a change for the spiritual welfare of the Methodist church.

Coming to the community when the church was in the middle of a struggle to raise a small sum for its pastor he has had an increase of 30 per cent in the membership. This increase has been of substantial citizenship and added to the prestige of the church.

The cotton experiment is indicative of the progressive work of the organization under the pastor. Rev. Bucy stated Monday that with fair luck the church would not only be able to pay its current expenses, but it would be able to build class rooms for the Sunday school and chapel for the people's societies.

The significance of the experiment is of more importance than it appears to those who are in the middle of the project. If the project proves to be successful it may be the foundation of the solution of the problem of financing rural churches all over the nation.

The churches may be able to become self sustaining and even add to the work of the general church in increased benevolent contributions.

Bank deposits in Burk Burnett have increased \$210,000 during the last six months according to the report of the First National Bank and Farmers State Bank of this city. The major part of this increase has accumulated during the wheat harvest.

The officials of the banks and last six weeks since the start of the business men are optimistic about the prospects for the remainder of the year, with only fair weather conditions for the corn and cotton crops, many of the farmers of this section will pay out of debt for the first time during the last six years.

Not only farmers but the business houses with which they trade are feeling the impulse of the good market for grain and heavy crop. According to the bankers almost every merchant in the city has had a positive increase in his business accounts during the harvest surge.

In addition to paying old obligations the farmers are purchasing long needed equipment and arranging for more comfortable handling of future crops.

The local representative of the railroad states that the railway companies are being pushed to provide adequate facilities to handle the large shipments of grain from this district, and that an increase in traffic in both directions because of the general improvement of business was apparent.

The optimism will be reflected in every phase of business and social activity in this city. Should there be sufficient rain for the corn and cotton, Burk Burnett can expect the best year since the boom days.

The reaction from this optimism is apparent in the phases of every day transactions where the staple goods of various stores feel the reaction of money increases.

Farmers Urge Burk Motorists To Watch Road Side Fires

Farmers of the Burk Burnett area have asked the local paper to request the motorists of this area to watch the fires starting along the highways and warn nearby residents. Many careless motorists toss smoking cigarettes or lighted matches from the cars which start fires along the right of way.

In several cases recently these fires have caused serious damage to crops and property in the area. During the dry season it is possible for the fires to spread rapidly, carried by prevailing winds to adjoining property.

At the same time the president of the United States has asked the cooperation of residents of agriculture to aid in the fighting and prevention of grass and forest fires. The statement of the president was recently issued. J. J. Blackstone, local marshal released the report. The report is as follows:

President Roosevelt, in a statement issued from his Hyde Park home in New York on Friday night, July 2, asked the nation's help in the government's fight against forest fires, and we sincerely believe that each fire marshal, fire chief, fireman, city, county and state official and each individual citizen of Texas will gladly cooperate in this most worthy movement to preserve the posterity of our forests.

We wish to cite you certain articles of the Penal Code of Texas relating to firing forests or cut-over land, grass, etc.:

"Art. 1330. FIRING FOREST OR CUT-OVER LAND.—whoever wilfully or negligently sets on fire or causes to be set on fire any forest, cut over, brush or grass land not his own; or sets on

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Wheat Reactions

Farmers and merchants in this district were jubilant last week when wheat prices jumped the limit several times during the period. The rapid increase in price meant cash rewards to the two groups. The farmers received more money and spent more freely. Thus the merchants were benefited.

The reaction of our business in this section depends more on the farmers condition than anything else.

Therefore, we ought to pay more attention to his welfare or be more interested in his work.

A more serious implication in the reaction was in the cause. One basic cause of the sudden spurt in sales and demand is the possibility of war between Russia and Japan. After this news was released, several business men said "let 'em fight". We will benefit for the price reaction. While we are theoretical neutral, still the little fuss along the Amur river does have a definite affect on us here in a small village in the United States.

The center of the trouble is about as far from us as it could be and still be on the earth. Yet we feel it. Wheat sky-rockets. The prices of other commodities will follow.

We talk much of neutrality. The preachers make sermons, politicians blast the air, women fill the mails with pamphlets about remaining aloof from conflict.

Yet we are not aloof. Even the bread we eat, the clothes we wear and every other commodity that we use are touched by a distant rumble of cannons.

An Interesting Experiment

Members of the Devo Methodist church are undertaking an experiment which may become one of the most important that any American church has ever attempted. By planting, cultivating and harvesting the 30 acres of cotton and other crops, the church hopes to be able to take care of all expenses this year. The pastors salary, current expenses, and the routine benevolences that the church is obligated to meet will be charged against the funds that with good luck the members hope to receive from the crops. Only a few days time for the entire year from each member cares for the planting cultivation and harvest. The only expense is the seed. The land and work is donated.

Rev. W. O. Bucy, pastor of the church and chairman of the farm committee, was appointed for the special purpose of trying this plan by the bishop. His previous experience at the experiment on a smaller scale made him the man to lead the important rural church in what might develop into a nationally important endeavor.

The entire nation is dotted with small churches that are barely existing or operating under a budget that is restricted and at times even non-existent. The heavy burden on the mission board restricts other important fields of endeavor. Could these rural churches assert independence, the whole nation would feel the strong tone of their spiritual life.

The movement by that process, if it works in Devo, will become the start of a social revolution in the religious circles. Ministers will become farm managers in addition to the duties as spiritual shepherds of flocks of sinners people. Out of such movement may grow the sturdiness and independence that has characterized the American people in their pioneering conquest of the frontier.

It is important therefore that the whole nation observe closely the results at the small congregation. In its experiment we may have the privilege of watching the growth of a new social movement of perpetual significance.

We wish to extend compliments to Rev. Bucy and his congregation for a revolutionary spirit. The spirit that made America.

Two Worlds In Conflict

In Europe there is a struggle between two camps representing opposite types of governmental philosophy. One extreme is pictured in Russia-Sovietism. The other extreme is in Germany or Italy-Fascism. Both extremes represent the type government suitable only for continental Europe. Under no condition outside of that continent would people be content under such rules.

Thousands of years of breeding has developed a devotion to rulers that a mixed and explosive citizenship like Americans could never imitate.

However, the point is that in each instance whether the name is communism or sovietism the government of each country illustrates the undesirability of dictatorships. While one country flies the red flag and hammers the sickle and the other the swastika, neither presents any quality that is attractive to the mind of a person who has lived under the comparatively recently developed American system.

There has been much talk of dictatorship in the Americas, but the fruits of the same type of system in Europe do not lend much encouragement to the idea.

As we watch the struggle from this distance, we mutter a prayer of thanks that it is removed from us by at least the distance of an ocean width.

HEADLINES

The evils of the farm tenancy system are due more to the ignorance and inability of the and often the shiftlessness of those participating than to the greed of the land owners that take advantage of the condition. The national government is attempting to remedy the situation by offering an opportunity for the farmers to own their own farms, but in most of the cases where there is a direct need for social revolution, those who need aid most would be incapable of taking advantage of any type of progressive opportunity that was offered. It is admitted that the greed and often even crookedness of land owners in certain sections has oppressed the tenant farmer. The conditions created are intolerable to the average citizens with the average sense of independence. Like the slums of a large city. These areas may be cleaned up, but it has been found that those needing the better homes or cleaner places to live do not take advantage of the scientifically constructed centers by the government. It is feared by some pessimistic that the same reaction will be found in temporary problems.

Economic Blight

The share cropper and tenant is an economic problem as much as he is a social problem. Usually he has a large family, and with the birth rate decreasing in the other classes, we will soon find the population increase in the direction of the lower bracket. Such a tendency is the social reaction that created an enslaved and indolent China. It took thousands of years, but the results are dreadful. In a land once rich in soil and farmed by a proud and intelligent race is famine and poverty. Erosion, tenancy and similar phenomena carried away the best of the nation in its rich soil and its fine people.

Dangerous Suppression

The decision of the news reel companies to suppress the films exposed at the now famous steel strike in Chicago was an unfortunate decision. The company stated that it desired to prevent the possibility of riot and disturbance in theatres where the films would be exhibited. Instead of accomplishing that purpose the news reel companies created a powerful demand for the films. Now they will be released and the interest centered on them as never on any single few feet of film. That is what happens when any news agency attempts to suppress an accurate report of a question so full of dynamite as this strike question is at the present time. Suppression usually leads to the same thing as the attempt to confine the powerful explosive in a container.

Unfortunate

Whatever happened at Chicago in that strike, it is unfortunate that it occurred. Neither labor nor industry will benefit by active physical combat. Such a course will ultimately lead to revolution and cause more suffering. It is regrettable that all the machinery of the federal government and state governments that have been set into action can not be used by the extremists on both sides to a more reasonable settlement of the questions.

Wheat Limit

It is highly probable that next year will find unlimited production of wheat. The farmers from 31 states representing the majority of the American wheat growers definitely refused to support the triple A policy for next year. The reason for the resolution was that the present methods for the control of the soil conservation act related to wheat was inadequate. This refusal came in the middle of a discussion of the law for

regulating the production and price of wheat as a permanent policy.

Indictment of Pendergasts

The average American citizen gets real satisfaction out of the story that the Pendergasts have been indicted. Such corrupt practices as have been evident under the political boss are about the worst part of the political life of the nation. A few minor characters have been indicted and tried, but they were always released in the politically controlled courts in Kansas City. Never was the grand jury able to get to the higher ups of the mess of political scandal. Now that these men must face trial brings a great deal of real pleasure to those who observed or who have been victims of the rotten mess.

Case Of Mountain Fever Found Near East Texas Farms

Farmers Urged To Watch Live Stock For Symptoms

Appearance of the dread Rocky Mountain Fever in Texas was evident this week when two cases of the disease reported in Southwest Texas were officially diagnosed as such by D. R. Spencer, spotted fever expert of the United States Public Health Service. Dr. Spencer, vacationing in San Antonio was pressed into service by State Health Officer Dr. Geo. W. Cox, to diagnose the two cases, one of which proved fatal.

Dr. Spencer's diagnosis is the first official recognition of the presence in Texas of spotted fever, a disease transmittable to men by the bite of infected ticks. Although many wood and dog ticks are not infected with the fever, the disease in man is serious enough to warrant the practice of precautionary measures. A person with spotted fever will develop the disease within 2 to 12 days after receiving the infection. When the ticks appear, they are unfed and are seeking some animal to attach themselves to and suck blood. When the tick drops on an animal, including man, it does not start feeding at once, but usually spends some time searching for a suitable place. Experiments have shown that a previously unfed tick will attach itself to the body and feed for a few hours before transmitting the infection but it then becomes highly infectious.

Three measures may be used to prevent spotted fever: avoid ticks, remove ticks from the person as soon as possible, or be vaccinated. Vaccine to prevent spotted fever is not readily available so precaution should be used to avoid or eliminate ticks from the person immediately.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD
WATER POEMS

An episode in an amateur photographer's picture Odyssey of the travels of water. Exposure f.22 at 1/25 second.

THE moods of water, tumbling, bubbling, gushing, spouting, dashing, splashing, trickling, rolling, rippling, dripping, glad, angry, smooth, rough, serene, peaceful, make adjectives for poets. For the amateur photographer with any poetry in his soul whatever, they make themes for beautiful pictures and the subject of a delightful picture hobby.

We know of one amateur photographer who used his camera to picture the grand circle water makes in its journey from land to sea to the clouds and back to the land again. This picture epic of water began with a photograph of a tiny woodland spring, then pictures of a rivulet, a brook, a river, a mightier river with its waterfalls and cataracts, the bay through which it flowed into the ocean, the ocean itself, a cloud and sunbeam picture over the ocean, thus picturing water being caught up for its return journey, and finally rain.

This idea far from exhausts the possibilities of poetic water pictures, especially when human interest is added. The majestic sweep of water over Niagara Falls is a poem in itself but a honeymooning pair in the foreground adds romance. A fair swimmer in clear water on which sunshine is shimmering creates a poetic pattern of life and light. A pseudo-moonlight picture over a placid lake of a youth and a maid in a canoe (a shot into the setting sun with a small lens opening) gives a poetic mood to "the

waters stilled at even." Poem at the prow of a careening yacht or its churning wake over the stern depicts the poetry of motion.

Verses may be illustrated. "When the breaking waves dash high a stern and rockbound coast" is a place for photographs of one of water's most inspiring moods, and then, from the hilltops "there is not in the wide world a valley so sweet, as that vale in whose bosom the bright waters meet."

Endless are your opportunities for making delightful photographs of water scenes. But there's a trick to successful water photography. It's largely a matter of shooting so that the pictured water has the right "feel" or texture.

For example, it's possible to shoot spray too fast, so that it has a hard, brittle look, thereby losing its essential sense of movement. On the other hand, rippling water should be shot fast enough so that the ripples are distinct, each with its own highlights.

Another point is lighting. Choose the angle that gives you the maximum "texture," the characteristic interplay of light and shade. No one can tell you exactly how to go about this; a little experimenting will tell you better than volumes of words. But keep this in mind. Any fair-sized body of water reflects a lot of light. Your exposures, therefore, can be faster or, preferably, your "stop" smaller than for a comparable summer landscape.

Tiny Weeds In Water Spoil Its Taste

THE water supply of virtually every city in the United States at some time becomes unpalatable because of strong, disagreeable tastes and odors that are given off by microscopic plants growing in the river, lake or other source of supply. Such tiny plants are in all water and multiply rapidly when growing conditions are favorable. Some give off grassy, peaty tastes, others give rise to oily, fishy smells. One type makes the water taste like cucumbers. There are dozens of kinds of tiny weeds, invisible except in large clusters, most of them are algae, and they make water unpalatable. A few of these, highly magnified, are shown in the accompanying illustrations.

Although it is extremely difficult to keep these microscopic water weeds under control, it is comparatively easy for a city to maintain its water sweet and palatable by the use of a remarkable substance, activated carbon, which acts like a sponge in absorbing the various odors and smells given off by the weeds. It is said that one pound of activated carbon will remove the undesirable tastes and odors in 100,000 gallons of water. The cost of such protection is only about three cents per capita per year. More than 1,000 cities in the United States are now using activated carbon to keep their water palatable. People throughout the United States are becoming more particular in their demands for water of good quality and probably most cities soon will treat their water with activated carbon to insure its palatability. The taxpayers of the country spend almost a billion dollars annually for water and are demanding for their money water that is not only safe, but pleasant to drink.

The weeds causing odors are not bacteria, and as far as science knows, are not harmful. But their scent is decidedly unpleasant and now, thanks to modern science, unnecessary in public water supplies.

Fort Worth Livestock Market Review Through July 7

By Livestock News Service,
Fort Worth

Wednesday's hog market at Fort Worth was 40 cents above last Friday at a top of \$11.75 to packers for the first time since August 19, 1935.

The cattle and calf market was active and mostly 25 cents higher for the first three days this week. Compared with a week ago, a gain of about 50 cents had been registered by most classes.

Lambs and yearlings were 25 cents higher than Friday and 25 to 50 cents higher than a week ago. Sheep prices were firm.

Numerable sales of good fed steers were from \$11.85 down to \$10.50. Most of them weighed around 1,100 to 1,350 pounds. Fair quality short fed cattle cashed from \$9.50 to \$10.00. Most of the fat grass steers drew prices of \$8.75 to \$9.50, with medium grades around \$8.50 and down and plain steers from \$6.00 to \$7.50.

Fed yearlings in small packages cashed at \$10.00 to \$11.00, with choice offerings quotable at more money. Most of the better grades cleared from \$8.50 to \$9.50 and medium grades around \$8.00. Fed heifers reached \$10.00 with two loads of good No. 895 grass heifers at \$9.25. Plain yearlings brought \$6.00 to \$8.00, with common butcher grades at \$4.00 to \$5.00.

Bulls sold at \$4.00 to \$5.50. Good fat cows were purchased from \$6.00 to \$7.00 and one car of choice cows from Menard brought \$7.65. Fair fat cows cashed around \$6.00, with butcher cows from \$4.25 to \$5.00 and canners and cutters in the \$2.75 to \$4.00 notch.

Good fat lightweight slaughter calves reached \$8.00, with a few heavy calves at \$8.50. Inbetween grade calves cleared around \$6.50 to \$7.00, with plain sorts at \$5.00 down.

Stocker steers and yearlings sold at \$7.00 to \$8.00. Choice sorts quotable up to \$9.00 above. Plain stockers brought \$5.00 to \$6.50.

The best hogs sold Wednesday at \$11.75 to packers. Good 150-175 pound butchers cleared from \$10.50 to \$11.50. Weights from 130-150 pounds brought \$9.50 to \$10.40. Most packing sows sold at \$10.25.

Purchases of spring lambs ranged from \$8.50 to \$9.00 for medium kinds and \$9.25 to \$9.50 for the best offerings. Shorn fat yearlings sold from \$6.75 to \$7.50. Feeder yearlings cashed around \$6.25, with lambs up to \$6.75. Aged wethers were quotable at \$4.50, with 2-year-old wethers around \$5.50. Good fat ewes would bring \$3.50.

fire or causes to be set on fire any forest, cut-over, brush or grass land, not his own; or wilfully or negligently suffers any fire set by himself to damage any property of another, and any person setting fire or causing fire to be set for the purpose of burning debris on areas worked or cupped shall be fined not less than ten nor more than two hundred dollars.

"Art. 1321. BURNING WOODLAND OR PRAIRIE.—whoever wilfully or negligently sets fire to or burns, or causes to be burned, any woodland or prairie not his own, shall be fined not less than fifty nor more than three hundred dollars. This offense is complete when the offender sets fire to his own woodland or prairie and the fire communicates to the woodland or prairie of another."

"Art. 1327. WILFULLY FIRING GRASS IN INCLOSURE OF ANOTHER.—whoever wilfully fires any grass within any inclosure not his own in this state, with intent to destroy the grass in such pasture, or any part thereof, or whoever fires the grass outside of any inclosure with the intent to destroy the grass therein by the communication of said fire to the grass, shall be confined in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years."

Grass Fires in the City Limits
Grass fires have been a source of great worry to fire departments throughout the country for a long number of years, and we suggest that you make it your policy to constantly warn your citizens (especially young boys) of the danger of such a practice. Your means of accomplishing this service.

We request that you kindly give this letter to your local newspapers and ask that they please give its contents full publication as our means of letting President Roosevelt know that all Texas is in accord with his movement to preserve the forests of the nation. Also, it should awaken each citizen to the fact that fire prevention is an individual responsibility, and thus eliminate fires from the causes herein mentioned as well as all other causes.
