With a time limit in which Littlefield property may be leased in connection with the proposed test well, it is declared vital for property owners, if they are to benefit from the proposed project, to volunteer their leases at once. Too few leases obtained, which means too little acreage, could defeat the plans to bring oil to this city and community.

John W. Murchison, who is to drill the well, is not holding back on the 120-day time in which to spud in the well as provided for in the escrow agreement with the City of Littlefield now in a local bank with \$15,000 forfeit check attached.

"I wish you had the acreage ready now, I have a drilling rig that will be free this Friday and I would have it over there next week ready to spud in if you had the required acreage."

There is some production at this time southeast of Littlefield and a new well seven miles southwest of this city is being drilled at this time. This is a deep test and reports are that there has been a showing of oil. A core was scooped to be taken last night.

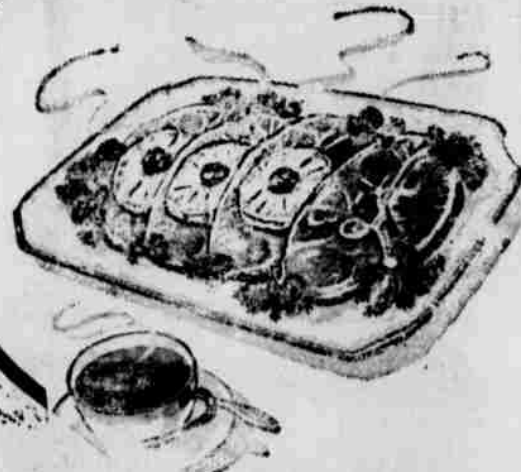

Report of Crop Given by Local County Chairman

By REV. H. A. HECKMAN (Lamb County Chairman)

Lamb County citizens were a part of the program which gave through Crop 4,085,400 pounds of life-giving feed to their hungry and shivering world neighbors. By the end of February, all these American good neighbors had shipped 360,000 pounds of beans, 1,445,000 pounds of wheat, 450,000 pounds of flour, 400,000 pounds of rice (mostly from Texas), of the more than 100 bales of cotton contributed in Texas, 50 to Korea (the rest to be sent when all cotton donations are in), 495,000 pounds of milk, 259,000 pounds of lard, 105,000 pounds of sugar, 80,000 pounds of corn, 60,000 pounds of horse meat, 205,000 pounds of corn oil, 30,000 pounds of cheese (all from Texas).

In addition to the above gifts, Texans donated one carload of commercial fertilizer, one carload of various items as tools, muslin, dried fruits for Korean refugees.

During 1952, CROP also assisted with other gifts from other parts of our United States. On June 26 of last year, one million pounds of food, fiber and medicine were shipped to India for emergency relief in the famine areas.

All who had a part in the CROP program during 1952 may know that in addition to practicing a good neighboring policy they were helpful in relieving some of the wants of their less fortunate fellow-human beings.

With three out of every four people throughout the world being hungry and in need, according to some authorities, there is a challenge for every American who wants to do something towards bettering world conditions. This challenge is heightened for everyone who calls himself a Christian. India, Korea, Central Europe are the chief areas of need which will be aided by the 1953 CROP appeal.

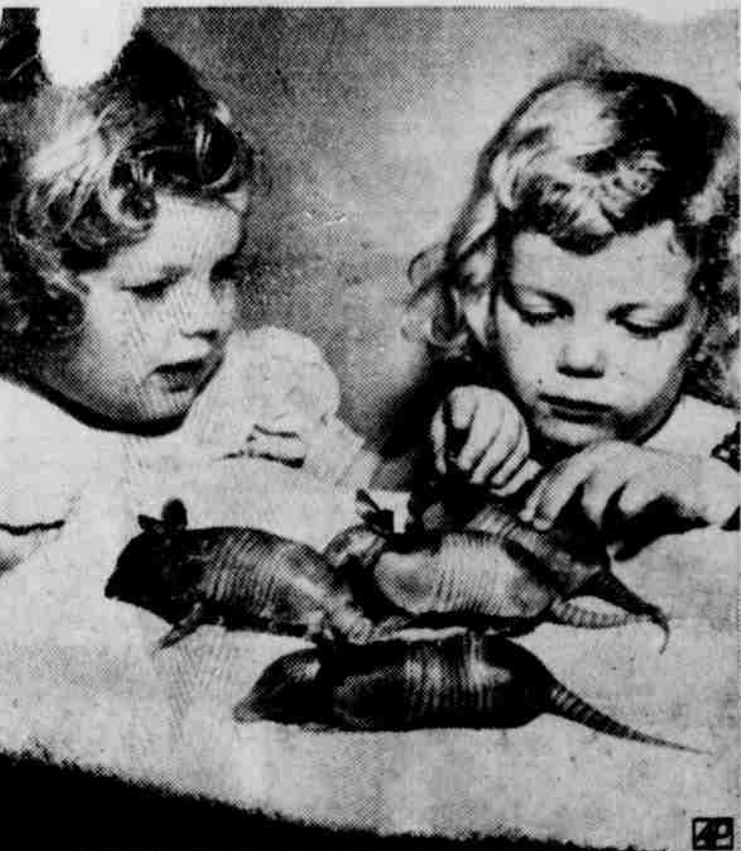

1953 Agricultural Legislation

Legislative action now brewing in Austin includes laws which will eventually affect every person in the state. Chief among these are some amendments and acts which directly concern the Texas Department of Agriculture—and therefore, every farmer and rancher.

One of the announced policies of the department last year was the promotion of an ambitious program to overhaul many of the outmoded agricultural laws. Progress this far has been good.

An important law now receiving consideration for revamping by the legislature is the Texas Seed Act. This act first came into existence in 1924 and was last amended in 1941. Over the years, its weaknesses have become increasingly apparent. It doesn't provide for adequate enforcement of its desirable features and it fails to specify adequate penalties when violations occur.

A case in point was the "Paris Texas Incident" of last year. Some farmers were sold bad seed under the protective labels issued by the Department of Agriculture. But in several of those violations, the state's hands were tied due to loopholes in the law.

The Texas Seed Act specifies, in part, that samples from each bag of seed will be inspected and the bag must be properly labeled as to content and seed quality. It doesn't necessarily guarantee the "best" seed—it merely says "what kind" and lets the purchaser be the judge.

Activities of the Department of Agriculture have

been handicapped by a lack of adequate funds for providing enough inspectors to keep a check on seed sales and prevent switching of tags.

Instead of completely re-writing the TSA, some amendments have been offered. One of them provides that the project will become self-financing and that revenue will be derived from sale of seed tags. Last year, 3,600,000 tags were sold at one cent a piece, bringing in 36,000 dollars. This was not enough, considering that the cost of printing the tags has increased from \$700 a million two years ago to nearly \$2,000 per million tags.

This year, the Legislature has been asked to raise the price of seed tags to two cents which will double the revenue. The additional money will be used to expand the force of inspectors, increase the amount of certification and provide adequate double-checks on selling activity.

An equally important amendment would allow the department to put any noxious weed seed on the Texas quarantine list as soon as it becomes a threat to farmers and ranchers. Instead of having to wait until the Legislature comes in session before taking action, the amendment will permit a quarantine to be slapped on the seed when it occurs in another state. This would immediately prevent its entry into Texas.

These proposals of course, are subject to review of local courts and will not give the Department of Agriculture any dictatorial powers. They merely help to put some "teeth" in the present program.

Health Talks

Hospital departments such as the emergency and operating rooms are by their nature dramatic. Like the theater, however, all the action in a hospital can't take place on stage, action behind the scenes there, too, is essential if the "play" is to go on.

Take such divisions as the diet kitchen, drug and central supply rooms, physiotherapy department, and record room. A patient doesn't have direct contact with workers in most of these departments, but even without his knowledge of their duties, they add to his comfort and welfare. You might consider them an extension of the doctor's arm—they are coached and perform their roles under the guidance of the director, the doctor.

The dietitian is trained to "fill" the diet prescription. She must know not only the kinds of food allowed but sometimes the amounts. Often, for example, diabetic diets must be weighed on scales. Her knowledge must cover more than just what's "in the book," however, through practice she discovers the most appetizing and digestible way to prepare and serve foods. She stresses to everyone handling the patient's tray the importance of serving it as promptly as possible to keep foods appetizingly hot or cold, because after all, a diet ordered is no good to the patient unless he eats it.

The pharmacist must compound prescriptions accurately, but he has other responsibilities too: drugs and medicines must be stored in a way to assure their safety. Antibiotic and vitamin preparations are refrigerated, and drugs which become too old are discarded. Persons working in the central supply room keep sterile and non-sterile supplies. On a moment's notice nursing personnel may obtain sterile instruments or equipment, oxygen apparatus, rubber goods, or many other items. Often the central supply room is located

next to the operating room so that the same equipment can be used to sterilize materials of each.

In the physiotherapy department treatments using heat, cold, water, light, electricity, massage, and exercise are given. These are designed to make the patient more comfortable or restore the function of a part of the body. Sometimes exercise can be accomplished through either recreational or occupational therapy. The former is an activity which gives pleasure, yet allows certain muscles to be strengthened through repeated use. Crocheting to make fingers more limber might be an example. Occupational therapy is training in an occupation or trade chosen with the patient's specific needs in mind, such as cabinet work or textile weaving. In hospitals for tuberculosis, mental disease, and other chronic illnesses, recreational and occupational therapy are used widely.

Even though a hospital doesn't have an established department for physiotherapy and recreational and occupational therapy, it may have some services to entertain convalescent patients. Distributing magazines, arranging parties or other entertainment, or piping music into the patients' rooms are just some of the ways.

Throughout hospitalization the patient's chart enables any trained person quickly to determine his condition and review treatment he has had. Also, it is a safeguard against the wrong kind or amount of therapy. After the patient's discharge, his record is filed and cross indexed in the hospital's record room and is subject to review by the patient's doctor, hospital personnel, and other doctors interested in research. Statistics may be compiled from a number of like cases, or a report of an unusual case made before a medical society or published in a medical journal. In any case, precautions to conceal the patient's identity are taken so that he will not be recognized

Problems Facing High Plains Water Board Outlined

"The first hundred years are the hardest," is an adage that will meet little agreement from county committeemen working in the 13-county High Plains Water Conservation District of West Texas these days. In the first 45 days since initial water well applications were received, fewer problems have been encountered than expected.

Questions have arisen, however, and decisions are being made on a fair and equitable basis, according to T. J. McFarland, District Manager, of Lubbock. Committees work without pay for time or travel, and meet at least once a week to process all applications received. As with the general public, these five-member committees are vitally interested in the protection of underground water by regulation well spacing.

Two of the biggest problems faced to date by County Committee-men are:

1. Procedure to be used in educating people in a more wise use of water and controlling of excessive pumping in agriculture.

2. The District as well as the committeemen are striving to impress upon water users of the High Plains the importance of information gained through completed well log and registration of the well after the pump has been installed. All this information has been needed for a great number of years to enable people of the High Plains to develop water in such a way that maximum benefit could be gained.

Application forms are to be submitted to county committees for approval before new wells are started. Forms are available without cost from county committees, county agents, well drillers, and pump companies.

Owners of completed wells are required to enter well log and registration with their county committee, on the regular form provided. This is required under Article 7880-3c, Section B-5, Texas Revised Civil Statutes. Plainly stated, the purpose of this requirement is to record proper information on each well.

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CRIMINAL TRIAL PROCEDURE HAS CONFLICTING AIMS

How many of the technicalities and so-called "loopholes" in our laws governing conduct of criminal trials could be eliminated without danger to innocent citizens? Some critics of our criminal trial system feel that certain safeguards in our system could be abolished without such danger. But many believe the danger to the innocent to be quite substantial.

While most everyone is in favor of more efficient law enforcement, a relative few would accomplish this aim at the expense of individual rights. A democratic society pursues conflicting aims in its criminal procedure — to convict the guilty without endangering the innocent.

The protections provided by our laws for the rights of those accused of crime form a primary distinction between our way of life and that existing behind the iron curtain. We start out with the promise that every individual is presumed to be innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. Then we rely upon various safeguards to insure that those actually innocent will not be wrongfully convicted.

If these safeguards are to be effective in protecting the innocent, our courts must insist upon their strict observance. This means that cases must be reversed and new trials must be granted in instances where the accused has not been afforded every protection guaranteed by our laws.

Many of these cases must obviously involve persons who are actually guilty. And sometimes the delays occasioned by mistrials and new trials will allow the guilty to escape punishment. Witnesses disappear and memories grow dim.

as the case moves from one appeal to another.

Admittedly, the guilty should be punished. But how far dare we go in reforming and speeding up the processes of criminal justice? Our judges and lawyers believe that any criminal procedure constructed solely with professional offenders in mind, or on the supposition that "the roughest have too many changes to escape" would result in a ritual whose efficiency would be equaled only by its terror.

So, while Bar committees are constantly working on plans for increasing the efficiency of our criminal trial machinery, progress must necessarily be gradual and orderly. Human rights and the individual are too important in our society to take a chance on any overnight upheaval of procedures and safeguards which have evolved over a period of several hundred years.

Our safeguards include the right not to be detained without being advised of the nature of the accu-

sation against us, the right not to be coerced into a confession, the right to be represented by counsel, the right to be a fair and prompt jury trial, and many others.

How many of these can we afford to give up in the interests of improving our criminal trial system? How many would you waive if you

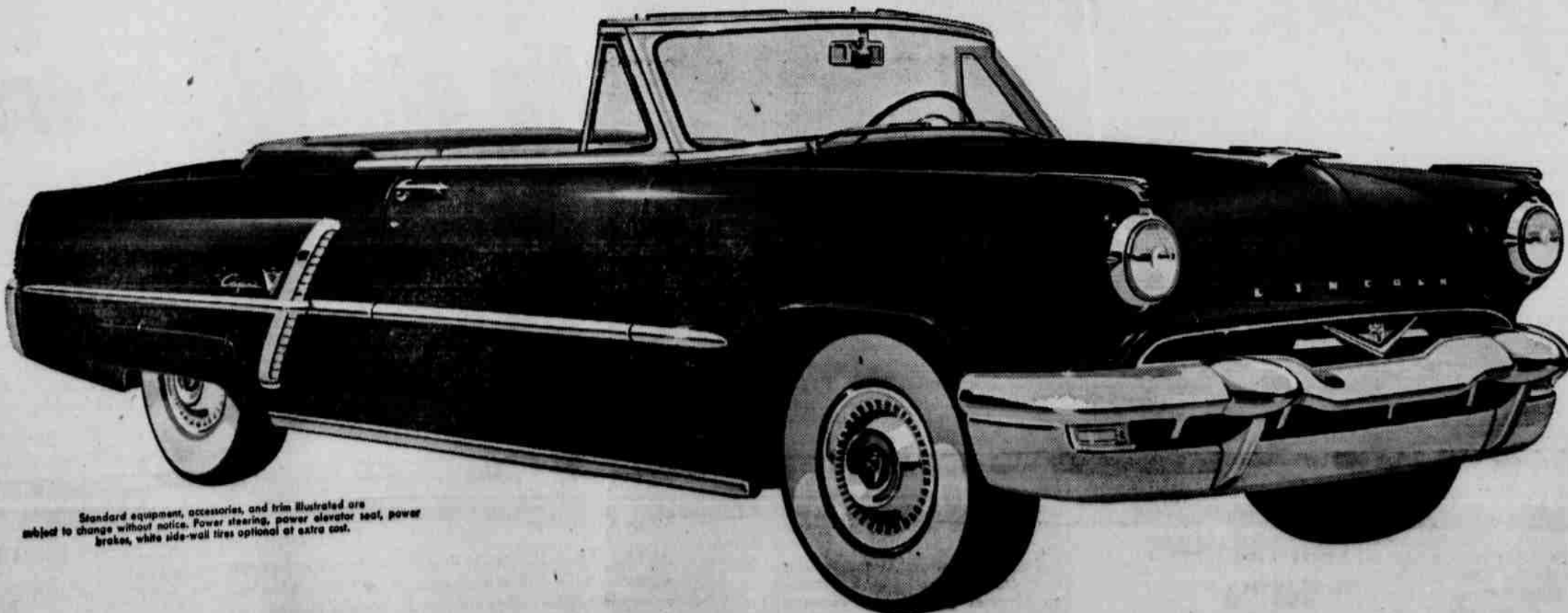

ACP PURPOSE EXPLAINED

A common question among a few Texas farmers and many residents of Iowa towns and cities is "What is the Agricultural Conservation Program of PMA?" The answer, in words is, this: The Agricultural Conservation Program is a practical and effective means of protecting the interests of all the people in our soil and water resources.

The Agricultural Conservation Program is operated as a government-farmer partnership. Through financial assistance provided by the federal government to the individual farmer, this program has encouraged and made possible the carrying out of conservation measures essential to the necessity of protecting our national agricultural resources in order that production of food and fiber can keep pace with the steadily growing population of our nation.

The financial assistance given by the government to help farm owners and operators to follow approved conservation practices has been in the form of materials, services and some monetary aid. Under the law, assistance could seldom exceed 50% of the actual out-of-pocket costs to the land owner or

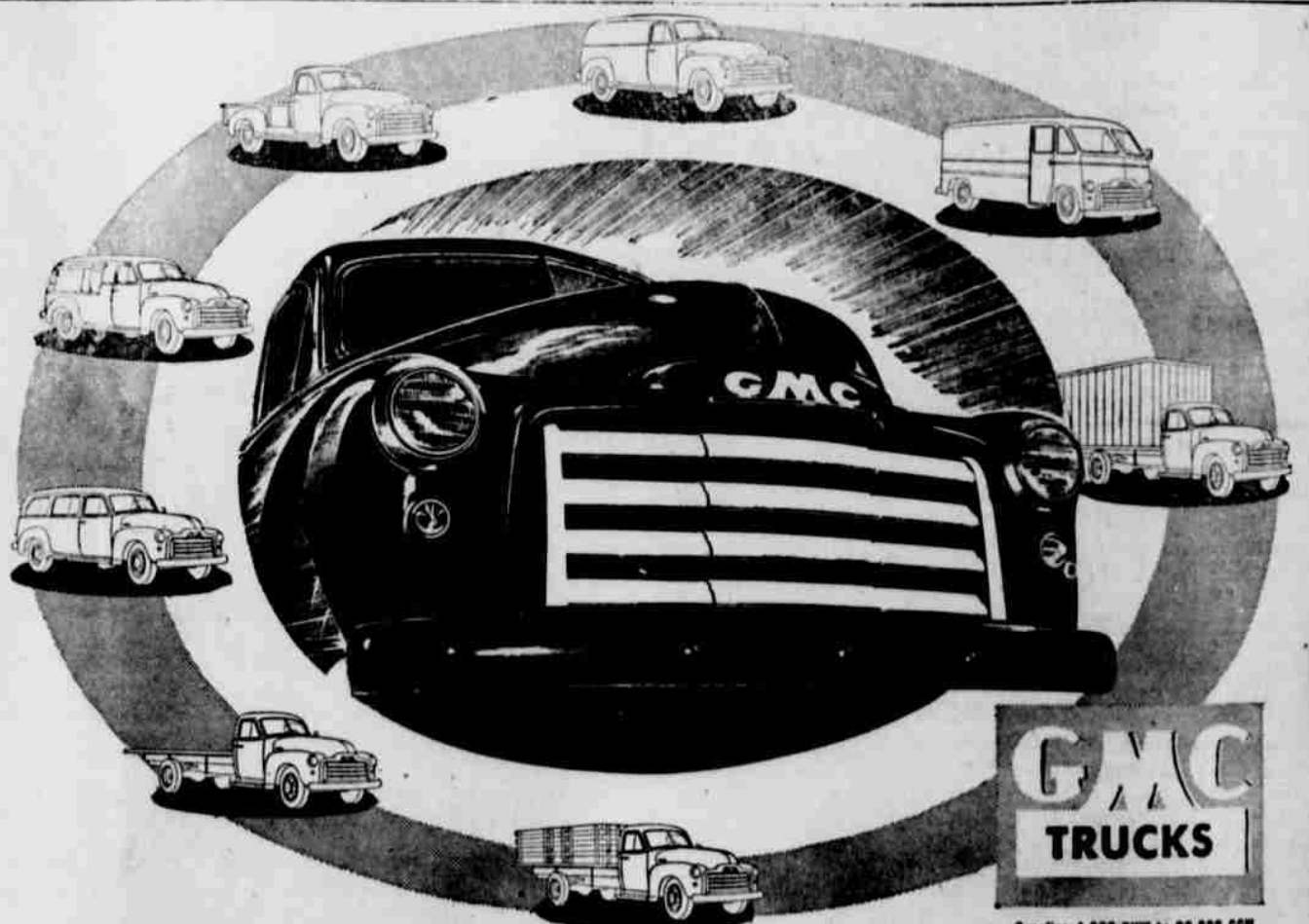

operator. In Texas, this federal assistance under the Agricultural Conservation Program of PMA has averaged only about one-third of the actual cost of the completed practices. In other words, the conservation practices that went into effect on the farms of Texas under the CAP plan have actual cost value of about three times the amount of federal assistance provided.

ALL FARMS ELIGIBLE

Participation in the Agricultural Conservation Program of ACP has always been open to all farmers. The program itself is administered for the United States Department of Agriculture by the State PMA committee and by farm-elected county and community PMA committees.

In 1951, there were 123,513 Texas farms participating in the Agricultural Conservation Program. These farms comprised 44% of all farms in the state. The average payment of federal funds for assistance in this work in Texas in 1951 was 174.94. Figures for 1952 will not be available until the filing of claims is completed this year. However, estimates of practices followed in 1952 under the ACP plan indicates that there was a considerable increase over the work completed in 1951. There was noticeable increase in permanent type practices such as standard and diversion terraces, contouring of intertilled crops, contour strip cropping, construction of sod waterways, construction of livestock and erosion dams, construction of drainage ditches and tiling.

It should be emphasized that one of the main arguments for the Agricultural Conservation Program of PMA is that it is designed to reach the greatest possible number of all

farm operators, both owners and tenants, and especially those who would be unable financially to carry on desired practices without governmental assistance. In this connection it should be pointed out that PMA has been greatly assisted in the task of encouraging adoption of sound conservation practices by other established agencies of the United States Department of Agriculture, such as the Soil Conservation Service, and the Extension Service.

The results of ACP are definitely apparent in increased production as reflected in cold, statistical crop production figures. But is not the

end of the story. Conservation farming has brought such visible results in the general improvement of homesteads and fields that they prompt even those not associated directly with agriculture to note the changes observed on their drives in the country. Conservation farming inspires confidence in non-farmers as well as farmers.

COTTON LOAN PROGRAM

As of this date 31,710 bales of cotton have been placed in the loan in Lamb County, representing \$4,118,523.81 dollars. Producers have brought back 1058 bales representing \$137,804.96 through the Lamb County PMA office.

Farm Bureau Urges Farmer to Fight Refund Gas Bill in State Legislature

Every tractor farmer in Lamb County will lose one-fourth of his refund on non-highway gasoline tax if House Bill 388 is passed by the State Legislature, according to A. F. Shelby, president of the Lamb County Farm Bureau.

Rep. James W. Yancy of Houston introduced the bill which would take away one cent of the four-cent-a-gallon refund and allocate it to the available school fund, the county farm leader said.

"What the proponents of this bill forget is that the so-called tractor gas 'Refund' is not actually a refund since the money power belonged to the state. The tax is collected just as an all gasoline, sent to Austin, and then returned to the rightful owners," Mr. Shelby added.

That the backers of the Yancy bill were apparently using the strategy

The Farm Bureau leader said of calling attention to the needs of the public schools and then pointing to the refund money as a likely source of revenue. He added that this would make the bill more difficult to defeat because the demand for a teachers' pay raise has touched off the hottest issue of this 53rd legislative session.

"The farmers pay their fair share of school taxes right along with everyone else in the school districts, and it isn't right for an additional burden to be placed upon them," Mr. Shelby said.

The head of the county farm organization said that if one-fourth of the refund were lost now, it might mean that the entire refund eventually might be abolished. He urged all farmers in the county to get in contact with their representatives in the state capital and inform them of their desires and wishes on the refund issue.

During the last legislative session—two years ago—the Texas Farm Bureau was instrumental in saving the tractor gas refund, the county road bond assumption monies and the rural road program. Before the session was over, the farmers and ranchers of the state had also pushed through a tax on natural gas which is still being fought in the courts.

High School Homemaking Course May Be Put on 12 Months Basis

The Littlefield school board is giving serious consideration toward putting the homemaking program now carried on in the school on a twelve-months basis, instead of the present nine months program.

Monday night the board was given an outline of the proposed program, which listed among others, the following impelling reasons, favoring lengthening of the course.

1. It would broaden home and family life education.
2. It would provide wider use of community resources and facilities and work experiences in the community, and the out-of-doors.
3. It would tend toward general education in family relationships with the individual working on special interest.
4. It would lend itself to group work and students learning from one another.
5. It would help to make the school a year-round center, for social recreation and culture.
6. Students are not as busy in the summer with extra-curricular activities. They would have more time to devote to the subject or project that they are interested in.

The following report and outline of the 12-month program was also studied, and entered on school board records:

Our present program of homemaking in high school includes the regular schedule of classroom work plus an additional month for summer experiences. Two teachers carry on this program and in the past have been working with from 80 to 100 girls. In addition to this program there have been requests from other groups in the community for the services of the homemaking department. We are now teaching a study course to a PTA group on the subject, "The Adolescent in the Home." This group of women also has asked if the homemaking teachers will give instruction to the ladies in such projects as speed sewing, tailoring, new techniques in foods preservation and preparation, furniture renovation, upholstery, and slip covering, and family relationships. The homemaking teachers are trained in all of these phases of work.

We now have an active chapter of the Future Homemakers club working in connection with our high school homemaking schedule.

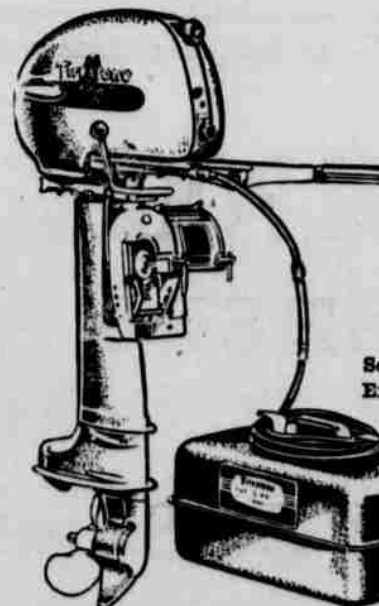

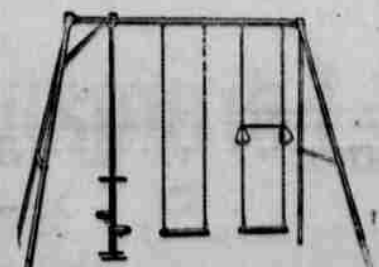

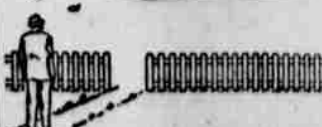

Violent storms harassed them, but on December 21, 1620, the company landed at "Plymouth Rock" and named the settlement, New Plymouth.
